Dollars, Not Dimes, Advised In Annual Polio Funds Drive

BOISE, Dec. 12—Idaho's 1953 March of Dimes beginning Jan. 2 must become a "March of Dollars" if we are to keep pace with the stampede of gold, Donald S. Whitehead, state chairman, announced today.

"The state's epidemic incidence of the dread disease this year plus its upward surge during the last five years has far out-distanced funds available for patient care, professional education and research.

"Year after year, March of Dimes contributions have moved steadily ahead but the state's unrelenting polio incidence continues to outpace the March of Dimes," Whitehead emphasized, adding "since 1947 Idaho has experienced continuous attacks of the epidemic disease which have left in their wakes over twice as many victims as had been stricken over the entire previous quarter of a century."

"Idaho county chapters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis have been trying to do a 100 per cent job with considerably less than 100 per cent of the funds needed to do it.

"Necessary success in the vital January appeal can only be attained if the state's citizens meet the challenge and contribute dollars rather than dimes in the fight against polio.

"Since the inception of the Idaho March of Dimes program in the late '30s, our county chapters have raised and returned less than \$700,000 while the national headquarters has pumped nearly \$2,800,000 in epidemic aid into its county units throughout the state. It is evident that without this additional support from other states we could not have begun to take care of the tremendous polio problem with which we have been faced," Whitehead pointed out.

He emphasized that maximum success in the campaign is essential if the services now made available to Idaho by the national foundation are to continue. These services not only include financial assistance

Political Truce of Truman and "Ike" Lasts Short Seven Days

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—The political truce between President Truman and President-Elect Eisenhower was one of the shortest of record—nearly seven days.

On Thursday of last week Truman stated the ground rules for the new Democratic opposition. He said then the incoming Republican administration should be given a chance to show what it can do before being subjected to a lot of criticism.

He said, for example, he would have no comment or criticism of Eisenhower's nominations to high office until the new administration had a chance to take over and show its stuff.

Yesterday Mr. Truman blasted, in language unusually strong for a presidential news conference, at Eisenhower's method of approaching the country's greatest problem, Korea. That is what to do about Korea, and how.

What Truman still identifies as the most stubborn and challenging of the unsolved problems he is leaving to the new administration.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—In the Truman administration's first year, the Tucker group and its communist influence at Washington and throughout the country, Attorney-Gen. James P. McGrath is preparing a new drive against the Tucker group, which has been enlisted so many respectable and patriotic Americans in Stalin's dirty work.

The department of justice compiled a comprehensive list of more than 100 names of Tucker's associates during the regime of former Attorney-Gen. J. Howard McGrath.

The compilation was made in a hurried, statistical and alphabetical manner, largely to answer congressional charges that the administration had been indifferent to this menace. It was a counterforce to the anti-Tucker revelations.

NEW LIST—This arbitrary method of red-tagging dangerous groups was condemned by the Supreme court a year ago but far-reaching disclosure. When the joint anti-fascist committee of the New York conference in New York City, the Tucker group was the only one of its kind without any hearing as to its status, the high tribunal condemned the government procedure.

James P. McGrath is making out a new list, and will create an administrative board to hear any complaints by alleged "iron" units that they have been placed on the list.

In order to comply with the supreme court ruling, the FBI and other protective agencies are how come the committee has been set up, as it never has been sanctioned in the past.

DIFFICULT TASK—Unfortunately, the task of identifying and labeling and prosecuting Stalin's secret organs is a very difficult one because of the long delay in attacking the problem.

During the period when Truman was ridiculing the investigation on Capitol Hill as "a waste of time," the Tucker group has been able to adopt a new false front and to hide their tracks.

Many of the hidden men with Moscow have escaped to Europe and are now active in American countries, where they have set up cells of anti-American activity and propaganda. These same areas were ferried to the Tucker group in 1939.

SACB BULLING—McGrath cannot release his new compilation, however, until the subversive activities control board hands down a final official decision on the Tucker group. The board has been set up to investigate and report on the Tucker group and its activities in the United States.

After a stormy nine months' hearing, a SACB report ruled in July that the Tucker group was in the United States as an active agency which took orders and funds from Stalin. But this ruling cannot become valid until it has been approved by the board headed by Gov. Charles Brown, Brooklyn, N. Y.

In view of the damaging evidence submitted to the joint government investigators and lawyers, full approval is expected soon.

COMPREHENSIVE—Once SACB has acted, there will be a definite and comprehensive check, perhaps for the first time, on the Tucker group, as well as its social, economic and philanthropic fronts.

All the units will be required to register and to make periodic reports on their financial contributions and expenditures, which will enable the federal police to check on the Tucker group's work, as well as its social, economic and philanthropic fronts.

JUDICIAL OPERATION—When the new method comes into force McGrath will forward to SACB the names of the Tucker group and its associates, and secretly on behalf of Russia. Then SACB, after a semi-judicial and open hearing, will decide whether the McGrath indictment is supported by the evidence.

Since, seven long years after Russia's subversive work in the United States had been recognized and exposed, we will have in operation an effective but wholly judicial and American system for checking the Tucker group's work.

MOMENT OF CONFUSION—It has been charged that the United States has been confronted with "crisis after crisis" since 1933. That gloomy word seemed to be a favorite with Roosevelt-Truman and their associates. It is the feeling that they will banish it from the federal dictionary, however.

RIEKS OF ABERNETHY-MINDEDNESS

A multitude of jokes, some good and some bad, have been made about Abernethy-mindedness. It is the quality of a man who suffers from a lapse of memory is apt to be subjected to memory.

Case in point is that of Dr. H. L. Plank, a distinguished scientist who took part in the recent atomic bomb tests at the Phillips Ranch. Plank, according to the Associated Press, misplaced his briefcase at Honolulu, T. H., on his way back to Hawaii.

A furore has arisen over what was in the briefcase left unguarded on a counter at Honolulu. Did it contain atomic secrets? Or was it merely the repository for Dr. Plank's toilet articles and socks?

Plank's associates are evasive on the subject. Pressed by reporters from the Star Bulletin, the army gave three versions: (1) the briefcase contained files; (2) the briefcase was locked; (3) there was no briefcase.

We are inclined to suspect there was a briefcase, and that Dr. Plank forgot it. But the "secret" data and "theoretical" conclusions—did leave it on a counter. It may have contained microfilm, dry film, or possibly Dr. Plank's lunch.

By tradition, professors are entitled to be absent-minded. If they wear socks that don't match, talk in metaphors and scribble on their appointments, it should be understood that it is occasioned by intellectual concentration on subjects beyond the comprehension of common folk. But the lapse of memory set off an incident. This is an era in which men of science are held in both respect and suspicion.

An absent-minded professor is a relic of another age. He must be above forgetfulness now; he must be above distractions, and yet always remember when he left his briefcase. Should he forget, the military will search for it, liable to be investigated by a continental commission.

The atomic age has placed a terrible burden on the shoulders of scientists. It is a happy day when Edison could putter in his laboratory and not have to be concerned whether he left his notes at the corner lunch stand—Lewiston Tribune.

IMMUNITY FOR BROADCASTERS

The radio and television industry is asking the legislature to amend the libel law of the state to relieve stations of responsibility for remarks made by their announcers. It would require that the candidates a green light at defamatory remarks, but not be liable. It seems that the broadcasters should be held responsible for some of the things that come over the air just as the press is held responsible for statements that are false or libelous when uttered by its reporters. It is responsible for the dissemination of information from pollsters and lies and slander. From the very nature of the medium, the radio and television stations are enjoying immunity for character defamatory remarks. This provides the medium of dissemination.—North Side News.

The total charge on the millage roll for 1952 is \$12,223.50. The Triumph mining company will pay approximately \$10,000 of this.

Of the city millage charge of \$177,648.27, public utilities will pay \$100,074.17. The charge for lands outside of incorporated cities is \$129,859.

The county's largest taxpayer is the United Pacific railroad with more than \$125,000 charged against it. 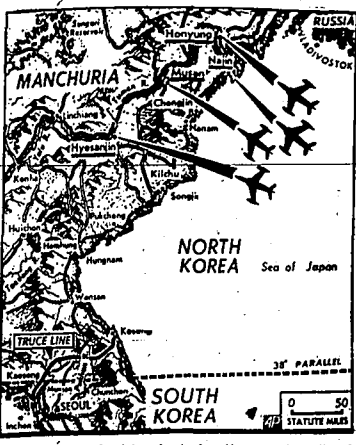

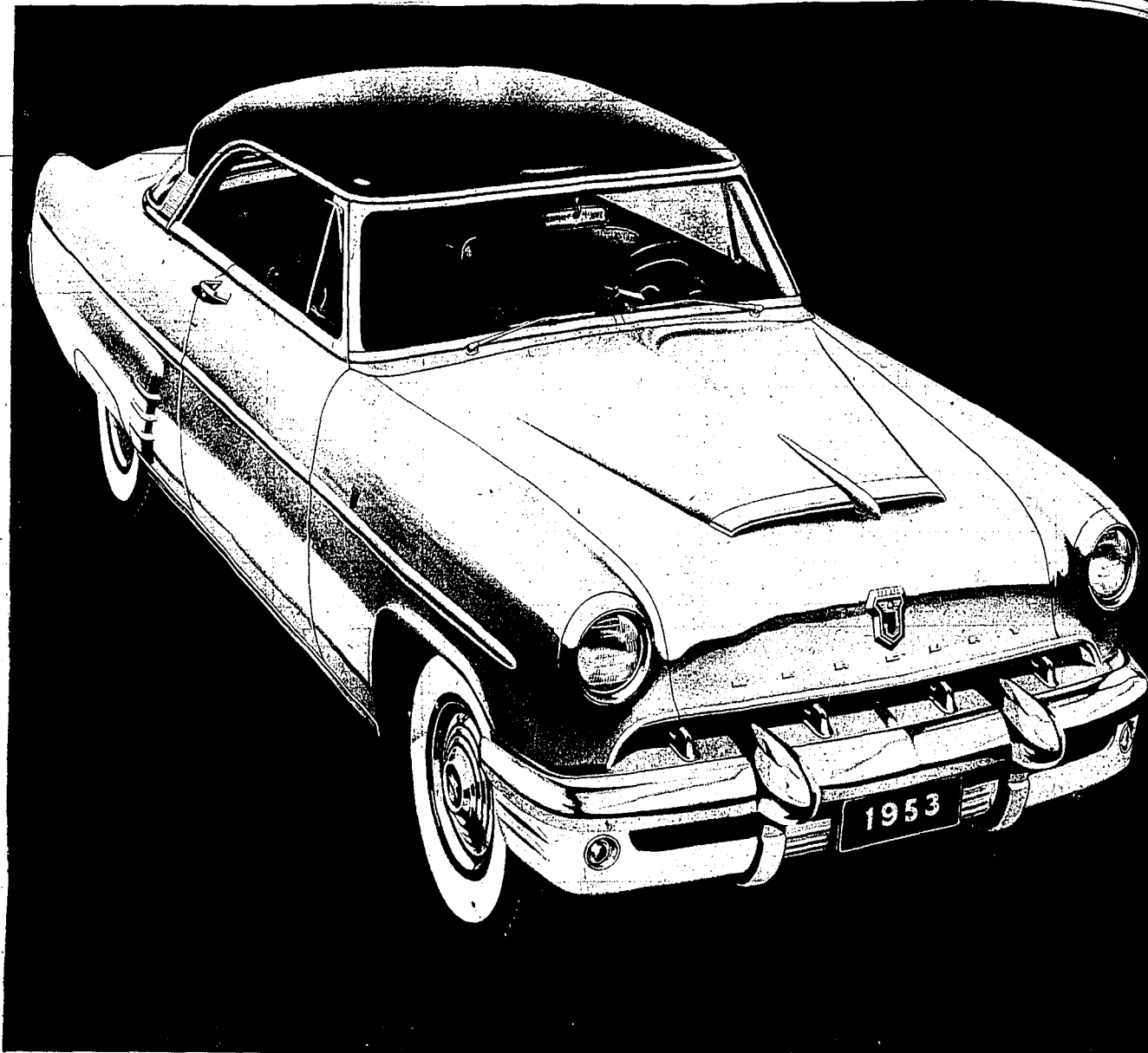
