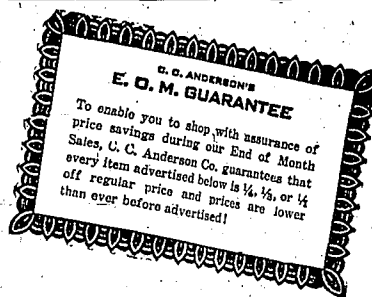

No Difficulty On Alien Act Seen in West

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 24 (AP)—A spokesman for the immigration and naturalization service said here today that the new McCarran act which gives immigration control over alien and airline personnel, "anticipate no difficulty in the responsibility under the law." Bruce Barber, district director, said that the act is "not as drastic as it appears." Barber said the law provides that the number of ships and planes operating here will have to be reduced. "There are no men landing permits" and the aliens can be revoked at any time.

No Passenger Ships
Barber said no foreign passenger ships are operating in the Pacific. Freighters and cargo ships are operating in the Pacific but not over 50 men each, he said.

Barber said the freighters would be operated by immigration officials in the Pacific bay and in most cases the officers already will have ship documents processed and ready for examination.

Barber said the process of determining if a ship is qualified for shore calls usually could be completed after each ship docks.

Barber said he is expected to be in the regulation, which went into effect at midnight last night, is the "strongest" since the act.

Solon Advises Large Cut for Foreign Posts

NEW YORK, Dec. 24 (AP)—Sen. Olin D. Johnston, D. S. C., said in his return from an inspection tour of United States installations overseas Tuesday the numbers of civilian employees abroad should be reduced "at least 50 per cent."

Johnston, chairman of the post-office and civil service committee, said he saw evidence of "wasted manpower and poor distribution of materials at installations in 10 middle east, European and North African countries."

Save Time Limit
"The best recommendation I can offer at this time is that employees of the United States in the areas we inspected be reduced by at least 50 per cent within the next 12 months," he said.

The reduction would affect more than 250,000 persons, both Americans and natives.

He said certain activities seem to be "winning us enemies instead of friends as a result of bungling and lack of direction."

Many Warled "We received direct testimony that many employees recruited in the United States and sent to Europe have actually wanted to return to the United States for their first work assignment."

"Many concrete evidences were found of overstaffing and lack of overall direction," Johnston was accompanied by Rep. George P. Moore, D. Calif., and a group of civil service officials. They returned aboard the liner United States.

next year could create crop surpluses. To follow the goal, the secretary said, might mean the day when farmers might have to pay to control in the case of wheat and cotton.

In announcing the goals Brannan said:

"The demand for farm products during the year is expected to remain high. Consumer incomes and expenditures will be higher than in 1932. Our population is increasing at the rate of 2½ million a year. Food is essential—no other weapon in democracy's arsenal is more powerful."

Prices Declining

The high production goals were set against a background of declining farm prices and rising farm costs—facts that have caused concern in some quarters. Prices at planting time next spring are expected to have considerable influence on farmers' own production plans.

Brannan noted that prospects for the fall-winter wheat crop remain very promising. He said, however, that there is no need for producers of spring wheat to boost their acreages to take up the slack in winter wheat because the export outlook is just favorable now as it was a few months ago.

Land taken out of cotton, wheat and other export crops should be put to livestock feed, he said.

Average Goals Set

The public sale of 360 million acres of crop land, or about the same as this year, the national director of the program, said. The national director said that farmers will be free to plant whatever acreage they desire, except for pasture and tobacco.

Individual national goals were set for major crops only. None were set for individual livestock or poultry production because production patterns for those already have been established by farmers. These patterns indicate more beef but less pork next year, about the same quantity of milk and more eggs.

Bread 'Softener' Use Is Outlawed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23—Indiscriminate shipments of bread made "deceptively and artificially fresh" through use of chemical softeners will be barred hereafter, food and drug administration officials said.

The officials said that such softeners today are being used by the enforcement of certain provisions of the agency's new bread standard.

They said the court rejected an appeal by the Atlas Food company from a ban on the use in bread making of polyoxyethylene, a chemical softener.

Shift of Weed Funds to Land Bureau Asked

BOISE, Dec. 24 (AP)—Transfer of the money now funneled and budgeted from the state agriculture department to the state land department was recommended today in Agriculture Commissioner D. A. Stubblied's biennial report to Gov. Len Jordan.

The report said the transfer was requested "in the interest of economy and efficiency."

The 1937 Idaho legislature appropriated \$400,000 for noxious weed control on state lands, and a similar appropriation is being requested by the agriculture department for the coming biennium.

The 1935 legislature appropriated \$200,000 for halcyon control. During 1931 the money was spent spraying halcyon along the roads and in small isolated patches to keep the weed from spreading, the report said.

In the spring of 1932 congress appropriated money to the bureau of land management, which is leading a campaign against halcyon, heavily infested tracts of halcyon. During 1932, the state has been leading lands within the area controlled by the federal government so there will not be an infested area of state land within the borders of land treated by the bureau of land management.

Record for Births Predicted in U.S.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24 (AP)—Births in the United States this year probably will approach four million and set a new record, the public health service reported Tuesday.

If births for all of 1936 stand up to the preliminary figures for the first 10 months, the increase will be between 1 and 2 per cent over last year's record, the agency figured.

It puts estimated births for the first 10 months of 1936 at 3,297,000, compared with 3,200,000 in the similar 1935 span.

University Plans Project on Weed Pest Eradication

MOSCOW, Dec. 24 (AP)—Two research projects in eradication of halcyon, sheep-killing weeds, have been announced by President J. E. Buchanan of the University of Idaho.

The university's agricultural experiment station and the forestry, wildlife and range experiment station will cooperate in the projects.

One study will determine the extent to which insects are destroying beneficial range plants and shrubs, thus opening the way for the spread of halcyon and other weeds.

During the past three years, university researchers on the halcyon project in Rat River valley have noted new insects and have suspected they may have something to do with the decline of natural vegetation, aiding growth of halcyon.

The university will cooperate with the bureau of plant industry of the U. S. department of agriculture to study soil types and their relation to spread of halcyon. Study plots will be established in areas where native vegetation has disappeared.

BOISE, Dec. 24 (AP)—The Idaho public utilities commission has ordered two PUC permits for construction of new power plants to show cause Jan. 13 why their permits should not be revoked.

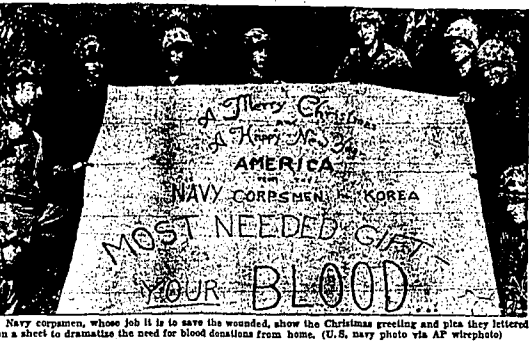

Panel Leader Jobs Shifting To New Men

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23—Legislative power wielded in the past by lawmakers from the south and midwestern states has been shifted to the new congressmen in the new congress. This will happen even though the midwest was the only area in which Republicans failed to gain congressional seats in the November elections.

In the new congress midwest Republicans, mostly from small towns and rural areas, will head 12 of the 19 standing house committees and nine of the 18 standing senate committees.

None for South Southerners who headed 11 house committees and eight senate committees in the last congress are held no chairmanships in the new congress. That also is true of lawmakers from New York City and California who headed four house committees in the 82nd congress.

Committee chairmen are powerful because virtually all legislation acted on by congress is considered first by the appropriate standing committee. The chairman can determine what legislation his committee will consider and when the decisions are challenged successfully.

Senate Chairmanships go to the majority party and almost always to men with the longest committee seniority. Almost all are held by lawmakers who normally win reelection by wide margins.

None of those who had held committee chairs in the last congress ever served under a Republican administration. No Republican senators and only 10 of the house members ever held a congressional seat under a Republican president.

In another power shift the west will be represented by more house members next year than ever before. This stems from the reorganization of house seats as a result of population changes between 1940 and 1950. California and Washington house seats and Washington one in the new congress. The midwest and northeast each lose four.

Agent Makes Farm Report

RUPERT, Dec. 24—The growing of legumes is one of the most important agriculture enterprises carried out in Minidoka county, County Agent W. O. Priest said Wednesday in his annual report.

Alfalfa was produced on 2500 acres of land, he said, but clover seed was produced on only 3000 acres. Three thousand acres were devoted to peas this year but because of scalding and late June frost he doubts if the acreage will be increased next year. There were 12,000 acres of beans in the county this year, he said.

Potato acreage was about normal this year, the county agent continued, since the average is between 7,000 and 10,000 acres. The total this year was 10,000 acres.

The yield on sugar beets was 12 tons to the acre on desert land and 1 1/2 tons on old land. Ten thousand four hundred sixty-two acres were planted, he said.

Pasture in Minidoka county is being used, he said, but clover seed is the most important crop raised, since the average is between 7,000 and 10,000 acres. The total this year was 10,000 acres.

The county has 1,000 farm units of which 823 were cooperating in the agriculture extension program, Priest said.

Gottwald Put On Own Spot After Purges

VIENNA, Austria, Dec. 23—Twenty-three years ago a quiet, dark-haired communist stood up in the Czechoslovak parliament and, starting with haired at Eduard Benes and the members of his National Socialist party, said: 'You gentlemen ask what we (the communists) are doing here. My answer is simple. We are here to break your necks. And I promise you, most solemnly, we will do it.'

The communist was Klement Gottwald, then a 33-year-old political unknown.

Today, through the promised process of breaking all necks that stood in his way, Gottwald is the undisputed master—under Soviet tolerance—of Czechoslovakia.

Broke Own Friends He broke the necks not only of Benes and the opposition party leaders but with equal ruthlessness snapped the necks of communist comrades and personal friends.

One by one he has sold out his party comrades, his personal friends, his hand-picked deputies in the interests of political expediency or to obtain a scapegoat for a party mistake.

Early this month, when a hargman's noose snapped the necks of former Czech party chairman Rudolf Slansky; Gottwald's former foreign minister and trusted friend Vladimir Clementis, and nine other high party leaders, there appeared to be few necks left to break.

Plot Granted Gottwald had asked Moscow for the power to purge and to reinforce his power. Moscow had agreed.

Now there is some reason to believe Gottwald's own neck may be in danger.

He guaranteed, in a visit to the Kremlin, to produce results if given a free hand.

NEW YORK, Dec. 24 (AP)—Herbert Hoover, the most widely known of the nation's public career men, may be entering the role of adviser to the administration.

The 69-year-old former President Hoover is a familiar name to the government with his name on the door of the White House. He was a case of a political newsmonger to the counsel of a President.

Hoover was smiling broadly when he left the home of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles yesterday afternoon. He was the guest of honor at the luncheon conference.

It was just a social gathering," Hoover said as he and Mrs. Hoover got into a car. "We had the opportunity to talk over a great deal of matters of government—present and future—to my best advantage."

Proposal for State Control of Projects Gains Solon's Praise

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24 (AP)—A proposal by which the federal government would step out of the Pacific northwest power picture in favor of an interstate agency has been described by Senator Gordon, R.-Ore., as a step toward more orderly development of the region's power resources.

Gordon told a newsmen the proposal outlined recently by Dr. Paul Haver, Bonneville power administrator, is in line with his thinking for many years.

He said that some time ago he asked that Haver work out the details of such a proposal from the operating end, but warned:

"There are many other details to be ironed out before it can be accomplished."

Under the Haver proposal, an interstate agency with power to sell revenue bonds would take over administration of the government's generating and transmission facilities. The bonds would be used to finance future construction.

Gordon said Oregon, Washington and Idaho would be the states primarily involved in such a compact, but both Montana and Wyoming have interests which would have to be protected either by their participation in the compact or by legislation.

The senator said he looked for no early action on the plan although work on the details is now being done. Many months of conferences he ahead before legislation can be drafted to authorize creation of such an agency and outline its powers.

One example of problems to be met in such a plan is the policy to be followed on reclamation projects, now financed in part from power revenues of government-financed projects.

Despite the numerous details remaining to be ironed out, Gordon said he sees in the plan a chance to provide for the orderly development of regional resources without resorting to the uncertainties of congressional appropriations. He said

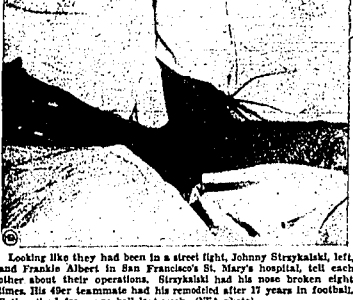
