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Soil to Seed Food as Topic Of Talk Here

The subject of soil conservation was the main topic of a meeting of the Soil Conservation Service in the Idaho Agricultural Experiment Station here today.

W. Douglas, manager of the conservation service, presided at the meeting. Present were Douglas, W. J. Kimbly, county agent, and Kimberly, county agent.

W. Douglas, who is in Idaho on a tour, stressed the use of grass seed in hay and pasture and the use of better fertilizer materials and better application.

Leaves More Roots
Douglas stressed that when a plant is cut, it will leave about one ton of roots in the soil than a crop which is cut.

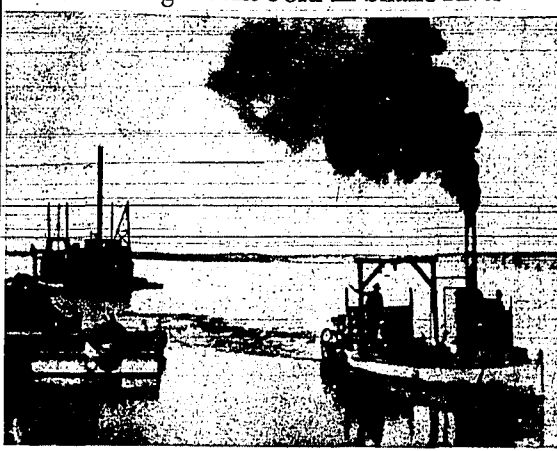
He said a number of rules should be followed in planning a pasture. The first rule is to plant grasses in the best seed available. He said the certified seed is a guarantee of the right type of grass and that the cost of the seed may cost the farmer more money in the long run.

Soil Production
Douglas said that after purchase of a dry place, the farmer should first place a good stand of grass. He advised inoculation of the soil with the right type of bacteria. He said proper drainage is a better method of insuring a better soil than any other method.

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Old Dredge Seeks Gold in Snake River

Old Building in Rupert Turns Out to Be Houseboat Used on Snake River

RUPERT, Feb. 22 — Would you like to own a houseboat, one that plied the waters of Snake river more than a half century ago?

Walter Taylor has one, only when he purchased Tom Maa's home on Fifth street he didn't know he was buying a houseboat. He thought the old building on the back of the lot was "just an old building."

It was when he started to tear down the two-story structure that he discovered he had something different. The floors were two-inch planks of fir, fastened together with six and eight-inch bolts. The walls had siding three inches thick.

Oldtimers recall that the building originally was a houseboat that was used as offices for the superintendent of a gold dredging operation on the Snake river in the 1890's.

George Burroughs and Harry Burroughs, brothers of Edgar Rice Burroughs, the novelist, and Lewis Sweetser, later lieutenant governor of Idaho, are the ones who used the houseboat while looking for gold in the river.

Single-born Yale graduates they named the siding at which they received the supplies, after their alma mater.

A large houseboat containing 10 rooms was used by Harry Burroughs' family. Later it became George Burroughs' home after he married Edna McCoy, Bellevue, Idaho. These houseboats were fastened to the shore by heavy cables and when the supply of gold was exhausted in one place they were moved to a new location. When the dredging operations were discontinued they were moved to the island near the Mindoka rapids, now the site of the Mindoka dam.

J. R. Howells, who operated a ferry across the Snake river in the 1890's, brought the smaller houseboat, the one now owned by Taylor, to Rupert. The boat served in several capacities down through the years, including ice house, horse racing stable and warehouse.

Third Perrin, Oden, who had a homestead near Burley, purchased the larger one and used it as a home for three years. To be near his land he towed the boat to a spot near the railroad bridge.

Mrs. Sam Buckley, Burley, the only surviving member of the family, recalls that the trip was uneventful except for getting stuck on a few sandbars and some trouble rounding Jackson Island near Montgomery ferry.

After Perrin had built a house on his homestead he built a timber for the construction of a toll bridge between Burley and Heyburn. Some of the planks still are in use on the bridge just above the railroad bridge.

A. C. DeMayo, Rupert, says the Burroughs brothers and Sweetser began dredging the Snake river in 1892 near the mouth of the Raft river. They met with considerable success and consequently built a large dredge. Associated with them in the new project was Gov. John Sparks of Nevada, the governor's son, Walter Sparks, and H. V. Van der Oregon Shortline. For several years they extracted \$50,000 worth of gold a year from the river.

Chiang Expected to Make Only Small Raids on Reds

TAIPEH, Formosa, Feb. 23 — Chiang Kai-shek's military operations against the Chinese Reds probably will be a series of nuisance raids by air and from nationalist hold bases on the island of Hainan, according to well-informed sources forecast today that these will be carried out by Chiang's best striking force—a combat organization of some 20,000 men, concentrated on eight island bases stretching from Swatow northward along the coast.

Their objective will be to seize red prisoners, seize supplies and keep the red defenses along the coast of Hainan.

Admittedly these attacks would not set up a beachhead on the China mainland, but for the foreseeable future, force the communist Chinese to divert forces from Korea.

Those more ambitious projects are for the future and will come only if and when the Eisenhower administration pledges extensive and continuing military aid to the U. S. navy and air forces. What's more, to enable a full-scale attack on the mainland, the United States will have to send substantial additional materiel and personnel.

Those are the realistic conclusions of the Chinese military and political leaders and the U. S. military advisers with whom this correspondent has talked.

A major assault calling for early employment of Chiang's Formosa-based ground forces either against the China mainland or big strategic Hainan island is out of the question at this time for two principal reasons:

1. The nationalists on Formosa simply are not prepared for such an ambitious move.
2. Conditions on the mainland are not favorable to such a concerted undertaking.

Estimates of Chiang's Formosa-based troops range from 600,000 to as low as 200,000 with widely varying appraisal of the extent of their equipment, training and combat-worthiness.

But nationalist leaders from Chiang Kai-shek down are convinced that the nuisance raids will become more active and eventually possibly by the end of the year, create conditions for more ambitious actions could be planned.

The guerrilla force that might eventually blow in its lot with the nationalists was estimated to have as many as 500,000 organized men. On the theory that nothing succeeds like success, sources making the estimate also believe other mainland Chinas would turn on their red mates once the ball got rolling.

VAN FLEET'S RECORD

Gen. James Van Fleet's welcome wherever he goes in the United States should be a warm and rewarding one. He has earned the retirement he seems to be entering upon so reluctantly.

In 20 months of service in Korea coincided with some of the most difficult days of the war there. He was always a tower of strength, a figure to inspire men in battle, a soldier's soldier.

There are those who say that in this man was too little of the broader political understanding that increasingly seems to be a necessity in top commanders. We do not propose to argue the matter here. Van Fleet's accomplishments in the military sphere alone are more than sufficient to have gained for him the lasting gratitude of the people he has served.

He has seen his military tasks in the large, something that is not just a matter of going to the front today or tomorrow, but a problem of morale, of training men for future duty, of defining goals and ways to achieve them.

Van Fleet first demonstrated these talents notably in the Greek fight against the communist rebels after World War II. Into the game he brought Greek army he infused new spirit. He provided invaluable technical guidance. That was got an assist when Tito closed his Yugoslav border to the rebels after his break with Stalin. Van Fleet can fairly be regarded as a prime factor in the final Greek victory.

In Korea, he built well upon these achievements. He quickly saw the need to train and equip the fighting men on a battlefield—many armies, both to buttress the existing United Nations strength on the battle line and to prepare for the day when the native forces would bear the full burden of defending their soil.

U. S. WATER PROJECTS

Much talk is heard these days about government reorganization as a general proposition, but soon it will have to be translated into specific proposals by President Eisenhower.

No tougher job confronts him than how to consolidate government efforts in the related fields of flood control, river and harbor development, reclamation and irrigation, and soil conservation.

At the present time, these operations are distributed among three agencies—the army engineers, the interior department's bureau of reclamation, and the agriculture department.

The Hoover commission on government reorganization sharply criticized this scattered effort, declared that it produced costly competition among the agencies, and recommended that these functions be brought together under one tent.

Other analysts have made shocking charges against the army engineers (handing flood control and river-harbor work) and the bureau of reclamation. Some have said that the engineers often deliberately understate the costs of projects to assure their approval by congress, and keep a dominant role in the picture. Others have laid cost-estimate errors simply to gross misjudgment.

It happens that both these agencies have many fast friends on Capitol Hill. Any reorganization plan which went the whole way suggested by Mr. Hoover—full merger—would probably be doomed to failure now.

The reclamation bureau is a favorite of western congressmen and has many powerful reasons. The engineers find supporting water development is a big issue. If the analysts are to be believed, neither group is hesitant about using the leverage it has on lawmakers.

Mr. Eisenhower's advisers surely must be aware of these pressures, and the chances are that the President's proposals in this field will fall short of merger and will instead tend to a clarification of function, an elimination of overlapping, a general simplifying and streamlining.

But in any event, the whole story of federal activity in this broad area ought to be thoroughly aired, so the public can understand the problems and so the groundwork can be laid for later more drastic reorganization. If the likely half-way measures prove inadequate,

It was handed out by Big Ten Commissioner Kenneth L. (Tug) Wilson and concurred in by the conference faculty representatives at a special meeting yesterday.

The action does not affect the college's athletic program and all sports, including football, will continue as scheduled at the school.

Michigan State is not an official member of the Big Ten grid family last year.

Wilson ruled that a fund—the Spartan foundation—violated conference aid-to-athletes regulations.

His sentence was probation for a year and an order to "provide adequate assurance" in future investigations and in obtaining the complete records of the foundation.

Michigan State spokesmen maintain the foundation went out of operation months after an investigation by Wilson's office and that its records cannot be made available by the school.

The Big Ten university itself had no connection with the fund, that it was run by alumni, and that they saw no disclosure when its obvious potential should have been the object of searching inquiry by college authorities, but was not.

Big Ten rules forbid an athlete receiving "unearned financial aid while he is treated by the same institution, and by the same procedure, as apply to all students in his institution."
