Toll in Holiday Accidents Passes 300, May Set Mark

Last year's Christmas week-end toll of holiday accidents was 770 deaths, 12 of them in traffic.

Highways in some parts of the Midwest and northeast were icy, but clear, dry weather was reported over most of the country Thursday.

Police officers reported a record number of accidents. In Chicago, police said the 24 hours of Christmas day was among the worst in the city's traffic history. There were some 1,300 accidents. More than a dozen persons were killed, including four by hit-and-run drivers.

Traffic Chief Michael Aarim

blamed the heavy toll on drunken drivers and increased traffic because of the relatively mild weather.

The National Safety council has estimated a traffic death toll of 500 for the 100-hour period. Council President Ned H. Dearborn said if the present trend continues, however, "we are headed for an all-time high for the holiday death toll."

Challenge Sounded By Dulles on Russ Leader's Statement

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—The incoming Eisenhower administration challenged Russia's Premier Stalin today to put forth "concrete proposals" on promoting peace and promised they would be "seriously and sympathetically received."

A statement taking that position was issued by John Foster Dulles, who will be the new administration's secretary of state, after Dulles had talked with President-Elect Eisenhower by telephone.

The statement was the first reaction of the new administration to make by President-Elect Eisenhower and published Thursday.

Dulles said this statement: "I have read with interest the press reports that Premier Stalin has proposed to one question and he also said Russia was interested in ending the Korean war."

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Boys Acquitted in '51 Held as Topsy Driver

A Twin Falls youth who was acquitted of an involuntary manslaughter charge as the result of a traffic fatality in 1951 entered a plea of innocent to a drunken driving charge today in Twin Falls.

The youth, Joseph P. Butterworth, 340 Gardner street, was arrested by city police at 11:25 p. m. Wednesday on Main avenue east after his car was seen weaving on Kimberly road. Police reported Butterworth could hardly stand up.

He spent part of Christmas in the city jail before a \$300 bond was posted.

The acquittal on the manslaughter charge came in mid-October of last year. The driver of the car which struck and killed Anna Belle Nelson, 7, on the 10th of his trial his age was given as 18. The driver's license in his possession was not valid.

Butterworth was fined \$100 and sentenced to 30 days in jail. He has been free for 100 days.

Christendom's Faith Gets Reassurance During Yuletide

Christendom's faith in a bright future and in the triumph of good will was reaffirmed Thursday by Christmas messages by world leaders and in prayers of people everywhere.

In America, President Truman and his Vice President, Richard M. Nixon, President-Elect Eisenhower, like many of their fellow countrymen, spent the day with their families across the Christmas tree. The Trumans had a big tree in the east room of the White House. Mrs. Truman had a big tree in her home in the New York home. Eisenhower celebrated the day with his three small grandchildren, whose father, John Eisenhower, is an army major in Korea.

America's churches were filled, and parties and family get-togethers were held in homes and churches. The night of high-wind fatalities added a grim note.

Wm. Z. Foster, secretary of the Communist Party, said in a radio address that the "war of the people" is the only way to peace.

Across the Atlantic, British Prime Minister Elizabeth II, broadcast her first Christmas message, adding her prayers for brotherhood among the people of the scattered British Commonwealth.

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Diplomats See Stalin Action as Peace Step

MOSCOW, Dec. 26 (AP)—Premier Stalin's statement that he favors diplomatic conversations on Korea is regarded by observers here as a preliminary offer to use his good offices in arriving at a Korean settlement.

Western diplomats in Moscow suggested today that a new western approach—based on the prime minister's replica to questions by the New York Times—is now a possibility that should be considered seriously.

They said the next move probably would depend on U.S. President-Elect Eisenhower's attitude on the question—Add Stalin 6 drop 10 points.

Several factors were mentioned as indicating that the Stalin statement on Korea might raise serious considerations:

1. The fact that in Korea—now long dead—Stalin has been a result of a Soviet government declaration that it would help bring about a Korean settlement. No other official offer has been made since that one in June 1951.

2. Stalin's influence and authority are undoubtedly enormous in Communist China, France, Czechoslovakia and the Soviet Union.

3. In another instance, intervention by Stalin in the Korean situation created by the Berlin blockade—helped produce a settlement.

High on the western slope near the town of Pocatello, Idaho, reported 30 below zero—coldest place in the nation. Big Spring, in eastern Wyoming, followed closely with a minus 27 reading.

Snow fell at Pocatello and flurries were reported from Boise eastward. Yena and Coalinga, with temperatures of 8 below zero, were the coldest spots in Utah.

The Idaho highway department reported that roads in good shape generally, except for a few icy spots.

Forecasters predicted another flurry Friday night in the mountainous areas of Utah, with temperatures dropping somewhat warmer.

Steel Dispute Cut U. S. Rail Traffic Totals

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—Willie P. Taylor, president of the Association of American Railroads, reported today that last summer's steel shortage cut deeply into railroad traffic and seriously hurt each carrier's program for increasing freight car supplies.

According to preliminary estimates, freight service was 30 per cent below last year's level in 1951. The 1952 figures show that the fall in traffic for the railroad ended 1952 with an slight improvement in their financial condition to the 43 per cent increase in freight rates authorized by the Interstate Commerce Commission last month.

The income of class I roads was \$775 million dollars compared with \$745 million in 1951 and \$744 million in 1950.

Continuing the large-scale program of capital expenditures on new equipment, railroads have spent an average more than a billion dollars annually in the past several years. The industry is planning \$1,474,000,000 for investment in 1952, according to estimates furnished by the carriers to the

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
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

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23 Are Killed In Plane Fall At Iran Field

TEHRAN, Iran, Dec. 23 (AP)—An airplane always in an open field crashed for Thursday night a few miles from Tehran airport, killing 23 persons, including five Americans. Only two passengers survived the Christmas night tragedy.

The plane, an Lockheed, was en route from the Iranian city of Isfahan, 210 miles south of Tehran, circled for a landing. It bounced several hundred yards in an open field, broke apart, then burst into a small fire that burned out quickly. Investigators believe the pilot miscalculated the altitude in attempting a blind landing.

Ullman Killed

The dead Americans: Cecile Ann DeMolay, 29, point four public health field nurse stationed at Shiraz; daughter of Charles DeMolay, Ogden, Utah; Mrs. Thomas Ripoli of the U. S. military mission in Shiraz, Calif.; Teacher Killed; U. S. Blackmore, 37, Great Neck, Long Island, N. Y., high school teacher of a study of the middle east at a P. Y. foundation grant.

Mrs. Blackmore, 37, wife of the high school teacher, headed the rescue effort. Mrs. DeMolay and Ripoli went aboard at Shiraz.

Crew Killed

All the other passengers in the C-47 were Iranians. All members of the crew were killed.

The survivors were all young men, including one American named Khazale. Both received minor injuries. Two others were taken to a hospital after being rescued from a Tehran hospital.

Paper Claims Attorney Has Brink's Cash

BOSTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—The Daily Record says the FBI knows of a Boston lawyer who has been contacted by the \$1,000,000 ransom of the sensational \$1,000,000 robbery of \$1,000,000.

The FBI declined comment on the report which says the attorney's role was part of a pre-arranged plan to handle the loot in order to escape detection.

According to the Record, the lawyer was chosen as money handler for no number of the \$1,000,000 ransom. The plan called for the lawyer to take the money to safe deposit boxes, where the money could be placed by him without suspicion. The route was reported to be a bank throughout the country.

The Record story followed unconfirmed reports that the FBI has traced \$230,000 of the Brink's cash to some of the vaults above mentioned. It is reported to have been used for purchase of government bonds.

The lawyer is under constant surveillance by the FBI, and it will be brought in for questioning within the next few days.

Service Objectors Total 385 in U. S.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—Only about 385 conscientious objectors are listed in civilian jobs instead of military service since the outbreak of the Korean war, the selective service officials estimated today.

The small number reflects the fact that it was not until July that the government established a program to channel conscientious objectors into civilian jobs. Prior to then, men who objected to military service in religious grounds escaped army or navy service.

Under the program, objectors avoid military service by contributing to the national health, welfare or interest of their country or performing specified federal state or local government jobs. So far, selective service has approved 47 projects, and officials believe many more in this nation or overseas.

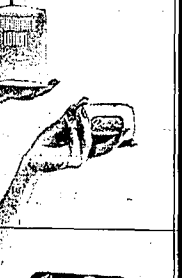

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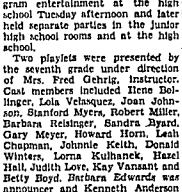

Failure to Unlock Control Gets Blame in Crash of Big Plane

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25 (AP)—Persons aboard the C-124 Globemaster which crashed and killed 27 persons in aviation's worst disaster last Saturday failed to unlock some of the controls, the air force has disclosed.

A report by a special accident investigating board said the elevator and rudder control surfaces of the wrecked cargo plane were found in a locked position.

These mechanisms must be unlocked to permit a plane to take off and fly normally. The board said the throttle was unlocked, thus permitting application of the power that lifted the plane briefly into the air.

There was no attachment of blame in the board's report. However, an air force spokesman said it is the pilot's responsibility to check all control surfaces before takeoff.

This kind of accident has happened before on other types of airplanes with fatal results—several instances were reported in combat areas during wartime—and the cause of such accidents has been attributed to pilot error.

The plane crashed on takeoff from Larson air force base, Moses Lake, Wash. The toll of dead is the greatest of any aviation accident.

The air force explained that the C-124 has one mechanical control handle which locks four separate controls—the throttle, elevators, ailerons and rudder—when the plane is parked on the ground.

To unlock all of these controls, the control handle must be moved through its complete arc.

Indications are that in this case the control handle was moved partly but not completely through its full travel before the takeoff, the air force said.

As a result, the throttle was unlocked, permitting power to be applied, while surface control locks remained in a locked position.

The air force added that on the board's recommendation, all commands operating C-124 type aircraft have been reminded strongly of the need for strict compliance with regulations that control surfaces be

moved and checked visually before takeoff.

In releasing the report, Gen. Hoyt B. Vandenberg, air force chief of staff, said the air force has cut its accident rate progressively through the years. Last year had the lowest accident rate in the history, he said, adding that the air force intends to "devote every resource to a further reduction."

"The air force deeply regrets this accident and the sorrow caused the families of so many servicemen," Vandenberg said.
