The 294-foot-long ship, after a "five minute" delay, was sent to sea by a gale which had been announced by the Coast Guard. Of 100 known survivors, 100 were rescued.

The 115-mile-long ship was piloted by Capt. J. H. Anderson, who was killed. The ship was carrying 100 passengers, all of whom were rescued.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Senator Morse has been generally credited with the origin of the "world award" which is now being presented to the winners of the Pulitzer Prize.

Answer: I would not hazard a guess on what the voters of Oregon will do to Morse when he runs for reelection in 1936, but I do not protest against any comparison of him or his record with the achievements of such statesmen as Horatio Nelson, George Washington, John Jay, John Adams, James Madison, James Monroe, James M. Smith, and others.

I am not referring here to Morse's objections to the nomination of the Wilson nomination. His worst objection was the nomination of a woman as an appointee even after he had been reported favorably by the appropriate investigating committee.

Perhaps of deeper significance, because it is more revealing of basic attitudes, was a new survey taken by the U. S. high commission which has been in Germany.

One of its main findings was that the large majority of the German people cannot be counted on to resist the efforts of any Nazi type group to return to power.

The survey indicated that most Germans believe there was more good than evil in the Nazi movement.

Only a fourth of the West Germans say they would do everything they could to prevent restoration of a Nazi regime.

Most startling of all was the fact that 86 per cent of those questioned in the survey agreed either that the German people made last fall by a former Nazi paratrooper commander, who called the western allies the "real war criminals" of World War II.

Among the democracies there can be no comfort in these findings. The report is particularly unhappy as it mirrors the outlook of Germany, which is now being led by a man who has been looking for signs of more liberal leanings.

The Germans never have distinguished themselves by any marked feelings of war guilt, either this time or after World War I.

What higher tribute is there to the power of ideas to resist the destruction of reason? And what higher tribute can be offered than that no matter what the west's need of German strength in the battle against communism, it must maintain unending vigilance against a serious rebirth of Nazism?

MAKING SENSE
The Democratic Party's new congress thus far is behaving like a party with a sense of responsibility.

On the important senate foreign relations committee they have installed Senators Humphrey and Mansfield of Montana.

Though Humphrey's antics in domestic issues have caused some to dub him a "Boy Scout," he is wiser to solicitive support, support of the U. N. and world cooperation.

Mansfield, a former house member, is an acknowledged specialist in far eastern matters.

For the other key senate committee, armed services, they have selected Senator McNamara of Massachusetts and Jackson of Virginia.

These men certainly would help to produce a sane, balanced viewpoint on that powerful investigating committee.

HIGH-CALIBER CHOICE
If there be any doubt about the ability of General Eisenhower to attract good men to public office, it ought to be resolved with the naming of Dr. James Bryant Conant, president of Harvard university, to be high commissioner to Western Germany.

The job is a heavy one in the cold war. What Western Germany does in the next year or two, and what the other allied powers do about the Germans, is a matter of vital consequence to the defense of the free nations.

Conant is pre-eminently qualified for it. If he were simply the academic head of a great university, that alone would recommend him. But he is far more.

He is one of the nation's top scientific minds, intimately linked with the atomic energy development. And he has been a pioneer in measuring the impact of science upon the people.

Beyond this, he has shown great grasp of the military, economic and political factors at work in the world today. He has contributed much original thinking which has been useful fuel for men in high places. The new government is fortunate to have acquired a man of his stature.

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Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Big Wood valley is experiencing its mildest winter in history. There are a couple of southern California residents staying at SUNNY MEADOWS who have just returned to this part of the country. They say the weather there is about the best thing that's ever happened. They wear heated clothing, ride in heated vehicles and eat nothing but heat-generating foods. They probably would have to protest if they were for the raising of their Great Dane.

Oldtimers in the valley claim this is the "Johnny-completely" of all winters for the Big Wood river country. Even the records at the Sawtooth national forest office show that they go back to 1900—show that this January is "out of this world."

The two Great Danes are being used by Universal-International Motion Picture company in the filming of "Back to God's Country," a picture which is supposed to have taken place in Alaska back around 1900. The two animals really are suffering in Idaho's weather. They were born and have lived all their lives in southern California and take a dim view of any weather that isn't thoroughly conditioned with plenty of warm sun.

One of the Danes has a prominent part in the movie and the other is his double. Because the Danes are usually allergic to the cold, Hibbe says first one and then the other while shooting scenes in Boulder Flats, Baker creek, Basley hot springs, Dollar mountain and at the Russian John ranch. Hibbe claims he can't use either for very long in the elements because "they just can't."

The animals are transported to location in heated station wagons. They wear heated blankets when not working and a sock with a heater in the cabin is taken wherever they go beyond "civilization" so they can get frequent shots of their work.

Universal has 30 special workers on the filming of the play in the Big Wood river country. Art Blalock is production manager and Maury Gertman is cameraman. They expect to be on location from 10 days to two weeks.

The story of "Back to God's Country" is based on history, Hibbe says. It is the story of a Chinaman with a Great Dane that was so big and strong and powerful it could outrun a team of five horses. 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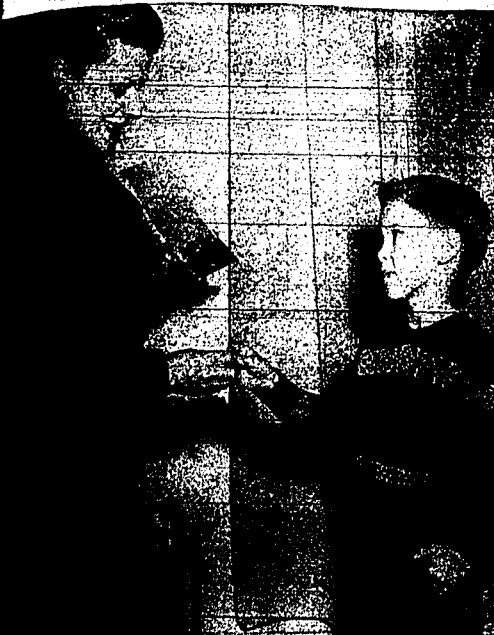

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Chances Eyed On Trout Bill OK in Senate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 (Special)—A bill for the relief of Snake river trout-risers appears to have a chance of passing the senate.

The interstate and foreign commerce committee is now studying a measure submitted by Sen. Henry C. Browne, R. Id., for tagging of all foreign trout and identification of imported trout on restaurant menus.

Although a tariff on foreign fish is barred by present reciprocal trade laws, Dvorzhak at the suggestion of J. W. Tingey, Snake River Trout company, drafted the tagging bill to prevent eating pieces from serving imports as native products.

Chief hope for the approval of the bill lies with the Democrats now in the majority on the committee. Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D. Wash., is believed favorable since Washington has already adopted a tagging measure for all trout shipped in to the state. Other Democrats deemed likely to support the bill are Senators Ed Johnson of Colorado and Lester Hunt of Wyoming.

Committee chairman Charles W. Tobey, R. N. H., is classed as a free trader. Rufus E. Capshaw, R. Ind., and John W. Bricker, R. O., should back the bill.

Tingey wrote Dvorzhak that competition with foreign trout is becoming very serious. Indeed, and threatens to force local trout raisers out of business.

"Trout producers around Twin Falls tell me they are unable to sell all their production," he said, "even after drastically cutting the price."

It related a dream by a student of the letterpress of every Bible in the world was to be printed in the year 1844. The passage in any book whatsoever similarly disappeared. It was as if some profane darkness had covered the earth, and the literature and much of the history of the world was left in shreds and tatters.
