EXPERT GIVES Smith Tells Group Limited Hunting Helps Keep Herds

McCALL, Dec. 6.—The scarcity of bighorn sheep in Idaho need not preclude limited hunting of the animals, Dwight Smith of the state fish and game department told the Idaho Wildlife Federation Saturday. Smith, Wendell, was one of three field biologists who reported recent research discoveries during the second day of the federation's annual convention. He was assigned by the University of Idaho Wildlife Unit to find out why the bighorn sheep herds were remaining small in spite of restrictions on hunting. Hunting can be used as a game management tool, removing surplus rams from selected areas, Smith said. But he urged the federation to help prevent illegal sheep killing. Smith estimated there are 2,500 bighorn sheep herds throughout Idaho's mountains. About half, he said, are along the middle fork of the Salmon river. Stewart Brandberg, also of the game department, when the uncertainty of Rocky Mountain goats, said the goats are the only species of which the game department has some range it always has. He urged carefully regulated hunting to guard against destroying such herds. The Smith and Brandberg studies will form the basis of future management programs.

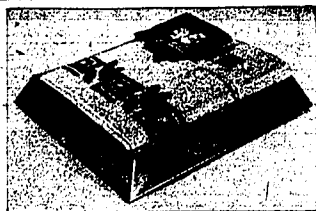
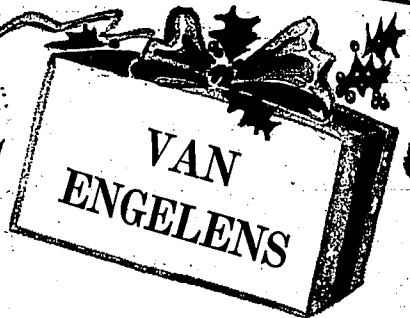

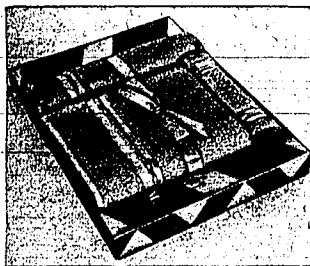

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

A strong feeling of personal responsibility during the tense days of winter, prompted J. O. "Ned" Warrington to take up Red Cross first aid work in Gooding. Since that time he has devoted uncounted hours of his spare time to teaching first aid and water safety and practicing what he learned.

For the last three years Warrington has served as Gooding county chairman for the American Red Cross first aid and water safety. He has been continuing his work since 1941. During 1951 he had charge of swimming instruction for 25 beginners, 21 advanced beginners, 25 intermediate swimmers and 11 junior life savers. He has taught five classes in first aid since Feb. 1, 1951, and has taught steadily for 11 years.

Class instructors in first aid are not paid for their services. Personal instruction in doing a worthwhile task is the only compensation. Warrington owns and operates a grocery in Gooding and devotes his spare time to teaching first aid. During World War II he also taught as an air raid warden.

Class instructor in first aid at Gooding, was one of the first instructors of first aid in Gooding. His instruction was carried on the work from 1944. Warrington says he "likes the work" as a hobby. He says he is sure to feel it might be able to save a life sometime, or if even one pupil saves a life, his effort has been well repaid.

"First aid means a step toward safety for those instructed in first aid will be more careful and have fewer accidents," Warrington believes. He claims there should be at least one person in every family who has been instructed in first aid. Lives have been saved and much pain relieved by prompt application of first aid in the home, he says.

Classes in first aid will begin in Gooding as soon as the required number of persons is interested. This work is being done through cooperation with Gooding County Safety council.

Because trouble was anticipated school was dismissed and the children were instructed to go home. But Judge Wright's curiosity overruled the judgment of the teachers and he hid behind a fence to watch the fracas.

There wasn't very much to it, Judge Wright recalls. A few shots were fired but no one was injured. He finally went home to dinner. The strike lasted for some time. The probable Judge recalls that the trouble was over but he doesn't remember exactly what it was. Records indicate that the mine wanted to reduce the miners' pay from \$4 to \$3.50 a day. Before the strike was over the state had to threaten to bring in the militia but soldiers never were actually sent to Broadford.

Men wanting to go to work in the mine at the reduced rate were escorted to the mine portal by the sheriff and his deputies. During several such "parades," armed miners lined the streets of Broadford and silently watched the processions. The alliance probably was more nerve wracking than calls and threats would have been.

Local Governments Pressed as Federal Monopoly on Tax Dollar Still Spreads

"If more of our tax dollars were kept at home, however, there would be little need for additional fundraising measures such as confronted some voters on Nov. 4."

The WAM study, using data from U. S. budget and internal revenue department, shows that 71 percent of all Idaho tax dollars are going to pay the federal government. Thus, only 29 per cent remains for city, county and state administration.

"Government handouts are usually accompanied by government supervision of the use of that money. Thus the states and cities lose the right to administer their affairs as they see fit," Agee charged.

"The problem can be solved," Agee said, "only by leaving to local governments their rightful responsibility for local activities and enough money to execute them."



Growth of Idaho Reflected in Large Utility Security Issues

BOISE, Dec. 8—Idaho public utilities were authorized to issue \$159,875,000 in securities between May 15, 1951, and June 30, 1953, the Idaho public utilities commission said Friday.

The PUC's annual report to Gov. Len Jordan also disclosed that utilities paid \$6,300,000 in taxes to the state in 1951.

The report said the issuance of more than 150 million dollars in securities reflects approximately that much new industrial development in the state.

Washington Water Power company was authorized to issue 66 million dollars in short term notes, much of which will be used to finance construction of Cabinet Gorge dam on Clark Fork river in north Idaho.

Other security issues approved by the PUC during the period include Utah Power and Light company, 15 million dollars in short term notes; 2 million dollars in first mortgage bonds and \$4,725,000 in common stock; Mountain States company, 7 million dollars in short term notes and \$1,450,000 in common stocks; California-Pacific Utilities, 2 million dollars in bonds and Montana Power company, 3 million in short term notes.

The commission said the \$2,306,000 payment in taxes to the state by utilities is not complete because motor carriers are not required to submit reports on their income tax called apears.

2020S Dec. 8 (U)—Adoption of resolutions for music and social studies for the next five years and last-minute amending of agenda to submit to the 1953 legislature will be practical topics committee before the state board of education here Dec. 15-17.

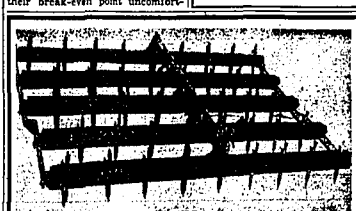

AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

By RICHARD DAVELIERES
(Pastor, First Christian Church)

Every person is a unique individual, but he is also a member and a part of the race. The drive for self-preservation is great, but the sense of belonging to society is also a strong one.

The conflict between self-interest and altruism is a constant one. One's welfare is dependent on others, and society is best served when individuals are altruistic and happy.

The practical fact is, Mr. Davolives said, that one gives himself to something bigger and beyond himself the moment he is born. "He that findeth his life shall lose it; and he that loseth his life for my sake shall find it."

Millions of people are primarily interested in their rights, and they neglect their opportunities. The motto of such persons appears to be, "Give me what belongs to me." They do not feel that the world owes them anything. They demand, as did the Prodigal Son, "Give me what I have earned or merited such."

So they proceeded to take what they felt was theirs, by force, by cunning, by guile, by grasping, retelling and getting what belongs to them, irrespective of whether it results in disgusting selfishness and forms the basis for strife and war between persons and nations. Their destructive declaration is: "Give me what belongs to me or I'll take it."

Executing their rights to determine what belongs to them usually results in taking what belongs to others as well. Here is the basis for constant strife. The root of the trouble is selfishness. "Give me what belongs to me, and I will give you what belongs to you or not."

When one is psychologically concentrated on his rights, his opinion, his money, his property, his car and his pleasure, he is on the road to carnalities and the puppen.

Such a person wants his rights but cares little for his duties. He wants privileges, but shuns responsibility. When a person belongs to nothing but himself, he soon finds nothing belongs to him. That's the way with life. Jesus was right, the No. 1 principle in developing persons worth is found in the text paraphrased: "He that giveth what he has soon loath it all, but he that giveth all that he has soon finds that all belongs to him."

More important than what belongs to me is what I believe in. The sense of belonging to something is deeper. This explains the urge of a person to belong. There is a deep sense of belonging—to give one's self to a cause, completely and wholeheartedly, to belong because I choose to, I will it, I want to, I give myself. Here is the high place.

Yes, what I belong to means more to me than what belongs to me. Let me stress in conclusion, and in all seriousness, that you ask yourself this question and then give yourself an honest answer: To what do you belong? What have you given to yourself? What holds you? It is important that you belong to the right.

If you belong to Satan and evil, soon avenge yourself, sorrow and hell will belong to you. But if you belong to Christ and His Kingdom, salvation, happiness, and heaven will belong to you. Jesus said, "Bless ye first the Kingdom of God, and all these things shall be added unto you" (Matt. 6:33).

Belong to the Kingdom and the Kingdom will belong to you. To what and to whom do you belong?

What do you belong to? What holds you? It is important that you belong to the right.

If you belong to Satan and evil, soon avenge yourself, sorrow and hell will belong to you. But if you belong to Christ and His Kingdom, salvation, happiness, and heaven will belong to you. Jesus said, "Bless ye first the Kingdom of God, and all these things shall be added unto you" (Matt. 6:33).

Idaho Solons See Action on Korea Fight

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (U-P)—Two Republican senators are looking to President-Elect Eisenhower to make recommendations for some kind of solution to the Korean war.

Two Democratic senators, commenting on the announcement that Eisenhower is on the way home after his dramatic flight to Korea, said they thought his journey was worthwhile as a morale builder for troops in the field.

Senator Dworthak, R. Ida., told a reporter that "as General Eisenhower is an authority on military technique, he should be in a position to recommend action which will force some kind of showdown in Korea."

"Obviously," Dworthak added, "he received that mandate from the American people on Nov. 4."

In a separate interview, Senator Weiker, R. Ida., said, "I am sure the information obtained by the general will be of such a nature that he and his advisers and the congress can work out some way to end this stalemate."

"The American people have clearly expressed that they don't want this war to continue as it is. They are looking to us and it's up to us to work out something for that situation."

Eisenhower said he was returning with no panacea but that he felt he had a better understanding of the situation.

\$5,000 Awarded in Suit for Damages

ROCATILLO, Dec. 6 (U-P)—A U. S. district court jury awarded \$5,000 to Harold Sparks in a suit against the California-Pacific Utility corporation heard Friday.

The suit grew out of the electrocution death of Sparks on Sept. 20, 1951. Aljeme Weiler, administrator of the Sparks estate, alleged that the company was negligent and responsible for the death and sought \$10,000.

The electrocution occurred near Cokeville, Wyo. Sparks is of Bear Lake county.

A civil action by the Lewis Optical and jewelry company, Price, Utah, against L. D. Egbert, Welling, Utah, was filed in probate court here Friday.

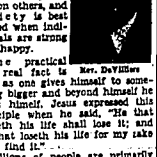

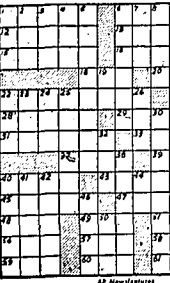

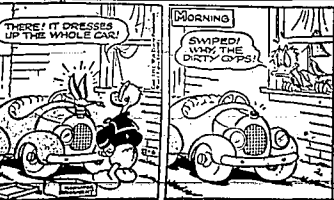

Drop Noted in State Revenue

BOISE, Dec. 6—Idaho tax collections for the five months ending Nov. 30, were \$4,316,836, a decrease of \$601,707 from the same period last year, State Tax Collector P. G. Nail reported Friday.

Inheritance tax collections fell off \$200,519; income taxes \$287,441; punchboard taxes \$130,511, and coin machine taxes \$43,894. Taxes showing the largest increase were the kilowatt hour, \$50,170, and oleomargarine \$49,527.

During the same period there was an increase of \$67,942 in gasoline taxes and motor vehicle fees to \$5,000,625. This money goes into a special fund, and not to the general fund, as do the other taxes.

The five-month totals for the various taxes were: Income, \$1,233,101; cigarette, \$761,562; beer, \$373,243; kilowatt hour, \$306,913; punchboard, \$149,177; machine, \$100,266; license, \$4,830; inheritance, \$60,200; mine, \$15,043; and oleomargarine, \$240,853.

Bad Weather Challenge for Drivers Cited

"Poor weather is a challenge to motorists." Approach of the winter season already has been heralded by a marked reduction in daylight hours, lower thermometer readings and slippery roads, made slippery by frost and sleet.

The coming of bad weather should be considered a challenge to one's driving ability, not an alibi for any accident, declared H. H. Des Autiers, director of the state traffic safety division.

Overhauls Advised

Expert drivers make certain their cars are ready to meet the shivering season's severest tests. That means more than checking battery and lights, charging oil and grease to lighter grades, and protecting the radiator with anti-freeze. It means also replacing worn windshield wiper blades, putting the defroster system in proper working order, adjusting brakes for simultaneous gripping, replacing badly worn tires, and carrying anti-skid chains ready for use when severe snow and ice conditions develop.

The Idaho traffic safety director further advised that "the national use of synthetic rubber tires makes tire chains more important than ever as a self help when the going is tough on snow and ice. Synthetic wear well and perform normally on dry or wet pavements but skid and spin more on ice and snow."

Adjustments Required

After the car's safety equipment has been placed in good order, Des Autiers said the motorist must adjust his driving habits. First of all, drive on shaded streets and roads give many a driver his first skid. Be well and perform normally on dry or wet pavements but skid and spin more on ice and snow.

Defensive, too, should be more cautious, the director concluded. Walkers should bear in mind that motorists have more difficulty operating their cars in bad weather. Persons on foot are hard to see on any dark night, and especially in stormy weather.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6—Secretary of Agriculture Charles P. Brannan has announced a 1953 sugar quota of 7,800,000 tons.

That is the total amount of sugar domestic and foreign producers will be allowed to market in this country next year.

The 1953 quota compares with an initial quota of 7,700,000 tons this year and later revised upward to a final figure of 7,800,000 tons.

Individual quotas for domestic beet growers, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands and the Philippines, have been increased over this year. Cuba's quota is smaller than its 1952 share.

Brannan said the 1953 quota was set 400,000 tons below estimated consumption because of requirement of the 1949 sugar act which became effective for the first time this year. But he said "as sugar prices during the course of the year achieve a fair relationship with prices of other commodities, sugar quotas can be increased."

Area Quotas

Here are 1953 sugar quotas for specific areas compared to their quotas this year (the first figure is the 1953 quota; the second this year's):

Domestic beet, 1,800,000; 1,800,000; Hawaiian cane, 500,000; 525,000; Hawaii, 1,000,000; 925,000; Puerto Rico, 1,000,000; 970,500; Virgin Islands, 12,000; 6,000; Philippines, 910,000; 774,000; Cuba, 2,288,725; 2,287,550.

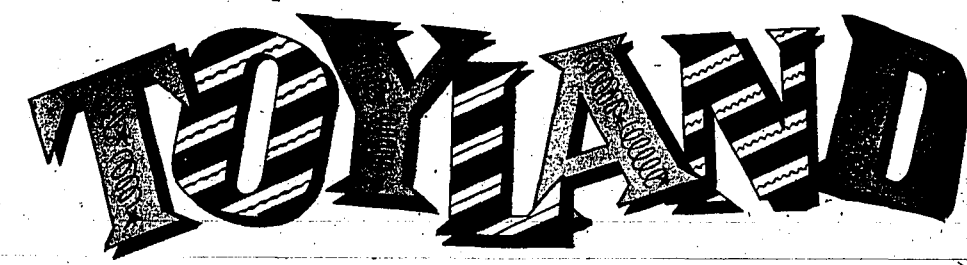
