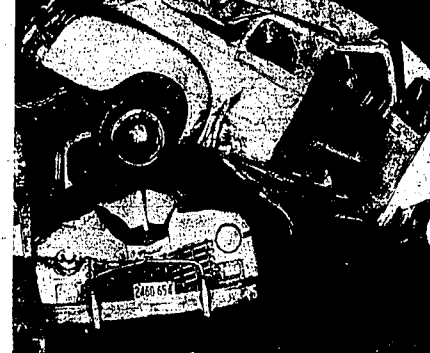

FEDERAL FIRING COSTLY

President-Eisenhower has already taken steps to cut the red tape involved in firing federal employees. He has said many times that he does not plan the mass sackings of present government workers to make room for Republicans.

It is believed that some of the committee's recommendations will be able to be put into effect by presidential order as soon as it is known that the "T-1" will not, but not eliminate the trouble.

According to present U. S. civil service commission officials, the law, particularly as it affects veterans, will have to be changed to make a basic improvement in the firing process.

And that's where Ike is likely to get into trouble with the big veterans' organizations with his plan. They are sure to fight any recommendations for reducing veterans' preference for federal employment.

It is the opinion of most of the experts, including spokesmen for the veterans' organizations, that the law is changed in such a way as to improve the situation and at the same time keep intact the basic idea of veterans' preference in federal service.

This is the goal of Ike's special committee.

When Taft sharply attacked Ike's choice of Martin Durkin to be secretary of labor, many senators began shying away from the Ohioan for fear support of him would look like criticism of their own President. But Taft has since calmed down his fire and indicated he wants no break with Eisenhower.

So the trend toward Taft has taken on weight. Carlson's move could be the key step. It may mean that he recognizes, as do most senators, that Taft has high qualifications as a leader and a legislator and that the House legislative program could be extremely vital to its ultimate success.

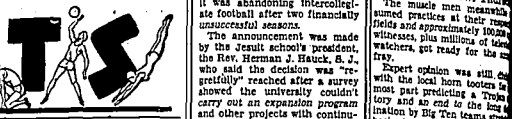

Education Cost Woes, Teacher Aid Pose Legislature Problems

BOISE, Dec. 30 (AP)—Public school education is financial woe for legislators as they face the 1954 session of the Idaho legislature since the 1948 special session.

But many of the controversies which stirred past sessions seem to have been ironed out by interim committees and advisory groups in the past years. Education will come in for plenty of consideration by the 1954 session, but the knowledge that past years is not likely. Platforms of both parties endorsed increased appropriations for the minimum education program, and the interim committees report favoring retention of the teacher retirement program on a funded reserve basis and appropriating enough to pay the state's obligations for past years is expected to disperse much of the opposition to that program. Both party platforms demand adequate appropriations for teachers' retirement.

The lawmakers answering an Associated Press questionnaire indicated they favor higher appropriations for state school aid.

The interim committee, headed by Sen. W. H. Deweller, R. Jerome, considered one of the 1951 session's major bills, the teacher retirement program, recommended an appropriation of \$2,000,000 to bring the fund current through the next biennium. Also recommended were five minor amendments.
