Eden Denounces Bomber Attack as 'Barbaric' Act

NEW YORK, March 12 (AP)—British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden has denounced as "barbaric" the shooting down of an RAF bomber by Soviet MIG fighters.

Eden delivered a major speech last night before the Foreign policy association, made a last-minute attempt to win support for his attack on Russia over Thursday's attack on the British plane, which was shot down over the Baltic.

Reading text, Eden said the U. S. and Britain stood ready to negotiate a new pact with the Soviet Union, but that such a pact would be meaningless if the Soviet Union continued to support the attack on the British plane.

Eden said that the attack on the British plane was a "deliberate and brutal act of aggression involving the murder of British airmen."

Prime Minister Winston Churchill confirmed with his top advisers on the note and presumably took a personal hand in its wording.

Responsible sources in London said that the note was drafted in France and that the British government was determined to deal with the Russian attack on the British plane as a "deliberate and brutal act of aggression involving the murder of British airmen."

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U. S. Sending Jet Squadron For Germany

WASHINGTON, March 12 (AP)—The U. S. Air Force is sending a squadron of jet fighters to Germany to help defend the country against possible Soviet air attacks.

The squadron, which will be based at Wiesbaden, will consist of 24 F-86 Sabres and will be commanded by Major General Curtis E. LeMay.

The move is part of a larger plan to increase the U. S. military presence in Germany and to show the Soviet Union that the United States is prepared to defend itself against any possible aggression.

The squadron will be the first of its kind to be based in Germany and will be a significant step in the U. S. effort to strengthen its military presence in the region.

The move is also seen as a response to the Soviet Union's recent military maneuvers in the Balkans and the Middle East, which have raised concerns about the stability of the region.

Chemical Processing Plant at Arco Station Begins Operation

IDAHO FALLS, March 13 (Special)—The new chemical processing plant at the atomic energy commission's national reactor testing station, designed to recover fissionable materials from spent nuclear fuel elements, has begun operation, L. E. Johnston, manager of the AEC's Idaho operations office, announced today. The plant is operated by the American Cyanamid company, New York, and incorporates a number of new concepts expected to produce data important to the economics of reactor use. It is designed for direct maintenance. Because of the intense radiation from fission products, chemical processing plants previously built have had costly provisions for replacement of defective units by remote control mechanisms. Although operations in the new plant must be carried on within thick shielding walls, the plant is expected to demonstrate the feasibility of decontaminating the individual cells to allow workers to handle the material. Experimental equipment has been incorporated in the plant to remove radioactive materials from gases generated by the chemical process. This feature will be important in establishing chemical processing plants in populous areas where power reactors of the future might be located.

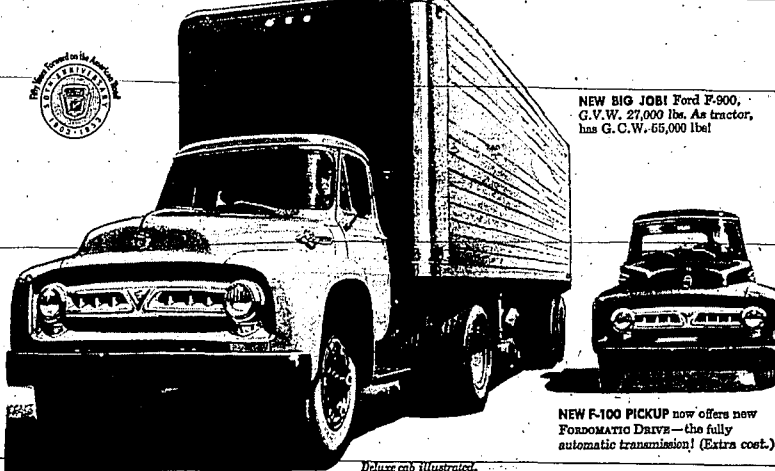

Reds Warned To End Their Korea Blasts

PANMUNJON, Korea, March 13—Reds in this town indirectly warned the communists today they no longer will tolerate their propaganda at Panmunjon true headquarters.

Lead-Gen. William K. Harrison, commander of U. S. troops, said the U. N. is under no obligation to accept notes from the reds which have no bearing on efforts to obtain an armistice.

Harrison's opinion was expressed in a letter to North Korean Gen. Kim Il-sung, chief communist negotiator. The primary purpose of the letter was to deny charges that U. N. troops were killing prisoners of war in North Korea.

Second Denial
Specifically, Harrison denied for a second time a red charge that U. N. warplanes bombed a prisoner camp at Sunghon on Nov. 9, 1937, and killed or wounded a number of prisoners.

The U. N. denied the charge Feb. 19, four days later, Nam reported it.

At another liaison officers meeting today, the reds accused U. N. troops of "bombing" Kim Il-sung's communist truck camp. The reds said the bombs damaged a number of trucks and injured three persons early this morning. The U. N. said it would investigate the charge.

Diplomatically
Harrison pointed out the U. N. has had difficulty in obtaining from the reds correct information on the location of the prisoner of war camp.

"You continued use of the liaison machinery at Panmunjon as a channel for your propaganda is a repetition of the same unconstructive conduct which forced a resumption of the same negotiations," Harrison said.

Farouk Has Fun As Wife Leaves

ROME, March 13—King Farouk spent his afternoon hours today with a long-haired blond "French model," sharply after his 19-year-old wife Maristina left for Geneva.

In Geneva, Farouk's mother-in-law, Mrs. Siba Sakak, told government officials that she saw a "complete and definite separation" from the ex-monarch but "there is no question whether I saw the king or not."

Mrs. Sakak, traveling with her daughter, said Maristina would return to Cairo within a few days with the full approval of the Egyptian government, which bounded Farouk from his throne last July. She said she did not know where he would go, but he would remain with the king (Farouk) for the time being.

Choice Made for Federal Attorney

WASHINGTON, March 13—Edward Furey, Belmont, was recommended by Idaho's congressional delegation as U. S. attorney for Idaho.

Furey is a former assistant U. S. attorney and assistant state attorney-general.

His appointment would be made by the president, subject to confirmation by the U. S. senate. Idaho's congressional delegation made the recommendation at a meeting with Atty.-Gen. Herbert Brownell this week.

License Required for Cheese

BOISE, March 13—Colgate cheese is cheese, the attorney general's office has ruled, and dairies which manufacture it must have the \$20 state cheese manufacturer's license.

The opinion was requested by Lester Hendrix, director of dairying in the state agriculture department. It seems to be the first time that the manufacture of cottage cheese has been exempt from the license, the opinion said "simply because the product only goes through processes preliminary to the making of more complex cheeses."

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German War Veteran Tells of Jet Attack on British Bomber

LUENEBURG, Germany, March 13—A German war veteran said he saw "from start to finish" the shooting down of a British bomber jet plane near here Thursday.

The witness—Jürgen Rohlfman, 24, a farmer—said he was standing in a field near the West German village of Garstorf when he saw the two jets send the British plane flaming in the air.

"I was in the field with my horse," he said. "The plane came from the direction of Neetze, a nearby village, there was a big gap in the clouds. Then in the direction of the airfield where we see many planes flying to and from Berlin every day. At about 2:30 p.m. I saw a big plane flying west about 10,000 feet high.

"Suddenly I saw two dark forms coming behind the big plane. At first I thought they were planes of much higher speed. Seconds later, I saw a white streak spouting out of one of them, which I recognized as a fighter plane. I have often seen this during the war. The white streaks were tracer bullets.

"Then I heard the sound of machine guns. The big plane went into a dive. It was burning. When it disappeared behind the hills, I did not see any nationality markings."

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Nation's Most Aged Veteran Dies in N. Y.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., March 13—America's oldest soldier, 111-year-old James A. Hild died quietly in bed last night after a month long battle for life.

The Civil War soldier had rallied repeatedly during his final fatal illness, but since Feb. 18, when his right leg was amputated, doctors had expected him to succumb to his crippling respiratory illness.

Eventually he was "just faded away," a spokesman at general hospital said.

Hild became a casualty of old age 16 minutes before midnight. He had entered the hospital Feb. 18 and was operated on Feb. 18. The next day he was reported near death but he fought on. At one time he rallied enough to eat a new potato crust—clear—a fond habit for the tough old campaigner.

The death of the Union army veteran, who participated in major engagements at Bull Run, Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, South Mountain and Antietam, left Albert Woolson, 104, Duluth, Minn., the sole survivor of the one time Union army of 800,000 men.

Four other Civil War veterans still living were soldiers in the Confederate army. They are John Balling, 109, St. Louis, Mo.; Walter W. Williams, 106, Franklin, Tex.; Thomas E. Riddle, 104, Austin, Tex.; and William A. Lundy, 103, Laurel Hill, Pa.

Panel Hears Forest Fund Plan Protest

WASHINGTON, March 13 (AP)—Protest against legislation to set aside 10 per cent of revenues from national forests for operation of these recreational facilities were heard Thursday by the house agriculture committee.

They said that in general they are not opposed to use of the forests for recreational purposes.

But, they said, money for the projects should come from congress through direct appropriations rather than from forest revenues.

Such a measure, enacted through the sale of timber, approximated 70 million dollars last year.

A bill—being considered—by the committee proposes that 10 per cent of such revenues—providing the return does not exceed \$4 million dollars—should be used to develop, maintain and operate the public use facilities of the forests.

The bill has the unanimous support of department heads and conservationists. It also is backed by congressmen in whose districts national forests are located.

Engle described the bill as the only practical means yet proposed to obtain funds for recreational purposes in the forests.
