The group opposed free hunting and game tags for persons over 70. The commission began considering fishing season recommendations of James Simpson, fish culturist.

Body succeeds Oliver W. McConnell, Grangeville, as commission chairman. R. C. Cole, Boise, was re-elected secretary.

The commission gave its approval to several proposed bills which will be submitted to the 1933 legislature. They would permit use of materials other than metal for big game tags, change the law closing 300 feet before any dam to fishing, abolish all licenses and abolish the Salmon river, Big Lost river, and St. Maries game preserves and the Council Ordways bird refuge.
