Controls Are Praised as "Major Factor" in Runaway Spiral Halt

Boise, Nov. 24 (AP)—A committee today said that the controls it has set up to halt the runaway spiral of inflation are being praised as a "major factor" in the country's recovery.

The committee's report noted that the "national economy has operated under restrictive controls for 18 months and added:

"During that time significant progress has been achieved in restoring the nation's resources for defense."

"Two years ago," the report continued, "the country's recovery was seriously threatened. Inflationary forces were rampant. The value of the dollar was dropping rapidly."

"Industrial leaders and businessmen were gravely concerned. All were trying to build inventories, but the price of raw materials and other commodities was rising so fast that they were unable to do so. Shortages and all the time were being squandered more and more by their own actions."

Serious Rift Over India's POW Plan Still Not Resolved

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 24 (AP)—The most serious diplomatic rift between Britain and the U. S. in years continued unabated today despite efforts by India and other countries to close the breach. Day-long harmony moves were expected, but diplomats held little hope for them.

The two great allies split far apart when the U. S. notified British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden it could not accept a British-backed Indian compromise plan for ending the Korean prisoner-of-war deadlock unless the proposals should be given a chance as they stand, but the U. S. wanted all details spelled out. India can quickly with modifications but these apparently did not satisfy the U. S.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—State and defense department sources today said Russian-made war supplies are pouring into Indo-China over a transcontinental rail system protected from air attack because it cuts through China.

Officials said this gives new strength to communist forces in Indo-China, and presents a new, sinister threat to Burma and Thailand.

Informants said evidence that the Vietminh communists were receiving supplies from Indo-China in a recent raid by French and American forces on a communist supply center.

The ROKs used deadly accurate rifle and machine gun fire on some Chinese formations along the slopes of Sniper ridge in an attempt to surprise South Korean on Sniper ridge.

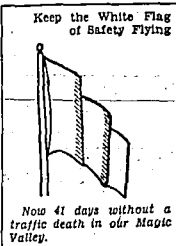

Opposition to Dies Forecast By Democrats

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—Congressman-elect Martin Dies, Texas, will find a big "keep your fingers off the door" next January if he tries to resign his old seat on the House Un-American activities committee.

Democratic leaders, to whom Dies must look for committee assignments, have made up their minds to bar him at all costs from the committee-investigating group he headed for seven years after, from 1938 to 1945.

Walter Blinn, Rep. Francis E. Walter, D. Pa., who will be ranking Democrat on the committee in the 83rd congress, said bluntly he doesn't want to see Dies returned to the group which once was known as "the Dies committee."

"I don't think he has any constructive contribution to make to the committee's work," Walter told a reporter.

Walter added that he feels so strongly on the subject he will lobby to his own seat on the committee necessary for no other reason than to keep from giving Dies a seat.

Selected "Ladd" Dies, who "retired" from the house eight years ago, was reelected this fall as a Democratic congressman at-large.

He made it clear during his election campaign—and in subsequent statements—that he hoped to resume the committee hunting activities which kept him in the front pages of the American press during World war II.

It will be comparatively easy for Democrats to bar him from the committee because there won't be any Democratic vacancies, anyway.

Ex-Trade Minister Confesses at Trial

VIENNA, Austria, Nov. 24 (AP)—Former Czech Communist Deputy Foreign Trade Minister Rudolf Margulies pleaded guilty to "economic espionage" today—the 10th "confession" in a row in communist biggest show-trial since World War II.

Margulies, 39, was the 10th of 14 former Czech red leaders to take the stand and plead guilty to charges of espionage and treason before a five-man court in Prague's prison courtroom, Prague radio said today.

The radio reported Margulies said he had committed "economic espionage" by negotiating unfavorable trade agreements with "capitalist countries."

He "confessed" he had been in "direct contact" with British, French and U. S. intelligence agents, the Prague radio said.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—The banking world is looking for George M. Humphrey, the incoming secretary of the treasury, to "stabalize" the government securities market and "hard" the dollar.

Just what should be done, and how it should be done are questions on which you can get about as many different opinions as you care to collect.

But business publications and interviews with bankers and others familiar with banking opinion disclose practically unanimous opinion that monetary policy should, in banking opinion, aim at getting more of the public debt into longer term issues, at higher interest rates.

of this city's power system and chairman of the Pacific northwest utilities conference committee. He says the area may "not utilize all this available publicity for several years."

The affected comprises all of Washington, most of Oregon, northern Idaho and western Montana. Ironically, the five million persons involved in the brown-out have been largely attracted here by one plentiful and cheap electric utility.

The northwest has been increasing in population at the rate of one-third each decade, or more than twice the national average. This growth has, in turn, given indirect benefits to the farms and industries in the Rocky mountains.

E. J. Dyer, head of the defense electric power administration, was here last week with his top aides to consult with power officials. They were in a joint statement that "even substantial rains in the next few weeks may not solve the shortage since precipitation probably will be in the form of snow in most areas where increased stream flow is most needed."

4th of U.S. Being Apped, Pentagon Says

The manpower dilemma confronts all the military services but hits the army and marine corps hardest because their turnover is greatest.

Army planners say they need more men under the circumstances than the present 450,000 ceiling allows, but particularly they want more realistic and predictable basis for planning. Few of them expect any desire to increase the lethality of service for draftees.

The planners would like to operate on the assumption that the Korean fighting may continue indefinitely. Then, they say, should peace come suddenly their manpower program could be cut accordingly.

At least a year's leeway is needed in proper planning, the military men say, but add they would be content with a six-month margin. At times they have had six months notice of how many men they would be allowed but the totals have been changed in some cases with only a few days or weeks notice.

One proposal said to be under consideration is that congress approve two defense department budgets—one based on no fighting, the other on a continuation of hostilities. Then, the situation would decide which budget would be in effect.

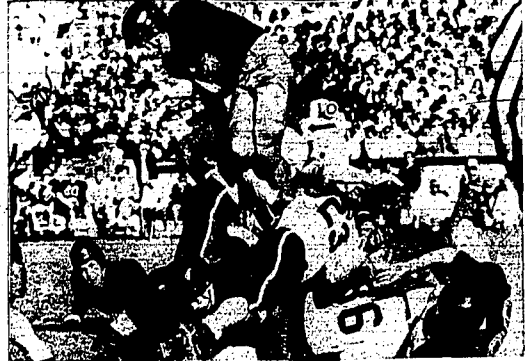

Stassen Faces 5 Problems in His New Post

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—Harold E. Stassen faces five major problems as America's new foreign aid director, mutual security experts say.

One top MSA official said Stassen will "find himself squarely in the middle of some real domestic and foreign fights in all those and even other problems."

"It's going to be a tough, thankless job all the way around," he said.

Foreign aid experts outlined the most vital problems facing the 45-year-old Stassen, named by President-Elect Eisenhower to succeed Averell Harriman:

1. An acute point toward a hostile congressional attitude toward any heavy outlays next year for foreign aid. The outgoing administration is drafting a 7.5 billion dollar aid request sure to be attacked as far too high.

2. U. S. allies are undergoing new economic crises brought on by the free world's expanded rearmament effort. It is cut, substantially, aid-receiving countries are sure to cut back their already uncertain defense role.

3. Any Republican emphasis on "trade not aid" as a substitute for heavy foreign aid programs may collide with demands for higher protective tariffs that would actually cut foreign trade with the United States.

4. In his new job, Stassen will be administrator of the Lend-Lease act which restricts the flow of strategic products and materials from aid-receiving nations to the communist bloc. Many nations had signed contracts with red nations before the act became law and deliveries are ready to go. Unless an exemption is made, the law requires that all American aid be cut off if the goods are delivered.

5. The bulky mutual security administration is slated for a reorganization to put defense, economic point four and other aid projects under lighter administrative control. The history of such schemes is that they delay programs and frequently end up with yet another agency on top of the old one.

Japanese Leader Falls in Try for War Babies Help

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 24 (AP)—A daughter of Japan's Mitsubishi family was killed today Monday, when she fell from a three-month effort to win help for Japan's more than 100,000 illegitimate war babies.

"And I asked for so little," lamented Mrs. Miki Sawada, wife of a former ambassador and the founder of a home for the war babies in Ohio, Japan.

"I asked for so little for so few. I asked only that a number of these babies, already petitioned for or already adopted in our country, be given the right to live in the United States."

"But the hard, hard immigration laws of this country prevent their admission except by special and costly congressional bills each requiring from eight months to two years for passage."

She told interviewers that 90 percent of the babies have American fathers.

Swinging Lights 'Mystery' Solved

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 24 (AP)—The mysteriously swinging light fixture which drew hundreds of onlookers to a vacant case building here is no longer moving through its 18-inch arc.

A caretaker, joining the "experts" Friday, merely shut off a nearby heat register and things, including the fixture, turned quiet.

The fixture dangled when several other similar fixtures in the structure failed to join the "swing session."
