S. Eyes Strict Embargo on Red China Shipments

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11 (AP)—The Eisenhower administration today announced a new embargo on all shipments of U. S. supplies to join in an embargo on all shipments of red China as an alternative to proposals for a risky blockade.

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Veterans Law Adds to GOP Jobs Trouble

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11 (AP)—The Eisenhower administration today announced a new law which will add to the GOP's jobs trouble.

The law, which is part of a bill to amend the National Defense Education Act, will require that 100,000 federal jobs not classified by civil service are to be filled by veterans' preference.

Thousands of other jobs still are being held up by the failure of the administration to appoint division chiefs, or by difficulties with congress over men selected.

"People just aren't going to stand still," one western senatorial aide warned. He said his office and other offices are being bombarded with demands for action.

The biggest loss of patronage for the Eisenhower administration is in the postoffice department, where a new incoming regime once had a clear field. In 1952, however, the four-year term for first, second and third class postmasters was altered to life tenure.

The majority of the 40,845 postmasters in the U. S. are thus protected from summary dismissal. The number of changes being required for firing, although fourth class postmasters are not protected, is estimated to be 10,000.

Irrigators Protesting Power Rate Increase

RUPERT, Feb. 11—Resolutions seeking lower rates, opposing increases in rates and cash advances and protesting the present system of demand charges were taken to the Idaho Power company office in Boise Wednesday by representatives of irrigation farmers on the North Side pumping division of the Minidoka project.

The resolutions were passed at a protest meeting of between 40 and 50 power users here Tuesday afternoon. Ralph E. Gale, vice president of the Idaho Power company; R. F. Ball, assistant to the president of the power company; Donald Bailey and Ralph Carpenter, Twin Falls, met with the group.

Lawrence Duffin, Rupert attorney and north side irrigator, called the meeting and presided. The meeting was held at the Rupert cafe.

Idaho Power company promised that it would meet with the irrigators and originally offered "dump power" at a cheap rate. "Dump power" is power that is generated during the summer months but which was being transmitted out of the area because there was no use for it locally.

The project grew so fast Idaho Power discovered it was going to have to increase power rates to meet the demand and the demand is continuing to grow. Duffin said.

The "dump" power has not been used in Idaho and the northwest. The Jerome Chamber of Commerce's original barter program presented three middlemen and two engineers during the quarter meeting.

Those who attended were: Rubeck and Fred Burdette.

"No application to increase the power rates to irrigators has been made by the power company to the public utilities commission but the proposal presented to the users by Idaho Power company officials is for a 15 per cent increase. A 15 per cent increase to eight well-pumpers, who now use eight well-pumpers, would mean a 125 per cent increase in the revenue of the company by 1.2 per cent, Duffin explained.

"The power company officials claim the increase in rate is needed so more revenue can be obtained to pay for the cost of the project," he said.

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New Cut Due For Controls

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11 (AP)—Informal sources said today that the government plans to end price controls probably tomorrow—on milk and other dairy products, poultry and eggs.

The orders would be the second big step in the "orderly" decontrol of prices. The first step was the decontrol of prices of wheat, corn and other grain products by President Eisenhower in his state of the union message.

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Ex-OPA Aide Named As Prices Consultant

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11 (AP)—James F. Brownlee, New York investment banker, was named today a government consultant on price and other economic controls.

The action was interpreted widely as meaning: 1. The Eisenhower administration has decided that remaining price controls should be removed progressively rather than wiped out by a single sweeping order.

2. Further study is planned, and Brownlee's advice is desired on the question of whether stand-by controls legislation should be enacted in the form of a price control act in event of emergency. The present controls law expires April 30.

The POW command said its revised figures for Monday's riot now total 40 deaths and 40 injuries, including eight seriously hurt.

The riot began when prisoners broke up red songs and threw rocks at guards. Allied soldiers broke up the demonstration with tear gas. The commotion spread to a number of other camps. The riot was sprayed into the prison compound.

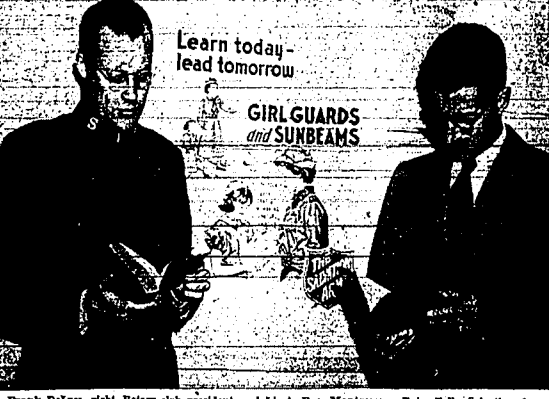

Dredging Bill Given Senate By Committee

BOISE, Feb. 11 (AP)—The senate fish and game committee has introduced a bill to require dredge operators to smooth over any ground they disturb "reasonably comparable with the natural contour of the ground prior to such disturbance." Chairman Ben Wherry, R., Fayette, said the committee decided to introduce that bill rather than a more stringent one requiring replacing of top soil and replacing of vegetation in hopes of getting a start toward anti-dredging legislation. The bill also requires that when dredge-operators disturb a watercourse they shall replace it "on a manner fits with pool structure conducive to good fish and wildlife habitat and recreational use." The operators also would be required to construct settling ponds to clarify water used in mining processes before it is discharged into streams. Administration of the act would be by the state board of land commissioners. The board would grant permits, inspect the operations, and be permitted to halt dredging if the operators violate the law. The companies would file bonds of \$500 per acre which would be forfeited in case of a violation. Violations of the law would be misdemeanors, and persons injured by the operations could sue for damages.

New Code on Idaho Water Wells Sought

BOISE, Feb. 11.—A new code to regulate Idaho's mushrooming ground water irrigation was introduced in the Idaho senate Tuesday.

The bill by the irrigation and water resources committee declared that under the doctrine of "first in time is first in right" a recognized, reasonable exercise of this right shall not block local economic development of underground water resources, but early appropriations of underground water shall be protected.

The bill also provides for the establishment of ground water districts, similar to surface water districts, and combinations of the two when underground water supplies affect surface water rights.

Under the bill, the reclamation engineer is required to advise the applicant for drilling permits on all wells not just the larger ones, as is present. He also is given authority to require capping and proper construction of wells to see that water isn't wasted.

Could Out Right He also could cut off pumping rights as he can surface rights now, to see that water rights are filled in their proper sequence. In former cases, his protest would be heard by a board consisting of the reclamation engineer, an engineer or geologist appointed by the district judge, and an irrigation farmer. The board's decision could be appealed to district court.

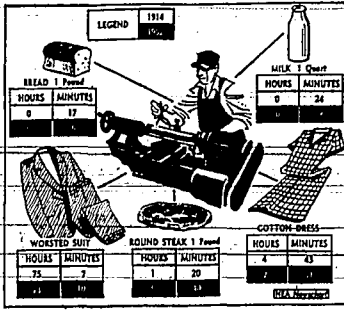
