Buyers Pay \$95,090 for Good Bulls

FILER, March 14.—One hundred sixty-seven bulls were sold for \$95,090 at the 14th annual range bull sale at the Filer fairgrounds Saturday. The total price was approximately 20 per cent less than the total price last year but officials expressed complete satisfaction with the sale. They said the buyers were "very good" and "better than expected." Bidding was spirited and fair.

The bulls were divided into three classes. In the first class there were 35 bulls which sold for \$28,850 or for an average of \$824 each. In the second class 40 bulls were sold for \$38,400 or an average of \$960 each. In the third class 92 bulls sold for \$27,840 or an average of \$302 each. The top 10 bulls in the first class averaged \$1,200 each.

The top bull in the list sold for \$1,500. Prince Larry was bought by Herbert Chandler, Baker, Ore., and was sold to William H. Lloyd, Soda Springs. The second highest bull in the sale, Chandler's Prince 4, also was bought by Chandler and was purchased by Ezra Lark, Soda Springs, for \$1,400.

Acquaintance for the sale were E. O. Waller, Filer; Howard Brown, Woodland, Calif.; and Rocky Goodhue, Jerome. Walter Scholten, Burley, and John Mather, Boise, were also present.

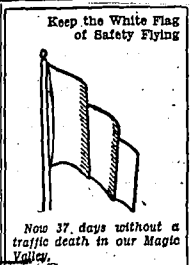

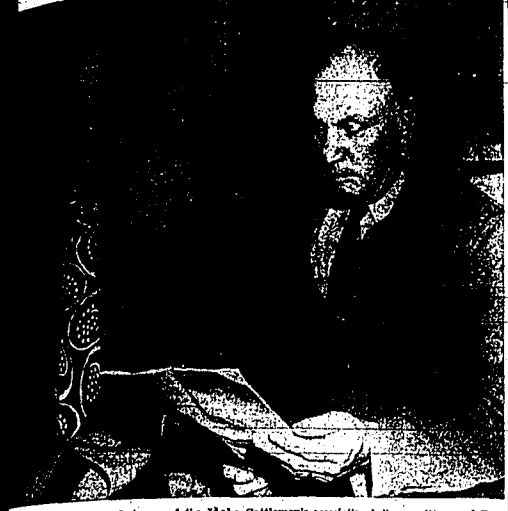

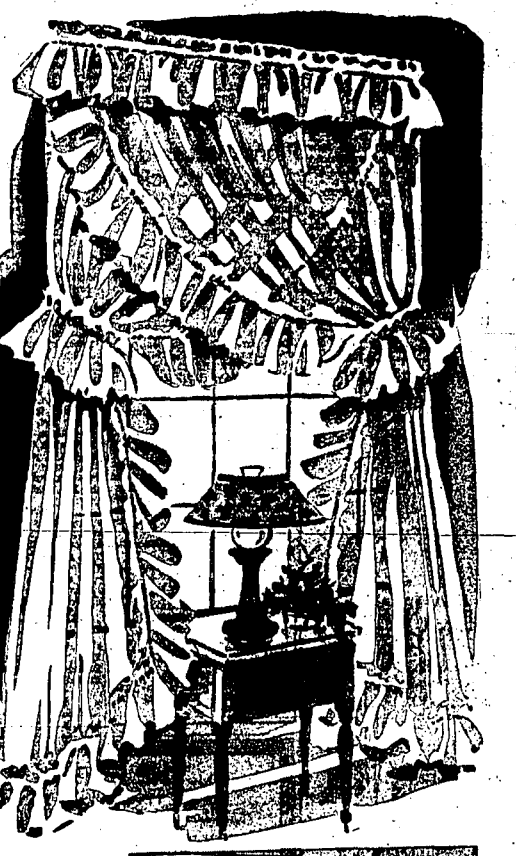

Six Red Cross First Aid Experts Are Prepared to Help in Area Emergency

Few Twin Falls residents are aware of it but there are six drivers in the city who would be more than welcome around any emergency scene. Their cars bear a small red and white tag above the rear license plate to indicate they are driven by certified Red Cross first aid instructors and are Red Cross mobile units. The small crew is headed by Elmer Sommers, Twin Falls county Red Cross chapter first aid and water safety chairman. Other members are Martin Fox, Elizabeth Riley, William Hughes, Paul Deussen and Jerry Wyatt. Local citizens in the business area early Friday night a first hand look at the units when they paraded through the section to call attention to the current Red Cross fund drive. Before going on the parade, Sommers briefly outlined the equipment carried in the cars and the qualification of the drivers. Each of the vehicles is a private car and the owner has volunteered its use as a mobile unit. They carry emergency first aid equipment such as splints for use on fractures and bone breaks, bandages, first aid medicine and antiseptics and a supply of blankets to keep accident victims warm, Sommers said. The six drivers are authorized to aid in any emergency by their certification by the Red Cross. All have taken their extensive first aid training under the Red Cross without cost and are eligible now to instruct in the course. Sommers pointed out covers for the tag are carried in the cars and when someone other than the certified drivers are driving the vehicles the tags are covered. He said he expects his crew to be enlarged soon by more drivers who will be eligible to put those small red and white tags on their license plates.

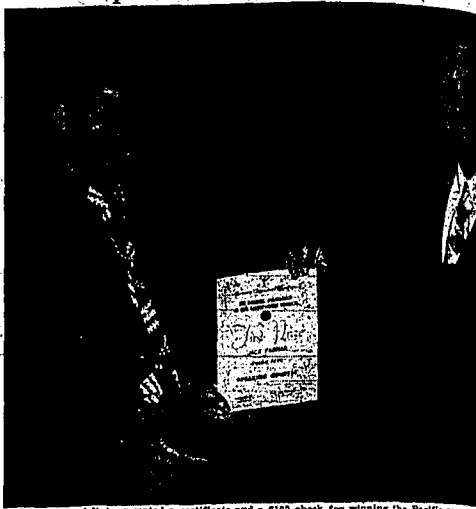

Idahoans Await Advent of Television With Preparations and Great Interest

With television in Idaho not too far around the corner, radio men, politicians, advertisers, students and would-be viewers are getting ready for its advent.

Two stations each have been licensed for Boise, Idaho Falls and Pocatello, and one for Nampa. The first television broadcasts from Boise are scheduled for this summer, with the other cities expected to follow within a year. Some north Idaho residents now see telecasts from a Spokane station.

Walter Wagstaff, manager of Boise station KIDO, says he is picking members of his staff to take outside the state to brush up on TV techniques. He says television's advent won't mean a lot of outside talent coming into Idaho, but will mean new opportunities for talents already here.

Idaho State college has inaugurated a program to train some of that talent. ISU has its own TV studio broadcasting on the radio, and it plans to purchase a television set for the Student Union building.

The school is moving cautiously into the expensive field of TV production, however. Dr. Carl McIntosh, president, puts it this way:

"Some of the students are anxious to go into radio operation. But we're going to go slow on anything like that. If we're going to send programs into people's living rooms, we have to know we can offer them more than an amateur substitute for a professional production."

At the University of Idaho, officials report that enrollment in radio courses has doubled within the last year, probably reflecting an interest in television.

The university is incorporating work in telecasting and in programming, writing and federal communications commission regulations for television in its radio courses.

The University of Idaho has been allocated an educational TV channel, but so far authorities feel the best idea is to develop facilities for releasing programs through regular commercial stations.

The university board of regents urged the 1953 legislature to appoint an interim committee for study of educational television, but the legislature declined to do so.

Boise has been offered an educational channel also, but no action has been taken to accept it yet. Both the school board and Chamber of Commerce opposed it as impractical, although the city council was for it.

Conan Matthews, professor of art at Boise Junior college, points out the opportunities TV offers commercial artists, and reports students at BJU seem definitely interested.

"Not all the opportunities for work in this field will be in large centers," he said. "It is estimated that many of the smaller and local stations will have need for artists."

There will be opportunities for designing sets and backgrounds, lettering plates of text, designing symbols, trademarks, signatures and packages.

George Moskovic, television sales executive for the Columbia Broadcasting system, came to Boise from Los Angeles recently, and told merchants and advertising men about television as a selling tool.

"Only in television can you demonstrate a product in actual use," Moskovic declared. "In other words, the TV set is not just another advertising medium—it's sort of a door-to-door salesman who's already inside the house."

Both major parties are laying plans to televise their campaigns in the 1954 election.

State Republican Chairman William Campbell says the state GOP organization hopes to budget money for this expense both this year and next. He doesn't know how much campaigns on television will cost, but he says it will be plenty.

Plans are vague as yet, Campbell adds, but he says the candidates probably will deliver televised talks and spot announcements, telecast interviews and possibly variety shows also will be included.

The Democrats, too, say their plans are in the embryo stage, but they will be there picking on the television screens.

As for the listener-viewer, appliance dealers say he is generally taking a "wait and see" attitude, encouraged by some of the dealers themselves.

Some orders are being placed, though, and salesmen report sales are concentrated mostly in the \$350 and \$400 range, with some purchasers going for the more expensive radio-TV-phonograph combinations.

Generally speaking, they say, John O. Public is content to let the dealer do the installation work and not tinker around with the complicated television apparatus himself.
