WASHINGTON, Jan. 22—The Senate today unanimously approved Charles E. Wilson's nomination as secretary of the Atomic Energy Commission.

The Senate voted 92-0 to confirm Wilson, who was nominated by President Truman on Jan. 15.

Wilson, 47, is a physicist and was previously secretary of the Atomic Energy Commission under President Truman.

Wilson was born in St. Louis, Mo., and graduated from Princeton University in 1922. He received his Ph.D. from Princeton in 1925 and worked for the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission from 1946 to 1952.
