U.S. Business Looks to Eisenhower for 'Better Climate' for Private Enterprise

NEW YORK, Jan. 20 (AP)—Business starts its own honeymoon with Ike today.

Like congress, it is full of faith in happy days ahead—but, maybe just a slight bit worried lest something happen to spoil the good times. It is now realizing the time is going to be called upon to serve.

The new regime is being tagged a businessman's administration, and is laying prospect for those who have felt misunderstood and neglected for 20 years.

Certainly businessmen will play a much larger role in the incoming administration. And there is much talk about the Eisenhower cabinet being more like a board of directors.

But also this could mean that every mistake and misdeed in the next two or four years would be laid on the doorstep of business when voting times roll around again.

What business expects under this new regime has been widely, and perhaps loosely, described—all the way from "turning back the clock" to "just a fair shake."

But at the days since the November election rolled on, what started as a simple victory celebration by businessmen gradually has turned to discussion of specific aims—budget, and of controls, lower taxes, governmental economy, less regulation—and more recently to a desire of control and reminders—of responsibility.

All through it, however, runs the talk of a "better climate."

"An era of good feeling" is what the president of the United States Trust company, New York, called it the other day at the bank's annual stockholders' meeting.

"A major turning point" the Guaranty Trust company, New York, called it the other day at the bank's annual stockholders' meeting.

"It was a vote for sound money, equal rights and the economic incentives without which a free society can not function at its best."

But in this "better climate" business problems openly can still flourish.

One of the first is that of controls. Businessmen expect that income taxes, controls over prices, wages and materials for civilian use will be relaxed.
