## Ke's New Team Takes Over; Cold Halts M'Kay Start

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (AP)—Secretary of Interior Douglas M. McKay today announced that he had named a new cabinet to take over the department's operations. McKay's new team includes Harold Ickes as secretary, and several other key positions.

Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D. Va., said he would object to confirming Charles E. Wilson as defense secretary if Wilson sells his General Motors stock.

Byrd disclosed his view to newsmen after the House reported President Eisenhower had not changed his attitude toward Wilson and said that reports that Wilson is considering selling his \$2,700,000 GM stock holdings, which senators say he must do to confirm.

Byrd originally was primarily responsible for citing the House action to confirm Wilson while he retained large GM stock holdings, the government's biggest defense contractor.

McKay's secretary said the new interior chief caught a cold and had a slight fever, but he expected to be in Washington for the remainder of his first cabinet meeting.

The eight officials, and the new federal security administration, Mrs. Ovela Culp Hobby, were sworn in at the White House in a simple, 15-minute ceremony yesterday.

Benson was sworn in with seven other cabinet members at a White House ceremony late Wednesday. He arrived at his office shortly after 9 a.m. today, accompanied by Mrs. Benson and their son, Reed, a chaplain in the air force.

**WASHINGTON**—Concordatory and unpredictable economic developments make it almost impossible for the conservative Eisenhower financiers in the treasury and federal reserve system to start a steady program for the maintenance of the present level of federal finance and credit.

These new forces, which have manifested themselves since the November election, cast a cloud over the once bright prospect of a great economy at Washington, and a revival and expansion of trade and stabilization of prices at a level higher than the present swollen figures.

The situation is reminiscent of Franklin D. Roosevelt's 1933 experience. He was elected on a strict platform of a return to the "gold standard," but within a year he had been transformed into the heaviest spender in peacetime history.

**CHIEF PROBLEM INFLATION**—Before taking office, the late President's advisers—Treasury Secretary Humphrey and Assistant Secretary Burgess, a federal reserve veteran—had their chief concern was to keep further inflation.

With defense expenditures due to reach a peak late this year, they had outlined a series of operations aimed at reducing the rate of increase to 2 per cent.

Besides serious attempts to reduce the Truman budget and to reduce expenditures on the continent of Europe, they had planned to introduce far-reaching reforms in the management of money and credit.

**REVERSAL OF PLAN**—Although these involve highly technical matters affecting the type and interest rates on 60 billion dollars of forthcoming treasury issues, they are not so much a reversal of plan as credit available to top up excessive purchasing power and to lower prices. Although these have stabilized lately, it is felt that they should fall back to 20 per cent.

It was to be a sharp reversal of Truman-Snyder policies, which have always favored a slight touch of inflation, but a reversal of the kind of inflation, not only even though it was stimulated artificially by easy money and credit terms. Eisenhower's cabinet selections of bankers and big businessmen to handle the Treasury, gave assurance of such a change.

In his final economic report, Truman and the two top officials, Treasury Secretary E. A. Tamm and Federal Reserve Chairman B. M. Warburg, warned against any deflationary move.

**TRUMAN CHALLENGE**—Although denying that our country's prosperity was built on heavy, top-heavy, military outlays, Truman wondered how a depression could be avoided when huge defense expenditures were reduced. He was suggesting a program of projecting a fair deal program of new dams, highways, hospitals and other federal ventures, he put the Eisenhower administration on the spot at the outset.

Truman's economic valdatory also noted that his office with the nation more prosperous than ever in its history. He said that the nation had a surplus for every body seven years hence. Deliberately or not, his final report was a chip-on-the-shoulder challenge to his successor.

**DOWNWARD TRENDS**—Now, as a result of re-consideration of the Eisenhower family can't be sure whether the greater threat is inflation or deflation. They have discovered definite weak spots in the economy.

Unemployment and employment have fallen heavily, with possible curtailment of this important market for consumer and heavy goods. Exports are declining, and the shipping industry is suffering. General purchasing power is ebbing up, as evidenced by the unprecedented number of retail sales. The boom in the stock market has halted, and the building and private construction are slowing down. There are many other downward trends.

Although there are also some slightly optimistic conditions, it is not clear what the future holds. While they forebode no recession or depression for the immediate future—1935 or 1934, it is six months—their outlook is pessimistic. They are not sure that the country will pass a long period of a year or more of 60 billion dollars a year.

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# NEW FRENCH PREMIER

The leaders of the western alliance are compelled to hope that the new shift of power in France will make all the difference it seems to in the support of an serious slowdown in plans for rearming Germany and weaving German armed forces into a six-nation European defense community.

Public utterances of the new French premier, Rene Mayer, plus the dropping of Foreign Minister Schuman from the cabinet, inevitably stirred fears. Mayer talked of making the European defense treaty, and of subordinating it to other issues. Schuman was its author, and the firmest friend on the continent of European unity and economic-military links with Western Germany. His loss was a hard blow.

For another thing, though Mayer came to power with no doubt in the cabinet, he could not have made the grade without the support of some 80 de Gaulle members of the French parliament. The worry: Would he not surely make some concessions to General de Gaulle's rabid nationalist point of view?

Certainly the concern is great in all the front capitals. What a situation can only say that their worst imaginations will not be realized. And possibly they will not be.

Whatever the inclinations of Mayer and his new foreign minister, Georges Bidault, the compulsions of the continuing communist threat in Europe may drive them forward on the path to a unified defense incorporating German divisions.

The inescapable fact is, if you believe the hardest-headed military specialists, that the west needs German forces to buttress its defenses. Without them, the armies of NATO will have very limited effectiveness in safeguarding western soil.

More than that, the west needs Western German territory to give it the kind of maneuvering space that its contemplated defense in depth requires. If that land is not brought into the defensive area, then the NATO armies will be compelled either to attack or to hold the allies after the breakout from Normandy were hardly better.

Besides these powerful military factors, Mayer and Bidault must face the fact that the economic cooperation of European countries contemplated under the Schuman coal-steel program is not fully realizable unless efforts at unity extend into the military, and ultimately into the political sphere.

So perhaps we ought to wait a while before gloomily concluding that the change in France's government virtually puts the skids under European defense and German rearmament. The realistic hope is that Mayer and Bidault may have for pulling up short.

# GOOD MEN FOR THE JOBS

Two recent recommendations to special committees should be of great interest to every citizen of Washington regardless of political affiliations.

The first recommendation was made to the appropriations committee, the first Washington senator to sit in this powerful group since 1931. His appointment is a commendable step toward giving him to give particular attention to the Pacific people's needs.

Senator Jackson, serving his initial term in the senate, has been assigned to the interior and general operations committee. Senator Jackson described his appointment as "right—given my ability."

The second recommendation is to the committee on the selection of the federal government of the services of men of integrity, experience and competence merely because of legal technicalities. No one can appreciate any more that Wilson would ever be anything but fair in regard to the companies which may come to the defense department looking for government contracts. His letter has not been questioned. It is the letter of the law only which has delayed his immediate confirmation.

James Henry, Idaho Potato and Onion Shippers' association president, reports a special truckload of Idaho bakers will leave Hazelton Monday for Los Angeles. The Balm-Hohmann Produce Company, Hazelton, is in charge of sorting the choice bakers for shipment.

Twenty-three potato producers from three Magic Valley counties have contributed 16 100-pound sacks of the choice Idaho bakers to be shipped to the National Fruit and Vegetable Producers convention in Los Angeles next week.

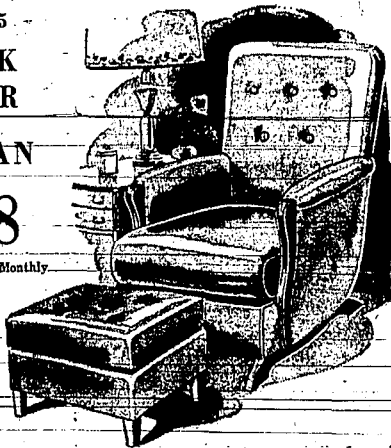

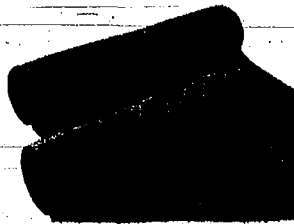

### Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

Recently, we were excited about the failures in reading. We have classes in remedial reading and those people want to know the reason for failures. The first impulse is to blame the school and the teacher. Some of it may belong there, especially if the supervisors are too eager to push innovation, modern methods upon the teachers when they are not prepared for them.

Reading is an accomplishment and demands a certain ability, instruction, and opportunity. Ability is always the first requisite. Most children between the ages of 7 and 7, roughly measured, are ready for instruction, but all of them are not able to profit by the same teaching. There are differences in the way children learn. Some do best by using their eyes and the visual memory eyes act. Some must learn through their ears and the memory hearing acts. Some learn best by means of their hands; they must touch things in order to truly get their messages.

Now the child who learns in his peculiar way must be taught so that he may make full use of his ability. That is plain to everybody concerned, but tell us how the teacher who has to teach at 40, 50 little ones at a time is to single out individual learners?

The only way she can manage is to, use every approach possible. When she discovers that one child is getting nowhere, she must take him apart from the big group, lead him to discover where his peculiar ability lies and attack the task accordingly. If she has a small group she can do this, but when she has a large group—no, hence, the remedial teacher who has the time
