More Hundreds Get Shots; Buhl People Staying Home

Hundreds of valley residents and school children received shots Tuesday at immunization clinics in Rupert and Kimberly as the area's battle against the diphtheria bug went on to boom.

At the same time, the first rift in the concerted operations to arrest the epidemic threat was noted in Shoshone by the Lincoln county health office's announcement that a fee of 50 cents would be charged individuals receiving immunization at the special clinic Wednesday.

Water Users Urging Palisades Cash Hike

IDAHO FALLS, March 3 (AP)—Eastern Idaho water users Monday urged increased appropriations for construction of Palisades dam with the hope the huge reservoir can be placed in use one year earlier than planned.

The meeting of district 36 water users was told that construction now is eight months ahead of schedule. However, unless additional money is provided construction will need to be slowed down because of lack of funds, Harold T. Nelson, Boise, regional engineer for the reclamation bureau, said.

WASHINGTON, March 3—Repeal of practically all major provisions of the Taft-Hartley labor law was urged on congress today by the American Federation of Labor.

The AFL President George Meany for House labor committee hearings closely paralleled recommendations of the AFL's legislative committee.

JEROME, March 3—Donald Jackson, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Jackson, Jerome, was wounded fatally early Monday afternoon when he was shot accidentally on a hunting trip three miles north and four miles west of here.

The boy was taken to St. Benedict's hospital here after the accident but died at 3:30 p.m. Jerome county Sheriff James E. Burns was called on the case about 1:30 p.m.

Iranian Police Break Up Communist Mobs

TEHRAN, Iran, March 3 (AP)—Police broke up with clubs today a demonstration by 2,000 communists who marched on parliament square shouting "Yankee go home" and "down with the American advisers."

The red high command has ordered mass demonstrations by all its followers against "imperialist plots." The shouts were aimed at the American military mission. The United States embassy, aware that the demonstrations were essentially anti-American, advised all American citizens to keep off the streets.

U. N. Envoys Rule Out Any Korean Gains

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., March 3 (AP)—U. N. diplomats ruled out chances today for any new action on the Korean peninsula after hearing the uncompromising statements pronounced by both the Soviet Union and the United States.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinskiy fired a broadside at the new Republican administration in the U. S. yesterday. He told the general assembly's political committee once again the only way to bring about a settlement in Korea is through the current U. N. secretary general's own formula for peace.

3 Schools in Area Reopen

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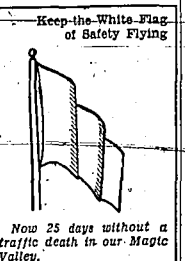

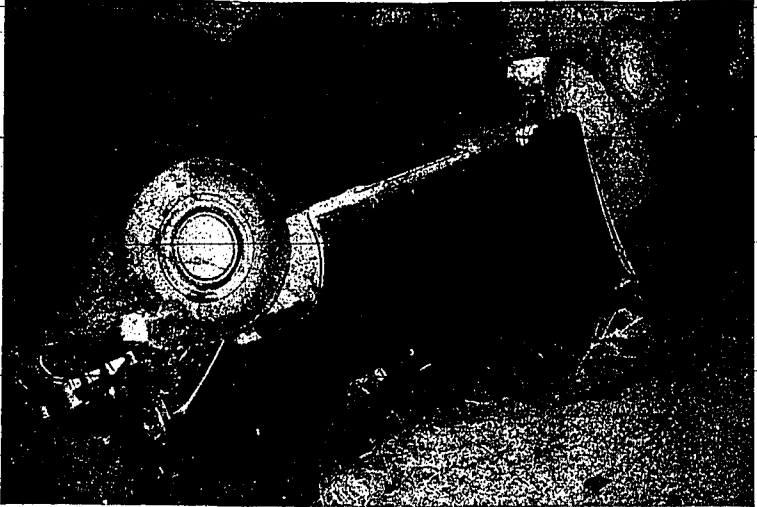

Solon Blasts "Rail Lobby" For Charges

BOISE, March 3 (AP)—Rep. Ezra Hawkes, R. Dancock, attacked the "railroad lobby" on the floor of the Idaho house Monday for what he termed "slandering statements" circulated about Hawkes and his firm in connection with a new truck licensing bill.

"The railroad screaming about alleged highway subsidies may be motivated not by selfish interest in public policy but rather by desire to cripple and hamstring other forms of transportation which finally broke wide open their long-held and abused monopoly," Hawkes said.

"Pack of Lies" He said the "railroad lobby" statements being circulated in the statehouse corridors and hotel lobbies are "nothing but a pack of lies based on false statistics."

Hawkes, who operates a motor freight line, said the railroad lobby had "isolated two pieces of my rolling stock" in an effort to show "HAWKES' firm would pay considerable less license fees under the new truck licensing bill which passed the house Saturday."

Hawkes took a blackboard into the house chamber and remarked that his firm would have paid \$400 more in taxes last year if the new law had been in effect.

Hawkes, who spoke in behalf of the "truck licensing measure," said "by bending and warping statistics, they further their determined effort to 'short-change' one of Idaho's most important industries."

Close Call

OFF-SHORE OIL ISSUE

Congress has begun delving again into the controversial off-shore oil dispute between the states and the federal government. And there are some signs that the problem may not be as thoroughly settled at this session as predictions have indicated.

The oil is as it is, first of all, not "tideland" oil as it is so often called. It is the oil which lies beneath the ocean bottom in the areas seaward of the water's edge at low tide.

For many years the states whose coasts border these rich submerged oil lands have laid claim to them. Under the Democratic regime, the federal government disputed the claim and said the ownership ought to be national.

The supreme court has declared that the federal government has a "paramount interest" in these oil rights, but has not flatly said they belong to the U. S. Its decision left the door open to congressional legislation awarding the lands to the states.

Twice both houses passed such a measure only to see former President Truman veto it. In his fall campaign, President Eisenhower made it clear he would sign the proposal if it passed again.

No one doubts that a "tideland" bill will be approved and signed this year. But all the fury surrounding the issue has obscured one important phase of the problem. Most of the off-shore oil lies beyond the proper legal state boundaries.

The historic state limits are three miles out in the cases of Louisiana, Mississippi and California, and because of special treaty arrangements, 10 and one-half miles out from the shores of Florida and Texas.

Thus any bill which awards to the states just that undersea territory to which they would be normally entitled will leave unsettled the status of the rich stores beyond state limits.

One bill offered by Senator Daniel of Texas, would let the states handle leasing of all submerged oil but require them to pay nearly two-thirds of the rents and royalties to the federal government on that oil beyond state limits. Other bills propose a handling somewhat less favorable to the states.

But so far congress has not shown any firm intent to solve this part of the problem. Odds now favor passage of a narrower bill.

Yet the oil beyond state limits is the real heart of the matter. Both the states and the companies want it settled to end doubt and confusion and permit orderly development of these resources. It would seem that the public interest demands early solution of the whole issue, not just a portion of it.

DEMOCRATIC PRESIDENTIAL POSSIBILITIES

LAW AGAINST CONTAMINATION

Food and drug officials are gratified, though not surprised, at the latest decision of the Supreme Court in Washington state, the supreme court recently held that the inspection law of 1933 was so contradictory as to require the repeal of the statute for the public protection necessary, according to C. W. Crawford, food and drug administrator.

In view of the fierce opposition to these elementary safeguards when advocated by the late Dr. Harvey Wiley 50 years ago, the industry's attitude today shows how times—and living-ability—have changed for the better.

DAILY CONFISCATION OF FOOD

President Eisenhower's executive order, which he issued on his legislative "must" program, largely due to pressure from the commercial interests involved. Every retailer and wholesaler who has been hit by this legislation protest him as well as the customers.

The food and drug files on seizures of unfit foods are somewhat gruesome. They describe entire lots of adulterated and misbranded products, and the number is relatively small.

Confiscation of adulterated or contaminated foods averages one lot every 24 hours. From these vegetables and fruits top the list in the amount of shipments removed from commercial channels by federal agents.

FLEEBING "PARADISE"

Dispatches from Berlin say communist authorities are preparing to create a "no-man's land" between East and West Berlin as a device for closing the last big holes in the iron curtain.

It is through these gaps, of course, that East Germans have been pouring recently in one of the greatest refugee streams of the post-war era.

This newest effort to wall off the Soviet orbit of nations from the west should come as a slight surprise. The wonder is the rede have been so long in sealing off these last leaks.

Should the new border controls and depopulated zone prove effective, the western world will naturally have deep regrets. Though the refugees are a tremendous burden upon Western Germany and seem sometimes an insoluble problem, they are a people of courage, people willing to risk their lives for freedom. The free nations must inevitably welcome them.

The no-man's land project is simply one more proof that paradise does not lie beyond the iron curtain. People do not try to escape paradise, and when they do resort to such measures as risk to life, it is most embarrassing to the proprietor of this touted realm.

MR. SMITH WAS LURED

The matter of funds has brought Dana C. Smith into the news again. Mr. Smith, who will recall, was the central figure in the famous gambling case that caused so much campaign controversy and television melodrama last fall.

Mr. Smith got very vindictive at the time. The whole thing was a high-class, high-stakes game. It will take a keen ear to detect the high moral tone in Mr. Smith's recent financial venture. It seems that he has not only in Havana gambling but in Las Vegas, where he has a large gambling establishment. He has a net worth of \$4,200,000 in the clear light of day, stopped payment on the check.

When the proprietor sued Mr. Smith claimed that he had no intention to win this money and dishonestly. We have always wondered by what sublimely Cuban gamblers lure tourists to Havana. It is only fair to say that the shirt that the tourist discovers that the place is fraudulent, dishonest and illegal.

There should be some way, it seems to us, that an honest man could tell that he is in a gambling joint before he loses \$4,200.

Of course, the court upheld Mr. Smith in his refusal to pay his gambling debt. Under the law, gamblers must pay their debts.

That is why gambling debts have always been known as debts of honor. That is also why there is no such thing as a "good" gambling joint, for being a man who gets outside in the fresh air and decides not to pay—Louisville Courier-Journal.

WATCH YOUR STEP

In an effort to cut down on Boise's pedestrian traffic accidents, police are handing out little cards to drivers.

Whether or not the program gets results will not be known for some time, but the police and James Brandon, chief, certainly rate an "F" for effort.

Not long ago it was pointed out in these columns that safety officials had issued a precautionary reminder to pedestrians of the folly of crossing streets between intersections. In advising adult pedestrians to use common sense and to come to a stop at the officials pointed out that drivers are more alert for foot traffic at corners and a pedestrian's safety should be a matter of concern.

These same officials added that a great percentage of pedestrian fatalities and injuries occur from accidents in mid-block. Boise police records bear them out. According to the records for the last year, injuries resulted from jaywalking. Fifty-five persons were injured and four killed in Boise in 1951.

It is not surprising, therefore, that it is better than for the corresponding portion of last year, police are not satisfied, hence the cards.

A new and useful gimmick is included on the cards besides space for the driver's name and address. The cards provide space for listing the hospital or mortician of his choice.

It is a good idea.

NO BIG DEAL

The final question put President Eisenhower at his first press conference was whether he feared—as Adlai Stevenson had charged—that the men of big business on his team would make his administration a "big deal" of the kind that the White House press corps, got a dead answer, but no semiotic discussion defining any kind of deal.

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DISPLAYS HIS IGNORANCE

Prime Minister Nehru of India has gibed at President Eisenhower, indirectly, declaring that "intrusion of the military metal into the chariters of the world presents a very great danger."

In illustration of the peril he cites "talk of blockade of China."

Nehru thus assumes an American who is perhaps the most unimpaired military man ever to hold high responsibility in this country, as the European well realized when he was among them as NATO commander.

Nehru also exposes his ignorance of American policies in his reference to a China blockade. His informants in America apparently do not even read our newspapers, for they would have told him the President himself has not considered a blockade.

The Indian premier knows little of the realities of peace or war, less still of the character of his friends and his enemies in the world. He seems determined to display this ignorance proudly for the rest of his days.

Whatever gave anybody the idea that standing on their dignity makes them look bigger?

AROUND THE WORLD

WASHINGTON—Adlai E. Stevenson will make his forthcoming tour of the world as an American politician in his personality and his place in American politics will permit. His modesty and his confidence in his own ability to lead a nation will be his greatest assets.

The witty and likable Stevenson has been deluged with invitations for speeches, interviews, magazine articles and public appearances. But during his recent visit here, he was the principal foreign ambassador to notify their governments of his desire for utter privacy. He has requested that the Washington newspaper friends to convey the same information to their overseas offices.
