Eisenhower on Way Home After 3-Day Secret Visit To Look Over Korea War

EN ROUTE HOME WITH EISENHOWER, Dec. 5 (UP)—President-Elect Eisenhower got the "feel" of the Korean war in a three-day top-secret tour, which took him within sight of the fighting line, and started for home today to study the possibilities of peace.

The former five-star general conferred with top commanders and ate pork chops with GIs just back of the battle line during his whirlwind tour. "Much can be done to improve our position," he said. "Much will be done."

Farm Prices Slide Grows

BOISE, Dec. 5 (UP)—Prices received by Idaho farmers on Nov. 15 were four per cent lower than the previous month, and 12 per cent lower than a year ago, the U. S. department of agriculture said today.

The price index, based on the 1910-14 average, dropped 27.5, a drop of 10 points from October.

The all-crop index was down only two points, but livestock and livestock products slipped 18 points, chiefly because of the sharp decline in the price of sheep. The USDA said, Cattle dropped 21 per hundredweight, hogs \$2.10 and lambs \$1.20.

Potatoes slipped 10 cents a bushel, but beans increased 60 cents per bushel. Wheat, however, advanced a bushel and a cent a bushel.

Improved Door Lock Urged for Autos by Local Safety Council

With two Magic Valley Safety conference proposals slated to be reviewed by the legislature during the next session, the Twin Falls group urged unanimously to recommend to the National and State Safety councils and automotive safety engineers that car door locks be overhauled in the interests of safety.

Clark Hand, state police lieutenant, attributed five automobile fatalities during the last year to car doors which flew open during a collision. He said the victims were then trapped beneath an overturned car, and was injured fatally when the door slammed shut.

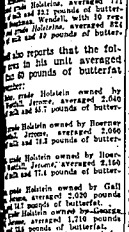

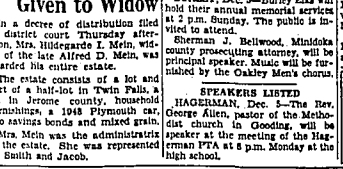

War Reports Policy Hit by Legion Chief

BOISE, Dec. 8 (AP)—The defense department's announced policy of discontinuing the term "casualty" in the Korean war was criticized here Thursday by Lewis K. Gough, national commander of the American Legion.

Anything that minimizes the number of casualties in the Korean war is against the national interest, Gough told a press conference. He said nothing should be done to minimize the Korean conflict as a war. Anyone who has been there wouldn't call it a police action.

The defense department has announced it would discontinue the use of the word "casualty" in reporting wounded, missing and dead servicemen as "casualties," but would report each classification separately.

Gough expressed confidence that Dwight D. Eisenhower's trip to Korea will be beneficial. He said the President-elect "is trained in his profession to deal with conditions" and added that Eisenhower is "entirely right when he stresses the psychological war of ideas in Korea."

Not Isolated Fight

The Legion commander said the Korean conflict "is not an isolated skirmish in a far away land. It is a war which will be felt in the United States if it will cost us the far east."

He called for an all-out Korean offensive "so 10-year-olds won't be fighting in Korea in the future." In a speech prepared for his presentation, he said under Eisenhower's administration "we hope for new, realistic policies to overcome the frustration of today."

Troops Confident

Gough said that on a recent trip to Korea he found the troops anxious to fight the war and their commanders confident they would win it. "If the military were permitted to conduct the war and were given adequate support in men and materials," he said.

The present situation is working to the advantage of the community, he said, and to break it into a more realistic view of the war, he said, he would like to see the military have a time limit for truce negotiations.

"If an honorable truce can't be reached, he said, we should launch an offensive, using Chinese nationalistic troops, bombing above the Yalu river in Manchuria and blockading the China coast."

Former Resident Dies in California

Orr Rhinhart, former Twin Falls resident, died at his home in Alabama, Calif.

Mrs. Goldie Chapman received word of his death. She is the widow of Mr. Rhinhart, who was a resident of Twin Falls for 25 years and moved to California about 18 years ago.

Turkey Lunches Due for Schools

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—Turkey will be a one-on-two-a-year tradition to most Americans that the million children benefiting under the government-sponsored school lunch program may get a dozen times this school season.

The agriculture department has bought about 40 million pounds of frozen, ready-to-cook turkey stock to help support producers and to help supply food to the school lunch program.

Officials estimated turkey will be on the school lunch menu at least 12 times this school season.

Corn, for example, has been selling for an average of \$1.45 a bushel, or 20 cents below the support level.

Donor Signup Announced in Jerome Drive

JEROME, Dec. 8.—Appointments to donate blood during the Red Cross bloodmobile may be made by donors until Dec. 15, the Rev. J. D. Crego, Red Cross bloodmobile visit chairman, announced. The bloodmobile will be in Jerome from 11 a. m. to 2 p. m. Dec. 15. The unit will set up at the Moose hall.

The visit is being sponsored by the American Legion auxiliary. The Rev. Mr. Crego said appointments could be made by calling Charlene Butters at the public health office, phone 245.

The quota for this run in Jerome is 200 pints of blood, and according to the Rev. Mr. Crego, this will require at least 200 persons for whom persons will be rejected.

He pointed out a donor must be 18 to 70 years of age and weigh at least 110 pounds. A person with a cold or sore throat is not eligible. Anyone with a history of infectious jaundice or malaria is ineligible. Pregnancy within the past 12 months and the use of birth control pills must have elapsed since a donor last gave blood.

Mrs. Lavaya Moore, Red Cross chairman, said that due to the fact Jerome county has not met its fund quota for the Red Cross there is a possibility the Red Cross chapter will be discontinued here. If this happens she said, the Red Cross hospital no longer would be connected with the Red Cross blood program.

Miss Martina, hospital administrator, said, "In the hospital we appreciate the service of the Red Cross blood center."

On the past year 300 pints of blood have been supplied by this service about 25 to 30 pints a month. About 25 pints have been ordered for emergency.

The Red Cross usually sends the blood by bus but in unusual cases it will fly to the patient. Only the laboratory work done in the hospital, that of typing, determination of the Rh factor, crossmatching and administration is charged the patient," she declared. "Without the Red Cross program such time would be consumed in obtaining donors," she concluded.
