Choice of New Russian Envoy for Red China Emphasizes Unity Aim

Prime Minister Stalin, written by communist Chinese leader Mao Zedong, announced today that Alexander Orlov, former Soviet ambassador to the United States, had been appointed as the new Russian envoy to China. The announcement, made in a radio broadcast, was interpreted as a move to strengthen the alliance between the two communist powers. Orlov, who served in the United States from 1943 to 1947, was a close associate of Joseph Stalin. His appointment is seen as a signal of the Soviet Union's continued support for the Chinese government and its efforts to maintain a united front against the West.

Stalin Funeral Orations Give No Real Clues of Russ Trend
 By J. M. ROBERTS, Jr.
 People who hoped to learn anything from the Moscow funeral orations were disappointed. The Russian situation has some similarity to that in the United States after the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt. A new leadership took over then, pledging itself to continue the President's program. Wide divergences developed later, but there was no sudden breakaway. It seemed likely that a similar process would develop in Russia, where the very absence of Stalin as the symbol of the power and leadership was bound to create new situations requiring new approaches.

There was no sign of any upheaval, which foreign observers had hoped for years would accompany the dictator's death. But this also was true at Lenin's death, though it actually produced a "single for power" not fitting for years. There was no "king in dead" long live the king atmosphere, either. Little or no attempt was made to start the raising of a new idol to replace Stalin. The Russian public was given a man, Malenkov, who had merely been assigned to keep the ball rolling. He, Beria and Molotov made proper funeral orations, promised to carry on in the name of Stalin and were, comparatively speaking, cautious. They took the Stalin line about working for peace and coexistence. Like Stalin, they didn't say for how long, nor did they repudiate anything he and Lenin had said about eventual conflict with the non-communist world. In New York, John Foster Dulles said he thought Stalin's death enhanced the prospects of peace, but

"The" Making Hit in Weekly Solon Parleys

WASHINGTON, March 10 (AP)—President Eisenhower has made a hit with Republican congressional leaders by the way he acts at his weekly legislative conferences.

Always jealous of their constitutional prerogatives as a co-equal branch of the government, the lawmakers have been gratified to find that Mr. Eisenhower does not look upon himself as a commander giving orders to his lieutenants.

Rather, as one participant puts it, the President serves as a sort of "moderator" at the sessions, paying respectful attention to everyone's views and never taking a dogmatic position from which he cannot retreat.

The chief executive meets at the White House at 8:30 a. m. (EST) each Monday with nine house and senate GOP leaders. Chairman of committee handling currently important issues also attend some of the sessions.

Before each session, the White House prepares an agenda of topics to be discussed.

Mr. Eisenhower presides but does not try to run the conferences with the crisp precision of a board of directors meeting.

By common consent, individual members of the congressional group speak with more authority on some subjects than others. With this exception of military staff conferences, Mr. Eisenhower is described as deft at drawing out the congressional viewpoint.

Officials Ease Auto Testings In Atom Blast

LAS VEGAS, Nev., March 10 (AP)—Civil defense officials made it easy Monday for late starters to get their cars on the atomic proving ground for the first time.

Press announcements that auto-mobilists would be tested spurred licensees from dealers as early as Buffalo, N. Y., said J. Clayton Jensen, test director for the federal civil defense administration.

But there's a deadline of next Thursday night for the cars to be licensed here.

Arrangements have been made with the Los Angeles Auto Dealers association to purchase cars there on behalf of dealers in other parts of the country who may want to get into the act.

The one reward for dealers is a chance to display their cars—if they get them back—in their showrooms as part of the publicity program, plus a chance to watch the blast from a vantage point on Charleston peak, about 40 miles away.

On Tuesday, dealers pay the cost of getting the car to and from Las Vegas and waive any claims against the government.

A volunteer program worked out because civil defense funds were insufficient to buy all the cars. People wanted to test—a complete little city with cars, office buildings and other places where people might be in an atom bomb attack.

Counter-Claim in Civil Action Filed

An answer and counter claim in the civil action of Claude V. King against T. E. Soper was filed in district court Monday by Soper.

King did not keep the terms of a lease they entered by an oral agreement, and writer memorandum Jan. 28, 1950.

By King's alleged failure to observe terms of the lease, Soper claims he was damaged to the extent of \$6,000. He also seeks judgment for \$120,000 which he says King owes him according to their agreement. In addition to the judgment, he asks for costs of the action.

In his suit against Soper, King claims Soper failed to pay rent to the lessor of a building at 804 Main avenue south which forced King to move from the building. King claims Soper is also liable for \$500 in unpaid rent and paid \$23 rent at one time. He asks for \$1,000 damages, the \$75 he spent on the building and rent and \$100 for loss of profits.

A decree granting Mrs. Zeta Gibbs a divorce from Byron Carter Gibbs has been filed in district court.

The couple was married in Twin Falls April 17, 1951. In her petition, Mrs. Gibbs charged her husband with extreme cruelty.

"I don't want to hurt anyone... just be quiet and calm."

The clerk, John Carlson pointed a concealed gun at the man and advised him to step aside so other customers could get at the window. Ten minutes later, a man called the local FBI office from a local tavern. He suggested the office come and pick him up for the postoffice incident.

When they did so, he told them he was James H. Reading, 29, Spokane. He was held without charge.
