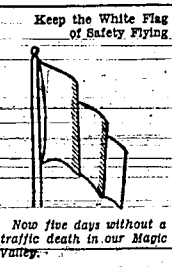

Budget Calls For Trim on Farmer Help

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—President Truman told congress today that the new-republican administration should be able to cut farm program spending by 116 million dollars in the fiscal year ending next July.

He submitted a fiscal 1954 farm budget of \$1,200,000,000 that compares with an estimated total of \$1,316,000,000 in the current fiscal year. Actual cost in the previous fiscal year was \$1,249,000,000.

No Further Drop
Truman's budget "assumed" no further drop in farm prices would occur in the next 18 months and the republican administration, as a result, would be able to hold spending on farm price supports and wheat export subsidies to 72 million dollars. That would be 27 million below the estimated present level.

Farm prices—now 12 per cent below the level a year ago—have slumped sharply in recent months. This has required heavy price support outlays and caused concern among farm advisers of President Eisenhower. Truman did not mention the price decline in his budget message. Nor did he recommend any new legislation.

Assumes Pact Okay
The closest bet came to recommending legislation was in saying his budget "assumes" the world wheat pact will be continued at least through the next 18 months. That program, now costing about \$70 million dollars a year in export subsidies, expires June 30. There is strong opposition in congress to the selling of consignment of the soil conservation subsidy program at the present level of 250 million dollars. That will face strong opposition. The American Farm Bureau Federation and the National Grange have fought to curtail these subsidies as unnecessary.

Grange Director, Officers Selected

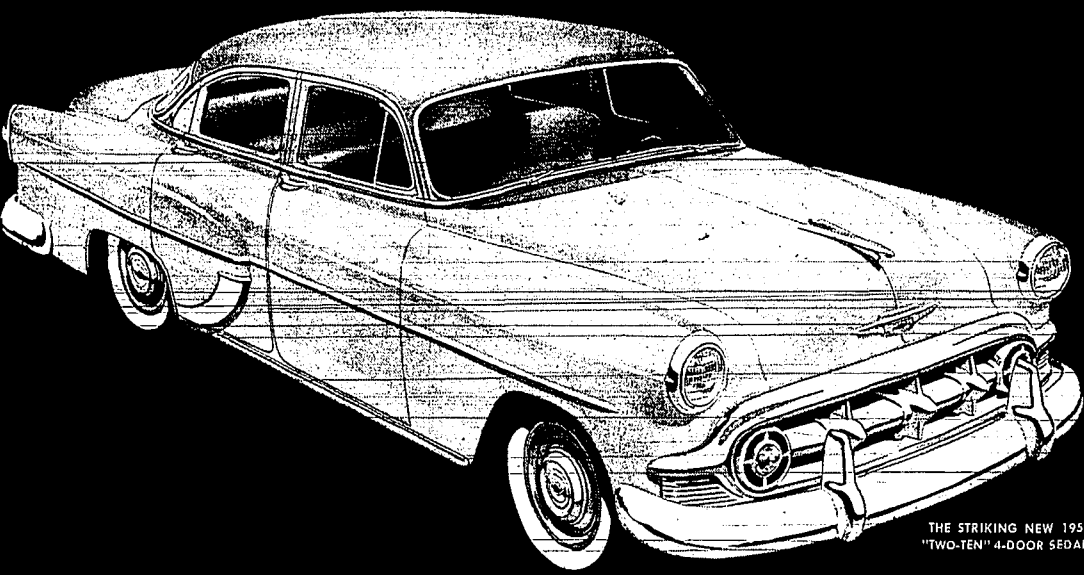
