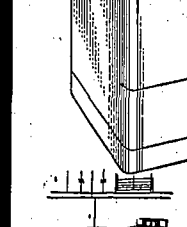



hope to complete the clinic in the morning hours. The public as well as school children are invited. Dr. W. E. Knight, who has taken charge of the clinic at Kimberly Tuesday, reported the program will take in the Hansen and Murtaugh areas. The clinic will be set up in Kimberly high school gymnasium. School buses will bring the school children from Murtaugh and Hansen. Residents are urged to visit the clinic at their convenience. The work will begin at 9 a.m.

Dr. Telford said the immunization work should not be a "seasonal thing." He said if the public made a practice of regular immunization, such a crisis would never occur. For persons who are in constant contact with the public he advised booster immunization every two years.

He corrected the impression that many residents have that they may obtain the shots from their private physicians free of charge. He said they are invited to obtain them from their private physicians, but must expect a charge for the doctor's time and services. Only through the public clinics may they obtain the shots free of charge.

plans are being made to test the throats of all school teachers in the area.

He also announced immunization clinics will be held Tuesday at Kimberly and Rupert.

Dr. Telford described efforts to cope with the epidemic threat as a two-prong offensive of immunization and isolation.

"If we can get 90 to 95 per cent of the public immunized, we'll see an end to the crisis," he declared.

Meanwhile, the work of tracing and isolating the carriers of the disease, spearheaded by Dr. Cecil B. Reinstein, Hamilton, Mont. U.S. department of health epidemiologist, gathers momentum. Dr. Reinstein spent Friday and Saturday in Buhl studying case histories.

Incidence of the disease has centered chiefly in the Buhl area. Dr. Telford said Saturday the count of cases in Twin Falls county stood at 34.

Dr. Telford noted Dr. Reinstein's broad experience in work of this kind has made him invaluable not only in efforts to trace the outbreak of diphtheria to its source but as an adviser in every phase of the work.

The professional staff of the district health unit has been doubled and a number of volunteers enlisted since the outbreak occurred, the director declared.

Throat tests are being made on

the school teachers of Buhl. Arrangements have been made to make similar tests on the teachers of Murtaugh and Rupert. Plans are being made to test the teachers in Burley. Dr. Telford said he plans to contact Twin Falls school officials on checking throats of the local teachers.

Such tests have been made on all persons known to have contacted the isolated cases of the disease, and area doctors are submitting cultures taken from the "suspicious throats" which come to their attention in regular practice, the director reported.

Louise Barney, Boise, bacteriologist from the central laboratory, state department of health, assigned to the local unit in this crisis, noted the Independent Packing company has furnished two gallons of hog's blood for use in preparing the throat cultures.

In the face of Saturday's response to the immunization program, the unit established new hours for next week. Mrs. Sidney Knight, unit nursing supervisor, said the offices would be open from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m. daily Monday through Saturday.

Mrs. Knight praised volunteers who have been assisting the health unit personnel. Nellie Berg, nurse aide, volunteered to help as did Mrs. J. Ted Davis and Dorothy Rens, clerical personnel. Graduate registered nurses attending are Bertha Wilson, Jessie DeViney and Mrs. Norman Crossley.

Dr. Telford will assist Dr. O. A. Moeliner, Rupert, in the immunization clinic at Rupert Tuesday. The clinic will open at 9 a.m. at the Lincoln school. Dr. Telford said they

Terome Sets Plan of Red Cross Drive

TEROME, Feb. 26 - The annual Red Cross fund drive for Jerome county will begin Monday, Mrs. Harriet Walters, district chairman, announced Thursday night with drive plans.

Bullion, Idaho, field representative, assisted with outlining arrangements for the drive. He answered many questions pertaining to false statements concerning the Red Cross.

Bullion said the statement that the president of the Red Cross receives an annual salary of from \$200 to \$1000 is unfounded.

The quota for Jerome county is 4500. Mrs. Walters urges everyone in the county to participate in the drive so the quota may be met. She said that the Red Cross has not made the quota and last year fell \$1500 short, she said.

Walters pointed out that a \$5 million dollar goal has been set for the national Red Cross drive. Of this amount a total of seven million dollars has been earmarked for collecting and processing whole blood into gamma globulin for combating typhoid epidemic.

Walters said that in a 12-month period the local hospital had used 300 pints of blood. One pint of the blood collected in Jerome during the same period.

Walters said that the hospital for blood secured through the Red Cross was for the administering of typhoid and typhus fever.

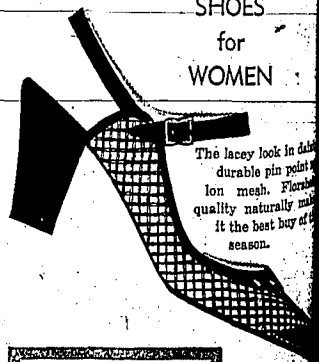

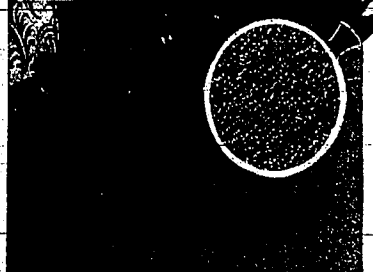
