Plane With 37 GIs Aboard Is Missing Over Idaho Range

LAKE CITY, Jan. 7 (AP)—A transport plane believed carrying 41 persons—including Korean war veterans—was reported missing today over a rugged mountain area in Idaho.

The two-engine C-46 was part of a fleet of planes chartered to speed the returning veterans to their homes. They were flying from Seattle to Boise.

The plane was reported missing at 7:30 a. m. on Jan. 7. It was believed to be carrying 37 GIs and four crew members.

The plane was last seen flying over the Snake River range near Lake City. The terrain is rugged, with few roads and no telephone lines.

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Truman's Final Message To Soviets Warns Russia U.S. Has Hydrogen Bomb

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (AP)—President Truman solemnly warned Russian Premier Josef Stalin today that the United States has developed a hydrogen superbomb that would mean "run for your regime and your homeland" in case of World War III.

The farewell state-of-the-union message to congress—Truman said the recent H-bomb tests at Eniwetok ushered in a "new era of destructive power" and man is now "capable of creating explosions of a new order of magnitude, dwarfing the mushroom clouds of Hiroshima and Nagasaki."

"There is something I would say to Stalin," Truman said. "You claim belief in Lenin's prophecy that one stage in the development of communist society would be war between your world and ours... But... war has changed its shape and its dimension. It cannot now be a stage in the development of anything save ruin for your regime and your homeland."

IKE'S STRENGTH

Except to the experts, there's usually nothing more deadly than yesterday's election. The official results of the Nov. 4 presidential vote are, however, a little livelier reading.

They bring out better than did the incomplete, unofficial returns the astonishing nature of General Eisenhower's victory over Governor Stevenson.

For one thing, they demonstrate dramatically the proportions of the general's impact upon the normally Democratic south. Of course, won Florida, Texas, Tennessee and Virginia, and also captured the border states of Maryland, Missouri, and Oklahoma. He missed taking Kentucky by 700 votes and lost South Carolina by just 15,000.

But the total vote in 16 southern and border states is perhaps the best proof of what happened—Stevenson polled 7,129,000 votes in these 16, but Eisenhower won only 184,000 behind with 6,995,000.

POLITICIAN'S NOSE—It frequently happens that, after endorsing a man of Stevenson's stature out of political expediency, the politician is only sorry to see him go. So, in some generalities, it happened to such great figures as Borah, Norris, Hiram Johnson, La Guardia and Alfred E. Smith.

It is not hard to see why, in fact, he might have become the victim of political and public yearning for a return to what Harding called "normalcy."

The local reaction to Stevenson suggests that the Eisenhower sweep, in a sense, was evidence of a nationwide desire for practical, bread-and-butter management of the nation's affairs—rather than a more raffish rule at Washington.

"There's nothing serious between me and him," she said. "I have never loved anyone else."

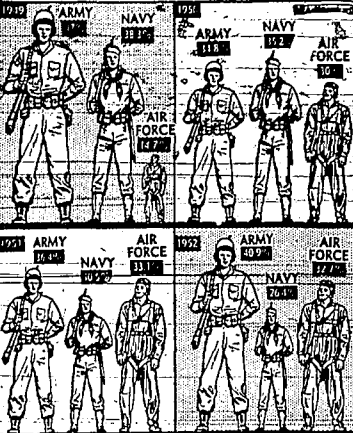
Rogstad came here for a divorce hearing from her home in the Twin Falls area. She is training for this winter's tryouts for competition in next year's international ski championships.

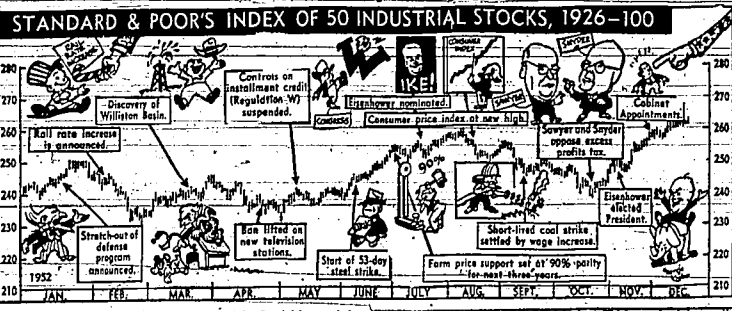

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Toll Termed Part of U. S. Safety Price

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (AP)—Top air force officials told congress Tuesday the recent series of military plane disasters, with its toll of 280 lives, is part of the price of the nation's safety.

The defense leaders, including Air Force Secretary Finletter and Gen Hoyt B. Vandenberg, air force chief of staff, also declared that:

1. Accidents have been going on for many years, and have led to establishment of an office of safety to "really analyze accidents and do something about them."

2. The safety effort, in bearing fruit—the 1952 accident rate is the lowest in air force history—and lessons are learned from each accident.

3. No evidence of sabotage has been found in any of the military air disasters of last November and December.

4. The air force does not accept inferior aircraft or equipment, nor has it been forced by the pressure of the Korean war or the North Atlantic treaty or anything else to use inferior aircraft or poorly trained crews for transport duty.

5. No "accident pattern" or fact common to all the crashes has been found, although most of them have been associated with bad weather.

C. of C. Takes No Action on Hiring Project Lobbyist

BOISE, Jan. 7.—No action was taken by the Upper Chamber of Commerce Monday on hiring a lobbyist in Washington for the North Side project. Last month E. W. Riege, a Washington lobbyist, was hired to confer with chamber officials on the possibility of representation of the chamber in Washington.

Chamber officials reported Monday they have received letters from Sen. Henry W. Dworshak and Rep. Hamer Budge to the effect that appropriations for the North Side project will meet with no difficulty report the chamber decided to table a decision on hiring a lobbyist for the project.

James A. Laidlaw, area sheepman, spoke on the plan of the army air month of Rupert as a bombing range, and the chamber passed a resolution opposing such use of the desert during the grazing season.

A protest also was entered by the chamber to the U. S. department of agriculture on the poor grade of potatoes now on sale in Idaho markets.

Dressed Me Output-G

BOISE, Jan. 7 (AP)—Dress production in Idaho during the first half of 1952 was slightly above last year's output. The USDA study reported for Idaho added that production of apparel was up 12 per cent over 1951. The total for the month of October, compared to 60,000 pounds, compared to 60,000 pounds in October and 400,000 pounds in November of the previous year. The biggest increase was in men's shirts, which were up 15 per cent over the year. Dog slaughter was up 10 per cent over 1951. Cattle was up 13 per cent over 1951, and sheep production nearly one-fifth.
