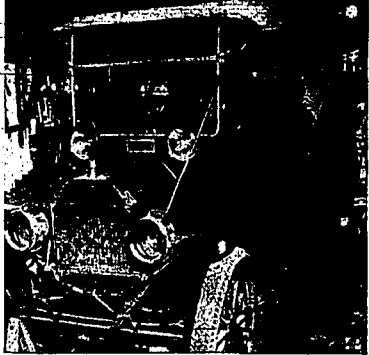

**TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG**

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower's comprehensive economic program, although disclosed so far only dimly, contemplates stability of prices, wages and general business activity at a level and more normal returns to free markets for agricultural goods and services in every field, with a minimum of government interference. It is a revolution to Roosevelt-Truman philosophy.

The plan was evolved carefully in six-day conferences with the staff of business, industrial and financial experts he has assembled at Camp David as members of his official family. Every act and word since Jan. 20 reveals the underlying purpose and objective.

Although it will be a surgical operation, and politically unpopular in certain circles, Eisenhower believes the deflationary maneuver can be accomplished without serious damage to the labor, agriculture, consumers, the business community.

Without such a readjustment, he envisages an eventual sharp rise in raw domestic and world-wide repercussions, for America's industrial and financial stability alone preserves today's tenuous peace.

**COURT DISABTED**—The new administration obviously does not share Truman's unbounded confidence in endless and ever-increasing prosperity. This is evident from the changes in the duties of the comptroller to speak cheerily of national income of a trillion dollars, which would permit higher budgets, taxes, expenses and permanent good times for all.

The hard-headedness of Washington as a nation overextended in every field of human activity. Unless these mortgages and future commitments are gradually reduced, they think our people court disaster. Here are only a few of the unhappy realities supporting this conviction:

**ARTIFICIAL PEAK**—The public debt approaches the legal maximum of 275 billion dollars, as against \$140 billion in 1940. The Truman 1954 budget totals almost 90 billion dollars, a 50 percent increase over 1940. Taxes may rise to 70 billion, or 65 billion more than 1950.

The government spending stimulation, everybody has gone up a spire. Consumer credit amounts to 23 billion, a 20 billion increase. Retail sales came to 165 billion last year, they were 133 billion before World War II. Everything has hit an artificial peak—real estate, industrial facilities, productive capacity, bank loans, prices, wages, earnings. They have become so swollen they have no meaning.

**FREE ECONOMY REINSTATEMENT**—The movement of elimination of the federal stimulus and reinstatement of a free economy already is under way, albeit gradually.

Secretary Benson, for instance, believes general farm price supports should be supplanted by more orderly growing and marketing methods. The Federal Reserve makes for unbalanced over-production. There is no reason for soil conservation payments for the normal upkeep of farms.

**KEY TO SUCCESS**—The key to success lies in the attack on inflation—that is, stabilizing the dollar so a general economic balance will result. This must be done quickly, or important groups will be hurt in the deflationary process, as farmers are now.

The method for achieving this goal will be drastic spending cuts and a more orderly management of the public debt. "Econ" and Secretary Humphrey already have attacked this problem aggressively in their first month in office. Severe federal economy underlies the whole move for economic freedom.

**VIEWS OF OTHERS**

**WHY NOT AN N. T. B. DAY?**

The Japanese—or is it the Chinese?—were forgotten to be said to mark New Year's day by canceling old debts and starting afresh. There is something appealing about this idea, though it hardly seems economically feasible.

We suggest a similar national observance in this country with some different ideas: A day to return all borrowed books.

Our own bookshelves contain many books with other people's names written on the fly-leaves. They are books we have borrowed, or books other people have loaned us (there's a difference). In the case of some of them, we've even lost track of the owners, but we can think of them of probably a dozen of our books which either repose on other people's bookshelves or have been lost long ago.

**MOSCOW-ON-THE-PARADISE**

The residents of Moscow, Idaho, are repeatedly called on to defend the name of their pleasant town because of the dwindling reputation of that older and larger Moscow across the sea. Lately it was the World Health Organization assembly in Geneva who confused the two Moscovs. They found, however, that a spontaneous \$100 bill had come from the green northwest, not red Russia.

Moscow, Idaho, is never long left unaware of its questionable distinction as the largest American namesake of the Soviet capital. (There are also smaller Moscovs in Arkansas, Idaho, Kansas, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Ohio and Vermont.) The chamber of commerce has received hundreds of letters suggesting a name change. One man wrote from Wisconsin recommending that the town shorten its name and just call itself "Cov." In the past, on May 1, the day red square in the bigger Moscow turned to the marching feet of the citizens of the Idaho Moscow have made capital of the name by distributing badges that proclaim the wearers' faith in American democracy. They are sure that the citizens of the Idaho Moscow of Moscow, Idaho, will not soon forget the play on names. 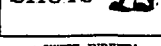

The uniform code, submitted for the state legislature's consideration, is patterned after recommendations of the national conference on street and highway safety. According to its sponsors, the proposed code has the endorsement of the President's highway safety conference and 38 state highway safety conferences.

It covers the field of uniform traffic laws, standards of road design and use, traffic signs and signals, regulations for pedestrians, penalties for violations, speed limits and all the other factors bearing on highway safety.

As it now stands, Idaho doesn't even have a speed limit. If a driver "can prove he's operating his car reasonably," he can barrel it down the road at 125 miles an hour without fear of any serious consequences in court.

There have been so many interpretations of our ineffective traffic laws, that the average driver can all but get by with murder, so long as he is not caught in the actual process of killing someone. And even in such extreme instances, some drivers responsible for traffic deaths have had their licenses suspended by courts, only to continue as potential killers on our highways.

The proposed code establishes a speed limit and serious penalties for such offenses as reckless driving, negligent homicide and drunken driving. Upon conviction, for instance, a driver responsible for negligent homicide would be subject to a prison sentence of one year, a fine of \$1,000, or both, and his driver's license could be revoked permanently.

On first offense, an individual found guilty of reckless driving could be sentenced to a minimum of five days in jail and a maximum fine of \$300. Upon second conviction, he would be liable for a maximum jail sentence of six months and revocation of his license for one year.

There will be a lot of opposition to a 60-mile-per-hour speed limit and various other provisions in the proposed highway code, and it will remain for the legislature to decide whether it's more concerned about such opposition, or has a higher regard for the mounting toll of human life being lost on our highways—a record that's most disgraceful.

The legislative committee of the Magic Valley Safety conference has gone over the proposed code in detail, and with recommendations for minor changes to make it even more effective, has endorsed the measure whole-heartedly.

Let's hope at long last, the state legislature faces this issue squarely and enacts the legislation that's needed to cope with a problem endangering all of our lives.

**YUGOSLAVIA IS WELCOME**

The news is welcome that the time is drawing closer when Yugoslavia may join Greece and Turkey in a Balkan defense alliance against Russia.

Nobody needs to stress the importance of the Balkan area to the over-all defense of the west. A successful Russian invasion here would turn the western flank and make western Europe difficult if not impossible to protect.

It was recognition of that which finally brought Greece and Turkey into the NATO pact last year. Defense authorities understood their strategic value, and appreciated also that they rank among the stoutest foes of communism.

For many practical reasons, Yugoslavia could not be pulled into NATO. There is strong resistance to that on both sides. Nevertheless, the Yugoslavs, for all their communist government, are seen as a powerful ally. The West might expect aid to flow, and there have been informal strategy talks looking toward a linking of effort in event of a Russian attack.

The plan for a definite pact incorporating Yugoslavia, Greece and Turkey is perhaps the strongest move that can be made for regional arrangement, and it would have all the binding force of any military alliance, yet it would get around the embarrassing business of asking Tito to join the full family.

### Large Check Of U. S. Aids Korean Cash

SEOUL, Korea, Feb. 19 (AP)—The United States handed a \$3,500,000 check today to the South Korean government, initiating a "pay as you go" policy for the new Korean currency.

The policy was suggested by President Syngman Rhee when the U. S. persuaded him to change the South Korean currency from the inflated won to the new wihan.

Claimed \$7 Millions

Rhee claimed the U. S. owed him about \$7 million dollars and said he was not going to "lend" the U. S. any more Korean cash.

Today's payment was made by Lieut. Leonard A. Bacon, Albuquerque, N. M., who acted for the U. S. funding officer in Korea.

Billed for Share

The wihan bought by the U. S. with \$3,500,000 will last about two weeks. The U. N. command in Korea has been spending about \$10 million dollars worth of Korean money a month, with the U. S. billing other nations for their share.

The new wihan currency is worth 80-to-the-dollar. The old won was officially quoted at 200 to the dollar, but it had fallen to 20,000 to \$1 on the black market.

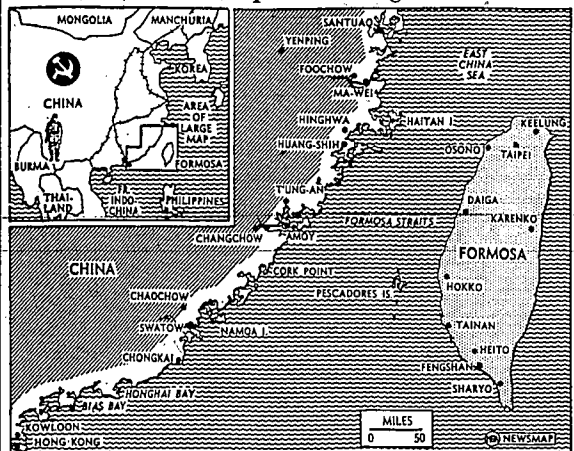

### Drawn-Out Talks Hint Trouble In China-Russia Trade Accord

**WASHINGTON, Feb. 19**—The little offer of strategic value to the Russians, who likewise need industrial production to meet heavy civilian and military goals set by the Kremlin.

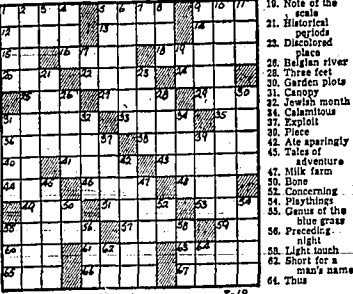
