Truman Still Holds to Vow To Stay Mum

INDEPENDENCE, Mo., Feb. 6.—Former President Truman stood firm today on his vow not to talk about current affairs or President Eisenhower's administration for the time being.

He paced up an opportunity to speak of his night at a "welcome home" dinner given himself, Mrs. Truman and their daughter, Margaret, by 600 neighbors and old friends.

The former President clamped up after he set off a national controversy by expressing doubts that Russia has a workable atomic bomb. But he accepted craft of such matters last night.

After telling his fellow townsmen how good it was to be back home, Mr. Truman chatted sentimentally about his childhood here and his political career.

He thanked the home folks, who paid \$3.50 each to eat roast turkey and the fixings in the basement dining room of a church tabernacle for the "wonderful welcome you have given."

Truman said such demonstrations since he left the White House last Jan. 20 has led Mrs. Truman to say she is "glad to say for all we have been through."

Fred Kohl Seeks Data on Lincoln's Past in Farming

SHOSHONE, Feb. 4.—A call is being made by County Agent Fred Kohl for information regarding early extension work in Lincoln county. The information will be used in new articles commemorating the golden anniversary of farm demonstration work, forerunner of today's cooperative extension service.

The information may either be written or just recalled and can include 4-H club work or any type of demonstration work in agriculture or home economics. Older residents of Lincoln county may remember H. G. Avery, appointed county agent in 1917, or George E. Manney, who served in 1920 and 1921.

On February 26, 1903, Dr. Sean A. Knapp, known as the father-of extension work in Lincoln county, was the first farm demonstration near Terrell, Tex.

Idaho has been carrying on an extension program since 1912. Lincoln county began work in 1917 but the county did not have an organized program until between 1921 and 1927 when Truman Anderson took over, Kohl said.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG WASHINGTON—A major and immediate cause of controversy between President Eisenhower and congress will involve an issue that is supposed to be as dead as prohibition and women suffrage, the tariff. It will range the big business and international interests in the White House family against numerous regional Republican bloc on the tariff.

POT SHOTS JUST DOLE CHATTER Dear Pot: What's all this idle chatter about no-winter-warfare this year? For the information of all those people responsible for the weather this winter has been just as bad as last winter.

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE Soon after President Eisenhower took the oath, Gen. Tracy speaks who had been with him throughout the war, said "Ike" might need a little more of a pep to adjust himself to his job but that given a little time he would be world-take success completely.

UNFAIR CRITICISM Some pretty foolish things are being said about the apparent business sense of the Eisenhower cabinet, and about time to take another hard look—especially since a few giddy critics are trying to label it "eight millionaires and a plumber."

President Eisenhower's cabinet are four business men, not eight. In Mr. Truman's time there were three at the end, but at one time there were four.

Run through the list. On the Eisenhower team, Charles E. Wilson, defense, head of General Motors; George Humphrey, treasury, manufacturer; Sinclair Weeks, commerce, Boston business man; Arthur Summerfield, post office, general, automobile dealer, politician.

There's how the other five posts stack up: Agriculture—Ike's cabinet, Benson, a farm cooperative specialist; Truman's Brannan, lawyer and career man; Interior—Ike's, McKey, former Oregon governor; Truman's, Robinson, military expert and career man; Labor—Ike's, Durkin, A.F. official; Truman's, Tobin, former Massachusetts governor; Attorney General—Ike's, Brownell, New York lawyer; Truman's, McCarney, former judge and congressman.

There are other business men in secondary posts in the administration. So were there in the Democratic regime. What the complaints seem to boil down to is that the men in Mr. Eisenhower's cabinet are too recently associated with business.

Mr. Eisenhower was elected to bring a fresh approach to several vital national problems. Should he therefore be expected to bring with him exactly the kind of men who so recently were voted out of power?

Remember, he has been filling posts that are essentially administrative. In searching for competent administrators, he has come up with one more business man than the Democrats did. The hardly sounds revolutionary.

It remains to be demonstrated whether lawyers, politicians or career government men are better or worse than business men as government administrators. Very probably they may test well show mixed results, as in the past.

Again, the fair-minded citizens will not likely worry too much about the origins of these men, or how much money they have in the bank. The real measure is what kind of a job they do, and how they serve the American people.

In the case of President Eisenhower's cabinet, it would seem wise to wait and find out.

WHOLESONOME EFFECT The delayed senate action in confirming the nomination of Charles E. Wilson for defense secretary should teach President Eisenhower and Attorney General Brownell, who is supposed to know his politics, a helpful lesson.

TRADE TO BE AID—A principal assignment for the traveling Dulles-Blassen mission is to ascertain whether the grain trade of \$1 billion dollars since the end of World War II can be replaced by larger American purchases of foreign goods.

TARIFF REDUCTIONS—Senator GOP leaders now say they had demanded the tariff attitudes of Wilson, Humphrey, Aldrich and other industrialists and big business during confirmation hearings. They objected to the question of greater concern over their corporate holdings.

FREER TRADE BACKERS—The list of organizations backing and opposing freer trade measures the world free trade movement has been compiled. The first time a Republican President has had to face such a split in his ranks on this issue.

TARIFF FAVOR OPPOSED—But, for fear of foreign competition, further tariff favors are opposed fiercely by all the influential labor and farm organizations in the United States.

NO KOREA SOLUTION The belief of Gen. James A. Van Fleet that the Korean army can be built up within 12 months to hold the entire 168-mile Korean battle front is open to question.

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Plan on China Blockade Gets Solons' Notice

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—There was considerable discussion among congressmen today of the merits of a new blockade against China. House President Eisenhower is said to be considering.

Sen. Henry Reagan, R-MICH., chairman of the Senate foreign relations committee, said, "We should allow trading with the enemy by any of our allies in the Korean war."

Both he and Sen. John J. Sparkman, D-ALA, another committee member, said the President could order a blockade just as easily as he withdrew the seventh fleet aid from the communist mainland.

Consultation Aftaid

Sparkman suggested, however, that Mr. Eisenhower should consult first with allied governments since the United States is not an agent of the United Nations in the Korean war.

Both senators emphasized they know of no pending blockade order. Chairman Dewey Short, R-MO, of the House subcommittee on China, said he had not heard of any such order in the week that a blockade might be the President's next move to crack the Korean deadlock.

Has Plan

Newark, N.J., House Speaker Joseph W. Martin, Jr., said that President Eisenhower has plans which will bring about a "blockade to the blockade."

The Massachusetts Republican said in a television broadcast he had talked "briefly" with the President on "the subject of the blockade."

"I don't think I ever worked harder in my life," he said, "than I did this week as he made his decision on the subject of the blockade."

"Brass" Overload Charge Is Denied

At Panel Hearing

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—The army was looking for more general today.

It denied it is loaded with too much brass as the house armed services committee resumed its hearings on whether the number of officers in the armed services should be charged.

The hearing charges that the army has too many brass, a military spokesman said there is actually a shortage of officers.

"Actually we are having trouble right now filling demands for general," he said.

The army spokesman said that in May, 1945, when the army had a total strength of six million men there were 1,674 generals and 5,014 colonels, all 1,674 men with army strength at 1,400,000 men, there are 400 generals and 5,071 colonels.

Pointing out that the number of officers goes down, the spokesman said the army would have 300 general officers to fill the present table of organization.

Hoffman May Get Posts From 'Ike'

PASADENA, Feb. 6 (AP)—Paul G. Hoffman, retiring general and Ford foundation, said today his return to the Studebaker corporation will give him "many opportunities to take on special assignments" for President Eisenhower.

Hoffman arrived here from New York yesterday. He had previously announced he was leaving the \$60 million Ford foundation to return to Studebaker as board chairman.

"The former economic cooperation administration chairman's most important job is to help us understand what his future connections with the new administration might be, but he has had talks with Mr. Eisenhower three days ago."

The 57-year-old Hoffman declined an offer made by Mr. Eisenhower to serve as an advisor to the new administration after the election to serve in a cabinet post.

More Trouble On Stock Law Rule Forecast

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The stockholding problem was causing more trouble for President Eisenhower's defense team today even though the top men have authorized the firm and won Senate confirmation.

The new service secretary, who is expected to be confirmed, is ready to run into difficulty in their search for competent officials willing to surrender their stock.

Two assistant army secretaries and one assistant air secretary, and one assistant navy secretary still were needed to fill the defense department high command.

Al Force Secretary Harold F. Tubo, who had the disposal of his stock in firms doing business with the government, said flatly the stock issue would seriously handicap the army to fill its command posts.

Repeats View Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens approved to resign. He has a 10 percent interest in a family textile firm. He said he still believed in the general principle that a member of the government should not be dealing on contracts in which he has a personal interest.

Senator James Eastland, services committee, however, held that a 1944 law specifically forbids a government official to have either a direct or indirect interest in a firm doing business with the government.
