Military Inquiry Opened In Worst Plane Disaster; Civilian Probe Demanded

MOSES LAKE, Wash., Dec. 22—A military investigation of history's worst airplane crash was under way today as demands rose for a civilian probe of the accident that claimed 86 lives here early Saturday.

Civilian officials in and out of the government called for investigations and action to reduce the number of military plane crashes. Saturday's crash, which killed all but 30 of the men aboard the U.S. military's biggest airplane, was the 10th in a recent series which has snuffed out more than 800 lives.

The local investigating team, which includes four generals, ordered a strict blanket of secrecy thrown over their investigation of the crash.

All survivors, excluding the most prominent, are being questioned thoroughly. Many are wondering if they will be released in time to go home for Christmas. Dozens of other officials said today.

The Douglas-manufactured transport plane had been in service after it took off Saturday, remaining in the world's worst air disaster. Company officials said the plane was given a 1,000-hour inspection check "within the last month" and never exceeded that service check a "few days ago."

A spokesman for the company said Douglas Globemasters had been in service for more than two years and are being used to operate a permanent air base between the United States, Japan and Korea. Investigators declined to comment on the military probe, but emphasized they will remain on the job as long as it takes.

The huge plane crashed into the scrubby desert hills of central Washington moments after taking off from a base about 100 miles from the base for Kelly air force base, San Antonio, Tex.

The plane carrying 114 servicemen home for the holidays crashed as it reached the end of the runway, about 100 feet into the air, then plummeted to earth with a tearing crash. Gasoline from the fuel tanks spilled onto the frozen ground and burst into flames.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Dec. 22 (UP)—The United States general assembly voted down early today a Soviet demand to condemn the United States for a "mass murder" of war prisoners in Korea.

The Soviet "midnight maneuver" was thrown out by 45 to 37 in a vote of a marathon, all-night session of the 60-nation assembly.

Arab-Asian nations abstained on the Russian resolution. U. S. Delegate Ernest A. Gross had described as a "mass murder" of war prisoners in Korea.

Eisenhower carried the state over Gov. Adlai Stevenson, 190,707 to 107,000. Mrs. Tamm won the first district seat by 501 votes over Republican incumbent, Rep. John W. Flinn.

Idahoans also placed again in the top 10 of the year in the "most interesting" category, which attracted an estimated 1,500 people, largely political, to the state's history.

More Private Atomic Development Urged

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (UP)—The national security resources board urged today that the government encourage greater participation by private enterprise in the development and use of atomic energy as a source of power.

Other steps it recommended after a six-month study of long-term materials and energy supply problems include:

1. A mineral leasing system as an optional alternative to claiming on public lands. The board urged the U. S. Geological Survey and other agencies to study the feasibility of leasing public lands for mineral development.

2. A law prescribing policy to be followed by the department of the interior in managing offshore oil lands.

3. Laws authorizing United States participation with Canada in construction of the St. Lawrence seaway and power project, and providing for other multiple-purpose river development.

4. Legislation authorizing reduction or elimination of tariffs on raw materials and minerals.

16 Are Killed, 30 Injured in Gun Mishaps

BOISE, Dec. 22 (AP)—Firearm accidents reported in Idaho during 1952 total a record high of 46-16 of them fatal—the state fish and game department reports.

Four of the deaths were attributed to carrying loaded guns in moving cars and trucks and one in a rubber boat. Two fatalities were from household gun accidents.

Six deaths were caused by rifle fire in the field, two by shotguns, one by a pistol shot.

Of the non-fatal accidents 30 were attributed to rifles, 19 to shotguns and three to pistols. The cause of one accident was not reported.

1948 Worst Year
On the department's records, which go back to 1947, the worst previous year for gunfire accidents was 1948, when 16 people were killed and 10 injured.

The department also reported that six hunters died from heart attacks in 1952, one drowned, one died from exposure after being lost and one is still missing. Three hunters were reported to have sustained serious injury from falls.

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Contract Gain For Palisades Dam Reported

BOISE, Dec. 22 (AP)—An obstacle to continued construction of Palisades dam in eastern Idaho has been removed by completion of 41 water-saving and repayment contracts with wateruser organizations in upper Snake river valley.

The regional office of the Bureau of Reclamation said the contracts include pledges that water users will discontinue running water through irrigation canals during the winter for watering of stock and domestic purposes.

The average saving, the bureau said, will be 155,000 feet a year thus complying with a requirement of congress that agreements providing that much saving would have to be completed by the end of 1932 in order for work on the dam to continue. The bureau said several similar contracts are being negotiated.

Palisades dam will provide a 1,600,000-acre-foot storage reservoir furnishing supplemental water for 650,000 irrigated acres in Snake river valley and power to operate a hydro-electric plant with 115,000 kilowatt capacity. The dam is scheduled for completion in 1937-38.

The bureau said the contracts completed and being negotiated will include:

1. Make available to contracting groups part of Palisades reservoir capacity and provide for repayment to the government for construction costs.

2. Provide for purchase by some of the groups of 115,000 acre feet of storage which the government previously leased to them.

3. Arrange a permanent exchange of storage rights between American Falls and Jackson Lake reservoirs, instead of the present annual exchanges required to deliver American Falls water to upstream land.

4. Provide for greater than normal operation of the dam's power plant during each of the first five years of its operation in which river flow for the February-October period is normal or above.

5. Curtail winter power operations at Minidoka dam.
