## Fierce New Storms Hit Stricken Areas As Suffering Gains

AMSTERDAM, The Netherlands, Feb. 4 (AP)—Fierce new storm lashed the flood-stricken areas of The Netherlands and Great Britain today, threatening more than 13,000 persons isolated in low-lying areas. The death toll neared 1,700 in the week-end hurricane-driven flood that hit Holland, Britain, Belgium, Germany and France, and was still mounting. A 46-mile wind hurled mounting North sea waves against the battered dikes of Holland. Waves driven by a 50-mile wind hit the British coast. As thousands of workers stood against a surge to shore up battered sea defenses, some 2,000 vessels and more than 100 planes rushed the evacuation of thousands of refugees from three days of exposure to isolated waterways throughout stricken areas.

"I trust that the American government has the ability to terminate the Korean war through peaceful methods," he said. "I should resume the Franco-Chinese peace talks immediately."

### Prospects for '53 Irrigation Are Brighter

It appears that farmers along the Snake river can have their cake and eat it too this winter. While the valley backed in sunshine for most of January, snow—lots of snow—on the Snake river watersheds, relieving the farmers' worry of what they would do for an irrigation water supply next summer.  
By the end of the month, the water content of snow on the watersheds measured above normal. The snow survey of the bureau of reclamation and the forest service Wednesday showed the water reserves substantially above normal at all measuring stations except two.  
This marked a sharp reversal of the trend of a month ago when the snow content, by water cast, was only 80 per cent of normal and about 80 per cent of last year's covering. At that time only four of the 21 measuring stations recorded water content at normal or above. After heavy precipitation in January, the current measurements approach those made at this time last year.

At the high elevation stations, the water content of snow measured only 77 per cent of normal on Jan. 15. But here was the picture by the end of the month: Teton pass, 78 inches of snow, 104 inch increase during the month; 242 inch water content, 118 per cent of normal; Lewis divide, 102 inches of snow (an increase of 40 inches) and 128 per cent of normal; Grassy lake, 79 inches of snow (120 inch increase), 213 per cent of normal; 116 per cent of normal.  
Lynn Grandall, district engineer, noted "January precipitation was one of the greatest amounts ever recorded in one month on the Jackson lake watershed. For example, at Lewis lake divide 10 inches of moisture fell and at Grassy lake 14 1/2 inches.

### Canal Firm Gets Report on Water

SHOSHONE, Feb. 4.—Marble Reservoir contains 140,000 acre feet of water, Robert Peterson, secretary of the Wood Canal company reported at the meeting of the directors.  
In comparing the amount to one year ago, Peterson said that year there were 141,000 acre feet in the reservoir at this time and although there was less water in the reservoir to start with in the fall, the inflow has been greater this year.  
According to the snow survey the precipitation in the upper watersheds is above normal this year which indicates an ample supply of water for the season's irrigation, he added.

### Road Project Poses Puzzle For Counties

BOISE, Feb. 4.—Plenty of legal angles are confronting Gem county commissioners in their effort to annex 34 square miles of Payette county for completion of a secondary road between Gardner and Emmet.

Rep. H. Grant Gardner, R. Payette, said Payette county commissioners have turned a deaf ear to the proposal as it would take so much land away from Payette county that it couldn't meet the legal requirements of a county.

Idaho law provides that a county must have at least 400 square miles and Payette county now has only 317 square miles.

But there's another problem, too. Idaho law provides that such an annexation never may be authorized by the legislature and then endorsed by residents of the affected area at a referendum. The only trouble is that the 34 square miles Gem county wants has no population. How can you hold a referendum if there aren't any people to vote?

Gardner said Gem county commissioners are trying to work out some alternate proposals—swapping Payette county 24 square miles to Gem county for the needed 34-square mile tract for the road or resurveying the road so only six or seven square miles would need to be annexed to Gem county.

### Payment of \$300 Is Asked in Suit
