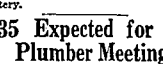

Surely, we all must admit that the merest glint and lighting effects fall far short of anything even approaching the Christmas spirit, and that is not entirely because of the year-old decorating plan itself. But because of the lack of interest shown in individual store decorations as well as in the general display.

Perhaps the most important factor in this contest of Commerce and our city officials could get together on short notice and figure out some hurry-up method of improving on a job which we'll have to admit is not well done.

In any event, steps should be taken to make sure that the contest is a success next year. Irrespective of individual or organizational responsibilities, the business men and city officials of Twin Falls should take the initiative in correcting this situation.

**NEEDS RESPONSIBILITY**—On behalf of Eisenhower's administration, the following executive agencies neglected completely by Truman. Indeed, his failure to permit them to function as originally planned is largely responsible for both the domestic and foreign "mess."

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**DEMOCRATIC OPPOSITION**

There is no reason at all to doubt the sincerity of Gov. Adlai Stevenson when he voices the hope that the Democratic party will take a position of "peace and progress" during the Eisenhower administration.

Stevenson today is the acknowledged leader of his party. President Truman himself told the nation that. The governor has wide backing with the rank and file. Undoubtedly he will use his influence to make of the Democrats the "loyal opposition."

Yet the realities of politics may actually produce a substantially different result. Not too many people are around who remember, but in the old days of Republican ascendancy, the Democrats very frequently opposed Republican's sake. No one needs to be reminded that the Republicans, in the Democratic era just closing, did much the same thing.

History, of course, does not have to repeat itself. But, broadly speaking, it is very likely to.

The minority party is in the business of setting itself apart from the majority. In wartime, such extreme considerations get buried. Even in critical peacetime, like the present day, there may be a high degree of cooperation between the parties on foreign affairs. Certainly there is every prospect that General Eisenhower will draw a lot of Democratic support for his foreign programs.

But time will probably show that the slightest excuse exists for criticism, for opposing, for going off at a different tangent, than that they are confident of going to the voters four years hence with a truly distinctive record.

In other words, "me-tooism" will in the long run prove no more popular with the Democrats than it was in GOP ranks. And to the extent that the Democrats seek to compel the party to follow such a course, it may find its cohorts looking to other leadership.

Already a few in congress are chafing under the Stevenson lines, urging that this or that senator be turned to for guidance. It will be hard, if not impossible, to keep Democratic lawmakers from like a record that stresses opposition for its own sake.

**POSTMASTER GENERAL APPOINTMENT**

The appointment of Arthur E. Summerfield to Michigan as postmaster general is strictly in line with a precedent of long standing, which we wish had been broken by General Eisenhower.

Summerfield is a very capable man, who under other circumstances might make a top flight postmaster general. What we dislike about the selection is that he is doing the new job from that of Republican national committee chairman, which we assume he will give up, as he is quoted, as saying, the same, should not hold both jobs.

But Summerfield will be deluged with patronage seekers, who will consider him the man to go to because he has the Republican nomination and the campaign in which the job seekers presumably contributed their bids. This will make it impossible for Summerfield to give his full attention to his job.

This department has been ridden by politics for years. It has been run as a business enterprise and run at some profit instead of at a never-ending deficit. And there ought to be a serious attempt to correct that.

Summerfield undoubtedly has the natural ability to make a good postmaster general. The doubt is whether the political demands will allow him to be one—Hamps Free Press.

Gasoline Plan Gets Scrutiny At City's Meet

BOHLE, Dec. 3—The method of supplying gasoline to city employees who use their vehicles in city work was discussed by the Bohle city council Tuesday night after the matter was introduced by B. T. Albertson.

Albertson questioned the economy of supplying gasoline to various vehicles when the vehicles are used for the city. Councilman Donald B. Higgins said the city was saving money by not having to buy the equipment now being supplied free of charge to the city.

Arrangement Cheaper Higgins also said that the present arrangement is cheaper than a mileage rate would be. It also was suggested that each employee who uses his vehicle for the city be permitted to draw a maximum amount each month.

Albertson said he thought it would be better if the employees purchased their own gasoline and then submitted bills to the city. Councilman pointed out, however, that the gasoline is furnished at wholesale prices but that retail prices would have to be paid if the employees purchased gasoline as individuals.

The four employees who use their vehicles for the city are J. W. Johnson, who operates a truck at the cemetery; Gene Avery, who drives his own pickup truck as foreman of the city street crew; Robert Stewart, fire chief, who uses his car when he makes his monthly inspections; and Harold Johnson, police chief, who uses his car in addition to the city police car.

Matter Tabled The council decided to table the matter and to investigate how other communities with similar situations handle the matter.

An ordinance setting up an temporary district for voters, mailboxes and drains for the Williams addition and West Main street was passed by the council. The ordinance also creates an assessment roll for the work.

### Truman Lauds

## Jessup, Blasts 2 for Charges

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—President Truman slapped at Sen. Joseph P. McCarty and Harold E. Stassen when they introduced the resignation of Ambassador-at-Large Philip C. Jessup.

Jessup, serving under a recess appointment from the President, resigned effective Jan. 16, the last day of the Truman administration. A senate foreign relations subcommittee had voted 3-2 against confirmation in October, 1943. The full committee never acted on the nomination and Democrats made no effort to force a senate showdown.

Jessup was one of McCarthy's prime targets in the Wisconsin Republican charges of communism in government. He accused the diplomat of an "affinity for communist causes." Stassen, President-elect Eisenhower's choice as mutual security administrator, said Jessup was linked with America's "diplomats" far eastern policy.

Mr. Truman, in accepting Jessup's resignation late yesterday, wrote the diplomat praising the "courage and seal with which you served your country at all times and under all conditions."

Jessup flatly denied the McCarthy and Stassen charges. Mr. Truman, in making the recess appointment, said "documentation introduced in support" of accusations against Jessup "based on fraud. Jessup in his letter of resignation, Oct. 14, said he would return to his former position on the Columbia University faculty."

Mr. Truman wrote Jessup that the nation is indebted to him for his public service in international affairs. He listed Jessup's service with the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration, the Bretton Woods monetary conference and the San Francisco conference which drafted the United Nations charter.

The amnesia fire caused minor damage to the basement, underneath a restaurant and another store in downtown Idaho Falls.

# 11 Ex-Czech Leaders Are Put to Death

**VIENNA, Dec. 3**—Rudolf Slansky and 10 other Czechoslovak communist leaders convicted in the recent purge trial were executed early today, Prague radio announced.

The 11—once trusted servants of the Kremlin—were sentenced to death Nov. 27 as confessed traitors who admitted they led a "Zionist, Trotskyist" plot to overthrow their pro-Moscow government.

Those who died with Slansky, the Czech party's former secretary general, were:

- Vlado Clementis, former Czech foreign minister;
- Bedrich Gajdar, former head of the Communist party's international section and Kremlin spokesman in Prague;
- Otto Silin, former deputy secretary general of the party;
- Bedrich Fajka, former head of the state economic commission;
- Bedrich Reicin, an ex-general and former deputy defense minister;
- Otto Fischl, former deputy finance minister;
- Alois Simon, ex-editor of the Czech communist newspaper Rude Pravo;
- Joseph Frank, formerly Slansky's deputy and a member of the party's presidium;
- Karel Svab, ousted last year as deputy minister of state security.

The other three defendants in the mass trial were given life sentences.

Bureau Gives

Its Retort for Red Charges

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—The state department says even if a prospective United Nations employee is an American, it is not in a position to tell the U. N. who it should hire.

The department made the statement last night in reply to a federal grand jury charge in New York that it had cleared U. N. officials who were the "most flagrant and obvious cases of disloyalty."

The department noted that it had identified for U. N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie Americans on the secretary of the United States organization whom it "believes to be communists."

In response to a request from the grand jury, the department identified for the grand jury 28 persons previously deported from the U. N. or now suspended. It said, "In 21 cases out of the 28 the department had made an adverse comment."

The grand jury said the state department, by refusing to name the officials responsible for the "faulty evaluations," hampered its efforts to learn the reason for the department's "misleading evaluations" of American employees of the U. N.

Reply issued  
The department replied: "The department of state did not disclose the names of people in the department who maintained the cases in which no adverse comment was made, as this could only result in their being named without their knowledge of a confidential file—something which they are not authorized to discuss."

The department, which earlier had refused to comment on the grand jury's statement, said it lacks the authority to decide who the U. N. should hire was confirmed by the recent report of a U. N. committee of three international jurists.

Clever Attempts by Reluctant Draftee Fail to Block Agents

CHICAGO, Dec. 3 (AP)—A reluctant draftee was collared by the FBI after reports of his death turned out to be greatly exaggerated. Alfred C. Zaccaro, 25, was held in lieu of \$2,500 bond today as he awaited arraignment on charges of failing to report for a pre-induction examination.

He was a hard man to pin down, but the jig was up when the FBI agents couldn't find his name on a telephone book.

When Chicago selective service board number 14 ordered Zaccaro to report for examination Oct. 31, it promptly got the order back in the next mail.

Scrawled across it was a note, supposedly from a doctor. The note said that Alfred was a victim of migraine headaches and couldn't keep the date.

The draft board could swallow that, and it merely postponed his physical. Later, a second notice was sent out.

A reply, "signed" by Zaccaro's mother, said the young man had enlisted in the navy. Board number 14 demanded proof.

Another "mother's" letter informed the board that "poor Alfred" had been killed in an automobile accident.

"Where," asked the board, "is the death certificate?" In the next mail, the board received a coroner's form recording Zaccaro's death by skull fracture.

It even included a burial permit, an undertaker's name, and a statement of burial in All Saints cemetery.

The death certificate listed Jan. 7, 1931, as the date of death. That was quite a while before Alfred allegedly enlisted in the navy.

John F. Malone, agent-in-charge of the Chicago FBI, said examination showed that the handwriting on all the letters was identical. "He even wrote his own burial permit," Malone said.

Federal agents checked All States and found no grave was occupied by Alfred.

Shift for Red Line Catches U. S. Faithful

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—Embarrassed American communists are trying to untangle the party line snarled beyond relief by the recent rulings on the Frigate Chicago.

Their embarrassment arises from the gross anti-Semitism of the Chicago trials which ended last week in death sentences for 11 former communist leaders and life imprisonment for three others.

Eight of those sentenced to death were identified in the trial records as Jews. Treason, espionage and sabotage were the charges against all 14 of the condemned defendants and the fact that most of them were Jews was pointed up in the trials.

Reported by Press The column press fully reported the trials and now is presenting learned speculation on the reasons for the Kremlin's harsh show of anti-Semitic feeling. These studies come down in their simplest form to the idea that Stalin and the surviving communists had command in Czechoslovakia urgently needed some anti-Semitic propaganda to be needed to take the blame and punishment for the hard and hopeless fight of the people of Czechoslovakia, where life goes on, but barely, and does not get better, but worse.

Editorial Explains—The communist-owned and edited "Daily Worker" of New York Monday had a long editorial explanation that the Prague trials were not anti-Semitic at all but were a warning that John Foster Dulles, the secretary of state-designate, would not permit the Jews to rally in the United States.

The "Daily Worker" was driven to this position by the anti-Semitic trials came just as American Jews were to go to a big meeting to prevent the execution of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg the week of Jan. 12.

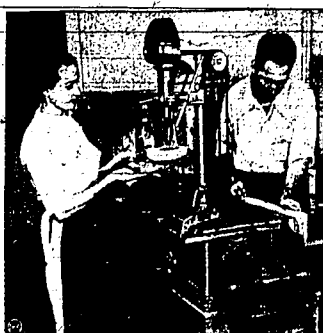
