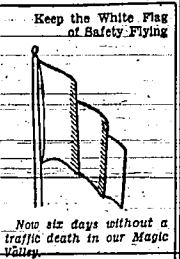

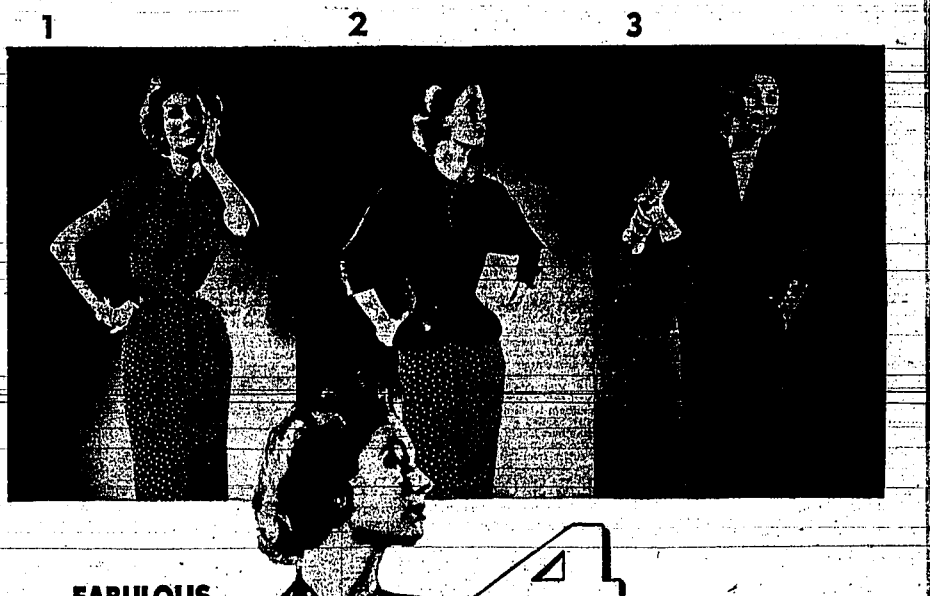

Burley Panel Okays Street Improvement

BURLEY, Jan. 16—At a protest meeting of the city council this week only one protest was received against the creation of a proposed local improvement district. A resolution declaring the intention of the city to create the district was adopted by the council.

An ordinance creating the district, which embraces the Southgate and Homestead additions and a portion of the Sunset addition, was read and approved by the council.

Work to be done in the new district consists of grading, regrading, resurfacing and curbing certain streets and avenues, construction, reconstruction and renewal of culverts located at street and avenue intersections; construction, reconstruction and renewal of curbs and gutters except where curbs and gutters are properly existing in a satisfactory condition and the construction of certain storm sewers necessary for the drainage of tiled areas within the proposed district.

The estimated cost of the proposed improvements is \$262,250, of which the city will pay one-third from the general fund. The remainder of the cost will be assessed against the property owners in the district.

Cost to each property owner is estimated at \$295 for a 50-foot frontage inside lot without existing curb and gutter and with one private driveway, and \$600 for a 50-foot frontage corner lot without existing curb and gutter, on both, the costs will be lower as adjustments for them will be made.

The same method of payment will be used as in creating certain city-owned areas. A choice of paying the assessments in full or spreading them over a 10-year period. If the latter is used, an interest charge will be added.

In other matters, City Attorney William H. Foster was instructed to notify the Carl E. Nelson, Construction company, Logan, Utah, that the city is not obliged to comply with the company's request for additional payments for street work.

The firm has requested \$6,638 in addition to the contract price for additional costs in connection with the local improvement district that was completed last summer.

The council adopted a resolution restricting trucks more than 240 inches in length from parking on Main street between Third and Eba avenues.

Two officials from the Minutoka dam, E. L. Loring, power superintendent and Clarence Bagnall, assistant power superintendent, explained the bureau of reclamation's power facilities in this area. They explained that while present facilities are sufficient to serve Burley now there is the possibility within the next few years the facilities will inadequately serve the city in view of the possible expansion anticipated from increasing development of the North Side Extension project.

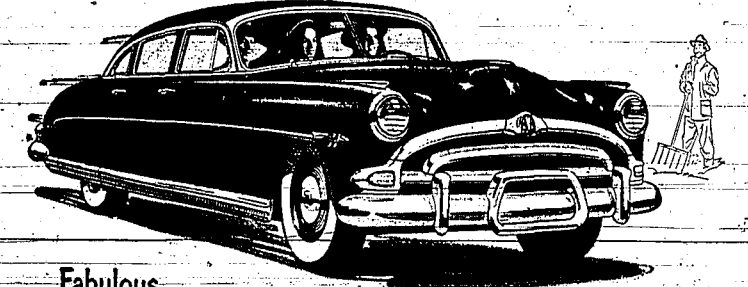

AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

By EDWIN E. CRIST (Pastor, Church of the Brethren)
What is your philosophy of life? Have you ever brought it out into the open and examined it? Perhaps you will not admit to having any such thing, but everyone has. And it is an important thing to you, for upon it much of your thinking and acting is based.



If a man continually searches for a meaning to life and the universe. He seeks to understand human experience, and to fit them into a pattern which gives to life a meaning. He adopts certain basic assumptions, which all philosophy must begin, and from this assumption builds his philosophy, relating to it all his personal experiences. This he chooses his own philosophic system.

In the history of philosophy there have been many systems, two of these being theism and naturalism. The modern

world is predominantly naturalistic, rather than theistic. We look to nature as our basic assumption, as that which we feel gives to our experience the most adequate explanation and to life the most meaning. The theist would assume God to be the source of life and its meaning.

One reason for our naturalistic philosophy is the astonishing success of modern science. Another is the widespread teaching of evolution in our educational institutions. A third is the relatively modern revolt against authority—an authority claimed by the organized church during the Dark Ages and later challenged, resulting in the reformation. The distrust of authority has grown through the centuries, making the traditional authoritative approach of Christian preaching (accepting the Bible as complete authority), an idea almost wholly foreign to the modern world.

The college generation today has a terrific store of knowledge for his age—therefore he is in revolt against what he had accepted before as an authority. At the age of a child believes his father is intelligent, but at 10 that child realizes he has already forgotten more than his father ever knew.

Naturalists claim to be scientific in their attitude toward life. The honest scientific attitude is to hold your position tentatively, and always be willing to change if proved wrong, with the advent of new truth. Naturalists confuse this idea with neutrality, which is entirely different.

They say one should not dommit himself to religion, because one cannot be positive it is the truth. Such an attitude toward religion is not tentative nor open-minded nor scientific, but "willy-waavy." According to such a stand one may never be committed to anything because one can't prove any belief philosophically to be 100 per cent true. Humanity is not infallible either.

In spite of this outward revolt against authority, however, the insecurity of our day dares all men to seek for integration—and security philosophically. The son of God, as our mentor instead of God for the satisfaction of this need. The world is being overrun by blind followers of the blind. This is a great day for every Christian believer to stand forth and be counted—to give a reason for the hope which lies within him.

We believe our Christian philosophy of life, based on a trust in Jesus Christ, the Son of God, as our personal Savior, is superior to any other philosophy because it leaves the least problems of life unexplained; it is the most coherent. The world is hungering for the security Christ gives to His believers. Let us introduce others into the joy of His relationship.

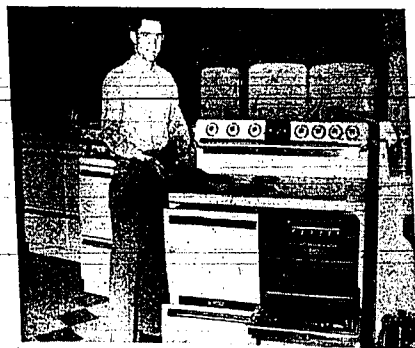
