Toll in Storm Gains; Traffic Deaths Added

WIND-whipped highways left a trail of wreckage and blizzards hoped to boost the toll of traffic deaths today.

A United Press dispatch showed that at least 22 persons had died in traffic accidents in New York and Pennsylvania today.

Deaths caused solely by the blizzards in New York were reported to be 11. The count there sharply upward when four persons were killed in a head-on collision on a highway when a blizzard driver when howling winds captured a small boat.

Firemen Hunt Victims of Big Hospital Fire

HUNTINGTON, W. V., Nov. 27 (UP)—Firemen today are searching for victims charred inside a building at the Huntington state mental hospital today for the cause of the Thanksgiving Eve blaze fatal to 14 women.

Nearly 100 other inmates of the 120-bed building sustained smoke poisoning or shock from the fire. None was in serious condition. Damage was estimated at \$100,000.

Fire-Proofing Under Way

Firemen had to run ladders to the second and third floors of the building and then chop through wire mesh screens covering the windows to reach some of the screaming patients. Others were led down a central staircase before the blaze became too intense.

State Fire Marshal C. A. Raper said the inmates were burned to handle than normal people.

Fire-Proofing OK'd
The state building commission recently approved a request for approximately \$100,000 to fire-proof the building and three others at the hospital. The request was to be submitted to the legislature in January.

OK of India Truce Plan Is Expected

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 27 (UP)—India's compromise Korean-peace formula neared a vote in the United Nations political committee today. Prospects were for overwhelming passage with American approval.

Although American officials, from Secretary of State Dean Acheson down, refused to confirm it, highly reliable diplomatic sources said Acheson himself told a caucus of the 20-nation Latin-American bloc last night the United States would support the third version of the Indian measure, provided a Danish amendment is included.

Despite Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky's announcement that both Russia and communist China rejected the Indian plan, American support assured an overwhelming passage for it when the 60-nation political committee votes.

Committee Chairman Jose Carlos Muniz Brazil, called a Thanksgiving afternoon session to vote the compromise proposal to a halt. But observers saw little hope of a halt today. The Ukraine, Australia and Canada were officially listed to speak. It was understood that Russia, Britain and the U. S. also would speak.

Korea Troops Block Attacks; Join in Feast

SEOUL, Korea, Nov. 27 (UP)—South Korean troops shattered a Chinese attack on the central front today and then joined their American and United Nations comrades in a Thanksgiving day turkey dinner.

Bloody Bulper ridge north of Kumhwa erupted in a rain of bullets and shells just before dawn as the Chinese surged from their maze of caves and tunnels at the northern tip of the ridge.

The Chinese, screaming "kill kill," pushed into the South Korean lines three times, moving in close for vicious rifle and hand grenade attacks. The Koreans hurled their own grenades and machine guns, and the Chinese were repulsed.

The war-torn area was quiet today. The U. S. and South Korean troops were seen eating turkey dinners in their quarters during their visit to Korea.

Controls Will Be Retained, Putnam Says

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (UP)—The administration seemed committed today to keep price and wage controls until congress takes them off on April 30.

After calling former price boss Michael V. Disalle here to advise on control methods and policy during the soon-some days of the administration, Economic Stabilizer Roger Putnam told assembled OPB officials.

"I want everyone here to realize, and the public too, that we will have a job to do and a law to administer."

We still need controls in many places.

Putnam favors a 14-month extension of anti-inflation powers until mid-1953. He said he hoped Disalle's return as a special consultant would help guide the prospects of imminent abandonment of controls.

No Decision for Coal Pay Raises

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (UP)—Economic Stabilizer Roger L. Putnam will not make a decision before Monday on the soft coal wage increase.

Putnam held a two-hour White House conference with top officials yesterday. He told newsmen before leaving to spend the holiday with his family that he would give no explanation for the delay, but that a decision "definitely will not come until next week."

Putnam must decide whether to support his own wage stability plan in cutting the miners' wage boost from \$1.50 to \$1.20 a day.

Blindness for Man Ends in Priceless Gift

STANFORD, Calif., Nov. 27 (AP)—A blind ex-convict, who has spent many years helping other blind persons has received a priceless Thanksgiving gift—restored sight.

After more than 30 years of blindness, Tom E. Hartwig, of Phoenix, Ariz., can see again.

His bandages were taken off this week. Stanford doctors say there's every chance he will regain normal vision in the eye.

Hartwig, until now, was the only blind man ever appointed by the governor of Arizona to serve on the President's committee for national employ-the-handicapped week.

As rehabilitation counselor in Arizona service for the blind, Hartwig serves a territory of nine counties including the city of Phoenix.

His task is to help other blind people find jobs and live useful lives.

Blindness overtook him early, and Hartwig is largely self-educated. He is currently taking a college extension course in advanced creative writing. He has written two books, one in Braille.

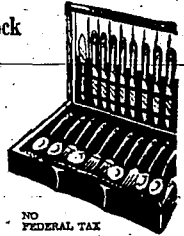

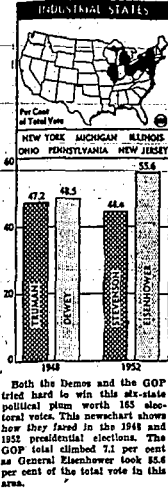

New Regime to Be Like Many Homes—Women Handle Funds

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—The Eisenhower administration will be sort of like an average American family in one way—women will handle much of the money.

Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby has been named head of a federal agency including the world's largest insurance agency, said Mrs. Ivy Baker Priest will be signing the paper currency—the nation's folding money.

President-Elect Eisenhower has named Mrs. Hobby, Houston, Tex., as administrator of the federal security agency and Mrs. Priest, Bountiful, Utah, as treasurer of the United States. Both are 47.

Eisenhower, in announcing Mrs. Hobby's designation to succeed Oscar Ewing, said she would attend cabinet meetings because of the importance of her post. Ewing on Tuesday was invited to such meetings by President Truman, but he did not attend regularly.

Mrs. Priest as treasurer will succeed Mrs. Georgia Westcott Clark, Richmond, Kans., the first woman to be United States purse-string custodian. She will be charged with the receipt, disbursement and accounting of public moneys. Her signature will appear on all greenbacks from 41 up.

Eisenhower's inclusion of Mrs. Hobby at cabinet meetings gave rise to renewed speculation that the Republicans may be planning to push the Hoover commission recommendation that a new cabinet post be created to include the variety of activities now in the federal security agency.

Republican women leaders are known to have their eye on this as a likely cabinet post for a woman. Only one other—Woman's Progress Forum, has served in the cabinet. She was secretary of labor in the Franklin D. Roosevelt administration.

Mrs. Hobby will become a trustee—one of the largest trust funds in the world—about 17 billion dollars held for those covered under the old-age and survivors insurance program.

Mrs. Priest will have the responsibility of seeing that the treasury issues its daily and monthly statements on the government's financial standing. She will sign government checks and see that the interest and principal is paid on public debts.

He rejected, however, a recommendation in a \$600-million reorganization survey which would have concentrated functions of VA's 70 regional offices into various centers. Gray said he intends to retain the agency's regional offices "as one-stop service stations for veterans as they exist today, with each office headed by a manager."

2 Cases Filed On Alienation Of Affections

Civil suits to collect \$15,000 and costs each were filed in district court Wednesday by Mrs. Betty Norrene Aldritt and her sister, Lillie Mae Aldritt against their father—and mother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. B. K. Aldritt, whom they charge with alienation of affections.

The girls are teen-age sisters who

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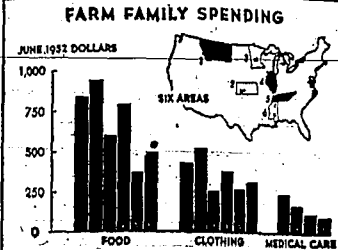
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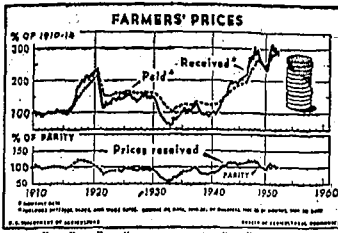
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These department of agriculture charts show how farm families spent their 1952 dollars (top) and how prices which gave farmers one dollar have fluctuated since 1918.



1953 Looks Fine for Farmers, But Overdue Drought Is Bogy

WASHINGTON (U.P.) — Unless there is a big war, big peace or big drought in 1953 the new president should start along fine with American farmers—at least in his first year in office.

That's what the top state and federal farm experts agreed to recently at their important annual outlook session.

At this session the big brains of agriculture got together, hash over all the big economic and political factors which can affect the U. S. farmers such as the foreign market, government spending and the general business level, and decide what the next 12 months hold in store for them.

General optimism over continued farm prosperity was the keynote of this meeting as it has been every year since the war. The farmer may get slightly less for his products, but he'll get more for his inputs, and he'll have a little more. But the general outlook is for another prosperous year for the farmer.

Despite all of this, scientific facts and figures, however, many of the experts had an uneasy feeling about one possible factor in next year's farm outlook. That is the fear that a major drought, such as the last one of 1950, might strike.

According to the records such a drought is long overdue. The country never has gone as long as this has now, without one. The very dry fall this year was mentioned as a bad omen. The result, if 1953 proves to be the next year for the big drought, could be a major headache for the new president.

If something drastic should happen to relieve the present, winter tension, resulting in a severe cut in military spending and foreign aid, the farmer would also run into some trouble, the experts say. It would quickly reduce both the foreign and domestic demand for farm products.

On the other hand, if World War III should erupt, the only thing on the American farmer's income would be price controls and the amount they could produce. There would be anything unlimited demand for food and everything else the farmer grows.

In the farm way-of-life for 1953 the major gains are going to be in

the same categories as for the past 10 years, according to the experts. Electrification of farms is expected to continue. Latest figures show a total of 84 per cent of all U. S. farms getting electric power from a central station.

In the matter of dress, 1953 should see the American farm family continue to catch up with the standards of the average American city dweller. The farmer will do the same in the purchase of more entertainment, education and medical care.

From the average American consumer's point of view the electrification also produced some good news. Again barring drought or war, the continued high farm production which is predicted is expected to bring a halt to the Korean-inspired rise in food prices.

The consumer outlook is brightest in beef, with farmers expected to raise about 10 per cent more cattle. It should start the best price down for the first time since the Korean fighting started.

The outlook for next year could set a pace for 1953, above 1941, but because of increased population the average person will probably get only about 144 pounds compared to the 1941 per capita average of 154 pounds.

Just the deciduous and citrus fruit crops are expected to be higher in 1953, with more and cheaper frozen juice concentrates on the market.

Plane Losses Under Score Big USAF Battle Against Elements

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Nov. 27 (AP)—A series of military air disasters the month tragically underscored the unending struggle between men and the elements in this far northern defense area. Here an airplane gets little chance to forgive a mistake in navigation. In the air and on the ground, weather, menacing mountains and all but impassable terrain swiftly separate men from boys. But despite the gigantic problems U. S. military pilots have learned to fly in the worst weather and to maneuver over the ground in temperatures down to 60 degrees below zero when mere survival is a struggle. Military men commonly describe Alaska as a land meant to fly over, not to walk over. The Illinois Republican is slated to head the committee in the new Congress which meets Jan. 3.

"The committee already has spent a little too much time on Hollywood," Velde said in an interview. "That field should be subordinated to more important matters."

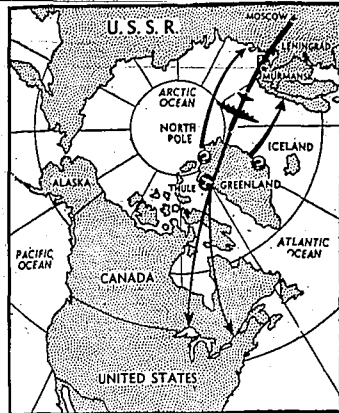
He also predicted the committee will permit some of its hearings to be televised. House GOP leader Joseph W. Martin, Jr., who will become speaker, has announced he will reverse Speaker Sam Rayburn's ban against TV-radio coverage of hearings and leave the decision to committee members.

Velde feels television coverage would "educate" the public on communism and enhance the committee's prestige.

"The general public would have a higher regard for the committee and its functioning if they saw it in operation. They could see it operate in a sane manner in keeping with our guarantees of the bill of rights," he said.

Velde said the "important matters" he wants the committee to investigate include at least two big labor unions, the United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers (U. M. W.) and the United Packinghouse Workers.

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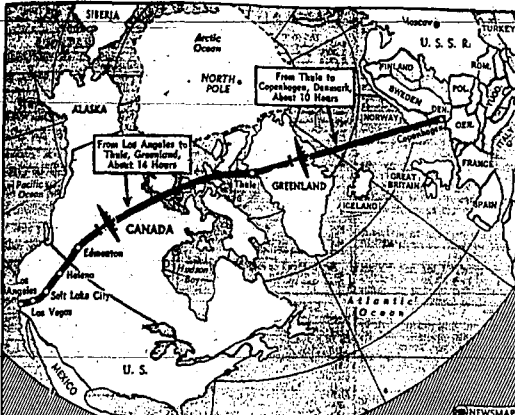

Many "Cat and Dog" Problems To Require Decisions by "Ike"

(Editor's note: Part of a series on the issue facing the new President.)
 By PETER EDSON
 WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—The more you look at it the 96-million-dollar question facing President-elect Eisenhower, the more you feel sorry for him. It isn't fair to burden any one man with all these weighty problems.
 The candidate who really won in this election was the man who lost. Eisenhower was the horsepower facing Eisenhower are a vast number of legislative "cat and dog" miscellaneous issues.
 Most of the matters referred in previous articles of this series have been groups by departments of government or by related activities. Here are some of the more varied matters Eisenhower must make up his mind on.
 The international wheat agreement expires July 31, 1933. There have been preliminary meetings of the international wheat council in London to consider renewal. Another meeting is being scheduled for Washington in January.
 Under the first wheat agreement negotiated in 1920 after 18 years of futile trying, 42 wheat importing nations and the four major exporters, the U. S., Australia, Canada and France, did get together. The importing countries were to be assured stable supplies at fair prices. The Korean war raised world wheat prices, however, and the result is that this year the U. S. had to subsidize the export of some 23 million bushels of wheat at 65 cents a bushel, for total of 164 million dollars. The immediate question is whether Eisenhower will recommend continuing this subsidy, or work out a new arrangement.
 Of a similar nature, a new international sugar agreement is being considered. The United Nations is now polling all countries to see if they wish to hold a sugar conference next spring.
 The original 1931 sugar agreement to regulate production, exports and stocks was suspended in World War II. It has been imperative ever since, except as a statistical exchange agency. Its members have been 17 exporting countries and the two major importers, U. S. and U. K. The present plan is that the new international agreement would not interfere in any way with the U. S. farm policy in general will be a major subject for the new administration. Farm rice supports at 50 per cent of parity and soil conservation payments are now guaranteed through 1934, however, there is more time in which to take up new policies.
 If the war emergency were to end suddenly, however, and farm prices to slip, hearings would almost certainly be held on very short governmental support of non-perishable crops.
 Expansion of crop insurance, now on a limited, experimental scale, and increase of farm credit are two other subjects likely for early consideration. Farm credit agencies now are turning away customers because they don't have money to loan to them—the demand.
 Veterans' affairs will present Eisenhower with some kind-sized worries. The principal one is the disability case. There are now nearly 30 million veterans and three million more coming from the Korean war up, the U. S. will have a nation of veterans. Caring for their health becomes an increasing social problem. On the social security program, the present power given to the states to determine what constitutes "disability" for the receipt of benefits expires next year. It must be reworked, or power given to the federal government to set the standards of eligibility for the receipt of disability payments.
 Presidential powers to extend embargoes in the armed services will be reopened in January and reach the President about July 1. Extension of operating certificates for U. S. airlines serving the far east must be considered. A number of foreign air carriers are applying for rights to fly over U. S. territory.
 U. S. maritime administration has a serious problem coming up in relation to renew the last exemption now granted on reserves funds for new ship construction. The last exemption expires next July 1.

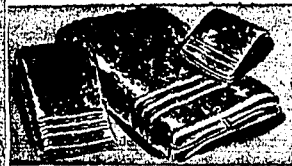

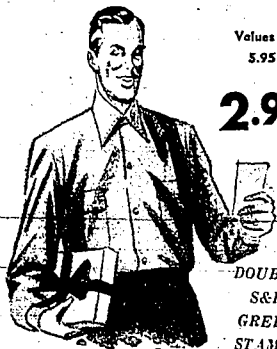
