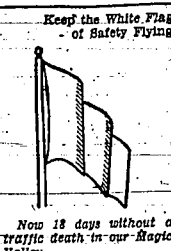

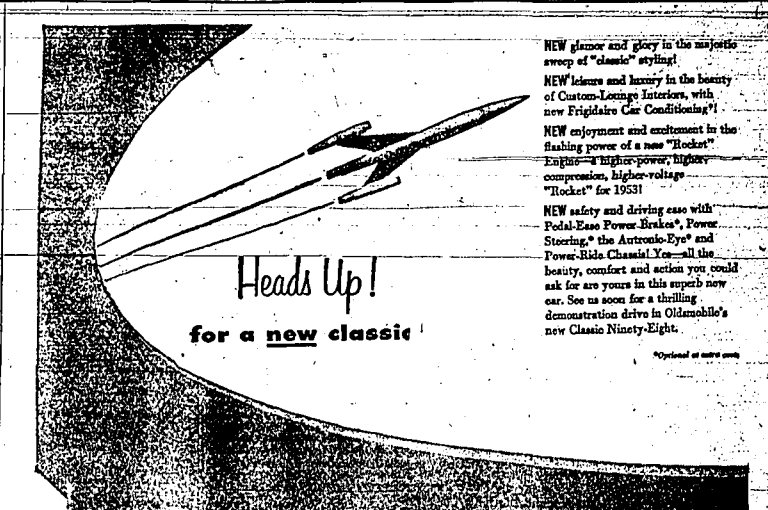

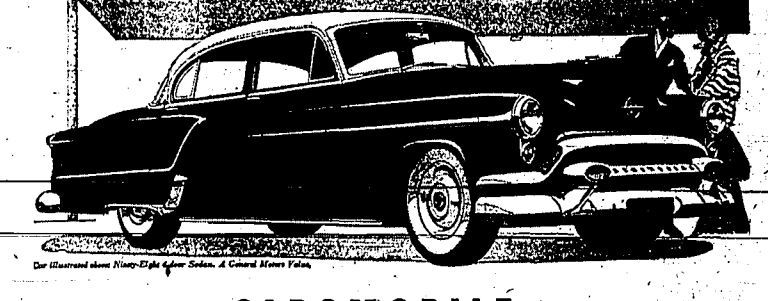

### TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The cumbersome machinery set up by the Eisenhower administration for distribution of federal patronage has provoked numerous complaints among Capitol Hill leaders. While so far unwilling to become entangled with the head-and-tail business, they are reacting them to Sherman Adams, White House chief of staff.

The principal critics consist of the House Republican leadership from New York, New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland. Where else they speak they have been asserting they would enjoy considerable voice in the selection of officials, if not final say. Eisenhower now is finalizing his appointments to be cleared with the governors of those states.

**CARRYING OUT FEEDBACK**—Senator's predicament is understandable, however. He feels that, in addition to his personal popularity and the expectation that he would assume a similar role as Governor Dewey, New York; Driscoll, New Jersey; Pine, Pennsylvania; McKelvin, Maryland, and many other executives.

The belief grows that he is slated for an important post at the expiration of his term, either as secretary of state, attorney general or secretary of defense.

In view of his numerous public appearances, especially at the State Department, his name does not set like a man anticipating retirement.

**WHEN LODGE SPEAKS**—And since the former President has made it frequently clear his own tradition or embarrassing statements, requiring for explicit statement to visit or query Washington for an answer, it is inevitable that he will speak out on short-term and long-range purpose and plans.

Now, when Delegate Logue speaks, he will be speaking for nobody but the President of the United States and the man who let the allied forces to victory over Hitler. Both Eisenhower and Lodge, as well as other friends of the international organization, believe it needs some sort of injection to build up its waning prestige.

**GROWTH OF FSA**—The files of the federal security administration, soon to be elevated to cabinet level, are being reviewed by the Federal Security Council in 1953. And the Eisenhower program calls for further expansion as coverage is extended.

The organization has 49,000 employees. About 21 million have been enrolled—long enough to receive payments for themselves or survivors in their old age. Five billion are now drawing payments.

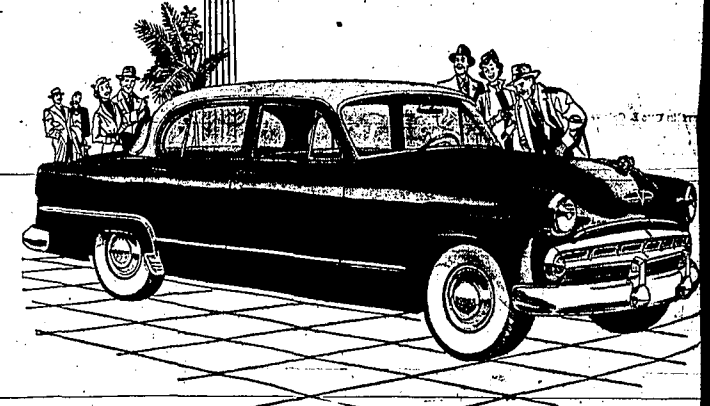

HELENA, Mont., Feb. 24 (AP)—Stephen A. Mitchell, chairman of the Democratic national committee, said last night the Republicans have got to realize farm prices "are just as important as the price of automobiles."

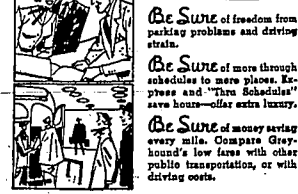
