## Price Fall Won't Bring Hasty Act, Benson Declares

PAUL, Minn., Feb. 12 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Arthur Benson said here last night farm price declines at his department into "ill-considered ac-

...gave assurance present price-support programs are not being stamped into ill-considered action by the price declines during the past month, nor do we propose to be stamped," Benson stated.

On the question of price supports, the secretary said he would repeat, that price support programs now in effect or previously will be continued.

1953 Prices "This means price support for the wheat you will seed this spring at a level which will reflect a national farm price of about \$2.21 a bushel, means a support for corn equal to 90 cents a bushel, for barley \$1.24, for soybeans \$1.43 and for flaxseed \$3.70 per bushel."

Benson said that "price support" will be carried out in the most equitable manner possible.

Blanket Fledges "There will be no blanket promises to embark on actions which have not been given authority to invoke nor the means to implement."

Secretary Benson made it clear that he is opposed to the program of price supports.

## Convicted Spies to Learn Execution Date Monday

NEW YORK, Feb. 12 (AP)—Convicted atom spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, their last-ditch appeal for clemency turned down by President Eisenhower, will learn next Monday the new date for their execution in Sing Sing prison's electric chair.

Legal sources here said they believed Judge Irving R. Kaufman, who presided at the couple's 16-day trial in 1951, would set an early execution date, possibly during the first half of March.

Emmanuel H. Bloch, attorney for the Rosenbergs, said he would make every effort to save them. He had these avenues open to him:

2. He may ask the circuit court of appeal or the supreme court for a stay of execution.

3. He may apply to the supreme court for a writ of certiorari for the granting of a review of the case.

The supreme court twice before has refused to review the case and the likelihood of the Rosenbergs' appeal being successful is considered doubtful.

### TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Wall street's restrained reaction to President Eisenhower's policies and principles has failed so far to bear out Harry F. Tucker's campaign slogan that a "triumph would mean the transfer of government from Washington to the financial canyons of downtown New York."

Looking at the national and world scene, despite the return of conservatism to power, Tucker's prediction of "ever steady rises in stock values, with a few intermittent dull weeks, with a few more occasional industrial strikes" such as "work stoppages" as aircraft, steel and motor gains only fractionally, seem to be borne out.

THE PRESIDENT WINS IN CONGRESS  
President Eisenhower's policies could have been rather surprised at the ease by which his reorganization powers bill swept through congress.

A month ago the President apparently intended to let leaders in congress bring their own reorganization issue without a fight. Later he changed his mind. His first major test of strength in congress ended in a resounding victory for him. It was something for him, for congress and for the nation that the vote turned out as it did.

Ever since the President took the same power former President Truman had reorganized the executive branch of the government. He was clearly in the right in his request for a bill which would force congress to meet a constitutional majority to determine whether reorganization measure be presented. Some leaders of congress wanted to allow a simple majority of those voting on the floor at any time to determine whether a reorganization measure be presented. This would have made it much easier for the house or senate to kill one of the President's proposals.

At first Mr. Eisenhower agreed to the suggestion in a committee hearing. Experienced workers in the executive department of the government were displeased with the proposal. They feared his acquiescence meant either that he did not understand the importance of the issue or that he was too anxious to avoid an early fight for principle with congress.

The President changed his mind, though, and insisted on all the reorganization powers Mr. Truman had. Ever since this vote was taken the tremendous power a newly-elected President has in congress. There should be no doubt in his mind about it now, and he should use that power in behalf of all the people and without unjustified surrender to factions in congress.

It is probable that it will be almost of some of his control over congress soon enough by the simple factor of familiarity whether he is right or wrong. He will lose more power through his inevitable mistakes. To insure maximum effectiveness in his executive powers when he is right and it swiftly. ### HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

The decision of the American Federation of Labor to intrude uninvitedly and with delay in the "autonomy" of the longshoremen's union in New York harbor is not a astounding change but it does represent a moral victory for the workers of that union fairly represented their interests.

President Eisenhower made some remarks in a press conference which gave a hope that he will use the curtain of the press of the unions. With the death of Green and Phil Murray the two most obstinate opponents of reform have vanished. They were ignorant men and they both lacked moral courage and morality. But they did represent the political forces but as millions of individual human beings, could not force to use the power of Green and Murray's to drive out criminals and communists and to protect the workers from the developed ruthlessness of the union power. But they would not listen and they had to die before a glimmer of reason and decency could be seen in this connection by the AFL in the longshoremen's case.

The unions have developed as much strength as the old trusts had when congress, the states and the press are fighting the greedy monopolists and the old supreme court was protecting them.

They now urge international politics—mysterious, dangerous and unprincipally by the state department and the central intelligence agency.

President Eisenhower knows this, of course, and it seems that when he has a chance to study the case he will agree that the unions have grown too big, have too much power, have exceeded their legitimate purposes and should be cut down to size.

This can be done by laws, without the slightest harm to any rank and file labor's individual interests.

Many of them were illiterate in a sense. That is, they were not admitted to membership but were allowed to work under "permits" issued by the hoodlums. The actual jobs were owned by the criminals and these croppers did the actual work but had to surrender 25 per cent, more or less, of their wages to these croppers—the jobs.

This fantastic condition was not merely protected but defended by the AFL. Indeed, in the lack of any action to the contrary, that still is the principle of the AFL.

The case was further involved by the national "hourly" broadcast. Strands of the gigantic espionage web were anchored in Los Alamos, Canada, New York, London, Moscow, and other cities.

The net also involved important names: Physicist Alan Nunn May and Col. Klaus Fuchs, a member of the British atomic energy mission. And such unlikely names as "Dave From Pittsburgh" and "The Lone Ranger."

The name of Rosenberg did not appear until long after the Russians exploded their atomic bomb in September, 1949. Even then atomic experts were wondering why the rods had waited so long.

A year earlier it had become apparent that "the world's best kept secret" had been exposed. The Kremlin knew more about atomic energy than all but a handful of men among the democracies.

The FBI was called in to trace what looked like espionage. It constructed a mythical spy. He was high up in the atomic bomb organization. He had access to American and British information.

The trail led to London. And within months the spy had called Dr. Klaus Fuchs. Gained by complicity, he confessed quickly. But he had been merely an assistant serving a cause. He knew no names. Not even that of his colleague, Alan Nunn May, who had been sharing secrets with the rods, too.

But Fuchs could identify the courier who had picked up the information. Not the fellow's name, but enough to make it easy for the FBI in New York to arrest Harry Gold.

Under aliases and with plenty of Russian-supplied money, Gold had been liaison man for the Kremlin. He had worked with Anatoli Yakovlev, Soviet vice-consul in New York. They met on subway trains, in front of statues, at "buy" intersections. Gold passed his information and received orders.

In his confession, Gold named Fuchs, May, Yakovlev. He also named "The Lone Ranger," U. S. Army sergeant, David Greenglass, and Greenglass' brother-in-law, Julius Rosenberg.

"Fantasio," said Rosenberg at his arraignment. "It's something like kids hear on the Lone Ranger."

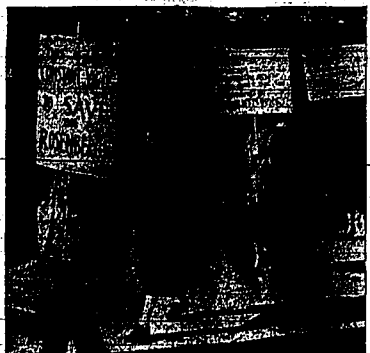
"Who knows," said Kaufman in pronouncing the death sentence on the Rosenbergs, but that millions of innocent people pay the price of your treason."

The judge was quite certain that the alien couple standing before him had contributed heavily to the communist aggression in Korea. And for their part in a world-wide spying that had given the A-bomb to the Russians, the Rosenbergs were sentenced to the electric chair.

The huge spy-net already had been burned out. Spy-master Kackovlev had fled to Moscow. British physicist Fuchs had confessed. Canadian atom scientist May had confessed. So had spy-courier Harry Gold, who named the Rosenbergs in the plot.

Said the Rosenbergs: "We cannot

assert often or emphatically enough our complete innocence."

Thus, much of the Rosenberg story came from Ethel's brother, David Greenglass, who played a strong-supporting role. His reward for state's evidence was a light sentence of 18 years.

An army sergeant and expert machinist, Greenglass had been assigned in 1946 to a lab in a new restricted factory outside Albuquerque, N. M. Neither he nor the other 200,000 workers at Los Alamos knew what it was all about.

His wife, Ruth, told him. She had learned from their brother-in-law, Julius Rosenberg, that an atomic bomb was under construction. She also told David Julius was now doing what he'd always wanted to do—giving information to the Russians.

Julius and Ethel had broken their connections with the Communist Party had stopped reading the Daily Worker, had stayed away from party meetings. The business of espionage called for people above suspicion.

It had been luck for Julius to find his wife's brother is a key position. For years he had carried Greenglass with presents and party literature, until he could call the younger man his protégé.

In spite of Fuchs' confession Julius and Ethel were expected to blow cover. But neither Julius nor Ethel Rosenberg was surprised on July 1, 1950, when the FBI knocked on their door.

The big surprise must have been in Kaufman's death sentence—a sentence as historic as the espionage for which it was handed down by the court.

The test at the mint here is one of the oldest procedures in United States government history. It was begun in 1793 by Alexander Hamilton, first treasury secretary, at a time when a "bad coin" could mean hanging for the counterfeiters.

The coins are checked for weight, measurement and metallic content.

### USAF Quits Using Mustangs in War

SEOUL, Korea, Feb. 12.—The U. S. air force retired its last propeller-driven P-51 Mustang from the air force, the "workhorse" of the air force, the shark-like Mustang faded havoc in World War II and performed yeoman service in close support missions in Korea.

The air force announced that Mustang units began converting to an unidentified type of jet fighter-combat last June. The Republic of Korea air force, however, still uses the P-51.

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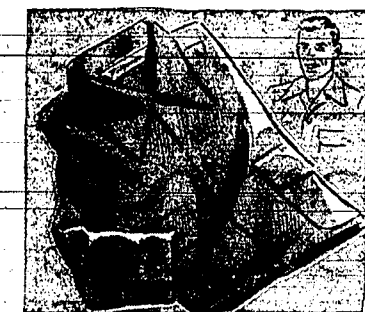
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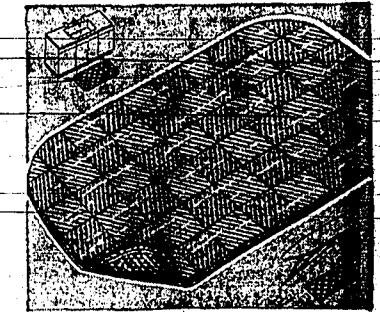

### M'Kay Asked For Study of Land Actions

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12 (AP)—Sen. William A. Dawson, R. Utah, has asked Secretary of Interior Douglas M'Kay to make an "immediate" review of "large tracts" of public land withdrawn from use in the past 20 years.

Dawson wrote M'Kay that he questions "the continuing trend of keeping large tracts of land—capable of multiple uses, such as oil and mineral exploration—closed and idle."

The lands were withdrawn, he said, by executive order which did not allow for public protest and for which no machinery for review exists. In Utah, he says, 25 percent of the state is federal domain and subject to withdrawal.

Dawson said he does not question withdrawals for parks and national forests. But he said, withdrawn tracts include areas earmarked for dams and power sites by the bureau of reclamation under plans now abandoned.

"Yet the lands withdrawn to protect the sites now needed have never been reopened," he said.

### 23 Navy Men Getting Tough Test on "Sub"

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12 (AP)—Twenty-three navy men who have been sealed up in a submarine since the middle of January probably will continue their volunteer scientific endurance experiment for another month, or more.

Navy officials declined Wednesday to give the exact time during which an officer and 22 enlisted men will remain in the submarine Haddock at the New London, Conn., navy yard. They are taking part in a test conducted with view to eventual use of nuclear-powered, or atomic, undersea boats.

But it was learned that plans originally made for the men to remain aboard the "buttoned up" boat for about two months.

Rear Adm. Homer Wallin, chief of the bureau of ships explained the test was to determine how men would react in a nuclear engine submarine which will be able to remain submerged almost indefinitely. The Haddock is not submerged but is closed up to simulate submergence conditions. Navy scientists, including a medical officer, board the Haddock frequently, using an airtight hatch, to check on conditions and talk with the men.

### Aid Cost Cited

ESSLINGEN, Germany, Feb. 12 (AP)—The cost of rehabilitating American families stricken by last week's floods in Britain has been estimated at \$50,000, the American Red Cross headquarters here reported today.

### Tentative Accord Reached on Wage

GARFIELD, Utah, Feb. 12 (AP)—Week-long mediation sessions, several lasting all night, produced a tentative agreement today that would end the long threat of a strike at the big Garfield smelter of the American Smelting and Refining company.

The plant processes concentrates from nearby mines and mills of the Kennecott Copper Corporation, whose Utah operation produces about one third of the nation's domestic supply of copper.

Federal mediators said the agreement would be submitted to the more than 1,500 members of the CIO United Steel Workers union at the smelter for ratification. Retroactive to last September, the new contract would be binding through Aug. 31 of this year.

Robert E. Talbot, who also gets \$18,000 a year as secretary of air, was not asked about his salaries by senators. He said he drew three of them from a family corporation, Electric Auto-Ind and Standards Packaging.

### New Defense Bosses Received 90 Per Cent Slash in Salaries

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12 (AP)—Uncle Sam is paying five-top defense department officials less than 10 cents for each dollar they formerly received as executives in private business.

A check of senate testimony by the five new defense leaders showed their combined annual pay and bonuses in private life amounted to more than \$1,000,000 a year. Their combined new salaries total less than \$100,000 annually.

Robert T. Anderson, secretary of the new officials agreed to sell or give away stock and personal holdings of more than five million dollars in order to qualify.

But one prospective official, Albert C. Sprague, passed up the post of undersecretary of the air force rather than sell his stock in a family-owned electronics firm.

Sprague said he decided against selling his stock for fear control of the firm might pass to outside investors with "consequent possible ill effects on the community."

The electronics company is a North Adams, Mass., and Sprague said \$314,607 worth of business it did with the air force last year was less than one per cent of its gross output.
