Gasoline Prices In Magic Valley

Local operators began slashing prices again Wednesday, apparently washing out Wednesday's attempt to raise prices to the level that prevailed before the price war weeks ago.

Some were posting the same signs they had taken Wednesday, advertising gasoline at 25.9 cents per gallon for the regular grade and 27.9 cents per gallon for the premium grade.

Some stations continued to sell their regular grade for 24.9.

It was noted that the operators who got together Tuesday night to slash prices were not the same operators who got together last week to raise prices.

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MacArthur's Truce Plan, Also Scoffs at Ike's Grip

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—President Truman expressed doubt today that Gen. Douglas MacArthur has a workable plan for ending the Korean war, but said if the deposed far east commander does have a solution he should come forward with it "like any decent man."

Truman told a news conference he does not want to see MacArthur, the war hero he fired abruptly 20 months ago. Nor has he seen any reason for soliciting MacArthur's views. But he said both MacArthur and President-Elect Eisenhower have a duty to come forward immediately with any solution they may have which will end the conflict and save American lives. He said MacArthur could come in any time he wants to because he (Truman) would not be discourteous to anybody.

Truman added, however, he could not afford to have a personal meeting with MacArthur or Eisenhower, indicating that neither of them has a workable plan to end the Korean war.

MacArthur told the National Association of Manufacturers in New York City Friday he has a "workable and definite solution" to the conflict, and the plan would involve "any increased danger of provoking a world conflict."

MacArthur said after a three-day stay in New York City that he has arranged to meet with MacArthur, probably sometime next week in New York, to get the former Pacific war hero's views.

Flames Destroy Fire Hall, Garage in Declo

DECLO, Dec. 11—Declo's fire department building burned to the ground Thursday and all of the village offices and records were destroyed. The blaze also consumed a garage operated by Frank Wells.

The fire was discovered by Mrs. R. F. Fisher at 1:45 a. m. Both she and her husband said flames were shooting from the windows of the building when they first saw the fire. They notified the Burley rural fire department.

Burley Fire Chief Otto Williams, who directed fire fighting, said cause of the fire is unknown. He likewise could give no estimate of the damage. In addition to the fire department building in it, he said all of the village offices and records were destroyed.

The building was owned by the village but a portion of it was rented to Wells for use as a garage.

Williams said that firefighters arrived the entire building was in flames and the roof was falling. Firemen bent their efforts to saving the buildings on each side of the brick structure. Only the walls were left standing when the fire was declared out.

Chief Williams said a double brick retaining wall between the village building and the garage housing all of the school buses saved the second building from being destroyed. Students removed the school buses while the fire was roaring against the double wall.

The Declo fire department didn't have a chance to put its equipment into action because of the time the fire was discovered. The building was a mass of flames and it would have been impossible for anyone to enter the building to get the equipment.

NPA Relaxes Restrictions on Use of Metals in Construction

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—The new ceiling for automobile production is 250,000 higher than that set by the NPA for the first three months of next year. But NPA Chief R. A. McDonald said "considerable risk" would be involved if the industry set its production schedule at 1.5 million mark with the expectation of getting all the scarce materials needed for such a program.

In lifting the ban on metals for recreational construction—projects such as swimming pools, spas, and hot tubs—NPA said that beginning with the new year builders may use up to 100,000 more pounds of aluminum and more than two tons of structural steel on each project. They also will be permitted to use 800 pounds of copper and 300 pounds of aluminum per project. The use of foreign or secondary steel is also authorized.

The new order increases from 5 to 25 tons the amount of carbon steel which may be used without government approval for the construction of hospitals, schools, public utilities, water and sewage projects and other public works.

Copper usage is also increased. Increased amounts of aluminum will not be permitted until May 1, however, since the metal is still in short supply.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

Washington - Battered by severe competition from many other domestic industries, now comes invasion from another quarter through the increasing substitution of vegetable and chemical ingredients for butter, bread, cake, ice cream and solid milk products. It will give President Roosevelt's agricultural and food policy a real test.

Although the battle has escaped the headlines, it is being fought in the laboratories, on the farms, in the courts and within the food and drug administration. Both government and private efforts to suppress and solve it will break out at the next session of congress. The vegetable and chemical interests will demand liberalization of laws which now prohibit the adulteration of foods, as they did on behalf of margarine.

In a sense, it will be another fight between the city boys and the country boys as capitol hill, today, many of the country boys on the whole, feel that the synthetic products mean a great saving for the consumer's market basket. Their success, however, could mean the end of the country boys and the thriving dairy business throughout a large and normally Republican area.

SECRETIVE GOVERNMENT

To tell us about the workings of our federal government, we have government press officers by the hundreds. Yet we know so little about the government that we can't learn enough about what really goes on in Washington.

Robert Ramepek, chairman of the U. S. civil service commission, thinks we ought to have a complete, non-political study of the government to give the information men. It sounds like a good idea.

Since the problems of the various departments vary so greatly, we demand not expect to find nor should we demand a high degree of uniformity in information practices. Obviously the state department, the department and the atomic energy commission cannot be looked for the kind of information policies we might anticipate in the other department. Vital secrets must be kept.

Still, we do have the right to expect from all departments a sincere effort to disclose to the American people every bit of information essential to their understanding of the government's activities, so long as it does not jeopardize security to release it.

There isn't any convincing evidence that we are getting that sort of help from information officers today. Here and there an extremely competent press aide turns up. But too many deal in the "ins and outs" of the government and their job to protect their superiors, to save them from embarrassment, rather than to inform.

Some of these, too, actually become vigorous advocates and special pleaders for the policies and programs of the department they represent. Ramepek rightly raises the question whether or not this is proper.

In other words, should a press officer be a propagandist for the "in"? With his easy access to the news outlets, he can promote his boss or the department's viewpoint with good effect. Ought he to spend his time thus?

We could hardly expect a press agent to portray his department in a bad light and hold his job. But we may fairly inquire into the question of whether the government should be having a mere "voice of defense" for its agency.

Here, again, is opportunity for the incoming Eisenhower administration to clear away the undergrowth of the department, hand books and set out upon a new course, if the circumstances warrant, as they certainly seem to in this instance.

ONE CREATES ANOTHER

The scholars in the social, economic and political world often tell us that for every problem we solve we may well create another. That's a pretty gloomy outlook on life, but there's enough evidence around to suggest that it's at least partly true.

The government civil service system that General Eisenhower will inherit as President is a good example.

In the old days the great bugaboo was the "spoils system," the practice of turning out office-holders in droves with each change of administration, and appointing them with your friends, relatives and fellow townsmen.

It could just get them under civil service, the argument ran, and the government would be fine. We'd have efficient, honest government with no rewards for the mere winning of office.

Well, now we have civil service, and it is right that we should. Some 25 per cent of federal workers are protected in their jobs. They can't be tossed out at a personal whim.

But we find, too, that these protections are so stringent that it is well nigh impossible to discharge inefficiently. In a case testing a civil service rule, the government recently had to spend \$500,000 to get rid of a single worker.

So it is cheaper to hang onto incompetent or unnecessary workers than to try to unload them. They are safe behind a wall. This hardly sounds like the ideal way to run a government. We got rid of spoils, but in place we got a system that freezes bad workers in their jobs along with good.

REDS' WARLIKE COLORS

Whatever plan now emerges from the United Nations in the broad effort to gain a settlement of the Korean war, the Russians already have shown a clear preference for war over peace. The leaves of the Soviet olive branch have withered, exposing a tangle of barbed wire underneath.

Obviously the U. N. is bent on pushing ahead to approval of some sort of peace proposal, probably rooted in the Indian plea for repatriation of communist prisoners, which was the issue on which the Panmunjom talks finally snagged. But the Soviet union seems to have decided to make no advances, and by that fact to have revealed Moscow's purpose of continued war.

Foreign Minister Vishinskiy accomplished this feat, following a puzzling strategy and a juggling act which the government delighted only the enemies of its government.

For, in denouncing the Indian proposal in the U. N., he went far to head a developing breach between the United States and Britain—the very sort of rift the Kremlin is reportedly anxious to avoid. He did it with a swift blow at the neutralism which pervades many countries and dominates such governments as Nehru's in India.

Started as Joke

12 Red Chiefs Are Taken in Morocco Row

CASABLANCA, French Morocco, Dec. 11 (AP)—Twelve communist leaders accused by the French of "collusion" in this week's nationalist riots were expelled today from this troubled protectorate.
The expelled comprised a French roundup of more than 1,000 persons which has deprived the powerful National (Nationalist) party and the Moroccan Communist party of their directors.
Authorities listed the arrests late last night of six European leaders of the Moroccan Communist party, including a woman believed to be a Russian citizen.
The 12 expulsions were announced in a terse communique from Rabat, administrative capital of French Morocco, where Gen. Augustin Guillaume, French resident-general, proclaimed a tough policy to remove known agitators from the scene.
No information was given in the announcement to indicate where the deported communist leaders went.
A list of arrested leftist leaders confirmed that the French have placed all of the top men under detention.

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

New Atom-Splitting "Gun" Due To Open Atom Research Fields

STANFORD, Calif., Dec. 11 (AP)—A new atom-splitting "gun" which fires electron bullets at the highest velocities ever attained, was expected today to open new fields in atomic research.

And a six-foot version of the "gun" built here by Stanford University is now under construction as a weapon against cancer.

Known as an electron linear accelerator, it was unveiled yesterday and is comparable to the cyclotron, synchrotron and cosmotron. Research scientists working at Stanford university's microwave laboratory said they expected it to expand atomic research.

Unlike other nuclear devices which speed electron particles around a circular path, Stanford's accelerator shoots them in a straight line down its slim, 200-foot "barrel."

Aided by powerful vacuum tubes, the electrons attain a speed almost identical with the velocity of light, or about 186,000 miles per second. At that speed, one electron could go around the world 446 times in a single minute.

Approximately 350 million electron volts of energy already have been produced by the device. It has an essential strength of one billion volts in discerning more about the atom.

Dr. William Webster Hansen, brilliant first director of the microwave laboratory, started the building of the accelerator. Hansen spent as many as 18 hours a day working on the development before he died in 1949 at the age of 39.

He conceived the idea of setting high voltage from low power by magnifying it in a cavity, or resonator, which is like increasing the sound of one's voice by singing in a bathtub.

Dr. Edward L. Ginzton, director of the university's microwave laboratory, estimated the cost of the accelerator to be about \$1,250,000, with more building and development yet to be accomplished.

The six-foot version of the "gun" is being built at the university for Stanford's school of medicine in San Francisco. It is to be used for high-energy X-ray treatment of deep-seated cancer.

Scientists said the model could be manufactured commercially for about \$25,000, which would put high-energy treatment of cancer within reach of virtually every hospital in the nation.

However, those connected with the project were cautious in predicting the eventual curative worth of the machine. But they were very enthusiastic about its potentialities in discerning more about the atom.

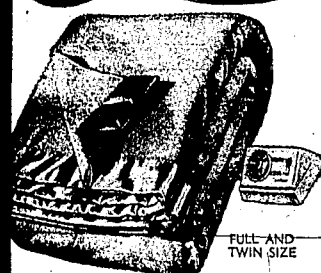

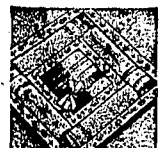

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Writer Gives Varied Story On 'Seizure'

TOKYO, Dec. 11 (AP)—A leftist Japanese writer, who says he was kidnapped and held prisoner for a year by U. S. agents, told his story to Japan's diet (parliament) Wednesday—with variations.

Wataru Kai charged in a statement Monday that he was held prisoner from Nov. 25, 1931, until last Sunday. The U. S. army drafted him. It said he was picked up late in 1931; then released.

Kai had charged that the army's counter intelligence corps (CIC) had kept him in custody. Under questioning of a diet investigating committee Wednesday he was uncertain which agency held him.

Under further questioning, Kai said that one group held him until last February, when he was shifted to the custody of another.

Kai has kicked up an uproar in Japan, left-wing circles and other parties opposed to Premier Shigenobu Yoshida's government have cried up the case.

Government Skeptical Yoshida's government has expressed skepticism. The government has begun to take a wait-and-see attitude after looting some anti-U. S. editors.

The Japanese-owned Tokyo Evening News said "the communists made an excellent job in making the counter intelligence corps its target because 'perhaps no organization operating in the occupied territories is so unpopular among the Japanese people' as the communists."

The news described the 49-year-old writer as "a vacillating, unconvincing and pitifully weak-willed man."

Writer Called Foreign Agent

TOKYO, Dec. 11 (AP)—The U. S. embassy disclosed today that Wataru Kai, a Japanese writer who accused the U. S. army of torturing him, was a "spy for a foreign power in Japan."

The embassy announcement was confirmed in a separate statement by National Police Chief Nobuo Saito.

"Details of this case have been passed to the national rural police and it is understood that they are now investigating the matter," the embassy said.

American officials refused to elaborate on the charge that Kai was a spy. He has many close friends in China, however, and it was presumed that the "foreign power" referred to was Communist China.

The case has provoked many anti-American Japanese with an excuse to claim that the United States is still intruding on Japan's sovereignty.

Foes of Reds Will Address Church Meet

DENVER, Dec. 11 (AP)—Two outspoken foes of communism are scheduled to address the second general assembly of the National Council of Churches of Christ here today.

A recorded address by John Foster Dulles, Republican secretary of state-designate who was unable to attend the assembly in person, will be broadcast at 7 p. m. Dr. Otto Dibelius, Berlin, Germany, will speak to the American church leaders at 10 p. m. (AP).

The German Protestant church leader, despite the recent death of his wife, made the flying trip to this country to speak to the convention. He arrived here late yesterday. The German cleric is chairman of the council of the evangelical church in his country and also chairman of the central committee of the World Council of Churches. He has become well known throughout the world for his outspoken opposition to both Nazi and communist totalitarianism.

Lodge Speaks
Another leading member of the Republican administration, Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., Massachusetts, told the American churchmen last night that "in a religious and moral sense" must be combined with material strength if the free world is to achieve peace. He told a near-capacity audience of nearly 4,000 clergy and laymen that "we must combat the forces that man is the servant of an all powerful and violent state" with a "new idea of our own."

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 11 (AP)—The Norwegian freighter Fernstrom sank inside the bay today after colliding with the freighter Hawaiian Rancher, but the Fernstrom's crew escaped in boats.

The crash occurred just west of Alcatraz island in a murky fog and dense fog.

808 Flashed
The Hawaiian Rancher immediately flashed an SOS and the coast guard hurriedly dispatched three rescue boats to the scene.

The coast guard said later reported that the Fernstrom's crew of 42 men had taken to the lifeboats when their ship began to under water. The coast guard said a few minor injuries were reported. A Fernstrom crew member sustained a wrist injury.

The accident happened about 7:30 p. m. The coast guard said the Norwegian vessel sank at 8:08 a. m. **Trig Color Out**

The side was going out at the time and the coast guard said the number ship collision might block the shipping channel.

Captain A. Kristensen commanded the Fernstrom, a 416-foot long ship of 4,800 gross tons.

The 12 passengers on the coast-guarded passenger vessel also escaped safely before the Fernstrom sank, stern down, and disappeared in about 100 feet of water. Not a trace of the ship showed above the surface.

U. P. Conductor, 70, Retires After Railroading 50 Years

Carl S. Clauson, 288 Filter avenue west after making his last trip Wednesday as a conductor for the Union Pacific railroad, retired Thursday and celebrated his 70th birthday anniversary.

He wound up a railroading career which reaches back nearly 50 years when he stepped down from the coach of the train from Wells, Nev., Wednesday morning.

Clauson said he plans to spend his newly-acquired leisure doing a lot of fishing and maybe making another trip to his native land of Sweden.

Smiling at the recollection, he pointed out that he could make the trip to Sweden and catch up on the fishing at the same time. There is a lake full of fish barely 150 feet from his late mother's home at Hembo, Sweden, where he was born Dec. 11, 1882.

As a boy he learned the shoemaking trade but gave it up when he emigrated to the United States in March, 1902. For a year he worked in a farm machinery factory in Moline, Ill., then in March, 1903, took a job as a carman for the Great Northern railroad. In 1905 he became a freight brakeman for the same road.

Two years later he returned to Sweden for a four-month visit. Upon his return he worked as a brakeman for the Minneapolis and St. Louis railroad and later the Soo line.

In 1913 he moved to Pocatello where he became a brakeman for the old Oregon Short line, which later was taken over by the Union Pacific. In 1917 he was promoted to conductor.

He married Ethel Cartwright in 1910 at Payette. He has a stepson, Robert Cartwright, who has followed him in the railroad business on the Western Pacific at Oakland, Calif.

Last summer Clauson, accompanied by his wife, took his first airplane ride — across the Atlantic ocean to visit his homeland again.

'Ike' Welcome of MacArthur's Ideas Causes European Shiver

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—President-Elect Eisenhower's declaration to commit Gen. Douglas MacArthur on the Korean war will send a shiver of fear through western Europe.

All the west was fearful when MacArthur decided to visit the Korean theater. There was editorial applause in his great continental and British newspapers when Eisenhower had completed his survey and had shown "IKE" was "not eager" to spread the war area.

The minority Socialist parties in Great Britain and on the continent were especially suspicious of Eisenhower's motives. For their own political purposes, a considerable number of British socialists keep drumming away that Americans as a whole are bigger-happy and not to be trusted as co-makers of foreign policy involving the use of force.

That was the party line of the whole socialist campaign during last year's British elections. Winston Churchill was tabbed as a war-stomper in debate with the Amer-

icans. The implications of what responsible British socialists said in that campaign was that Churchill's election would be followed by an atomic-bomb free-for-all.

A lot of them really believed that and so did many continental Europeans. They were scared. Nomination of Eisenhower and Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson for President quieted their fears, but Eisenhower's campaign alliance with Sen. Robert A. Taft, "Ike" rekindled their again.

Entry of MacArthur into the picture will give a lot of Europeans the shudders and give the socialists more handy new scare propaganda. But viewed from Washington, instead of from London or Paris, the forthcoming Eisenhower-MacArthur conference looks like something very much different.

It looks like a move to get MacArthur to put up or to pipe down, or even to join the team. That remains to be seen. For the present no one knows the nature of his new ideas about Korea or whether Eisenhower will like them in whole, in part or

not at all. But so long as MacArthur was on the sidelines with a plan to end the Korean action honorably, a great many Americans would want to know why his experience and wisdom were not being used.

President Truman made a martyr of MacArthur, in some people's eyes, by abruptly rejecting his services and his advice. Eisenhower strategists do not intend to repeat on that. They know that only the judgment of future historians can decide who was the United States' greatest World War II general. But MacArthur unquestionably is among the nominees, despite his current low ratings in Europe.

No Power Cuts Due This Week

SEATTLE, Dec. 11 (AP)—No power cuts will be ordered this week in the Pacific northwest, a defense electric power administration official said Wednesday.

Harry A. Lee said a decision on further curtailment of power use has been deferred until next week. At the present time firms using more than 8,000 kilowatt-hours week have cut their consumption by 10 percent.

Project Help To Be Asked By Lewiston

LEWISTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—The Lewiston Chamber of Commerce will prepare to recommend today that Gen. state chambers support the Harbor project on the Snake river.

A resolution drawn up by the Lewiston chamber will be submitted in the All-Idaho congress-meeting in Boise Monday, members said. It says it has sponsored navigation and hydro-electric development of the Snake for 50 years, and it adds that the entire Pacific northwest would share the benefits of the development.

The Lewiston chamber also contends that the dam would permit generation of additional electric power and provide cheap transportation of agricultural products.

Meanwhile, members of the Lewiston organization were informed that speakers at the congress would review Idaho's economy, with special emphasis on agriculture.

L. E. Cushman, president of the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce, said that the school of the Lewiston and Klamath Falls chambers will be the first to speak.

Thief With Desire for Streetcar Tops Past Year's Parade of Looney Larceny

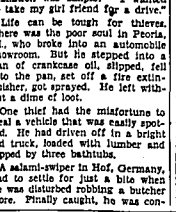

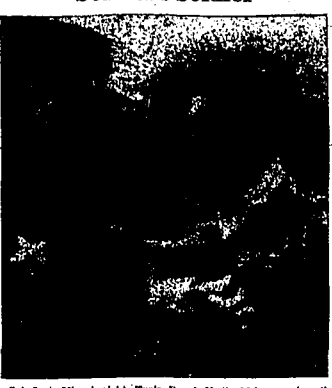

37 Contracts Are Signed on Project

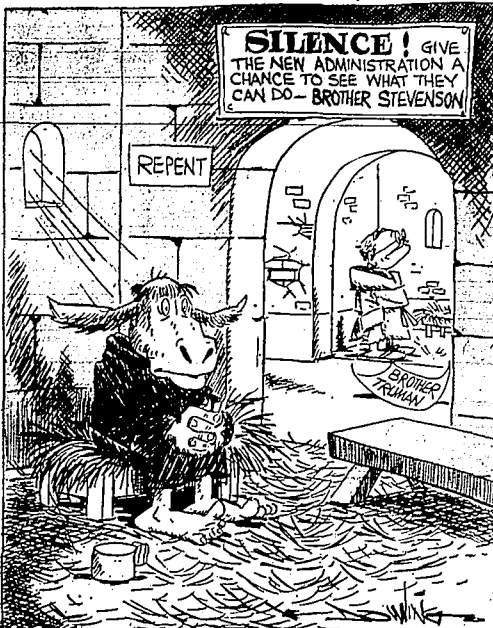

Decision Not Reported for Western Dam

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Secretary of Interior Oscar L. Chapman made no definite recommendation on construction of the Echo park dam near the Utah-Colorado border in recommending the upper Colorado reclamation project last week.

A congressional source said Chapman in effect left a decision on the controversial dam to Secretary-Designate Douglas McKay. The dam has been opposed by groups, including the interior department's own national park service, on grounds it would encroach on the Dinosaur national monument.

Signed Report

Chapman signed a report recommending the 10-acre upper Colorado project last week. But at the time he declined to say whether he had recommended the Echo park unit.

However, the source said his recommendation was for "further study of the recreational problem involved in construction of the dam."

Report Circulated

An earlier report by the bureau of reclamation on the Colorado project was circulated among the states concerned for their approval. It proposed a dam 250 feet high, impounding about 400 million kilowatts in electric generating capacity with a total project cost of about 164 million dollars.

This report said the Echo park reservoir would hold floodwaters from the original 80-acre site of the monument, but would cover portions of the expanded reservation. However, the source said the reservoir would make accessible areas in the "dinosaur park" which now cannot be reached.

Bureau to Retain Rule of Reservoir

BOISE, Dec. 11.—The U. S. bureau of reclamation plans to continue to administer the Grand Coulee equalizing reservoir of the Columbia basin project in eastern Washington for a while at least.

However, Harold T. Nelson, regional director of the bureau, said he had authorization from Reclamation Commissioner Michael E. Slocum to continue discussions with the Columbia basin commission and other local agencies over administration of the 27-mile artificial lake. Some local interests have urged that the state be given control of the reservoir, which recycles water pumped from Columbia river at Grand Coulee dam. The reservoir is a popular bass fishing area.

Recreational aspects of Franklin D. Roosevelt lake, the 61-mile-long reservoir created by Grand Coulee dam, are supervised by the national park service.

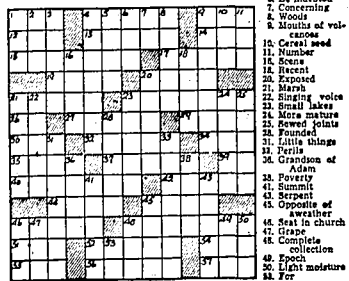

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Cloud-Seeding Expert Claims Rainfall Gains

LAS VEGAS, Nev. Dec. 11 (AP)—Dr. Irvin P. Krick of Denver is confident that artificial cloud seeding could increase rainfall in the Intermountain region sufficiently to solve water shortage problems.

"It spoke at the final session of the annual meeting of the Colorado River Water Users Association. His firm, Water Resources Development Corporation, has operated extensively in the west the past two years and Dr. Krick said the activity has resulted in increased rainfall.

Not "Rainmakers"

"We are not rainmakers in the sense that we can turn a downpour on or off at will," he said. "All we can do is operate on present storms by encircling them to the point that the precipitation will be greater than normal."

Dr. Krick said that at present an estimated 1 per cent of the moisture in storm clouds normally is released during a storm under natural conditions.

Like Fertilizer

"If through a system of seeding, we can turn a drizzle into a 2 per cent of their moisture," he added, "then we would increase the precipitation 100 per cent over the program is much like that of the farmer who puts fertilizer into the soil. We use silver iodide to seed the storm clouds."
