### Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

"How can I teach my pupils tolerance? In my class there are all kinds of children with various dispositions that make for trouble at recess and in the classroom. One child refuses to touch the hand of another child. Another child is so afraid of dogs that he will not go to school unless he has a dog with him. All day-long there is some kind of trouble."

The word tolerance means: To endure the differences between oneself and others, to be patient with their ways and to overlook their peculiarities. Of course, one's own peculiarities of color, faith, form and whatnot, are started.

We had a mixed class at one time and the teacher, like the one who is asking for help, was about distracted by the pupil's peculiarities, even open hatred displayed. Finally, she hit on a plan to level the differences. She appointed a chairman of each group and sent them to the library for information about the contributions men and women of each national group had made to civilization.

As group by group reported, the pupils took an interest and sent art objects and literature to reinforce the report. By the end of the term all dislikes and discriminations were gone.

When children are taught that they, too, have their origin in other lands, and a background of religious beliefs that differ from their own; when they discover that the Indians are the only Americans born with their roots in this country, they begin to take their places in the great national group. They then have no further actual need for the feeling of "tolerance," being members of the host.

All that is necessary is a little teaching backed by example.
