TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—President Eisenhower's aggressive, long-range foreign program has aroused both interest and concern among three strong contrasting groups, for its content with their own, their own considered viewpoints on world affairs. They await specific action to execute his strong, positive program. They choose to admit that the three groups are Republican isolationists on capital hill, the Church government and the war mongers at the Kremlin. The three elements are having a hard time of it. Senator Taft, the British prime minister and Stalin, although each is motivated by different considerations.

Whereas the trio prefer that aggression be tempered by caution, the war mongers feel that it is greater rather than less American influence in international affairs. There will be no withdrawal. His concentration on foreign relations has been a success in his inaugural address testifies to that reversal.

PLANS COMPLICATED—In looking forward to putting the new role into effect, Taft's faction wants to know whether he will demand ever greater military and economic assistance to overseas allies, including lowering of tariffs to assist them, respectively. He wants to maintain majority leader's plans to cut the budget, reduce taxes and boost tariff walls. Churchill will send special agents to Washington soon to obtain more revealing glimpses of Eisenhower plans for war or peace. Whereas the prime minister has urged a conference with Stalin, Eisenhower has said he would not meet with the Soviet leader until he is especially worried over any action that will expand military operations in Korea and India. He has urged a check on the Sino-Soviet pact and the middle east. Paris likewise fears for the impact of the President's ideas in North Africa, where they are insisting on "liberation" from French control.

STALIN KNOWS—Stalin now realizes that Eisenhower intends to "ball his bluff" in Korea. He has been told that the American side is playing its puppets in Indo-China, the middle east, the Mediterranean and central Europe. He has half-hearted efforts to this effect will be coordinated and coordinated.

There will be no letdown in rearmament of the kind which helped to level the invasion of Britain and other continental allies contribute more generously to the European defense community. "He" believes they can do more than they have so far.

COALITION MUST TIGHTEN—Eisenhower sees two sectors where the anti-red coalition must be tightened and strengthened. The primary one is in Europe. TO TAKE INITIATIVE—In short, Eisenhower intends to seize the initiative in glaring down the reds. He has been told that the Truman administration was content to counterpunch after Stalin had slipped over the first blow.

Eisenhower's strategy policy, if backed by determination and strength, will encourage and stimulate the free world, including dragging allies like Britain and France and half-hearted neutralists.

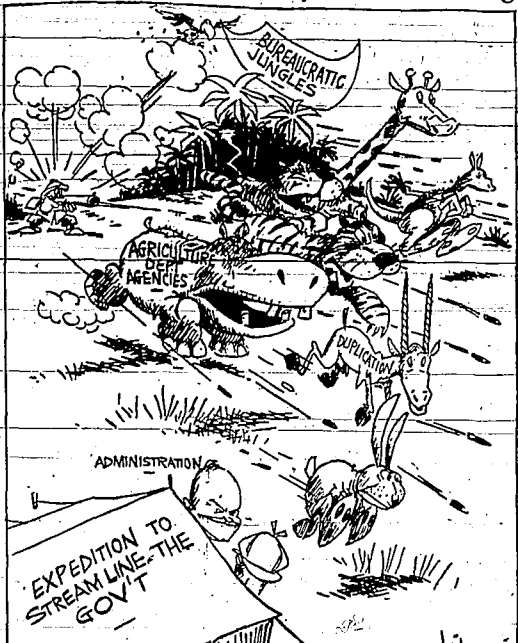

FORT WORTH, Jan. 23 (AP)—A newspaper said Tuesday the hydrogen-bomb B-36 bomber recently exploded in the South Pacific, was dropped by a B-36 which returned to base here with the bomb bay doors blackened and blistered.

The Fort Worth Star-Tribune said it learned the B-36 was based at Carswell air force base. The paper said: "The heat-treated B-36 said: 'The heat-treated bomber after repair of radio-active and other damage.'

Top Condition "Primed to top flight condition by a specially selected crew of air-men and the flown away by a super-selected crew, the big brother to the B-29 'Enola Gay' which dropped the first atom bomb over Japan, took off here shortly before the Nov. 1 blast date.
