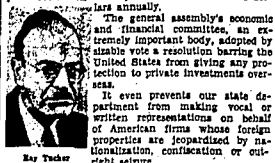

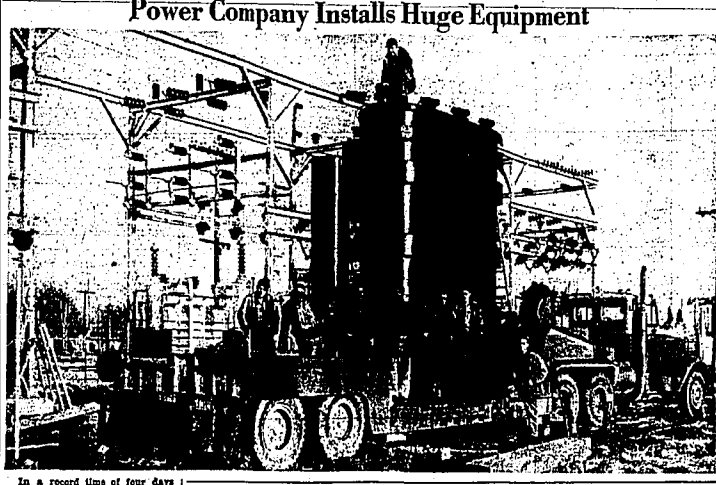
Transformer Installed by Idaho Power

BOONVILLE, Dec. 23—As a part of the long-range plan to keep ahead of the demand for electricity, the Idaho Power company last week completed installation of a 90,000-kilowatt transformer at the company's sub-station at Shoshone.

The transformer, the second largest in the Northwest, was purchased by the firm from the General Electric Co. and cost \$200,000. It was installed by the Idaho Power company at the Shoshone sub-station.

The object of the new transformer is to carry a steady flow of power to the Sun Valley and other areas in the northern part of the state. It also increases the capacity of the lines to carry power to that area. Reason said, "In the past, the voltage going to that area has varied from 100 to 110 volts. Now it will be constant, he explained."

The Idaho Power company has been experiencing a steady increase in demand for power from all over the state. Reason said, and the equipment at Shoshone was installed in anticipation of ever greater demand.

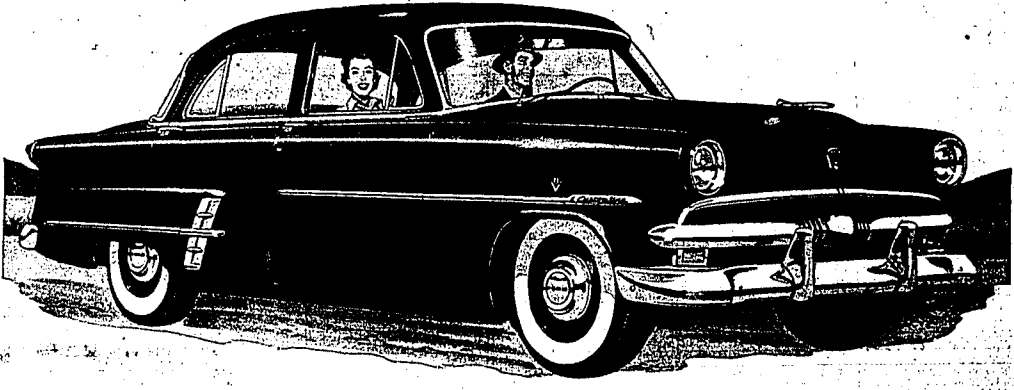

The muddy or frozen earth along the 155-mile front will be the front-line soldier's table and chair. He'll hope there'll be no uninvited guests—but will eat with one eye cocked for a possible surprise rod Chinese spy.

Even very close to the frontlines there will be midnight religious services for sons and Carol singing for many.

Rhymes of "peace on earth good will toward men" will blend with the boom of artillery and the chatter of machineguns.

Ingenuity and ingenuity will be the keynote of a Korean Christmas.

Christmas trees will carry a variety of decoration ranging from shopped-in "stale" tinzel, stars, glittering balls and electric lights to bright strips of ration cans, foil from cigarette packs and tissue paper.

Infantrymen will set aside—but keep within easy reach—their tools of war while they enjoy what gifts and Christmas trappings they have.

For most men in the lines, Christmas morning already has come and gone. Packages from home have been arriving for two weeks or more. Curiosity has, for the most part, won over the "do not open until Christmas" seals. The strong-willed may have left packages unopened for a few days. Then boredom and curiosity suggest:

"Well open just one, then put it back until Christmas."

The remaining gift packages and tons of turkey and other "fixin'" are on their way to the front today. When they have been prepared as carefully as possible, they will be where the food will run together like a menu without punctuation.

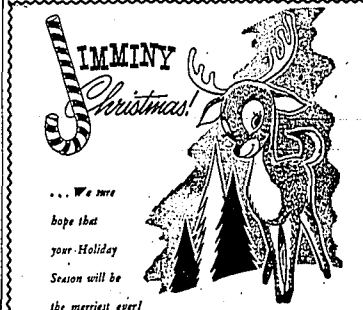

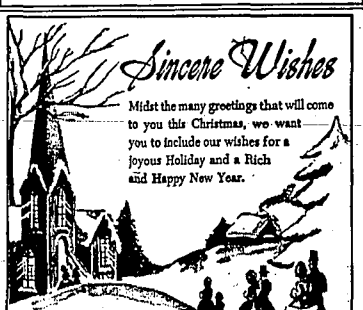

Marine Killed After Grenade Toss Into Bar

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (AP)—A marine sergeant on Christmas leave threw an incendiary hand grenade into a crowded bar early today and was shot to death by an off-duty policeman in a seven-block chase through busy Manhattan streets.

The 19-year-old sergeant, identified as Eugene McDermott, New York, died of a bullet wound in the head six hours after he terrorized an entire neighborhood by throwing a grenade in a west side bar. Thirteen persons were injured in the spray of burning phosphorus from the bomb.

Police said the fiery ball literally burned the pants off one man in the bar, John H. Orth, 50, a federal narcotics agent. Orth was in the bar as a narcotics investigator not connected with the bombing.

McDermott was wearing civilian clothes. Fireman Vincent Beckles, who chased McDermott and finally dropped him with a pistol shot, was treated for knife wounds.

Police could establish no definite motive for the bombing. They said McDermott apparently threw the grenade in an outburst of anger or resentment against someone in the bar.

About 80 residents of the brick tenement building the bar fled into the street after the explosion. The bar was littered with broken bottles and pieces of window glass and several of the injured were treated for cuts from flying splinters.

McDermott and two companions had been drinking in the bar, named the Royal Flush, before the bombing.

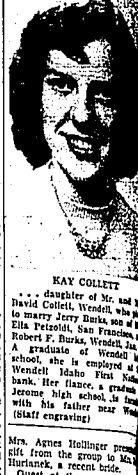

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—The federal government now is taking from the taxpayers about \$250 for each \$1 of taxes collected the year the Japanese hit Pearl Harbor. That was 11 years ago.

As federal taxes have increased, so has federal spending. Both without ending the series of federal deficits rarely interrupted since 1930.

Federal taxes jumped nearly 35 billion dollars from 1931 to 1950. The 1950 collections set a new record for the take of government from its taxpayers. The sum was approximately 25 billion dollars. "It's to keep the boys keyed up," explained Col. Royal Baker, McKinney, Tex., a jet ace with six MIGs to his credit. "Our quota is one MIG a day. Right now we've only one day behind."

Communists Seize Insect Collection

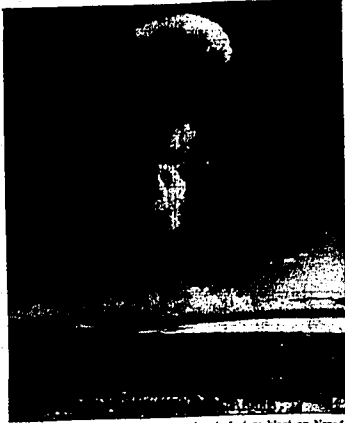

Dreamers and Workers Unite Skills, Build 'Impossible' Dam

SANDPOINT, Dec. 23 (AP)—The "dreamers" with their wild ideas and the construction "suits" in their hard-boiled hats have combined forces to whip nature and conquer rugged Cabinet gorge on Clark Fork river.

The switch has been thrown on the second generator of the 46-million dollar hydro-electric project many experts claimed couldn't be built.

In January, 1961, the Clark Fork traced 65 feet through the rock walls of its northern Idaho river bed—with cliffs towering more than 300 feet above the gorge.

Yuletide Tree Can Boomerang Into Disaster, Council Warns

CHICAGO, Dec. 23—Be sure to pitch out that old Christmas tree before the natural pitch and resin in it turns you out.

This warning comes from the National Safety Council today as millions of Americans set up Christmas trees, the traditional symbol of yuletide gaiety, in their homes.

A fir tree is filled with pitch and resin, the council pointed out, and is one of the most combustible objects known. Ignited, it burns so rapidly it is almost impossible to extinguish the fire.

To help prevent Christmas tree fires, the council offers 14 simple precautions:

1. Buy a fresh tree—and choose a small one. It's less dangerous. The wary of trees sold as "fireproof" and don't attempt to flameproof Christmas trees with chemical solutions.
2. Keep your tree in a cold place—an unheated garage is fine—until ready to set it up. And do not set it up until you are ready to use it.
3. Before setting up the tree, saw off diagonally at least an inch of trunk, and place base in water-containing holder. Keep water well above diagonal cut at all times.
4. Locate your tree well away from fireplaces, radiators, television sets, powerful electric lights and other sources of heat.
5. Never use candles for decorations. Use only electric lights, and be sure these and wiring bear the Underwriters Laboratory label. Always check wires for defects and loose sockets before putting them on tree.
6. Since too many light circuits in one outlet may overload the house wiring and blow a fuse, distribute the load among several outlets. A blown fuse means too many lights on one circuit. Reduce the load or connect part to another circuit outlet. Never increase size of fuse, or substitute a penny for a blown fuse.
7. Turn off the tree lights when no one is to be in the room for any length of time.
8. Do not operate electric trains under the tree.
9. Dispose of Christmas gift wrappings at once.
10. Use only artificial "snow" and decorations of the flameproofed or non-combustible type for trimming your tree.
11. In all places of public assembly, locate trees away from stairs and other exits, and station competent watchers with fire extinguishers or water pails nearby. Keep aisles and exits clear, and plan ahead to avoid panic.
12. Move the Christmas tree lights if the tree's needles near them turn brown. And when the needles start to fall, take the tree down and discard it.
13. Dispose of old trees in fire-safe areas outdoors—not in furnaces, stoves or fireplaces—because Christmas trees burn with almost explosive violence.
14. In case of fire, call the fire department immediately.

USDA Sounds Warning Over Sheep Disease

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—USDA officials have alerted sheep raisers and sheep raisers' associations that a new disease, called "scrapie" because of its slow progress, is spreading in sheep. The disease is a central-type infection, caused by a protein called prion, and is fatal to sheep. It is spread by contact with infected sheep or their hands, or by contact with infected objects. The disease is essentially being passed on by sheep.

No Known Cure
There is no known cure. The only thing to be done is to slaughter and dispose of infected sheep that are known to have been exposed.

The disease appeared in 16 sheep two breeding flocks of purebreds in California. These sheep were known to have been exposed although they had no symptoms.

Agriculture department officials said owners were compensated in all cases.

Today 45,000 American airmen and supporting ground troops are scattered over 28 big and little installations from Scotland in the north to Manston at the southeastern corner of England. Most of the bases are three hours or less from Moscow as the bomber flies. Many of the bigger bases are adapted for swift expansion in event of war.

ELYRIA, O., Dec. 23 (AP)—Lorain County Sheriff Carl Finegan has turned to trickery to hold down accident rates in his county. He has even saved the county money. Finegan, one of the first in this state to turn to electronics as a means of checking speeders, installed one of the first such gadgets. Myth on Serpents Is Given Support

BERKELEY, Calif., Dec. 23 (AP)—The sea-serpent myth has received an unexpected rejuvenation. Dr. R. A. Stejneger, University of California paleontologist, has discovered the skeletons of two. The discovery, however, still leaves existence of the sea beast some 75 million years in the past. Scientists call Stejneger's finds, made in Colombia, South America, in 1946, "extraordinary pleistocene." The first word refers to a geological age, the second to the kind of reptile. Study of the fossils may give scientists a picture of the earth's geography at that time. If successfully linked to specimens found in California, the sea serpents would give evidence of a seaway between Colombia and California. It linked to midwestern finds, they would indicate a seaway up the middle of the continent.

Obesity Declared Threat for Liver

CHICAGO, Dec. 23 (AP)—Obesity causes damage to the liver, according to findings disclosed in the Archives of the Internal Medicine, a publication of the American Medical Association, by Dr. Samuel Zelman of the Winter veterans administration hospital in Topeka, Kans. Zelman warned fat people that obesity can cause cirrhosis of the liver, which sometimes is fatal. The duration of obesity, rather than the degree, is the determining factor, he said. Zelman based his conclusions on a study of 70 overweight men whose ages ranged from 25 to 71 years, and whose weight ranged from 200 to 250 pounds. All showed both laboratory and histologic evidence of liver disease, he said. Zelman said food requirements of fat people are increased over the normal and constitute a functional overload on the liver. Active plant material such as leaves contain about 90 per cent water.

Plan to Cut Gas Explosions Eyed

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Dec. 23 (AP)—A system for minimizing the danger of gasoline explosions of airplanes in flight is being developed by the Ryan Aeronautical company. A spokesman said it had been proven that the danger of fuel tank explosions and fire was comparatively small when the tanks were full. They became dangerous when the fuel was being used, leaving an explosive mixture of gasoline and air.

The experiments being conducted by Ryan are based on the idea of filling the empty space inside a fuel cell with some form of inert gas such as carbon dioxide or nitrogen.

Husband Killed
Mrs. Pina's 30-year-old husband, James, was killed accidentally by carbon monoxide fumes from a defective gas furnace in the Pina home in San Rafael. Mrs. Pina and the children also were overcome but were saved by Pina's fellow workers who became concerned when he failed to pick them up one day to work and went to his home to investigate.

At the time, Pina was one of the youngest foremen employed by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company. He started with the firm in 1940 when he was 18 years old. He served in the navy from 1942 to 1945 and returned to the company upon his discharge.

Supported by Fund
Mrs. Pina will not have to go to work and be separated from her children to support the family. As she puts it, she now can devote full-time to being both mother and father to her babies.

Nearly 13 years after payments of monthly benefits began in January, 1940, five million persons on the rolls are receiving more than 200 million dollars a month in insurance payments.

The first person to receive such a monthly payment was Mrs. Ida Fuller, Ludlow, Vt. She received her first payment early in 1940 and has been getting them regularly since.

Science Analyzes Writing on Beans

Caution Note Is Sounded for Drivers on Yuletide Holidays

CHICAGO, Dec. 23.—It's not always fair weather when families get together, so drive carefully on your Christmas trip.

The National Safety council warns that Christmas is America's family get-together holiday. That means a lot of travel under hazardous conditions of poor visibility and treacherous road surfaces. That's why the death toll from traffic accidents is greater at Christmas time than for any other holiday of the year.

Heavy travel, tricky weather, early darkness and holiday festivity combined to bring death to 331 persons during the four-day Christmas holiday last year, the council said. Many persons again are enjoying a longer holiday this year, long enough to tempt millions of motorists to drive considerable distances for the rendezvous with Santa and a turkey dinner.

"Our records show that the traffic death toll for Christmas eve and Christmas day is about twice his annual daily average," said Ned W. Dearborn, council president. "This calls for special caution on everybody's part—driver and pedestrian alike."

"To keep death from taking your holiday, or someone else's is a simple thing. All that is required is extra caution and courtesy, plus a little more time during the holiday

push—just enough more time to be extra careful when driving on the highway or crossing streets.

"If you're driving, start early and wait for the green light before crossing streets. Carry packages so they do not obstruct your view. Motorists cannot always see you, especially during early evening darkness.

"If you're driving, start early and take it easy. Be extremely cautious in bad weather and darkness."

"If you're Christmas spirit in liquid form, stay away from the steering wheel of a car. Don't let holiday spirit or spirits replace common sense and caution."

"Assume personal responsibility for a safe celebration for yourself and others. Make Christmas happy for everyone.

"Don't let death take your holiday."

Famed View Of Falls Due For Revision

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Dec. 23.—Visitors to Niagara falls are due for some surprises in the next few years.

They may find the scenic splendor of the Canadian Falls somewhat distorted, but it's only temporary. It's part of a plan evolved by the international joint commission to keep the grandeur of the horseshoe falls intact in future years when more water is drawn off upstream for hydro-electric development.

The construction plan calls for a dam blocking off portions of the brink so crews can work on the river bed above the falls. They will deepen certain sections by excavation, to produce an even distribution

of water all around the horseshoe, providing a beautiful, unbroken curtain of falling water.

Unfortunately for the honeymooners and tourists who flock to the historic holiday center each year, this work can only be done during the summer months. Until it's completed the Canadian falls just won't look the same.

The job, if it gets the go-ahead from the Canadian and U. S. governments, will be started in 1933. It will take four years to finish at an estimated cost of 16 million dollars, shared equally by the two countries.

No work will be done on the American side of the falls. A proposed control dam 1,350 feet long about a mile upstream will guarantee an even flow over the U. S. side.

GOP Victory Causes Flood Of Job Pleas

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—Scores of Republican senators are being swamped with letters from job seekers eager to get on the federal payroll after 20 years in the political wilderness. The senators say they are amazed. They had not looked for such a rush in a line of generally booming businesses. Many of the senators say privately they are sure most of the would-be federal employes are going to be disappointed — not only with the limited number of job openings but also with the pay and qualifications.

Most of the letters asked for the approximately 40,000 postmaster territories scattered throughout the country. One senator said his correspondents were surprised to learn these territories are under civil service and there is no limitation on the terms of the incumbents. Postmaster jobs are named "without term." An aide to one GOP senator said he had been advised this could be construed that the officials serve at the pleasure of the President and are removable without cause if he wishes. Full Tenure However, the civil service commission disputes this. It contends the postmasters have full tenure and death of resignation and are removable only for cause. At the moment, job seekers' letters are going into files pending decision as to how Republican patronage is to be handled. One senator said no word had been received on bids as yet from Messersmith, headquarter, H. H. Brownell, attorney-general-designate, has been handling up-level opportunities but has not asked to receive applications for routine jobs. This senator said. Another GOP source said he understands Thomas E. Stephens of New York, chosen by Eisenhower to be his special counsel at the White House, would be in charge of patronage.

New Facts Found On Shifts of Land

He said the strip probably was altered by erosion and above the water's surface during the course of geologic history. Dr. Gastor based his beliefs mainly on the "astounding" similarity of plant and animal life in corresponding formations on the two continents.

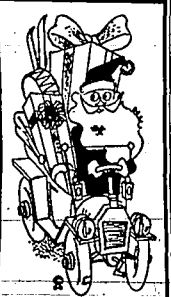
Old Culture for Indians Located

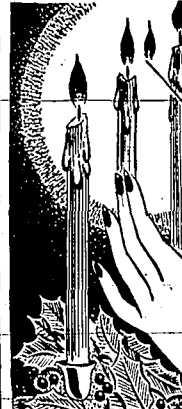

Oil Reserve Land Opened to Exploration for Uranium Ore

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—The atomic energy commission hopes new sources of uranium will be found in a vast area formerly reserved for petroleum exploration. Two steps are being taken to expand the search for the atomic bomb metal. They are:

- 1. Miners will be permitted to dig for uranium in land covered by petroleum leases.
2. Drillers will hunt for uranium at the same time they look for oil.
A large portion of the United States has been leased for petroleum exploration. This includes more than 49 1/2 million acres of federal land alone, in addition to state and private holdings.

Most of this is in the Rocky mountain west. Some is in the Colorado plateau country, scene of one of the biggest uranium booms in the country. Although no rich uranium deposits have been found near oil wells, there is no proof metallic and non-metallic minerals don't exist in close proximity. The hunt for uranium is comparatively young. There has been little prospecting for the metal on petroleum land.

Uranium has been discovered in the Colorado plateau and in southern Utah, in areas where thousands of acres are covered by oil leases. Miners have been reluctant to apply for government aid to explore for uranium on oil land because of a belief that the iron mineral leasing law prevented mining in areas leased to petroleum development.

However, they have been told by the AEC to go ahead. AEC announced it has authority under the atomic energy law to lease oil land for uranium mining. The agency's new rules will be drafted to effect continued production of uranium operations in areas covered by oil and gas leases and give equitable treatment to miners who have brought new uranium deposits into production in such areas and encourage exploration.

Mining will be permitted as long as it doesn't interfere with the oil drilling. In addition, AEC said it will work out similar lease agreements covering uranium discoveries in land withdrawn from public use for any purpose other than oil exploration. Hints Are Listed On Good Lighting

DURHAM, N. C. (AP)—Edward K. Kravill, a Drake university illumination expert, has these tips for home planners who want good lighting:

- 1. Avoid excessively dark walls, floor and furniture which soak up light and cause harsh contrasts. Use light colored semi-transparent lampshades.
2. Plan for even distribution of lighting. A person reading by a floor lamp in a semi-dark room will often turn the light down to its lowest level, not because the room is too bright, but because it seems to glare in contrast to the rest of the room.
3. Avoid spotlights. Many modern lamps concentrate light in a small area. They are the poorest kind you can have, except for special use such as highlighting a piece of furniture. They should never be used to provide reading light over beds, chairs or desks.

Ideas of Both Sexes Agree

BERKELEY, Calif., Dec. 23 (U-P)—In the privacy of the home, a man and wife may frequently disagree on many questions, but University of California psychologists have found through group tests that a surprising uniformity of opinion exists among the two sexes regarding each other.

For example, both men and women agreed that women are most faithful in marriage, show the greatest moral character, are more imaginative, have more poise in awkward situations, have more understanding of the needs of children, make a greater attempt to "keep up with the Joneses," are more predisposed to honesty, are more likely to hold a grudge, and are subject to violent outbursts of temper.

Both sexes agreed that men show the greatest emotional balance in crisis, have more courage in the face of disapproval or danger, have higher general intelligence, are less likely to go dangerously in debt with family finances, and are more apt to violate sexual codes.

Widow's Names Lead Man to Jail

DETROIT, Dec. 23 (U-P)—Some persons lead a double life, but Eugenia Davis, 34, led a multiple one and wound up in prison.

Under his own name he was a credit-rating checker for a Detroit firm. As Jesse Wheeler, he drew welfare aid for 15 years. Using the names of "good risks" on his company's list, he obtained credit at local stores. Twenty merchants complained he fleeced them.

"I used other people's names and credit ratings because mine was so poor," he explained.

Dimly Remembered State of 'Normalcy' Is Predicted for U. S. Economy in 1953

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (U-P)—Road signs on the economic highway could be pointing to the dimly remembered state of "normalcy" in 1953.

After the long postwar period of shortages, regulations and restrictions, you might see a return in the new year to a day when nature's competitive forces determine what you pay for what you want.

Indications are plain that the war backlog of demands of the war years have been met and that the law of supply and demand again may be the main controlling force in the economy.

A new war crisis, of course, could change the picture.

The economy enters 1953 after another tremendous year of action topped even the peace-time heights of 1951.

Businessmen were worried during the first months of 1952. A general comparative slowing up was noted and retail sales fell over most of the nation from the 1951 buying level. Many prices were reduced. Some manufacturing was cut back.

But, the tide began to turn at midyear and the boom rolled on to year's end in the usual tidal wave pattern that has marked the post-war years.

A steel strike, an abortive coal strike and Korean peace rumors hardly ruffled the rush of the economy, capping the momentum of the final months was the election of Dwight D. Eisenhower as President.

Business generally sounded the trumpet that his meant a better market for industry. The stock market went up and it was called an "expectation market."

Economic records for 1952 were impressive by any standard.

Gross national product—total value of goods and services—was running at a rate of 344 billion dollars as the year ended, compared with 250 billions in 1951, a previous high record.

National income reached 287 billion dollars for 1952, compared with 277 billions in 1951. That's the total earnings of labor and capital.

Personal income for the year was running at a rate of 366-billion dollars, compared with 254 billions in 1951.

Unemployment was under the level of a year ago.

Industrial production reached a new postwar high in October. Corporations paid out \$6,235,000,000 in dividends during the first 11 months of the year, a 3 per cent increase over the like period of last year, the commerce department reported.

So, we come to 1953 and the question of what's ahead for you.

There are two things:

1. The indications we all may be facing a period of freer economic activity and

2. As to the first, here are some of the signs:

In the last year, price controls were suspended on 65 per cent of goods and foods whose prices were frozen two years ago.

Consumer credit controls — ended May 1. Financing restrictions governing real estate—regulation X—were suspended in September.

The government told automakers this month they could make more cars and build certain kinds of structures.

There is some expectation in Washington that most controls will be discontinued in 1953, although there also is a feeling that Republicans may move cautiously in that respect in order to forestall any criticism of hasty action.

Wage, price and rent ceilings expire under the law April 30, 1953, unless congress renews them.

Will there be a slump, or a recession? The opinions are varied both ways. Some of the government people think not. Roger L. Fildem, government economist, said during the year, said, "It's hard for me to see a recession within the next year and a half."

He said he saw no economic reason for one, but he added that if businessmen keep on talking about a slump they could scare themselves into one.

Some of the private economists think the same way, as well as many businessmen, but others are not so sure.

Those who do think there will be a slackening off, generally agree it might come mid-year.

New Pictures of Planets Exhibited

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (U-P)—The National Geographic society has put on display some "close-up" shots of the earth's heavenly neighbors, taken by the world's largest telescope.

The pictures aren't so candid as to catch Martian men walking around on the planet Mars, but they do supply new evidence that at least a primitive form of plant life exists on the red planet.

The photographs, put on display for the first time, were taken by the 200-inch Hale telescope on Mount Palomar, California. They show a chunk of the moon, two views of Mars and one each of Jupiter, Venus and Saturn.

Salisbury Steak Origin Reported

SALISBURY, N. C., Dec. 23 (U-P)—Salisbury steak was a spur-of-the-moment creation of a Southern Railway dining car cook from Salisbury, Chamber of Commerce officials here claim.

The order on an Asheville-bound train, dinner steak but there was none aboard. The cook sent word that he could prepare a "salisbury steak" as a substitute "just the way they fix it in Salisbury, N. C."

After the order was sold, according to the Chamber of Commerce, the cook got creative with some scraps of meat and then served the first order of a meat dish that has become popular throughout the nation.

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 23 (U-P)—The television programs aren't any worse for today's youngsters than the "Tom Swift" type of adventure book was for children 35 or 40 years ago, according to Dr. Lenox Grey of New York, president of the National Council of Teachers of English.

Grey also has a theory expressed before the English Club of Greater Milwaukee, that teachers are dis-

persing with outmoded rules of grammar, such as insisting on "it is" instead of the commonly heard "it's me."

Language grows with the times, he said, and teachers who formerly had only the printed word to work with now have communications media such as radio, television, movies and picture magazines. Such media give common experience to large groups quickly.

"I look back on the times when we kids used to get experience from reading books that ranged from 'Tom Swift' on," Grey said, "I can't think that television is any

worse, and it gives them experience a lot faster."

Grey said that while mass communication media carry "education for good and for bad," English teachers are, in his opinion, doing an effective job. He said the huge pocket book reprint business of to-

day points to the fact that there are more readers than ever.
