

# Teachers Given Teacher Training Facts; Results Called Stand-Off

Jan. 15 (P)—Idaho law which requires that all teachers receive a year's training in the state college or university before they can be employed in the state was a stand-off between the proponents and opponents of the measure.

Sen. W. J. Costley, D., Lewis, remarked that Idaho has a normal teacher turnover of about 800 a year and asked if the university could do it if he had to? "Buchanan answered that he had."

Cotley also asked if Idaho could not obtain an "easier solution" to the teacher shortage by reopening NICIE and SICE. The university president said it couldn't be answered "yes" or "no" and Sen. William C. Moore, R., Latah, president pro tem, protested the question was "out of line." Deal agreed.

The university president, reflecting on the training done at SICE and NICIE he believed a "university-trained" teacher is "broadly trained."

# Ban on U. S. Grants Asked in Legislature

BOISE, Jan. 15 (P)—The Idaho legislature was asked today to take a firm stand against federal grants and call on congress to reduce taxes.

Sen. Ray Davis, R., Bannock, introduced a resolution declaring "the state of Idaho will not ask the federal government for any grant whatsoever except in the case where the federal government itself through one of its agencies, creates a situation that throws a special burden upon the community or service within the state."

Both Republicans and Democrats asked for more time to study it, and the resolution was sent to committee.

The resolution declares the federal government retains complete jurisdiction of the federal income tax for administrative purposes, and the state could not be liable for any part of it.

# Last Report by Brannan Stresses Need of Export

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (P)—Secretary Brannan, in his final report as head of the agriculture department, said today farmers face restrictions on production unless they can keep big foreign markets built up by World War II.

"American agriculture," he said, "is tooled up to export at the highest rate in our history."

After expanding its record production during and after World War II, exports of many farm products are dropping.

Foreign trade restrictions, a shortage of dollars abroad, and a reduction in U.S. economic aid to foreign countries contributed to this decline.

Brannan said American production of tobacco, wheat, cotton, dried and fresh fruits can be maintained at present levels only if exports ranging from 25 to 80 per cent of total production of these commodities can be removed.

"The alternative to maintaining the present level of exports," he said, "would appear to be the reduction of production alignments and general cutback all along the line with all of the inevitable and unpleasant consequences such as the loss of the American economy as a whole."

Brannan said many foreign countries, historically among America's most important markets for farm products, have built up an "increasingly complex web of controls on imports and exports."

These actions, he said, are making it difficult to find markets for surplus farm products.

He said, "severely these programs have 'graft' weaknesses in that they provide no satisfactory method for supporting producer prices of nonstorable and perishable commodities, such as meat, dairy and poultry products, fruits and vegetables."

Present supports are largely limited to such products as grain, cotton, tobacco and peanuts.

A satisfactory method, Brannan said, would be one which would "make production available to consumers at prevailing market prices, would benefit producers by working more directly for their interest, and would benefit the nation by permitting full consumption of year's production."

Brannan did not mention it, but this definition fitted a proposal he advanced in 1949. It was rejected by congress.

The incoming Eisenhower administration is committed to development of price support programs for farm products.

# Eisenhower Plans Detailed Message On State of Union

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (AP)—President-Elect Eisenhower disclosed today through his staff that he plans to deliver a lengthy, detailed state-of-the-union message in person to the new Republican congress shortly after he takes office.

Actual date of Eisenhower's first formal appearance before the new congress will be established after the President-elect reaches Washington and consults GOP house and senate leaders.

Meanwhile, Eisenhower headquarters in the White House hotel have made these other announcements:

1. The President-elect will leave New York for Washington by train Sunday afternoon. Press Secretary James O. Hagerity could not confirm this, but Eisenhower was expected to be in the country for his inauguration with leaders of his administration.

2. Acting on recommendation of Herbert Brownell Jr., attorney general, Eisenhower today announced the appointment of H. Brian Holland, Boston, Mass., as assistant attorney general in the justice department. This was the post held by T. Lamar Clayton, who was involved in the controversial contract negotiation. Charles E. Lyons Jr. was named the tax adviser.

3. Hagerity said he thought the inaugural address would be relatively brief and the state-of-the-union message would contain considerable details on what his economic administration would like to have in legislation.

Rep. Samuel W. McCconnell, R., Ohio, said today that the President-elect's revisions of the Taft-Hartley labor act will be one of the major legislative proposals after the inauguration.

# Key GOPers Disagreed on Control Need

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—Two top Republican leaders today agreed on whether to give the incoming Eisenhower administration standing power to control prices and wages.

Sen. Charles McNary, R., Ohio, of the senate banking committee, said the favored enactment "of standing authority to operate for the duration of the Korean war."

But Chairman Wolcott, R., Mich., of the house banking committee, in a separate interview, said such powers are not needed and "would swing like a sword over the head of business."

This conflict developed in the wake of President Truman's final major message to congress, a 28-page annual economic report from the Federal Reserve Board, the main annual report of economic advisers.

Republican congressmen generally trust able most of Truman's program, but they are divided on whether to give the nation to a stable property "control."

Launched by Demos

But Democrats who specialize in economic affairs praised the report and said GOP economic policies, if enacted, would be a disaster for the nation, would pitch the country into an economic tailspin.

Sen. Milton E. Eisenhower, R., N. D., in a report said they look for the repeal of agricultural commodity laws. "All recent depressions have been preceded by low farm income," he said.

# Idaho Police Report Made

BOISE, Jan. 15 (P)—Idaho state police made 5,975 arrests last year which resulted in collection of \$122,075 in fines, Dept. A. P. Bureau report today.

His annual report showed 294 arrests which brought convictions for drunken driving and \$37,939 in fines. 227 were arrested for 216 convictions and \$53,630 in drunken driving fines in 1951.

### Inaugural Program Contains 23 Pictures of New President

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—The inaugural program came out Wednesday, and to no one's surprise it has 23 pictures of a man named Eisenhower. A man named Truman gets his picture in this elaborate Republican booklet, too. But he's merely included without comment in the picture of the past Presidents. The 48-page program, handsomely printed on slick paper, retails for \$1 including tax. It shows Eisenhower in cap and gown as president of Columbia university, Eisenhower at the time, Eisenhower carrying fish, presumably newly caught by Eisenhower, Eisenhower as a boy, Eisenhower with the other member of the victorious team, Richard Nixon. One appealing picture was taken on the day Mamie Geneva Doud married Dwight D. Eisenhower. The young Mrs. E. wore her hair piled on top of her head then. No bangs. It's interesting to compare the program with the one the Democrats produced four years ago. Four years ago the Democrats used two pages to honor Andrew Jackson, followed by 47 Democrats and especially by Truman. Three Presidents get double-page, flag draped treatment from the Republicans: Washington, Lincoln and Hoover. Four years ago Hoover was displaced pictorially with a crowd shot of his taking the oath, with the camera so far away it was hard to make out who was Hoover. A couple of informal family pictures are included in the new program. One shows the beaming Nixons with their beaming children; the other shows Grandmother and Grandpa Eisenhower with their daughter-in-law and three children. There's an early photo of Eisenhower in Korea. The Nixon sketch contains a bit of history that may be new to you. At 40, Nixon will become the second youngest vice president in history. Only John C. Breckinridge, elected on the Buchanan ticket in 1860, was younger. Breckinridge was only 38.

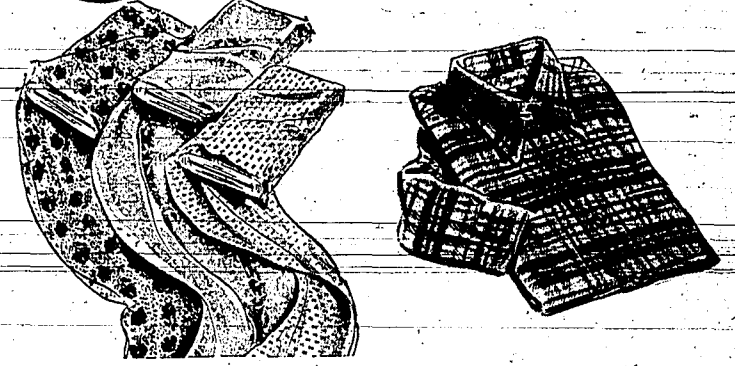

### Court Ruling Is Delayed on Theft Charge

Judges of the Peace J. O. Pumphrey Wednesday afternoon took today's argument on a motion of whether Daphne (Billy) Duffy and James Taylor should be bound over to the district court for a preliminary degree burglary charge. Bonds were reduced by the court to \$500 each for the two defendants. Duffy, a 28-year-old woman, was charged with stealing the extra \$500 of the \$1,000 bond posted for Duffy over to the court to release the 18-year-old boy from jail.

Car at Gas Pump  
Duffy testified that he found the two defendants and Patrick in the yard when he returned from the gas pump. He said the youths' car was backed up to the gas pump with the headlights on. Patrick identified a package he found under the car when he returned later. Duffy said he saw the package and identified it as a car. Quinn objected to the evidence. Quinn said Duffy's possession at all times. The officer admitted there would have been time for the car to be placed under the car before he and the sheriff returned the second time.

No Lights on  
Under cross-examination, Patrick said there was no one around the car from the time Duffy left until he returned with Carlton. He admitted Mabel Parker, Ruppert, was in the house when he returned. He said she came there with him about 10:30 p.m. and left before Duffy returned. Duffy testified the kitchen light off when the defendants' car approached, and admitted hearing knocks at the front and back doors.

House Not Entered  
During the long cross-examination, Patrick admitted he did not enter the house and he was not sure Taylor took anything. He admitted whether he realized that he thought he saw a third person in the yard that night.

Patrick said that the third person could have been the one on the porch. He admitted his recognition of Taylor was based only on size.

### 4 Ships Collide in N. Y. Harbor Fog

NEW YORK, Jan. 13 (AP)—A Staten Island ferry with 1,000 passengers crashed into a tugboat near the Statue of Liberty today in one of the collisions in fog-shrouded New York harbor.

Six persons were injured and many shaken up aboard the city-owned ferry, the Gold Star Mother. Passengers rushed for life preservers, but the ferry was not damaged.

The 4,000-ton freighter, American Victory, and reached her Manhattan berth.

In the other accident, in lower New York harbor, the 477-ton United States Line freighter, American Leader, and the 1,131-ton Waterman Steamship Line freighter, Chickawau, collided in the narrow waterway. The American Leader apparently was damaged badly.

None of the vessels sank.

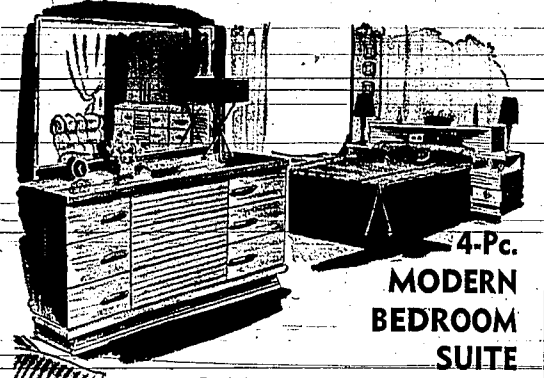

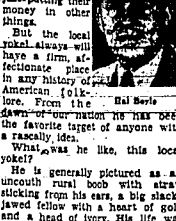

**Hayseed 'Local Yoke' Hasn't Gone, Just Moved Into Cities**

 NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—It is setting harder every year to sell the Brooklyn bridge.  
 One explanation for this along Broadway is that the country is turning short of local yokels, who always have been willing to buy the Brooklyn bridge.  
 Another theory is that they are putting their money in other things.  
 But the local yokel always will have a firm, affectionate place in any history of the American folk.  
 The old yokel was the favorite target of anyone with a raspy, loud voice.  
 He is generally pictured as an uncouth rural boob with straw sticking from his ears, a big black-furred hat and a heart of gold and a head of ivory. His life was covered by an unassuming determination to prove that a fool and his money are soon parted.  
 His most striking characteristic was a scintillating curiosity that sometimes made those who robbed him feel a kind of liking for him. He had a blind faith he could do anything, and a perfect



belief that anything a stranger told him was true, particularly if the stranger wore an imitation diamond stickpin and a gold-and-ruby ring.  
 The local yokel was always sure he could beat the shell game or the feed yokles wheel. He spent his week's wages knocking wooden bottles off a platform at a carnival, and was home happy with his prize—a two-bit chalk coin.  
 Whenever the medicine show came to town, he went in line to fork over a buck for two bottles—one of them a bottle of "guaranteed to cure everything" from 100¢ to a broken heart.  
 Others might discover the remedy was nothing but a bad-tasting mixture of creosote and water. Not the local yokel. The next time the medicine show came along he bought four bottles. He knew what was good for him.  
 Every time the local yokel went to town he got stuck. Whenever a crowd gathered around a pitchman on the pavement, the local yokel joined it. He went for the fast part like a bee to a ripe clover.  
 "And now, gentle, step right up," said the pitchman. Who stepped forward was the local yokel.  
 Whatever the pitchman was selling, the local yokel bought it. He went for the fast part like a bee to a ripe clover.  
 And he stepped back, broke but happy. The only thing that really angered him was to see a fool or a machine that makes it bills—and

### National PTA Leader Urges Study of Reds

CHICAGO, Jan. 11.—"Fear and loathing and coercion" are the elements of communism most abhorred by those who cherish the National PTA, said Mrs. Newton P. Leonard, Providence, R. I., president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, declared in a message to more than seven million PTA leaders and members today.

In the current issue of National Parent-Teacher, the PTA magazine, she urged a New Year's reevaluation of communism, "the better to cut to a three-core," and called upon the members of her organization to examine the "delectable" design "carefully, painstakingly, so that we may recognize it before it appears."

Fighting communism, Mrs. Leonard made clear, is far more than unmaking and expelling communists from all places of influence; important, as that is. Certainly that must be done and "saboteurs" must be found and dealt with by those who are responsible for our internal security.

"Nor should we forget," she continued, "that the inestimable principle of our children must be led to understand the fallacies and methods and ruthlessness of the communists, so that they may fully appreciate the supreme worth of our system of government and the values which it represents."

Yet fighting communism is even more than that. Mrs. Leonard insisted. She said we must "get behind the scenes of the communists' activities" in order to identify those "quiescent" that make communism so successful. She urged that we "set a pattern for government, as a pattern for a way of life."

Communist doctrine "leads into government," Mrs. Leonard said, "waves of fear, and violence and the threat of violence keep them enmeshed. Conformity is the rule. The voices of opposition are silenced one by one until through the silence only a single voice is heard—the voice of the dictator."

"Protest and dissent and criticism are tantamount to treason. Dissent is a crime—only if a man merely thinks dissent, without acting on it. Offenders are ferreted out by informers and their secret police neighbors inform on neighbors, and treason is not for criminals only."

"Under the doctrine of communism," she said, "the individual is subordinate to the state supreme. Books, movies, magazines and newspapers are examined for deviations from the party line, and whatever is suspect is banned and burned. Schools, instead of being places where the truth is sought and taught, are arenas where patterns of conduct and slogans and formulas favorable to those in power are instilled into the minds of the young. And in the home, too, Mrs. Leonard added, "the state supersedes God, mother, father."

"Here it is, then. This is the design that is so detestable. This is
