**12 Bills Received**

The appropriation bill represents nearly a 50 percent increase over the 1933 appropriation and is approved by the 1931 legislature for public schools. Both the senate and house have passed and sent to Gov. Len Jordan's message, which makes possible the allocation of the 12 million dollars. It would increase the minimum salary schedule for teachers and boost the average daily attendance allowance from \$1 to \$1.30 per child per month.

### Disaster Facing U. S. Cattlemen, Democrat Avers

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—Representative McCall, D. Mont., Saturday told agriculture Secretary Rosen that Montana farmers are threatened with a "major disaster" if the administration's farm price support program.

In a letter to Benson, McCall said the section of President Eisenhower's state of the union message dealing with farm prices "is not only inadequate but the administration policy would be disastrous."

BIG NEWS AND GOOD NEWS There's big news a-poppin' these days... at home, abroad and right here in our own state of Idaho.

Things sure are taking a turn in a different direction since General Eisenhower was elected President, and from all indications the American people are well pleased with the change.

After 20 long years of New and Fair Deal leadership, climaxed by the Truman administration, the people are expressing renewed hope that some of the things they long have cherished will survive after all.

In fact, they are so gratified with the contrast since President Eisenhower took office, they now are asking one another what would have happened to this country if the lips of a Truman administration had remained in place for another four years.

Now that they're stop-afraid of the burden of taxes and weary of all the many courtesies saddled upon them, millions of Americans are relieved beyond words to find that it's still possible to have a federal government that respects their rights as free men.

During the low ebb years of the nation's chief executive, President Eisenhower not only has inspired new confidence in the people themselves, but he has challenged congress to measure up to its responsibilities.

The President has made it crystal clear that he favors an early return to the free enterprise system with a minimum of government intervention—that the day of throwing money to the four winds is over, and that a determined effort will be made actually to reduce taxes!

In his state of the union message, the President outlined an 11-point work program that should keep the congress busy for weeks, not on proving mistakes of the past, but on shaping new and constructive programs for the future.

The aim is to get the country out of the mess it's in and not merely to dig more deeply into the mire.

The President's own immediate actions, of course, are getting most of the headlines. When he announces, for instance, that he is withdrawing troops from the Straits of Formosa, that's news that electrifies all the world.

Almost in one breath, he tells us that from a foreign policy standpoint we're not to be bound by "secret understandings" to "purchase fangled gains for ourselves" and that we're going to have a complete revision of the tax structure on our home front.

Answer: President Eisenhower has had to discuss this problem with Secretary Acheson before the latter had made any official charges. They're deeply concerned over present and prospective hardships caused by an important segment of the population.

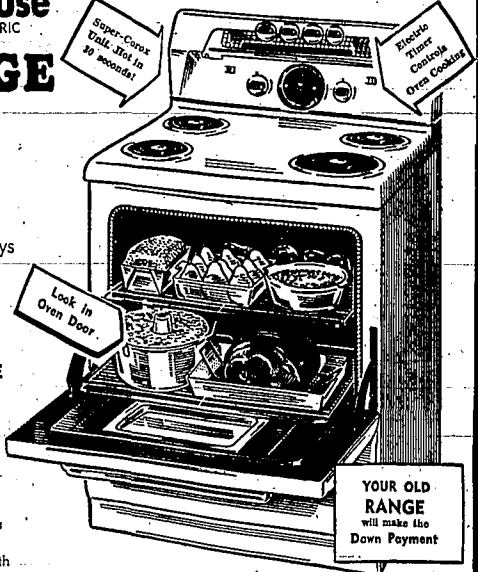

Long Wrangle on Importing of Canada Gas Nears End as FPC Hearing Slated

By PAT MURDOE
WASHINGTON Staff Correspondent
WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (Special)—After five years of wrangling and enough testimony to fill a small library, the federal power commission is nearing a verdict on importing of Canadian gas into the northwest.

The final decision, now that the skrimishing is over, may be quite easy to reach. Pushing for fast action are the northern part of the province into the northwest. A subsidiary will distribute gas to the Seattle and Portland areas, while Trans-Northwest Gas, Inc., Spokane, Wash., will supply eastern Washington and northern Idaho.

Hearings in the case will be resumed here Feb. 18. A large attendance is expected, but the show won't last as long because some parties to the earlier fighting may decide to leave the field.

The companies taking part in the gas importation have tried to build final material and are relying now on the local talents of their respective lawyers. The seasons should conclude in 8 to 10 weeks.

After digging through the back files and the latest information, one concludes: 1. The biggest point in argument will be whether the Pacific Northwest Natural Gas company, New York, has enough gas to deliver into the northwest. It has contracts with producers in the San Juan basin area (of New Mexico and Colorado) for the required amount. But its opponent, the Westcoast Transmission company, Ltd., Calgary, Alberta, is prepared to challenge the figures furnished to FPC.

Meanwhile, the El Paso Natural Gas company, El Paso, Tex., has asked FPC permission to build a second line from the San Juan area (and west Texas) to serve the huge market in California. It's a huge El Paso can use the current available supply in San Juan and will have firm support from New Mexico, Arizona and California in blocking the Pacific proposal.

El Paso is so anxious to keep tight control of San Juan fields it has blocked Pacific's original plan to run its line through Salt Lake City, which had figured to be an important customer. El Paso did this by offering to build a new line, 100 miles long, from the Clear Creek field in central Utah north to Salt Lake City.

Utah customers thus would be served more cheaply. Pacific then had to change its proposed route to exclude Utah but include customers in Colorado. It would go via Wyoming and southern Idaho. This new route is perhaps more difficult to build.

Westcoast recently has submitted to FPC a rate schedule that looks rather attractive compared to the cost of oil and coal. It's true that Westcoast's price isn't as good as the one suggested by a third competitor, Northwest Natural Gas company, New York. This concern would pipe gas from the relatively close fields of southern Alberta. The only trouble is the Canadian authorities have eager markets for this product to the east, whereas the northwest is the only buyer, for the present, of the reformed northern reserves.

It's regarded as significant here that Clear-Gas company, owned by Montana Power company, and Northern Natural Gas company, Omaha, so far are out of the final round. Both had been active in earlier hearings with their bids for southern Alberta gas.

Some say Clear and Northern now qualify except the fact Alberta won't even talk to them until the northern reserves have been marketed. Under these conditions, why, it's said, should these companies bother to complicate the new hearings and tangle the nerves of FPC officials who get around to their case after this one is over.

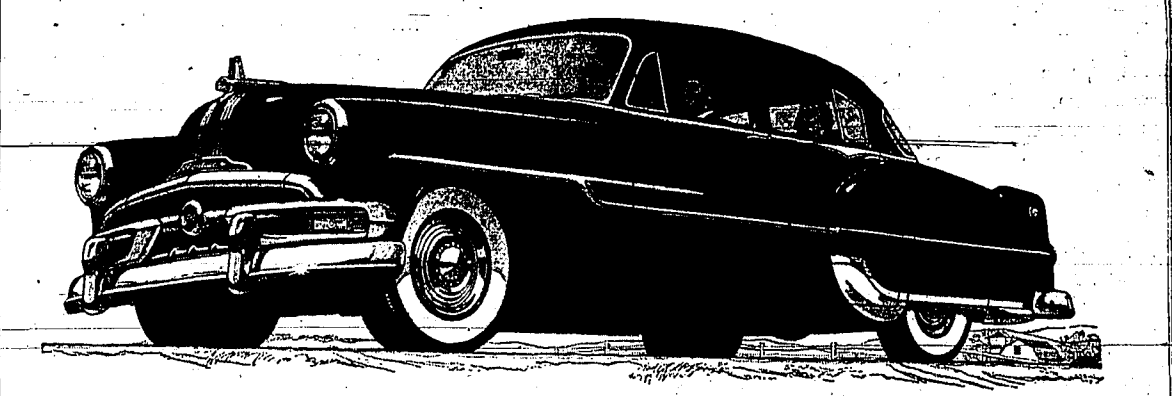

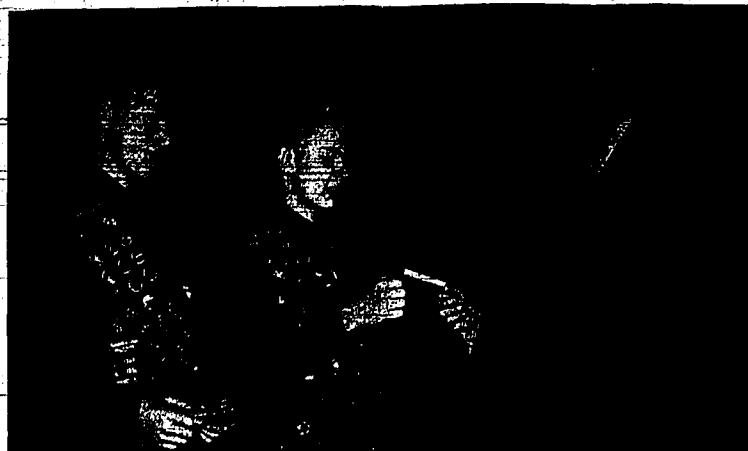

### Tide of Spending Rising New High Levels for States

The tide of spending is rising to new high levels in the states. The budgets still are being prepared. The budgets are recommended plans for spending in the next fiscal period—a year or two years. The legislators can slash or hike the items.

But as the budgets now stand, the increase adds up to 62 million dollars in the 48 states where proposals have been suggested. And in the five states where decreases have been

proposed the reductions add up to \$7 million dollars.

Thus, the over-all result in these states would be a net gain in spending of \$70 million dollars.

The 48 states spent a record total of 13 billion dollars in 1931. The current trend indicates a new record is in the making.

Gov. Earl Warren has asked California lawmakers for a record one-year (1933-34) budget of \$923,851,805—a sum \$2,717,927 higher than 1932-33 expenditures. Most of the additional money was approved by the voters in November for further school support.

Gov. John S. Pine is asking Pennsylvania legislators to adopt a budget of \$1,428,777,243 for a two-year period starting June 1. The total is \$107,743 higher than the budget for the current biennium.

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, New York, has proposed appropriations for one year which total \$1,072,484,440—a drop of \$36,252,228 from the total of appropriations in the present fiscal year.

Those are the only billion-dollar budgets submitted to legislators there far.

States where proposed budgets show reductions are New York, Mas-

sachusetts, Nebraska, Utah and Montana.

States where financial blueprints show increases are Arizona, California, Delaware, Idaho, Indiana, Kansas, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Nevada, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota, Texas, Vermont, Washington and West Virginia.

New or higher taxes are being considered in some states. Other states are considering reductions.

Gov. J. Bracken Lee told Utah legislators:

“I urge again that you give first

consideration—to-the-long-abused and forgotten taxpayers by reducing taxes.”





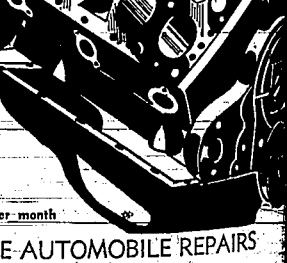

**Eisenhower's Denunciation of Secret Agreement May Give Hope to Millions**

By LEON DENNEN  
 NEW YORK, Feb. 7 (U.P.A.)—President Eisenhower's virtual denunciation of the Yalta agreement may give new hope to the millions of Americans who long regarded the 1945 treaty as the instrument which first subjected them to red domination.

It may well strengthen their resistance at the very moment when Moscow seeks to obliterate the last traces of satellite independence.

The president thus fired the first shot in the new psychological offensive against communism in his state of the union message to congress.

Between the west and Russia lie ninety nations, once independent, but today entirely dominated by Moscow largely as a result of the Yalta agreement. Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Rumania, Bulgaria and Albania—They represent a population of more than 100 million Europeans.

The inducement shown Russia by the U. S. and Britain during the 1945 negotiations at Yalta virtually gave Stalin the go-ahead signal to deprive these nations of their freedom.

The Yalta agreement—especially the secret clauses now repudiated by President Eisenhower—acknowledged in effect Russia's right to carve out for herself after the end of the last war a "sphere of influence" not only in eastern Europe but also in northern Asia.

The Kremlin agreed to help the allies in the war against Japan—but for a stiff price. Stalin demanded, in addition to influence in eastern Europe and the Balkans, the awards of Japan's northern islands—the Kuriles and South Sakhalin—as well as a free hand in Outer Mongolia, Manchuria, and other parts of China.

He thus prepared the ground for the war in Korea and Moscow's bid for a German position in Asia.

The late President Roosevelt and Britain's Prime Minister Winston Churchill accepted Stalin's terms—though they were met at the expense of our Chinese ally and with-
