BOISE, Jan. 26 (AP)—The state affairs committee sent to the senate today a house-passed bill to outlaw slot machines in Idaho. The committee reported the bill without recommendation.

The committee had been excused Saturday from reporting on the bill. It met during a brief recess at the morning session. The senate was reconvened for the "sole and separate purpose" of hearing the committee's report. The report was filed in the senate adjourned until Tuesday.

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Union Pacific Gets Order to Set Joint Rates for Gateway

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 (AP)—The interstate commerce commission ordered the Union Pacific railroad today to set up joint freight rates with the Denver and Rio Grande Western railroad on a group of selected commodities moving through the Ogden gateway.

In a complaint filed with ICC nearly four years ago, Rio Grande accused Union Pacific and its connecting lines with discrimination because of a refusal to establish joint rates.

"But the joint rates, freight moving through Ogden and interchanged with Rio Grande was subject to a combination of separate rates. This resulted in higher charges than would be on a joint rate basis."

The ICC demanded joint rates on all freight moving through Ogden in both directions.

Stock Crop Helped But the ICC does not order joint rates established only on livestock, fresh fruits and vegetables, dried beans, frozen poultry, frozen meat and butter and eggs moving out of the Pacific northwest into the south and east, and on granite and marble moving from the Colorado mountains to California and Georgia.

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Spring Troop, Atom Exercise Is Planned

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 (AP)—The government announced today it will stage joint troop maneuvers and atomic weapons tests at its Nevada proving grounds this spring.

The test will start in March with 18,000 men of the army, navy, air force and marine participating. How long the test series will continue was not disclosed.

There has been speculation that an atomic shell will be fired for the first time by the army's new 11-inch cannon, but the Atomic Energy commission did not confirm that. It did say, however, that in addition to advancing "development of new and improved nuclear devices," the tests will provide certain unspecified "weapons performance data."

The new Nevada tests will not involve the H-bomb or any atomic explosions comparable to the giant hydrogen-blast set off last fall at remote Edwards airfield in the Pacific. The AEC hopes only to conduct small atomic blasts at its continental proving ground. In the past they have been of about the same general order—as those of World War II.

Most elaborate The AEC indicated it will perform the most elaborate of the test programs so far carried out at the huge proving ground near Las Vegas.

In addition to test explosions for fielding small atomic blasts, the proving ground will provide "in-depth" atomic weapons and training programs. These will be "many secondary projects, including 'in field' and other programs in government and to the public."

Since the Nevada proving ground was established in January, 1951, 20 atomic test explosions have been fired there. All have contributed to the development of the large family of atomic weapons for the armed forces, the AEC has said.

Construction of structures for the spring series of tests was begun last fall and included new facilities for testing atomic weapons in the technical areas and additions to the permanent establishment.

Test ranges for the 1953 spring series will be Carroll L. Taylor, manager of AEC's Santa Fe operations office, Albuquerque, N. M., the AEC said.

Internal revenue headquarters officers told the story of the battle Saturday:

"The agents went into action following a tip from a coast guard plane searching for hidden stills that there was 'something big' in the hills.

A machine gun belched a hailstorm of noise as the agents crept through the woods.

"Who is... is out there?" shouted an angry voice from the woods.

The agents didn't answer.

WESTERN FRONT, Korea, Jan. 24 (AP)—The army's new "mail from Mars" cold weather suit has passed the toughest tests yet. The suit, which was approved with the word "amazing," is being worn by 100 men in the 8th Army, including William E. Aron, Jr., 1st Lt., who wore the spangly, vinyl-plastic "cold bar" suit instead of the regulation 10 to 15 pounds of winter clothing the army issued. The "cold bar" weighs only four pounds.

Describes Patrol
"At one time," said Aron in describing a night patrol, "we lay down on a frozen paddy and didn't get cold."

He said his chief worry was not in keeping warm but trying to keep from peeing too much. The new battle-dress is fitted with sippers and he said he supposed to open when he gets too warm.

Aron's patrol wore the suits under poncho's and pants over the outside for two reasons—to protect the suit from pine strips and because it has no pockets.

Another test was given at division headquarters. The 1st Cavalier Division, 2d Brigade, 8th Army, was in the area. The suits were used for two hours in bitter cold, wearing one of the suits.

"I kept warm very well," he said. The suit will be given front-line status for several weeks. The decision is made to issue them as standard equipment.

Sabotage Is Suspected in Loss of Ship

LIVERPOOL, England, Jan. 25 (AP)—Sabotage possibly caused the fire which gutted the Canadian luxury liner Empress of Canada and sank her in the Atlantic Ocean today, investigators said.

Flames and smoke still rose from the 20,325-ton Canadian Pacific cruise liner as she lay on her side with her tilted superstructure jammed against a dockside building.

\$5,000,000 Ship
For more than two hours 500 firemen battled the flames which gutted the \$5,000,000 liner and made her a total loss.

Fire, police, harbor and steamship officials went aboard the smoldering bulk this morning as she lay with her port side down in the river about 80 feet of water.

"Sabotage cannot be ruled out," fire brigade spokesman A. J. Greenwood said. "It is for the official inquiry to try to ascertain what happened."

Police spokesman Barry Rogers, home office scientist, Dr. J. E. Firth, opened his investigation on the dockside today. He said he will be several days before the liner could be sufficiently examined for the cause of the disaster.

No one was killed. Seven firemen were hospitalized with minor injuries.

ICC Inquiry Is Begun for Train Crash

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 (AP)—The Interstate Commerce Commission today began its own investigation into the baffling case of the runaway train that rumbled into Union station Jan. 14 and injured more than 40 people.

Officials indicated the public hearing would be broadened to include other mysterious train failures on east coast routes in which authorities suspect possible sabotage.

The ICC hearing followed up last week's senate commerce committee hearings. Members of the train's crew testified that air brakes cut off the first three cars of the Pennsylvania railroad's Federal Express train as it left the New Haven railroad today to guard against a recurrence of what is believed to be three cases of brake tampering within six days.

Each train leaving Boston's South station was being watched for suspicious persons near equipment that could be tampered with to cause a brake failure.

Two other railroads, the Boston and Albany and the Boston and Maine, were following the New Haven's lead in taking special precautions with braking devices.

Mediators Asked To Settle Dispute

CHICAGO, Jan. 25 (AP)—Federal railroad mediators stepped to arrive here today, will attempt to bring a swift end to a strike by 600 miles of track in the Chicago and Great Western railroad.

Federal mediator Frank Switzer said the members of the railroad mediation board were called here after his own efforts to avert the walkout proved fruitless.

The strike called yesterday morning halted freight shipments over 600 miles of track in the midwestern states. Pickets marched at most important stations of the Great Western.

The walkout was called by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Railroad Trainmen and Firemen and Enginemen and Order of Railway Conductors. Later in the day the Brotherhood's Union of North America joined the strike in some areas.

The unions said the dispute involved working rules and "accumulated grievances" resulting from their interpretation.

On many occasions, by accident or design—Russian IL-28s have crossed the line into Japanese territory.

"Some crossings may have been accidental," said Low, "but I know, from the path and direction, that others were not accidental."

U. S. Sabrejets have been patrolling northern Japan since Dec. 18, ready to shoot down any intruding MIGs. The Japanese government warned this month that hostile aircraft violating Japanese territory would be shot down.

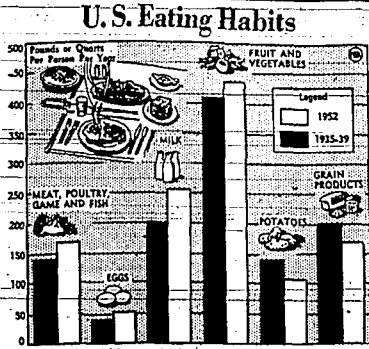

Report Shows Dry Creek Area Pumping Produced 44,000 Acre Feet During 1952

Pumping activities in the Dry Creek area, which were virtually non-existent in 1950 and 1951, were reported to have produced 44,000 acre feet of water last year, according to a report released by the U. S. Geological survey.

This pumping, for an irrigation season of about 145 days, represents an average withdrawal rate of nearly 310 acre-feet per day, or about 12,000 gallons per minute.

The report is based on the work of field parties which spent the summers of 1951 and 1952 gathering data on location and construction characteristics on wells, measuring water levels and yields and establishing measuring stations.

Border Violation Claimed by Egypt

CAIRO, Egypt, Jan. 26 (AP)—Egypt charged today that Israeli troops had violated the truce lines near Gaza and crossed into Egyptian territory to blow up two Arab refugee camps.

Five refugees were killed and another injured seriously in the explosion, the Egyptian protest said.

Korea Chief Regrets Loss Of Van Fleet

SEOUL, Jan. 26 (AP)—The retirement of Gen. James A. Van Fleet as eighth army commander has sent a surge of regret through the Republic of Korea government, but President Syngman Rhee has pledged warm-hearted cooperation to his successor, Lieut.-Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor.

"I am sure," said Rhee, "that President Eisenhower who has the right and speedy settlement of the Korean war in his heart, must have a plan which is better than we know."

Rhee called the retirement of Van Fleet, effective March 31 "a disappointment" to the "entire Korean nation."

Rhee added: "We believe that if he is left long enough to carry out his plan with his wonderful ability to organize, train and discipline young men, he will succeed in solving the major problem of the Korean war, so that it will not be necessary for the American boys or the boys of any other U. N. member nation to expose themselves to enemy bullets anywhere in Korea."

Flu Outbreak in U.S. Called Mild

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 (AP)—Experts worry too much about the current widespread outbreaks of influenza. It is a mild virus, not to be compared with the severe outbreaks of 1918-19 or 1929-1930, Surgeon General Leonard Scheele of the public health service replied.

Dr. Scheele added that, even if the current outbreak were more severe, medical science is much better equipped now to deal with influenza—and other complications—which caused many of the deaths in earlier years.

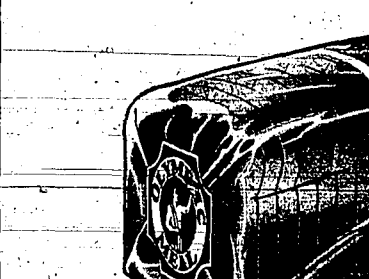
