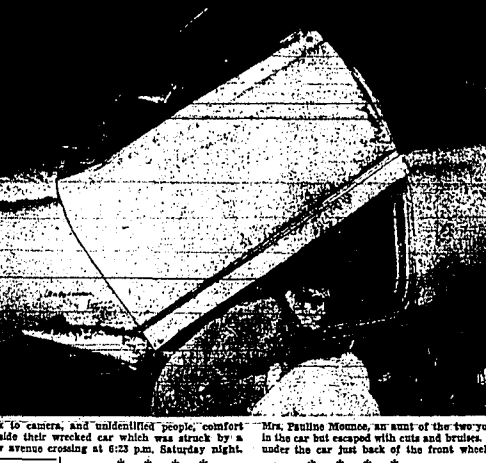

WHOLESALE OF FIRE

One of the weird facts of 1952 was the slight public excitement which attended the late fall announcement that the United States had exploded an H-bomb at Eniwetok in the Pacific.

In its final state-of-the-union message, President Truman took steps to rive greater attention upon this horrifying new phenomenon. This was wholly fitting, since the government's unnecessarily vague presentation of the Eniwetok story had much to do with the lack of public concern.

In the interval since the original announcement, some reporters have come forth with a degradation that the Eniwetok explosion was a resounding success. They contend that a bomb of colossal destructive force was touched off.

Mr. Truman appeared to confirm, rather than to challenge, this information when he offered dire warnings to Premier Stalin of the future nature of any future general war. Knowing what we know of what happened at Eniwetok, we understand these words of the President to be more than idle phrases:

"The war of the future would be one in which man could extinguish millions of lives at one blow, demolish the great cities of the past and destroy the very structure of a civilization that has been slowly and painfully built up through hundreds of generations.

"Such a war is not possible for rational men."

Mr. Truman said he did not know how long it would take Stalin and his associates in the Kremlin to understand what the H-bomb and the late A-bomb would do to his own and to Russia's great cities. It is entirely possible the Kremlin may already grasp the full import.

For, whatever disposition the Russian Communists may have shown to commit aggression, to impose their rule on millions of free men, they have shown very little liking for national self-defense.

And with their own highly developed seismographs and other technical equipment, they do not need to take President Truman's word that we are now in the hydrogen age. They have their independent check on what occurred at Eniwetok.

Beyond any doubt the Russians are racing to fashion an H-bomb to match our. Eventually they will surely succeed. Scientists say there is no technical mystery about the bomb once you have built an A-bomb, as the Russians have.

Nevertheless, developing an H-bomb will not relieve the reds of the threat posed by the American version. It merely gives Moscow the means to retaliate in kind.

Incidentally, in these first months of life with this dread device tucked away in our arsenal, we cannot see clearly the whole meaning.

The H-bomb, promising holocausts of fire and blast and tumbling stone, could be the weapon that will end the great wars. Men undertake war only when they believe they can prosecute it at less than ruinous cost to themselves. President Truman has said that world that such a war may never again be possible.

If that is true, the only question, then, is whether all men across the globe may be brought to realize it in time.

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TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—"I have been told," writes F. M. Brooks, Pa., "that the public debt and its total debt, and that the latter sum is much larger than the amount of U-S obligations listed by the treasury."

Answer: Although the public debt, in the sense of broad-and-bitter concern to all of us, since it represents a liability of six billion dollars, few subjects have been more misunderstood.

The public debt, which is virtually a national mortgage, is a direct charge on all of us. Due to the depression, new deal-fair deal spending has amounted to \$70 billion. It will cost to spend another 70 billion dollars more than he collected in taxes during the last 20 years. He has to tax the individual taxpayers whose incomes does not equal their expenditures.

He obtained that excess 70 billion by selling bonds to the public. These securities are not paid off or renewed at stated times. The present statutory limit on the amount of this kind of debt that he incurred is \$100 billion. It may have to be raised in view of the almost 10 billion deficit Truman is requesting to President-Elect Eisenhower.

IN EVENT OF DEPRESSION—In addition to the interest-bearing debt, the government has assumed many other obligations during the depression. These include: public housing, defense plants and so forth.

These advances, of course, are expected to be paid off by the borrowers, and in most instances they are being liquidated in the form of monthly payments.

We should have a severe depression, and the borrowers were unable to meet their commitments. Uncle Sam would be left holding the bag. He would have a large amount of direct debt of 270 billion, as distinguished from the indirect debt of 270 billion, estimated at more than 300 billion. Thus, the total exceeds 500 billion, and for the first time, is larger than the private debt piled up by industry, business and individuals.

Should either another 1929 crash or world peace hit us, Uncle Sam, to all practical purposes, would be broke.

SOCIAL SECURITY—"I have heard," says R. B. Hard, Springfield, Mass., "that Franklin Roosevelt created social security. It also has been said that Herbert Hoover was the first exponent of this law."

Answer: FDR's "brain trust" advised proposed this legislation. Hoover's preliminary studies and reports on Social Security were introduced by former Sen. Robert F. Wagner, New York, a Roosevelt associate since their legislative friendship at Albany in 1910.

Pruett Gives Answers for Moon Riddle

By J. HUGH PRUETT

"I was up at 5:30 one morning recently and saw the moon low in the eastern sky. The rounded side was down and toward the eastern horizon. The moon was only a few days later I saw the crescent in the west after sunset but with the rounded side toward the western horizon. How did it get turned around completely?"

H. A. S. Dr. Frost
Moon shapes and positions are quite puzzling. The moon gives no light of its own but shines brightly only by reflected light. The part of the moon turned toward the sun is illuminated; the other half is dark except for a slight twilight reflected sunlight which can be detected when the bright part of the moon is at the crescent.

Always Toward Sun
The rounded side of the lighted moon is always turned toward the sun. Since the moon revolves completely around the earth in 29 1/2 days, it is seen from the earth in all positions as it orbits around the earth.

Moon's Eastward
From night to night at an early hour as the moon moves eastward around the earth, we see it higher and higher in the west and in about a week after the crescent stage it is at half moon—first quarter—and in about a month it is at full moon. The rounded side is still turned toward the sun.

After half moon, our lunar neighbor gets more plump and fat and east at our early evening hour each night. But as the sunlight is coming over the western part of the earth, the lighted side of the moon is still toward the west.

Lighted Half
Two weeks after new moon, full moon is reached and moonrise in the east occurs at about the time sunrise in the west. We then see all the lighted half of the lunar sphere.

After full moon we see less and less of the lighted side and moonrise finally occurs late at night. This is the "waning moon" and as the sunlight is reaching it over the eastern part of the earth, so the rounded side is toward the west. A little before new moon we see the thin crescent low in the eastern dawn.

Two weeks after new moon, full moon is reached and moonrise in the east occurs at about the time sunrise in the west. We then see all the lighted half of the lunar sphere.

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Farm Worker In Idaho Gets 'Best U. S. Pay'

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (Special)—Farm workers in Idaho are still the highest paid in the U. S. by daily rate without room and board, the bureau of agricultural economics of the agriculture department said today.

The estimated average daily wage rate without room and board for the first of 1937 was listed as \$2.50, up 30 cents from a year earlier when Idaho also topped all others.

The daily rate without board and room is reported for all states except the three Pacific coast ones, where monthly and hourly rates are customary.

On a monthly basis with board and room, Idaho farm labor is sixth in the nation with an average of \$207, compared with house hold stands fourth with an average of \$207, compared with \$200 last year. Only California, Washington and Arizona top this figure.
