In London, six prime ministers of British commonwealth countries are currently talking over their mutual economic problems. They will be a good thing if the conference produces decisions leading to greater stability within the commonwealth. It will be a better thing if progress is made toward drawing those countries more firmly into the wider orbit of trade in the whole free world.

The time has gone by when any nation or group of nations intent upon lasting economic well-being can look to self-entrenchment for salvation. Too many high walls already break the flow of strength-giving commerce in the non-communist family.

In theory, the free nations have the resources, men and skills to face down the communist threat. But theory and reality are wide apart. Many of these elements of potential strength are tucked in isolated pockets within national borders. Here they either serve the restricted aims of insubstantial economic nationalism, or they lie in sterile idleness.

Communism brooks neither tariff barriers nor national boundaries in consolidating its own economic strength. If the Reds should be allowed to succeed in that merging of power, we cannot complacently assume there is security in our superior geographic potential. We must realize that the potential into the hard goods of thriving trade and effective defense. For the free lands the problem is acute and it is immediate. A successful commonwealth meeting would count as an important stride toward solution. But alone it is not enough. All the west ought to assemble in conference on the economic issues today affecting the globe.

Not since 1938 has such a gathering been tried. The London economic conference of 1947 was a disaster, not only for many reasons, but not the least because President Roosevelt declined to take serious part in it. With heavy American support this time, an international economic conference might well make striking advances toward the solutions indispensable to a full counter of western power.

Such a conference could be scheduled right on the heels of the coming biennial meeting of the International Chamber of Commerce in Vienna next May. Almost certainly the conference would attract the finest business brains in the free countries, will focus its energies on the basic problem of increasing trade flow. And by then President-Elect Eisenhower will have had reasonable chance to acquaint himself with the intricate details of that fundamental of free world security.

BONUS FOR TAXPAYERS

A congressional committee is investigating reports that the outgoing heads of various business and service agencies are rushing to the wholesale promotions for some of their favorite employees before the new bosses take over. It's sort of a parting gift.

There are supposed to be two reasons for this trick. If the new heads which are brought in do any mass demoting to make way for men who they want to hire, the effect will be to maintain present incumbents in their same civil service rank. They will just be demoted back to where they were before the new election.

On the other hand, if those persons who are getting rush promotions get their lump-sum payment they get for their unused leave will be figured on their higher salary. In other words, it just gives them an extra bonus on the U. S. taxpayer.

The whole personnel machinery of the federal agencies is so tangled in red tape and complications, an investigator from the committee says, that it is almost impossible to determine now if there is a widespread attempt to use this dodge.

It can be proved for several months, in fact. It takes about that long for the paper work on such a thing to clear through civil service and be tabulated. Then it will be too late.

CRITICAL BATTLEFIELD

The early optimism that accompanied the daring French paratroop drops and tank raids in the rear of rebel communist forces in North China has evaporated. In its place comes the growing concern that fundamental of free world security.

The French may indeed have temporarily slowed the west-south-westward advance of the Viet Minh armies in the mountainous Southwest China, but they did not precipitate a rout. Indeed, they have inevitable withdrawal from the enemy's vital elements of the French were ambushed.

To add to the gloom, Russian trucks and other equipment recently have been found in great abundance in the hands of rebel forces. These Soviet supplies are being brought in over a 7,000-mile rail line built across China and safe from air attack.

These recent developments underline for the world once more that the communists do not see Indo-China as a minor rebel skirmish, but as a critical battlefield in the strategic contest for all Southeast Asia. We of the west may regard it as something less than critical only at our peril.

Group Okays Plan for State Police School

Dec. 10 (AP)—The Idaho Police Association legislative committee has approved draft legislation to establish a state police training school in Boise.

W. P. Anderson, president of the association, announced the approval at a meeting of officers in Idaho from small towns and have had study on training in basic police work. He said proposed school would make training available to state police, county and local police.

Anderson said the school would stress training of present and future officers in the handling of accidents, emergency contacts with the public and other fundamentals of police work.

To Submit Bill

The association plans to submit a bill to the 1953 Idaho legislature. The police officers committee plan to propose to the 1953 legislature a bill requiring a police academy for training in basic police work. The bill would require the officers' attorney fees in court cases in case the officer is sued.

Lack of Interest Threatening Loss of Magic Valley's Air Reserve Squadron

Lack of interest by Magic Valley air force reservists threatens possible loss of the local air reserve squadron, Maj. Dean L. Benson, Focastello, air force liaison sergeant for southeastern Idaho, warned here Tuesday.

Of five squadrons assigned to the 804th volunteer air reserve group in Idaho, only the local 481st squadron is not up to strength, Benson said.

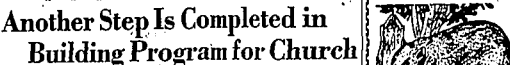

French Morocco Featured in News, Hailey Man Recalls Experiences There

"They were clad in rag and seemed to be half starved," Benbrook said. "Those who were weak were paid to eat at a table and within a short time they had discarded their rag and were seated in the same worn clothes we wore. Gradually they put on weight."

"One of their native customs almost drove the foreman to desperation," he continued. "Eight times a day the Arabs stop whatever they are doing and eat a crust of bread and drink a cup of mint tea. Foreman had to become resigned to the habit."

Benbrook said his curiosity got the better of him and he tried a little mint in his tea. In his opinion the American housewife is overlooking a delicious drink.

In Old Medina, where Casablanca was built, Benbrook said, there live only Arabs and Jews. Although the east wall of an Arab home may be the wall of a Jewish home, their hatred for each other is almost fanatic. The only point on which they agree is their mutual hatred of the French.

It has been 40 years since the Frenchman first came to Morocco to "civilize the natives." They are still considered imposters. There is no "hello" or "goodbye" among the natives. The greeting and parting is always the same, in Arabic, Jewish or a gibberish of mixed tongues, and translated means "Damn the French."

Benbrook said he witnessed a street riot in which a Jewish woman was beaten almost to death and all windows in the houses on the street were broken by flying stones. Streets in Medina are hardly more than 10 feet wide. In the center of each street rice vendors sell their wares. A small cart holds hot embers which keep the rice warm. One bowl and one spoon suffice for all customers.

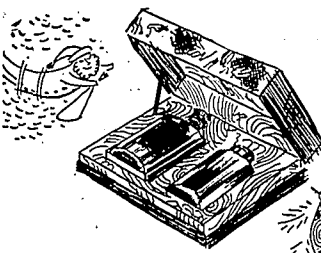
No Arab will eat food cooked by a Jew. No Jew will eat food prepared by an Arab. No Frenchman will touch food prepared by either and no American will eat away from camp.

All commodities are exhibited at open markets. No attempt is made to keep flies from meats, vegetables or fruits. Each prospective customer handles the wares to decide whether or not he will buy. In Old Medina there are no sewers and no water system.

All during the day "water boys" walk up and down the streets of Medina with goatskins of water. Benbrook said some friends witnessed the killing of a goat on a street corner one day. In a half an

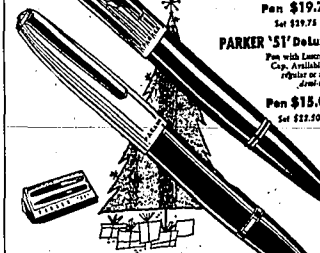

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Beck Relates His Policy as Union Officer

PORTLAND, Dec. 10 (AP)—Dave Beck, Seattle, recently elected president of the AFL Teamsters union, plans to hold down strikes, cooperate with employers in expected disputes with railroads, and keep the union out of politics.

These were the major points in a declaration of policy Beck has written for publication in a forthcoming issue of "The International Teamster."

Office Move Planned
Beck also said in the statement he planned to move the union's headquarters from Indianapolis to Washington, D. C., but national officers also would be maintained at Seattle.

Of strikes, Beck said: "We hope to advance our objectives without strike action. The strike as an economic weapon should be our last resort. We also said efforts will be made to keep jurisdictional disputes at a minimum."

Protection Only
"We will not enter into active political affairs unless it is necessary to protect our people in their contract, bargaining and employment rights," the statement said.

Beck said he hopes to align the union with employers "to counter some of the vicious propaganda of the railroad industry and its banking associates."

Plow-Ordered
HAILEY, Dec. 10—A new rotary snow plow was ordered by the Hailey city council at a meeting Monday night.

Mayor R. R. Horn reported that the city's snow removal equipment has been kept busy constantly since the recent storm began and that all streets in the city have been plowed. He said employees now are widening the snow cuts.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—The Republican chairman of the 1953 inaugural committee says the ceremonies launching Dwight D. Eisenhower as President of the United States probably will be the biggest, best attended and most costly in history.

Joseph C. McGrath, a local Republican leader and a lawyer, said the cost will be around one million dollars. The Truman inauguration four years ago cost about \$700,000.

The million dollars is being underwritten by local sponsors who hope to get their money back in sale of tickets to various festivals, McGrath said.

Diplomats Believe New Policy For U. S. Shaping in Confabs

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—Diplomats believe a new U. S. strategy for fighting communism throughout Asia is taking shape in President-Elect Eisenhower's dramatic shipboard policy conference.

Few solid facts have seeped out of the admiral's quarters on the cruiser Hickens where Eisenhower and his top aides have been meeting secretly.

But diplomats said it seems evident the new President already is beginning to shape the basic policies he will follow not only in Korea but throughout the entire far east.

These experts believe Eisenhower himself has not decided finally on the specific measures he will take. But from what was said during his Korean trip and from the people he saw, some of the general outlines can be discerned.

There is little doubt, for example, that the new administration will plan a boost in U. S. aid for Asia, planning for a shift in emphasis from Europe to Asia already has started in Washington.

It also is clear the new administration will step up the propaganda offensive against communism throughout Asia.

In Korea, Eisenhower made it plain he will speed up the training of South Korean troops to ease the

Experts here discount this possibility. They said everything Eisenhower has said and done indicates he will step up aid to the nationalists but, for many reasons, oppose their service in Korea.

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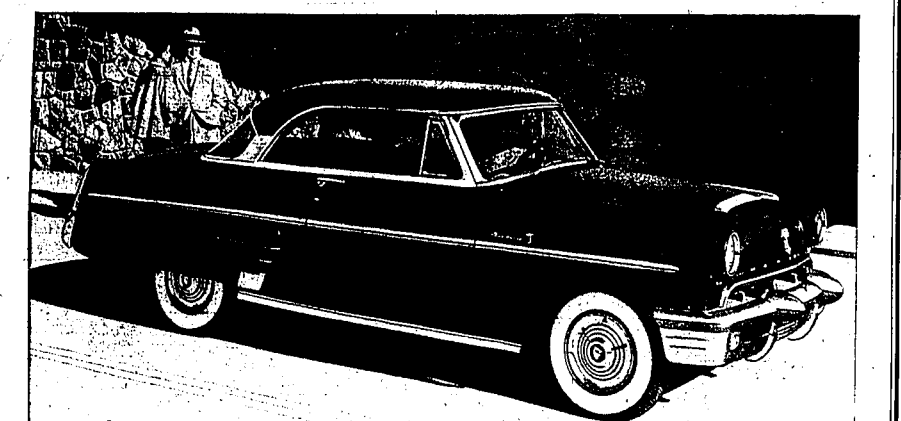


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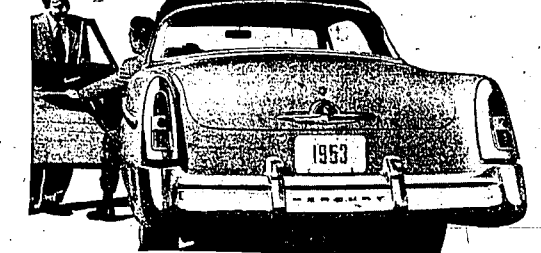
