

Six Arrested For Drunken Auto Driving

(From Page One) Charge of drunken driving and other drivers, unable to pay heavy fines for drunken driving, are lodged in the Gooding county jail.

Wick Larrabee was arrested from custody Saturday when he paid the \$20 fine and \$3 cost imposed earlier Saturday by Justice of the Peace Justice Lees.

Jailed in lieu of payments of their fines earlier in the week were Johnny Casias, Robert, and William B. Murray, 34, Gooding. All three pleaded guilty before Justice Lees.

Larrabee was arrested Friday night after his automobile careened into a borrow pit and broke down a telephone pole on highway 28 east of Gooding. The arrest was made by State Patrolman Stanley Pace.

Murray was arrested by Patrolman Pace at the same location on highway 28 on Tuesday night. Arraigned Wednesday, he pleaded guilty to a \$20 fine and \$3 cost and sentenced to 30 days in jail. He had been able to pay the fine, sentence would have been suspended.

Casias was arrested when he became involved in a minor traffic accident at the corner of Idaho street last Sunday night. The arrest was made by City Patrolman R. C. Wiley. He also was fined \$20 and \$3 cost by Justice Lees and sentenced to 30 days in jail. The sentence was suspended upon payment of the fine.

Murray and Casias face jail terms of 100 days each unless they are paid and they will remain in custody for each \$20 of their fines. The driver's license of each was suspended for 30 days by Justice Lees.

The driver's license of Raymond Leon Depp, 18, Twin Falls, was suspended upon his plea in a hearing in Twin Falls county probate court Saturday morning. He was charged by city officers with drunk driving and speeding on Dec. 11. Police said the boy was driving 30 to 40 miles per hour in a reckless manner in a 20-mile per hour zone on Kimberly road.

Raymond R. Sutton, 31, Burley, was arraigned in Burley police court Friday on a stop sign violation and a paid fine of \$10. Judge Henry W. Tucker.

Drug Laughs Last in Fight On TB Germ

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 27 (AP)—Tuberculosis germs start to laugh at a new drug, but they find the joke is on them, a scientist reported today.

The bugs become resistant to the drug, so it no longer can kill them. But the germs lose their ability to cause TB infection. They are disarmed in changing to meet the threat from the drug.

This strange quirk in action of the germ was described to the American Association for the Advancement of Science by Dr. E. Grunberg of Hoffman-La Roche, Inc., Nutley, N. J.

This is what happens, at least in test-tubes. Germs that become resistant to the drug don't cause TB infection in human beings. It is a hopeful sign in treatment of this stubborn disease.

Yugoslavia OK's Vatican Tie Cut

BELOGRADE, Yugoslavia, Dec. 27 (AP)—With Marshal Tito looking on, the Yugoslav parliament today unanimously approved a vote on the government's decision to break diplomatic relations with the Vatican.

Before the vote, Peter Stambolic, president of Serbia, had to shun the central committee government, denounced the recent designation of Archbishop Alojzije Stepinac of Zagreb as a cardinal. He said Pope Pius XII's appointment of the Yugoslav archbishop was a propaganda move designed to assert the purposes of "Italian imperialism."

With the ball on the five-yard line, he handed off to halfback Bill Marchbrooks of Detroit and he was around the West right and behind great blocking to score. Bob Haner, Illinois, made his conversion perfect for the day—three for three as he booted the winning point.

Both teams scored touchdowns in the first and second quarters with the East leading at halftime 14-13. The West tied the score in the third and fourth quarters.

Francis has scored 700 points in his first 15 games, on 244 field goals and 221 free throws.
