### Lone Gunman Gets \$13,000 Of Bank Cash

SPokane, Feb. 8 (AP)—A lone wolf gunman, equipped with three shopping bags for loot, two handkerchiefs for disguises and a .40 automatic—baited up a little suburban bank Wednesday and got away with two bags full.

He roared in a car at the curb and drove away with \$13,000 in five, tens and twenties. In haste he left behind one handkerchief, one shopping bag and another \$13,000.

The gunman, ordering three women tellers to "map it up" and warning he might shoot, ditched the getaway car in a high school parking lot five blocks away and switched to a later model.

No Leads

Police set out traps, blocks and combed the first car for fingerprints but no substantial leads were revealed.

Ray L. Flitz, assistant cashier at the Spokane Valley State bank, said the man walked in shortly after the bank opened. He was carrying the shopping bags and had a red handkerchief in his face.

The man, about 35, 6-2 and weighing around 180, thrust the sacks at teller Naomi Rinkensberger, flashed the gun and said "map it up."

Worked Slowly

He told her to pass sacks to two other tellers, one to the left and one to the right. The girls worked slowly despite repeated warnings from the robber who apparently planned the job carefully.

One customer came in, tried to back out but stopped in the face of the 45, Flitz and O. K. Johnson, the bank president, also were threatened and had to stand by. "If anybody moves, she'll get it," the man said, indicating Miss Rinkensberger.

One teller was extra slow and the gunman couldn't wait. He ran out with the two bags and dropped a big white handkerchief that he apparently had hid to his mouth to disguise his voice.

### Delay Due on Installation of McKay's Aide

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 (AP)—Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay said today Undersecretary Vernon D. Northrup will stay in office until about April 1.

President Eisenhower has nominated Ralph A. Frazier, California engineer, for the post. Authorization of the interior department sources predicted speedy Senate confirmation for him and three other nominations, but McKay said Frazier probably will not be able to take office for several weeks.

McKay said he would like to see Frazier cooperate with me and will be here until his replacement comes." The secretary said he would like Northrup to remain in the department in some capacity, but that his future is up to him and he doubts that he wants to stay.

McKay said no one has been made an Assistant Secretary Oils Bureau.

He said he expects the other three nominees to be on the job within a week after they are confirmed by the senate. They are former Rep. Fred G. Aandahl, R. N. D., and Mrs. O. Lewis Phoenix, Ark., attorney, and Clarence A. DeLoach, Colo. Neb., attorney, as solicitor.

### Businessmen Get Warning

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 (AP)—Senate Republicans and President Eisenhower's appointment of wealthy executives to high government posts will give business and industry an "economic paradise or fairyland."

Senator Bennett, Utah, also said there should be no idea that the government, under the Republicans, would become a beneficent fairy godmother, with business as "her favored favorite to be showered with privileges and immunities."

Bennett, a former president of the National Association of Manufacturers, scolded this note in an address prepared for the National Manufacturers association.

Bennett said businessmen must prove their right to leadership by maintaining a "sound economy" and by making progress "toward the political goal of liberty, the educational goal of understanding and the spiritual goal of happiness."

Bennett said the new administration must strive for a rising standard of living for all, for an increase of knowledge shared by more people as well as for more liberty for all Americans.

### Philadelphia Fire Is Fatal for Man

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 8 (AP)—An aged man was burned to death today and 50 persons had narrow escapes when a three-alarm flash fire whipped through a four-story building on the block of the Center City department store area.

Firemen first believed five or six persons were lost when the fire swept the building and spread to an adjoining seven-story building.

The dead man was identified as Louis Kilmann, 63, whose son is an advertising executive. He was carrying papers with offices on the building's fourth floor. The son said his father had an artificial leg and had difficulty walking.

### Granges Okay Plan on Water

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 8 (AP)—State Granges at California, Oregon, and Washington announced today they have agreed to recommend to Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay a 10-point program to continue and expand existing federal water and power policies.

George Schlimmer, master of the California State Grange, said the agreement was reached at a conference in Portland.

The Grange's program included continued development of reclamation, power and multiple purpose projects in the west; public agency preference for federal project power; federal ownership of dams built by the government and no relating of the 190-acre limitation in the present reclamation law.

The Granges also agreed the federal government should embark on an extensive program of building check dams on lands in its ownership, authorize funds for range improvement and reseed and determine proper ratio of water for irrigation use and irrigation in that order.

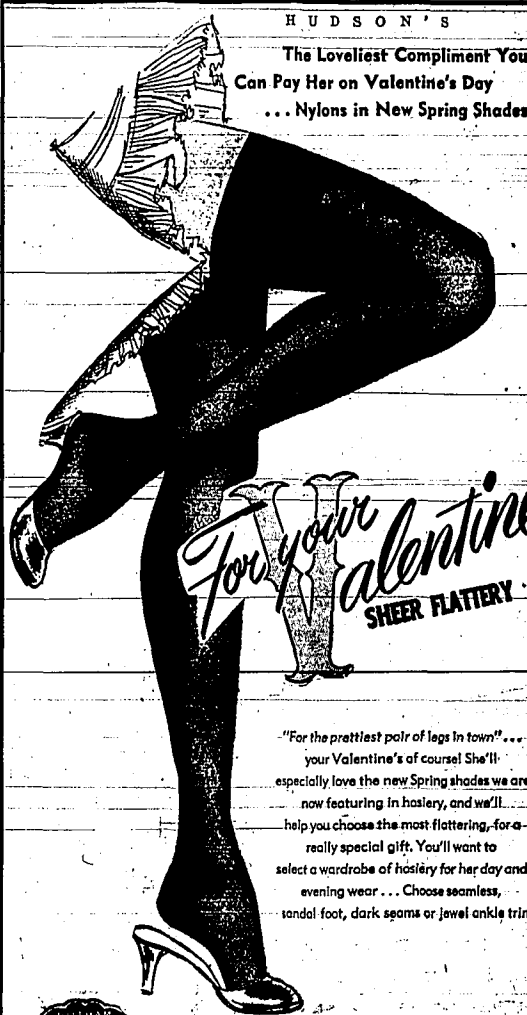

### Probers Scan Data on N. Y. Dock Scandal

**NEW YORK, Feb. 5 (AP)—How do racketeers manage to take about \$30 million dollars a year from port of New York's attention-drawing dollar shipping industry?**

The New York crime commission is writing the answer up in a report. In the past two months it has heard about 1,250,000 words of testimony from 300 witnesses who appeared at public hearings on waterfront crime. In closed sessions last spring and fall the commission heard nearly 10 million words of testimony.

To call all the testimony and evidence and come up with concrete answers to hard facts is expected to take the commission most of this month. Then it will present its findings to Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, J. George Thompson.

The public hearings among three groups are generally responsible for criminal conditions in the world's biggest port: Seamen's union; International Longshoremen's association; some stevedoring and shipping companies, and public officials.

They forge a three-way tie-in between politicians, businessmen and underworld racketeers.

This, in general, is the way the pattern works, as disclosed by the testimony of numerous witnesses:

1. Labor gangsters control vital segments of the I.L.A., intimidating longshoremen and directing a highly efficient system of kickbacks, extortion, bribery and other rackets. I.L.A. President Joseph P. Ryan wound up his witness stand appearance last week with the admission that it is possible 20 per cent of his union's officials have police records.
2. Consent Needed
3. Racketeers could not create their own waterfront empire without the consent of some stevedores and shipping companies. Some companies cooperate with the union racketeers because these men are tough enough to keep dockers in line. The main concern of the companies is to keep freight rolling.
4. But neither the labor bosses nor the companies could maintain the system without at least the tacit consent of local officials in New York and New Jersey. Many of these officials accept campaign contributions from both the labor bosses and the companies, maintain contacts with them, and dish out political jobs for them.

The food crisis is so severe Soviet military forces have turned back for

civilian use large quantities of requisitioned foodstuffs.

Popular discontent over the food crisis has led to large public protest demonstrations in several cities.

**Opposition Growing**

In rural areas, opposition against collectivization is growing constantly, increasing numbers of attacks by irate farmers on members of what the communists call "co-operative production associations" are reported.

In industry, both human and supply problems are crippling the drive toward "total" collectivization—of workers and fulfillment of the five-year plan.
