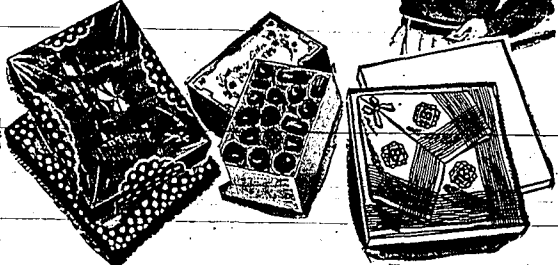

## Minister Raps Low Thief Who Took Church's Safe, Records

Editor, Times-News: I break into a church and steal from a preacher and from the poor-box. I nominate as the low thief of the year the man who came into the Lutheran church office in Twin Falls and made off with the church safe last Wednesday morning. By stealing that safe, the church lost valuable records which are priceless.

Eight years in preparation, how they are gone. The records of the baptism of some 500 adults and children, the official records of 140 marriages and 75 burials, the official entries of confirmation for adults and children, records which in some instances are the only record of law as a document—gone! Records of the church services, neatly tabulated and filed—gone!

Three instruments of parish life are of no value whatever to a thief; he cannot sell them, he cannot use them, all he can do is destroy. Evidence indicates that there were no standing statues that night, or in front behind the shrubberies, the other in the rear. There were at least two inside trying to steal from the church. Mine five, it reminds me of the time I was taken with "records and slaves" to take Jesus in the Garden.

And what did they get in cash? They got the contents of the poor-box, the charity fund, some \$40. They got the money given in memory of a departed veteran of men, earmarked for charity. Isn't that a manly thing to do? There was a film on "Venture of Faith," a 45-minute sound movie telling the story of poor students building themselves a building on a college campus so they could get an education—gone! They found \$50 which the pastor had been saving for almost a year, toward the purchase of a commentary on the Bible, used in writing sermons. They also took \$150 which the pastor had been using as a revolving fund, for travel to church meetings in Portland and St. Louis, and out of the meager earnings of a preacher that may be repaid.

That's all they got. And that kind of money should bring four or five people to a church in the dead of night, to steal from a preacher, from the poor-box, and from a congregation. And all that just eight days before Christmas! I wonder why the Almighty did not strike them dead.

Well, it's still nice to live in America. Here a man is free. Here no one locks your church door, or takes away your Bible. It's too bad that we have to have people on this land of opportunity and prosperity who will not do an honest day's work. "Stealing their daily bread in the sweat of their brow," but instead

### Death Doesn't End Case for Divorce Here

The divorce case of Mrs. Mrs. Johnston against Peter B. Johnston continues to produce court-room headaches although it was pronounced settled by a memorandum decision by District Judge Kalte E. Love more than six weeks ago.

The court awarded Mrs. Johnston a divorce, but also was granted only a small amount of the property. The latest difficulty arose with the death of Mr. Johnston Dec. 10. In a hearing before Judge Love in chambers Friday, attorneys for both parties argued over jurisdiction of the court as to whether Judge Love can follow through with the routine findings of fact and conclusions of law and a judgment in the case. Idaho law appears to be indefinite in the matter.

If the court cannot follow through with its decision, the couple would remain married and property rights would have to be settled in probate court.

Attorneys E. M. Rayborn and John Turnbull, of the firm of Rayborn, Rayborn and Kenner, and John Daly, of the firm of Parry, Kenner, Robertson and Daly, and Guy Kinney, who was the attorney for Peter B. Johnston, said the hearing originally was slated to have Mr. Johnston's case follow through with the routine findings of fact and conclusions of law and a judgment in the case as a whole.

Daly explained the money paid to the clerk in the form of a check. Daly said nothing on the check can be settled now in district court, and he asked that the alimony cease. He said the court can follow through with its judgment. Kinney agreed with Daly that there is some question about the matter.

Rayborn, Mrs. Johnston's attorney, said death has obviated the marriage. He cited considerable law, admitting uncertainty, but expressing the belief that the court cannot enter judgment.

Judge Love said the court had jurisdiction over the marriage and property in Idaho. He said it is obvious a divorce decree cannot be entered now, but wondered if the property can still be adjudicated. He also wondered about Utah property. Kinney said both parties had agreed the court could have jurisdiction over that property. Rayborn said the court is now

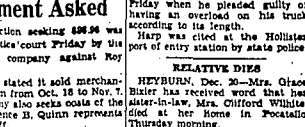

Members of the agricultural class were in their shop to help explain the tools.



### School Plant Construction Beating Plan

Construction of the new \$1,122,917 high school and gymnasium is two months ahead of schedule, according to the architect, George Ross Devan, architectural supervisor.

Excavating ceremonies for the new building were held on Aug. 3 for the south end and Aug. 12 for the north end. The building is expected to be completed and turned over to the school board early next summer. School officials are optimistic that the weather conditions will not cause any delay in the rapid progress possible.

The program has been completed and installation of the heating system is under way. The balcony seats are being poured and the gymnasium is expected to be completed in the next month.

The new \$1,122,917 school will give Twin Falls one of the best high school athletic facilities in the state, believes Holmes, architect.

A portion of the gymnasium will be 144 by 111 feet in size and will contain 20,000 square feet of floor space. The gymnasium is designed to accommodate 100 persons with seating for 100 on two balconies of folding seats. The balcony seats will provide additional space for recreational activities, such as basketball, etc., in addition to the main floor.

The height of the building is 22 feet. The ceiling will be 22 feet high and will be used to convert the gymnasium into two full-court basketball courts. The folding seats will be used to convert the gymnasium into a special school assembly and rest of the building is completely out of sight.

# Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Now in use at the BURLEY public library is a special display case which was purchased with a portion of the M. E. King memorial fund.

On Aug. 26, 1931, when death closed the career of this pioneer Burley business man and the M. E. King company chain of variety stores, the King family suggested memorials to the library.

Mr. King had taken an active part in civic affairs, was proud of Burley and worked with the greatest interest in its progress and the history of both. He studied maps and could quote freight rates anywhere in the United States without referring to a rate chart.

An ardent believer in the benefits of education, he was not satisfied with having provided a full, well-rounded education for his four children and so established a scholarship known as the M. E. King award which is presented each year to an outstanding high school graduate.

Mr. King lived in Kansas City, Mo., until 1904 when he decided to explore the west. For two years he traveled and worked on the railroads in the northwest coast, in Idaho and in Colorado, finally settling in Idaho.

Mr. King was a successful business man and after working in Fossilville for nine months he moved to Portland and then to Burley. Here he bought a variety store from Mrs. Tom Westman.

From then until the time of his death his chain of variety stores had increased to 14. He has since traveled and worked on the railroads in Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, Florida, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware, New Jersey, New York, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Vermont, New Hampshire, Maine, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland, Quebec, Ontario, and the United States.
