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

Hulker waived preliminary hearing before Probate Judge Theron W. Hays Thursday morning on a charge of first degree burglary and was bound over to district court. Bail was set at \$3,000 which was not posted.

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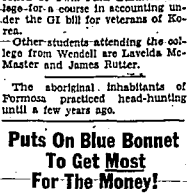

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson has announced the discovery that the nation's armed forces lack the two most effective weapons in modern warfare—airplanes and ammunition for the heavy guns. The need for more airplanes and ammunition against heavy cuts in the military budget.

General Van Fleet's proposed all-out offensive in Korea, as well as reinforcement of China's Kwantung Army and the Nationalist Government in Indo-China, cannot be undertaken until these shortages are remedied.

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

Another flagrant example of disreputable journalism on the part of the various news items in the world occurred in accounts of a lawsuit for the conventional one million dollar damages. Sen. Pat McCarran and a roster of other defendants in Las Vegas, Nev.

The co-defendants were keepers of hotels and a restaurant. The plaintiff was an ex-convict who entered Nevada as a press agent for the Buggy Sigel gang and its headquarters in Las Vegas.

His name is variously Herman Hyman and Hank Greengard. He comes from Brooklyn, the point of origin was not stated. He is a member of the New York bar for one year after he had passed his bar examination.

Certain circumstances of his first examination made it necessary for him to take another with political intention to help him. This matter is dealt with in an official report of the FBI, which took notice of Greengard's name when he was convicted of violating the neutrality laws.

Greengard has claimed this crime was done for noble motives, but there was evidence he was paid lawfully and there is further evidence that other principals in the conspiracy shipped war materials to Czechoslovakia, behind the iron curtain.

The printers' union had established a paper in Las Vegas to compete with the established Review-Journal when the Review-Journal broke with the union over a labor-saving machine.

This new paper was weak from the start and after the murder of Buggy Sigel, Greengard took over. The inference is not far-fetched that Greengard bought in with the proceeds of his crime.

The hotel and gambling managers of Las Vegas, now found themselves under pressure to spend additional money for ads in Greengard's paper, the Sun, which was a vulgar, unscrupulous, paper of the left-wing New York news type.

It soon began to berate Senator McCarran, an eminent Catholic, with two daughters in the sisterhood of the church, as an accomplice of the most depraved underworld characters. The gangsters were, in fact, actually colleagues of Greengard himself in his role as press agent Sigel's frame-up.

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BUTTER OVER PRODUCTION

Secretary of Agriculture Benson has made his first critical move. It was not a decision for government retrenchment in farm price supports, as might have been expected from some of Benson's public statements. It was, rather, for their continuance in the vital dairy field.

The law gives Benson the option to set dairy price supports for the year starting April 1 at a level from 75 to 90 per cent of parity. Parity is a price level calculated on the basis of the farmer's fair share of the national income.

For the current year supports on dairy products had been fixed at 90 per cent. Benson announced he will continue them at the same level.

But, though this decision is of course pleasing to the farmers immediately concerned and may help to arrest a long decline in general farm prices, it also poses other problems acutely.

High support prices for butter, particularly, have encouraged production of an unmarketable surplus. The artificial props under butter prices have turned more and more housewives to margarine, which sells in many urban markets at a price 50 cents a pound cheaper than butter. U. S. butter consumption has slipped from 10.7 pounds per person each year to 8.7 pounds, and is still slipping.

REB AIR FORCE CRIES

THEY ARE NOT BEING HEARD—Although the exact figure cannot be determined, it is believed the red's air force has at least five-times as many planes as the United States, and that the ratio of jet types is 10 to 1.

TRUMAN BLOCKED EXPANSION

But Truman refused to accept 80 million dollars of the air force allocation, limiting the expansion to 48 groups. He would be agree to the 70-group total insisted on by Pentagon spokesmen and congress. Subsequently, the maximum was set at 45 groups, the present objective.

DEFICIENT IN JETS

—Bull—and here is the news that the United States is deficient in jets. The outbreak of the Korean conflict has had added 60 groups for a current total of 95. That is an extremely weak armament for a nation having so many jet fighters and the globe.

Worse still, more than half of these units are equipped with obsolete planes, useful only for training. The United States has supplied the Chinese in Korea with more jets than Washington has been able to forward to the United Nations forces.

Then there have been stories lately about people getting shot. A lady was someone's impression of all the statistics. He came up with the notion that perhaps Russia wouldn't be too bad a place to live after all. It seems the thinking goes something like this: There aren't nearly so many autos in Russia as in the U. This is indicated by Mr. Cole's working record in congress on housing legislation. By excerpts from many of his speeches on the floor of the house of representatives.

White some of the public housing Tories and the labor organizations are preparing to oppose the Cole appointment by President Eisenhower, there is little doubt about confirmation by the senate.

Furthermore, Representative Cole has the backing of James Sen. Frank Carlson, who is close to the President. Cole's appointment was also urged by the real estate, home builders' and mortgage bankers' organizations, because of his record on housing legislation.

In his speeches on the floor of the house, Representative Cole made clear his opposition to public housing. In June, 1949, he made this statement:

WHILE THE NATION WAITS

Michael Amrine, former editor of the Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists, calls attention to an unusual and serious situation. The joint senate-house committee on atomic energy has had a long and arduous work of selection of a chairman, and no prospect of a break is in sight.

The atomic energy bill is now scheduled for this month, and with hearings on the possibilities of using atomic energy to produce electricity being held in advance, the eight senators and eight representatives have been divided in that exact proportion between the two candidates, Senator Bourke B. Senators insist that continuity of the work of this most important committee should be protected by having a senator as chairman, since senators serve six-year terms and representatives only two.

This is an almost incredible situation, and it should have been foreseen by congress which failed to act by a method of breaking a deadlock. Dividing the committee would be worse than a deadlock. It may be necessary for congress to amend the atomic energy act to get a chairman—and it should be a senator—before the bill goes to the secret work of the committee lays, under a temporary chairman, and the nation has only an inkling of what a serious possibility is involved in the case of the Portland Oregonian.

OPPOSITION FOR ITS OWN SAKE

Senators Hickenlooper and Kerr of Oklahoma, to mention only two, have now given the nation its first new demonstration that Democrats, no less than Republicans, are capable of opposing for opposition's sake.

NEWEST MIG STILL NOT SEEN IN WAR
SEOUL, Korea, March 12 (AP)—The advance model Russian-made MIG fighter, flown to Denmark by a flying Polish pilot has yet to make its appearance in Korea, allied air force officials believed today.

An air force spokesman said the MIGs have occasionally tested new designs of jet warplanes in Korea, but so far none has answered the general description of the red jet fighter in Copenhagen.

"We haven't noted an increase in performance of the MIGs," he said. "They are still trying to get over the stock."

The new type of MIG described from Denmark has considerably more firepower than the one used in Korea. The European MIG has two 38-millimeter and two 20-millimeter machineguns.

The MIGs in North Korea have one 37-millimeter cannon and two 23-millimeter guns.

'52 Candidate Faces Charge Of Tax Dodge

SAN FRANCISCO, March 12 (AP)—Vernon Hallman, Progressive party candidate for President last year, faced an indictment charging \$65,000 federal income tax evasion today.

Hallman, with his wife, Virginia, was accused of declaring net income of \$12,877 for the years 1946 to 1950 instead of actual income of \$54,742. They were scheduled to turn themselves over to the U. S. marshal today.

Denies Charge
"We don't owe a nickel—neither one of us nor any of us," Hallman said. "It's one thing to get an indictment and another to get a conviction," he added.

The Hallmans face a possible \$10,000 maximum fine and five years in prison if convicted according to Assistant U. S. Atty. Robert Peckham. Peckham said they would also face civil liabilities in excess of \$500,000.

Convicted of Contempt
Hallman, 56-year-old attorney, was convicted of contempt of court and sentenced to six months hard labor for his actions while defending west coast labor leader Harry Bridges in a 1950 perjury-contempt trial.

Hallman, who received 140,150 votes during last November's election, lives with his wife and six sons at Ross, Calif., a few miles north of San Francisco.

A warrant was issued for the couple's arrest and bail was set at \$5,000 each.

Egypt Queen Leaves King

ROME, March 12 (AP)—Egypt's Queen Farouk today amid conflicting rumors of an impending divorce from her husband, King Farouk, pregnancy or a political move to safeguard the royal dynasty.

She took off from Rome's airport at 3:40 p.m. for Zurich. She was accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Sitta Sakka, a nurse and a little black poodle, but did not take her baby son, King Foad II.

"Farouk" was not to go to his airport to see her off.

Farouk's shadows—two tough Albanian Mideast bodyguards—were not present either when Farouk and his mother arrived.

Both the queen and her mother were wearing rich fur coats and dark sunglasses.

A spokesman for Farouk denied all rumors of a divorce or separation.

"The queen is going to Zurich for a short period of rest and treatment," he said.

He refused to say how long she would stay in Switzerland.

Asked why Farouk did not accompany his wife to the airport, the spokesman said: "Sometimes he does and sometimes he doesn't."

NEW ORLEANS, March 12 (AP)—Sen. Allen Tate, D. La., predicts states will have a tough fight to gain control of offshore oil under the Eisenhower administration than under President Truman.

Mamie Eisenhower Has First News Confab, Exhibits Charm

WASHINGTON, March 12 (AP)—Wonder what would happen if a bunch of male reporters asked the President of the United States:

"What color are your bedroom walls, Mr. President?"

"What do your grandchildren call you?"

"What time do you go to bed at night?"

"Who designed that suit you're wearing?"

"Eisenhower might blow his stack at about this point. But his wife, Mamie, answered these and a flock of equally personal questions posed by an eager bevy of lady reporters and one man, as readily as you please yesterday.

Bedroom walls? Gray-green. She finds that color restful.

Grandchildren? They call her "Mamie!"

Bedtime? 10 to 10:30 p.m., after watching television.

That box size light gray suit? Designed by Molly Parris.

For what a male reporter's opinion is worth, the first lady handled herself with charm and good sense at this first meeting with the press since she entered the White House.

She made history of a sort, too, by inviting the men who cover her husband's doings to sit in on the get-together.

Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt had "unwarrantably" rule Mrs. Harry S. Truman just didn't hold news conferences.

So 41 slightly sheepish men trooped along with the women folk over to a vaulted room with white paneled walls, the executive mansion Wednesday, and, as shyly as boys at a dancing class, infiltrated the ranks of 57 women. It was the women's show, however. You'd hardly have known there was a man in the place.

In came Mrs. Eisenhower, clad as all get out in her wool suit, two big gold bracelets on her right arm and a small watch with black band on her left. Movie cameras whirred, flash bulbs exploded.

She sat down at an antique desk in front of a gold wall hanging with two potted palms in the background.

As her husband does at his news conferences, Mrs. Eisenhower volunteered some comments at the outset. She told about her engagements for the next week, speaking clearly but in a voice that seldom carried to the rear rows. Then came the questioning and the gas, though given to bursts of titling, threw queries thick and fast.

What had Mrs. Eisenhower done for the White House in the way of furnishing? (Not much.) Is there enough closet space? (Well, she's

17 Vessels for Chinese Reds Are Reported

HONG KONG, March 12 (AP)—At least 17 merchant ships carried cargoes from European ports direct to Whampoa in communist China before Feb. 6 and March 6, a well informed source said today.

Nine British ships, three Polish, one Norwegian, one Russian, one Danish, one Finnish and one Italian ship were known to have made the voyage, he said.

Truck Ties
The source, who asked to remain unnamed, said one of the Scandinavian ships was known to have carried several thousand truck tires.

All of the European ships bypassed Hong Kong, where officials have banned loading of strategic cargoes for shipment to mainland ports, en route to the south China port, the source said.

Two British ships and the Danish and Italian vessel called here after leaving Whampoa, he said. One was known to have sailed for another Chinese mainland port after docking here.

Others Possible
"There may have been others," this source said. "We have other ships listed as possible. These are just the ones we know have entered Whampoa during this period."

Many of these ships passed at Lap Fung, southwest of Hong Kong territorial waters. There they unloaded cargo to enable them to enter the 22-foot channel leading to Whampoa.

Hong Kong officials point out that they have no control of ships bypassing Hong Kong waters en route to Chinese ports.
