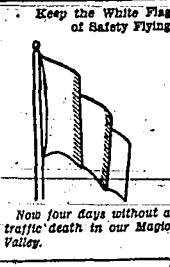

### Care of Your Children

What are parents to do with a child, or about a child, who calls them "nanna," "daddy," "kicks" them? I do not go along with the people who say, "Oh, he is only a baby, he will outgrow it," I am not so sure he will.

To begin with, I would like to know how the child got the idea that such behavior would be tolerated. Children of a family whose good manners are usual, all treating each other with courtesy, are not likely to fly into tempers. So, family background must have something to do with it.

But suppose a well-behaved child surprises his father by making a temper tantrum? It should not be condoned. Isolate that child, put him apart in the quiet of a vacant room where he has no audience. Say nothing, but let him know you are so disappointed. Tell him that when he behaves, he can come out again. If he continues to yell, pay no attention.

Once I heard of a small child who had been treated this way, sitting before the mirror watching her tears, trying with her fingers to draw them down further on her cheeks. She was absorbed in this for a few minutes, until the tears had dried and she started yodeling again. But she weaned soon and went to sleep.

When the child is quiet, tell him that his behavior was bad; that everybody feels bad sometimes, but they should control their tempers; that tantrums are always punish-

### Mrs. Paterson Will Represent Bellevue in "Mother" Contest

In 1941 the Patersons moved to Bellevue where they bought the home in which they now live. For a time Paterson worked at the Carey dam. Then he took a job in the forest. In 1940 he became janitor of the Bellevue school, a position he still holds. Because of his physical handicap, his wife and children help him with the work.

Robert, 20, now is a wheat and cattle rancher at Pullman, Wash. He completed three and one-half years at the University of Idaho. Their second child, Mrs. Catherine Deemer, 25, is a graduate of the Bellevue high school and the Boise secretarial school. She is married and has two children.

Jack Paterson, 23, graduated with honors from the University of Idaho. When discharged from the army he plans to return to school to obtain his masters degree in education.

Mrs. Janet Elizabeth Owens, 21, is a housewife and lives in Cedar City, Utah.

Anna Mae Paterson, 19, is also a graduate of the Boise Secretarial school and now is secretary in the Boy Scouts of America office in Boise.

David Paterson is a junior in the Bellevue high school. He is treasurer of his class and president of the Youth Resurrection council. Last year he earned a scholarship in this high school.

Four of Mrs. Paterson's children have been valedictorians of their graduating classes. Along with raising her family, she found time for community projects. She has done more Red Cross knitting than any other one person in Blaine county. Mrs. S. C. 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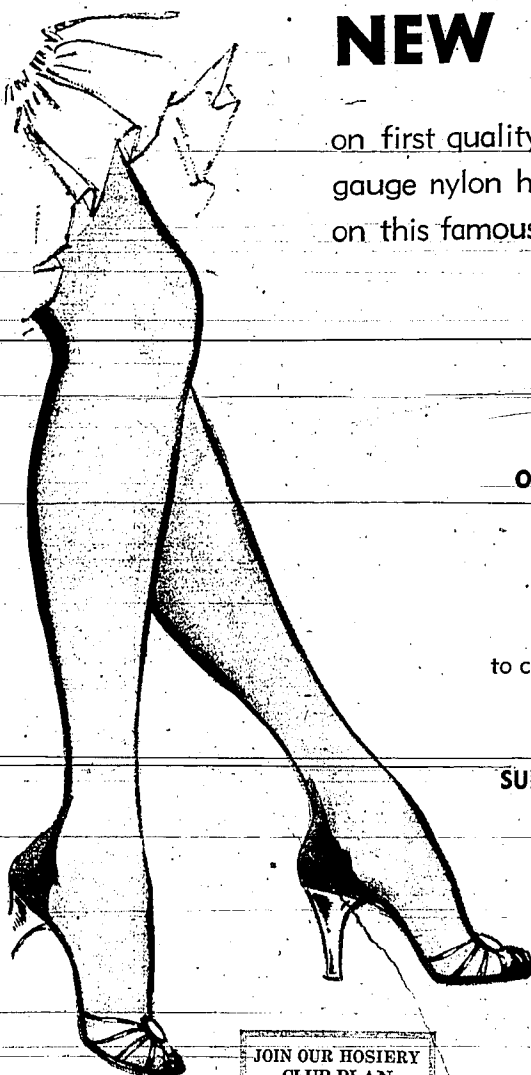
