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Thanksgiving Day Visit to Korea Gls Rumored for 'Ike'

NEW YORK, Nov. 25 (AP)—President-Elect Dwight D. Eisenhower's headquarters buzzed with speculation today that he may try to spend Thanksgiving day in Korea with the GIs. Owing to a security blackout covering all details of his trip, no official information was available. A number of indications, however, pointed to the possibility that the President-elect is about ready to leave for the war zone. They were:

1. He has made two more re-designations. Yesterday he named Mrs. Paul H. Douglas, Salt Lake City, for secretary of agriculture and Gen. Sherman Adams, New Hampshire, for White House aide.
2. He has named a new commander in the far east, Gen. Mark W. Clark, to take over the command of the United States Army in Japan.
3. The President-elect tapped off in his appointments book today, setting aside most of his visits from friends, some relatives, and officers from the military.

Taft Does Not See Revolution For U.S. Crop Support Policies

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 25 (AP)—Gen. Robert A. Taft feels the change to Republican control will bring "no revolution in the basic principles of agricultural policy." In his first major speech since the election, Taft told members of the Ohio Farm Bureau federation last night he also doubted if any tax reduction would come before 1954. Taft said at a press conference before his speech he had "joined" in recommending Ezra Taft Benson, Salt Lake City, for secretary of agriculture in President-Elect Eisenhower's cabinet. The Ohio Republican added that Benson was the only man so far named to the cabinet in which he and Eisenhower had "joined."

2 Experts Tell 1953 Outlook For Livestock

BURLEY, Nov. 25—The outlook for 1953 dairying and livestock was outlined at the meeting of the Cassia county farm bureau here Saturday by Virgil Kennedy, farm management consultant, and C. C. Anderson, state extension dairy specialist, both Boise.

"The cattle industry is in the middle of a considerable cyclical expansion, the effects of which are showing up in 1953 and will continue prominently in 1954 and 1955," Kennedy said.

He stated that cattle production on farms has been expanding since 1949 and that slaughter has risen the last few months and is now exceeding that of a year ago. A further increase in slaughter is expected in 1953, he said. Slaughter probably will be stepped up enough to push total meat supplies above this year, enough to bring another general reduction in price of cattle, and enough to prevent any marked improvement in price of hogs until a somewhat milder hog slaughter, he said.

Kennedy added that in 1953, with cattle slaughtering increased by a question of beef will be about 8 to 10 per cent larger than last year.

"The outlook for dairying for 1953 in respect to general production is more of what we had in 1952," Kennedy declared. With few exceptions, he said, this applies to the number of milk cows, production per cow, total milk production, farm income from dairy products, utilization and consumption. In a number of areas, because of last summer's drought, milk prices will continue substantially above a year earlier until next pasture season, he said.

Kennedy claimed, "We can look for a further significant drop in butter production to not more than about eight pounds in 1953, less than one-half percent." Most of the other prospective changes are small in comparison with those experienced in recent years," he concluded.

Anderson claims better care is being given to increasing production in dairying by a number of factors, so that many beef growers are buying dairy bulls to convert from beef to dairying. "Dairying in the next few years has a better future than beef raising," he concluded.

The Rev. Mr. Kendall, who received his master's degree from the University of California theological school, is director of evangelism for the district of Idaho, Utah and Montana.

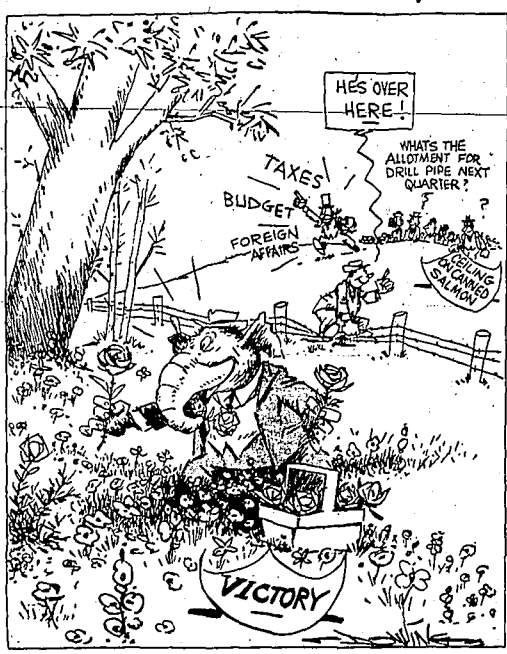

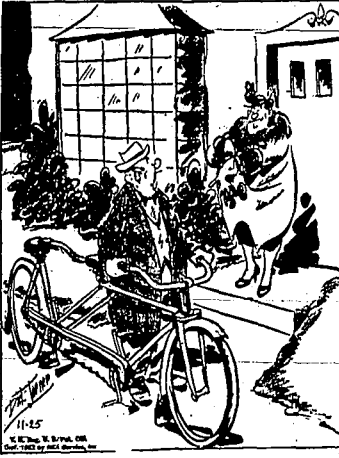

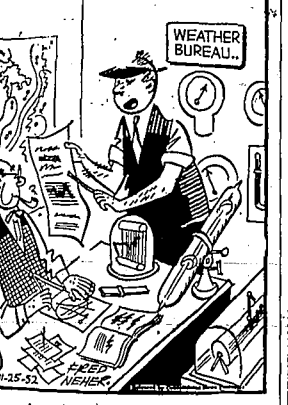

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Revise Slated For Laws on Forest Fires

BOISE, Nov. 23.—State Forester Roger Guernsey, was instructed Monday to prepare an amendment to state laws to provide that persons accused of burning fires in forests without permits during the season may be tried by justices of the peace.

At present, the offense is an indictable misdemeanor. The amendment recommended by the state cooperative board of forestry, would make it a misdemeanor.

The board also instructed Guernsey to prepare for its March meeting a statement on the forestry department's policy for fire fighting on privately owned land.

Forest Idea Left Guernsey said a suggestion for a state law allowing cities and towns to establish community forests was not brought up at the meeting. He said earlier the state might consider a law two years from now allowing such forests to be set up, primarily to protect municipal water-sheds.

Other Proposals Also referred to committees for further study were proposals that: 1. Part of the slash disposal fund collected from timber land owners be used for control of insect diseases attacking trees and for research in the field.

2. The reforestation law be amended. 3. Power saw operators be required to carry a shovel as well as a fire extinguisher.

4. The statute requiring machines in the woods to carry spark arresters be strengthened. The group decided against recommending an "insect committee" on public lands. And investigation needed, they said, could be done by conferences or study groups called by the land commission or forester.

Tests Planned

BURLEY, Nov. 23.—Achievement testing program for Cassia county schools will take place in all grades from second to ninth inclusive before Dec. 8. Superintendent Wiley reports.

"Purpose of these tests," Wiley explained, "is to assist teachers to analyze their work and to assist them in doing a better job during the balance of the school year."

USDA Choice Is Surprise to Farm Leaders

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—Selection of Earl Tarr Benson as secretary of agriculture in the Eisenhower administration came as a surprise to farm leaders here.

White Benson has devoted much of his life to agriculture, he was not widely known in that field. He served here as executive of the National Council of Farmer Cooperatives from 1932 to 1944, resigning to become an apostle of the LDS church in Salt Lake City.

Benson was believed to have been recommended as secretary of agriculture by President-elect Eisenhower's brother, President Milton S. Eisenhower, Pennsylvania State college, and a longtime aide to Henry A. Wallace when Wallace was secretary of agriculture.

Benson is a farm marketing specialist—a fact that probably played a major part in his selection. Republican farm leaders long have contended that farm programs under President Roosevelt and Truman neglected the possibilities of expanding markets for agricultural products. Instead, the Republicans said, the democratic programs have depended too heavily on government subsidies and production controls to solve problems of low crop prices.

Alan D. Kline, president of the American Farm Bureau federation, said Eisenhower had made a "stop-n-go" appointment.

Senator Watkins, R., Utah, said he was sure the Benson appointment will be fully approved by the farm organization and the farmers themselves. "He's not for a lot of give-away programs," the senator said. "But he will be for the things necessary to maintain farm prosperity."

Senator Carlson, R., Kansas, who had been mentioned for secretary of agriculture, said "I think it's a very good appointment."
