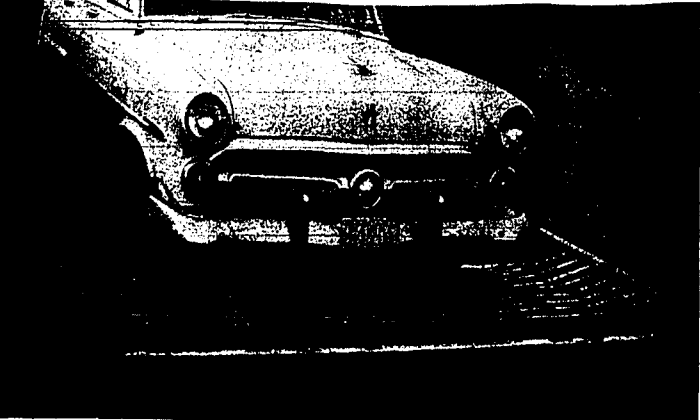

"Bedspring" Cattle Guard Is Good, Economical, Portable

BOISE, March 16—An economical home-made cattle guard devised by an irrigation district manager in eastern Oregon effectively blocks cattle and at the same time permits the ditcher and others to pass over it in an auto without stopping to open a gate.

Walter White, manager of the Vale (Oregon) and Warm Springs irrigation districts in Malheur county, Ore., puts in long hours. When irrigation farmers drove by his small pasture a year ago, they wondered whether it was really necessary for him to move his boat onto the ditch-bank.

Actually, they were seeing a new type of cattle guard. Wait had placed it in the fence line where the driveway to the ditch crossed the highway and followed a small lateral to his home. The guard looks like a bedspring, but is narrower and has no undercoil. It is White's idea of an economical and effective cattle guard that water users can install in their own shops during the slack winter months.

Such a device is a time, money, and water saver. Ditchriders will not have to stop and open gates when they are trying to outrun a canal break. They can save the time spent in stopping, opening, and closing a gate every day of the week at every fence line.

White realized that water users paid the bill for delays caused by opening and closing gates. Yet, could they afford a pit concrete and steel cattleguard, costing from \$250 to \$400 at each fence?

With this in mind he made a frame of 1 1/2-inch pipe, 30 inches wide by 120 inches long. Initially the slide members of the frame were 1 1/2 inches long, but nine inches on each end were turned up at right angles. A 48-inch piece of the same size pipe was welded between the tops of the upright ends. To the cross-pieces on each end were welded 11 small rings evenly spaced, and into each ring was hooked a spring one inch in diameter and 12 inches long. From each spring was suspended a strip of 1/4 by 3/8-inch strap iron with sufficient tension to carry the 11 steps in a uniform position and to reduce rebound when a vehicle passed over the guard, a crosspiece of strap iron was welded midway from the ends, creating a floating

Czech Leader Gets Honor in Prague Castle

VIENNA, Austria, March 16 (AP)—Communist Czechoslovak President Klement Gottwald's body lay in state today in the historic Spanish hall of Prague's Brudcany castle.

Prague radio announced the 56-year-old communist leader would lie in state for three days and be buried Thursday with a state funeral.

There was no explanation of the almost 4-hour delay in announcing funeral plans. Gottwald died Saturday after an illness of only two days.

Autopsy Possible Western observers speculated an exhaustive autopsy may have been performed on the dead leader's body to "prove" he died of natural causes.

Gottwald apparently was good health Wednesday when he returned to Prague from the Moscow funeral of Josef Stalin.

Prague radio announced Friday afternoon the Czech Communist party and government chief was sickened Thursday with pneumonia and pleurisy. His condition worsened rapidly and Saturday morning the Czech radio announced he died peacefully "all that was done in men's power" by 11 Czech and Soviet physicians.

Work to Halt Western diplomatic sources in Vienna said they expect President Antonin Zapotovsky would take over supreme control of the Czech Communist party and government in Gottwald's place.

Term Suspended For Film Writer

WASHINGTON, March 16 (AP)—Sidney Buchman, Hollywood writer-producer, received a one-year suspended sentence and a \$150 fine today for contempt of congress.

Federal District Judge T. Blake Kennedy imposed the sentence after Buchman told him he "acted in good faith and meant no contempt in my heart."

Buchman was convicted of the contempt charge because of his failure to appear in court to testify before the committee at Los Angeles on Jan. 23, 1952.

Buchman previously had testified before the committee at Los Angeles that he had been a member of the Communist party from 1933 to 1940, and Kennedy to put Buchman on probation for one year.

Chiang Guerrilla Statement Drawn

TAIPEI, Formosa, March 16 (AP)—The Chinese national government is preparing to issue a statement denying that national guerrillas are operating in the mountainous area of southwestern China.

Instead, the government will hold that the guerrillas are the work of a group of "non-Burmese territory" or territory claimed by both China and Burma.

Furthermore, nationalist China "will be adamant on declining to discuss the forces that are being sent," the China Evening News said.

Mine Production Boost Predicted

COTTON DENNIS, March 16 (AP)—Production from Pacific Northwest mines probably will be more than tripled in future years, a Spokane mining man told the Idaho Historical society Sunday.

Frank Lilly said the area has prospects for more than \$1 billion worth of minerals, more than any comparable area in the world. He said such proven mining district still contains unexplored veins rich in ore.

Gold—which brought the prospectors originally to the area—accounts for one-tenth of Pacific Northwest metal production, Lilly said.

Finnock said when he regained consciousness he was seated in his parked car on the Airport road.

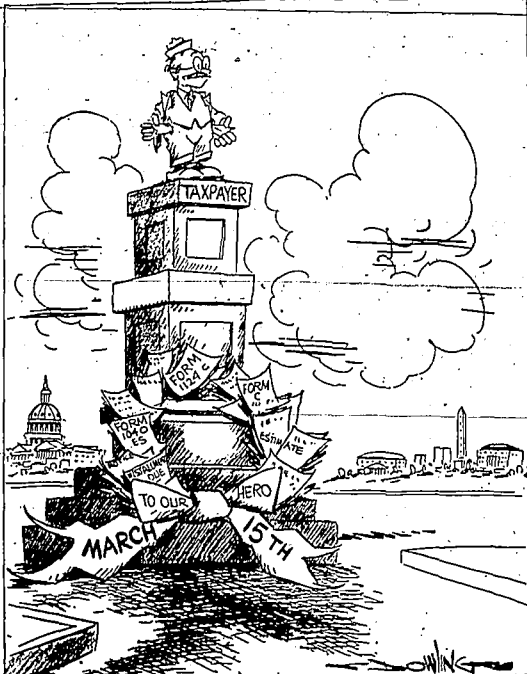

Source of Natural Gas Import Into Northwest Proves Puzzle

WASHINGTON, March 16 (AP)—The Pacific Northwest get natural gas from Canada or from the United States?

That's one angle of a many-sided legal fight being waged at a power commission heard on applications to pipe gas to the Washington-Oregon-Idaho area—a hearing which runs into its fourth week Wednesday after a four-day recess.

Attorneys' tactics so far show three applicants are lining up solidly against one. The three would handle Canadian gas. They are Westcoast Transmission Company, Trans-Northwest Gas company and Northwest Natural Gas company.

Their opponent is Pacific Northwest Pipeline company, which proposes to build a pipeline from the San Juan basin field in Colorado and New Mexico to Utah, Wyoming, Idaho, Oregon and Washington.

Westcoast seeks a U. S. license to pipe gas from the Peace river field in northern British Columbia and Alberta to Washington and Oregon via Vancouver, B. C. It is the only applicant with a Canadian license to export Alberta gas.

Trans-Northwest has no fight with Westcoast. Trans-Northwest would buy its gas from Westcoast and pipe it through eastern Washington and Idaho.

Northwest Natural, however, is listed with Westcoast and Trans-Northwest as well as with Pacific Northwest. That's because it wants to pipe gas from the Peace river field in southwestern Alberta to Washington, Oregon and British Columbia.

Attorneys for firms proposing to handle Canadian gas apparently intend to base part of their fight against Pacific Northwest on the contention that San Juan basin reserves aren't adequate and the gas should go to relieve shortages in California and elsewhere.

Pacific Northwest, on the other hand, is expected to concentrate on the one-year limitation on Canadian export licenses. Pacific Northwest favors any consumers along the proposed Westcoast pipeline would have only a one-year guarantee of service because the license would be up for renewal annually.

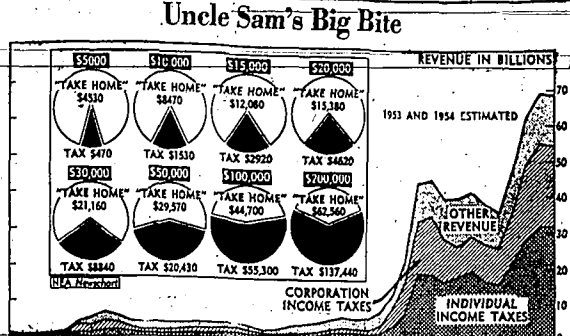

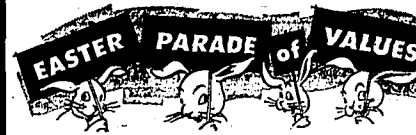

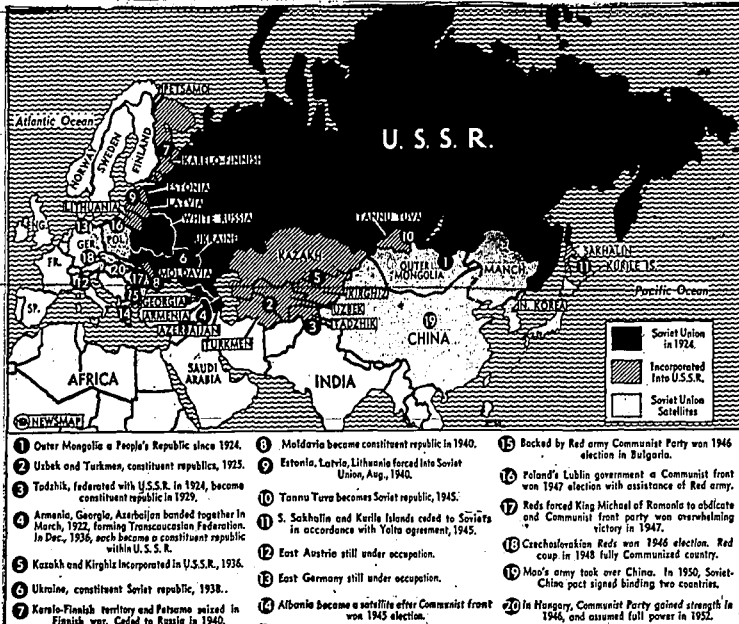

Boyle Wonders if Present Era Giving Tots Proper Memories

NEW YORK, March 16 (P)—Every one in a while President Eisenhower has a way of putting an interesting finger on the American mind.

He did that recently when he took time out for an international worries to pay a tribute to the American country store keeper in a chat to the American people.

Recalling his own warm memories of the country store, he said: "Man does not live by bread alone. He needs to give the kids that are 6 years old to 12 similar memories. . . memories that will live with them. . . I hope that the American retailers will not forget to sell memories."

There is no doubt that the kind of country store in which Al Lincoln learned to know people—famous for its checker players, poibelled stove, cracker barrel and hot cheese—is getting as rare as the clear store Indian.

It has given way to that vast cathedral of commerce, the supermarket, in which through shop to soft music, every buy is a bargain, and every purchase is wrapped in a package as sanitary as a saint's dream. There isn't anything wrong with them. Mass shopping probably is a natural aftermath of mass production. But they do sell more bargains than memories.

In between the old country store and the—Impassable—supermarket, however, are thousands and thousands of neighborhood stores across America which are a kind of a compromise. They are more likely to give credit than bargains but the customer is treated as a friend, and when a kid comes in with his father, order the butcher delights him with a free slice of baloney, eaten on the spot.

My dad ran that type of store for almost 30 years. Some small shopkeepers develop a grudge against supermarkets, but dad never did.

"Any man who can't open a grocery store right next door to a supermarket and do all right, doesn't belong in business," he said. "But

being out of work, will pay up his grocery bill as soon as he lands a job. But in a big shot neighborhood the last man they pay is the grocer."

Today I am not sure whether it was dad's personalized service or his extension of credit that kept him in business so long. I do know that if the red ink that was on his ledger when he died was transformed to black ink on his heavenly credit sheet—well, he has a high rating now.

"I like to think there are at least a million other storekeepers just like my father. . . still in business. . . and don't you know one, too?"

\$343,997 Set As Aid for 5 Mining Firms

WASHINGTON, March 16 (Special)—Five Idaho firms will receive \$343,997 in government assistance to aid in the development of new tungsten, lead and zinc deposits, the defense minerals exploration administration announced.

The contracts were among 25 signed in the first two months of this year with operators in nine states. Government funds totalled \$639,902 and the operators will furnish \$500,492 in additional costs.

The biggest individual contract of the 25 was with the Day Mines, Inc., for lead-zinc exploration in Shoshone county estimated to cost \$142,860. The government will supply 50 per cent of the cost.

Other Idaho firms winning contracts were Spokane Mining company for \$12,624; North Fork Mining company, \$44,500; and Galconda lead mines, \$80,000. All these were for lead-zinc exploration in Shoshone county and the government was committed to pay half of the cost.

Bradley Mining company received a \$112,000 contract for tungsten exploration in Latah county, with the government supplying \$56,000, or 75 per cent of the cost.

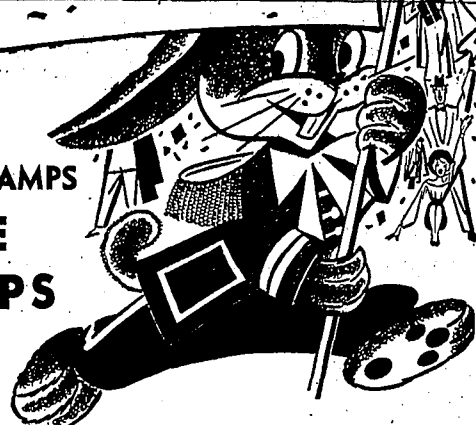

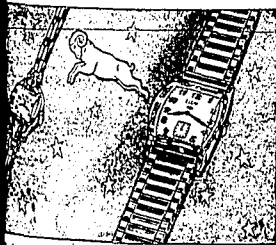

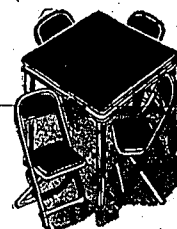

Peiping Radio Declares U. N. Girding Force

TOKYO, March 15 (AP)—The communist radio Peiping said today the United Nations command is "tensing up" all along the Korean battle front.

Peiping indicated the reds believe the allies are preparing to launch a major assault in Korea, including amphibious attacks on both coasts.

In reporting the "tensing up" along the front, the broadcast said since Jan. 1 "our enemy troop dispositions have been made along the whole battlesfront."

"Reinforcements and fresh supplies have been brought up," it said. "Obstructions previously erected were removed all along the front in the latter part of February."

"At the same time, large quantities of ammunition and military supplies have been sent by enemy air-planes to islands off the eastern and western coasts."

Grange Builds Special Pieces Of Furniture for Polio Ward

Several of the problems which go with a handicapped existence have been solved for patients at Magic Valley Memorial Hospital by a Twin Falls Grange project.

The Grangers have constructed 11 pieces of special furniture which are bound to bring joy to polio patients.

The furniture was designed and assembled by J. T. Creed—known in the polio ward as "Polio Pete"—and handed out to patients by the other Grange members.

One article is a play table, built to a height for pre-school children, with a ball-circle cut in each of the four sides. Creed calls this the "shamrock" table. The children, by taking seats in the half-circles, may lean to either side for support and find it impossible to topple off their chairs, should they tire.

Creed found the greatest challenge in building a reading stand for the rocking bed. The stand, held by a metal arched bar, tilts down facing the patient as he lies upon the bed. The stand is faced with a clear-plastic cover which holds magazine or book in place.

Other articles include small tables for bed or wheelchair and reading stands which fit atop either the bed or wheelchair table.

The patients find the stands convenient for drawing or working at hobbies as well as for reading. The bed tables make it possible for a number of the patients to feed themselves.

Materials for the furniture were furnished by Twin Falls Feed and Ice company, Home Lumber company and Sears, Roebuck and company.

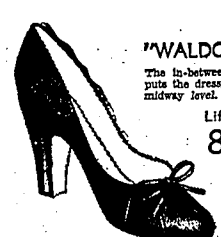

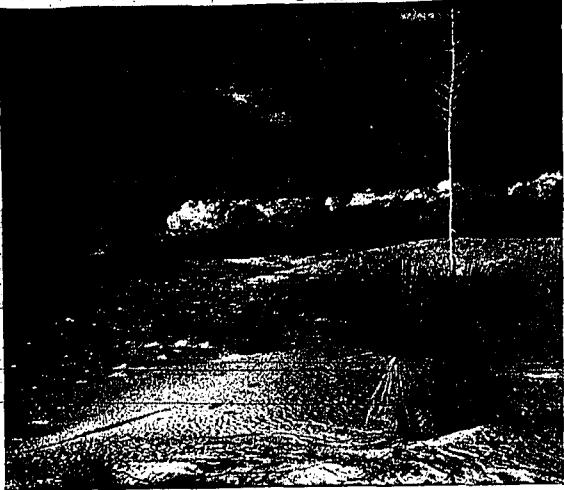

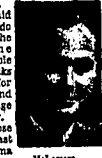
"I'm home, but late, and at such a part of this country at Plymouth rock, the liberty bell and shouting evangelists.

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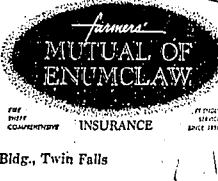
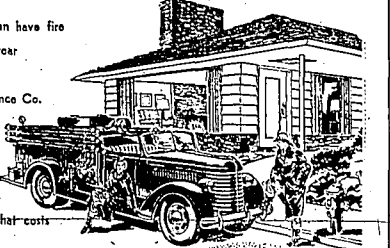

Segments of Nation Have Top Interest in Government vs. Business Battle Over Power

(From One) information existed at the time of the strike.

Today no one is in a better position to know the facts than the men who were in the front lines of the struggle. It is to be expected that the men who were in the front lines of the struggle will have a different view of the situation than the men who were in the rear.

There is no power shortage, nationally, that necessitates the construction of great hydro projects, in case of another war.

These are the main contentions by advocates of public power.

1. Where possible a project should have more than the usual function of generating electricity. It should be "multipurpose," embracing irrigation, flood control, soil conservation, recreational facilities and the conservation of wild life. Since these functions are "non-reimbursable," private industry is not interested in building to fulfill them.

2. The charge of socialism is false and designed as a scare head. Former President Truman said last year the power industry had learned from its mistakes and was now ready to accept the TVA in general and the TVA in particular. Since the survey also showed that people were opposed to socialism, Truman continued, the power companies have decided to use the charge of socialism as the core of what he termed their "propaganda."

Truman also had a reply to the charge of unfairness to the taxpayers. He said it is unfair to both taxpayers and the customers of utility companies to have the charge of "propaganda and advertising" when these outlays are classed as an operating expense and there are no other alternatives.

3. The margin of surplus power, across the nation, is so small it constitutes in effect a power shortage. "Brownouts" and shutdowns of aluminum production lines in some areas when rainfall is below normal are proof of this.

4. Power companies in a given area tend to become a monopoly through government power. The threat of it—has tended to bring rates down and hold them down.

The great, multipurpose projects like Hoover dam and Grand Coulee are beyond the capacity of private capital. If the federal government had not built them, they never would have come into being. Many subsidiary arguments are noted in addition to these main assertions. In most recent cases the

power executives repeatedly have expressed optimism about the possibility of a change in the federal power program. Whether they sound the basis for this in campaign speeches or merely in the belief that a new philosophy has come to Washington has not been spelled out.

During the campaign Mr. Eisenhower set forth his views on the problem in Portland, Spokane, Seattle, Memphis and Knoxville. In the northwest he said he favors the decentralization of authority and greater state control over public projects. He called for a new interstate body for the Columbia valley.

In the southeast, at Memphis, he praised the TVA for its accomplishments but said:

"We should not, however, look upon the TVA as a rigid pattern for such developments in other regions. Our goal should be to work out river basin developments the way the people in the region want it done."

Reviewing these statements at San Francisco, Clyde Ellis, executive manager of the Rural Electric Cooperative association—one of the biggest of all public power operations—came to the conclusion: "As far as we can see, he simply supported the platform."

In January Oregon's Gov. Douglas McKay came before a senate committee. He had been designated secretary of the interior. The committee questioned him closely on various aspects of the power controversy. He had the following exchange with Democratic Senator Murray, Montana:

McKay—Well, senator, I believe likewise that private enterprise has a right to pursue their business. They haven't had fair treatment under the administration because they haven't been allowed to have more than one-year contracts.

I don't think that either private or public power should be given any advantage over the other. They ought to be able to work side by side under the northwest power pool. They should be given equal opportunity. I wouldn't want to see either one of them have special privileges or be penalized.

Murray—You believe, then, "in continuing the public power policies?"

McKay—Oh, yes, sure.

Murray—For the construction of the dams?

McKay—Oh, yes, the construction of the dams. They must be. The only way they can be built—the big ones—is through the federal government.

Murray—Mr. Wilson, of the General Electric company, some short time ago... advocated the turning over of these dams that have been developed by the government to private industry. Do you recall that?

McKay—I recall his statement. Private enterprise should not take them unless they pay for them.

Murray—Are you in favor of turning it over to them on the basis of having them pay for it? Do you think that private enterprise should take over those dams?

McKay—No.

Murray—You don't believe that TVA should be turned over to private enterprise?

McKay—No.

Murray—Do you believe that atomic energy should be turned over to private enterprise?

McKay—Well, I haven't considered the question... I think that private enterprise should be allowed to assist in the development of anything that has value to the public in general. I don't think they should be excluded from it.

In answer to a question by Senator Long, D. La., McKay related a view Mr. Eisenhower had expressed during the campaign.

McKay said: "People at the local level are better able to decide what is better for them than somebody in Washington."

On the hard-fought question of the "priority clause" in the sale and distribution of power, McKay had an exchange with Senator Jackson, D. Wash. The "priority clause" gives preference to REA and other public bodies for government electricity.

McKay—If there is only so much power available in a given area, and you have the cities, the REA co-ops, the public utility districts and other public bodies that need power, isn't it sound public policy that when power is generated from government-owned dams it ought to be first sold to the public bodies?

McKay—Not necessarily. It is sound public policy that the citizens all be treated alike.

McKay—But this is federal property. We have had the preference clause in the sale of war surplus goods and a thousand and one things to municipalities.

McKay—Yes, but here in this situation you have people who have

no alternative. They have to buy power from the privately owned power companies. Other people have publicly owned power. Now if that preference is in their, you are unfair to some of the people of the states, because they might want to buy from a publicly owned place and they can't.

McKay—That is a matter for local determination.

McKay—I don't think people should be prejudiced by unfair treatment because they happen to favor private enterprise.

Jackson—I gather you feel that the sale of power from federal dams ought to be on an equal basis with private utilities and public bodies?

McKay—Not necessarily equal, but they ought to have equal treatment. I grant that publicly owned projects probably have a priority on publicly produced power.

In the end the committee voted unanimously to endorse and confirm McKay's nomination.

So it stands in Washington today.

A Democrat is apprehensive about "the evolving philosophy of the big deal."

Power company executives express hope that private enterprise will regain "at least some part of

the socialized segment of business." The radical moves in the direction of either of the contending groups. All over the country people are watching to see what may come.

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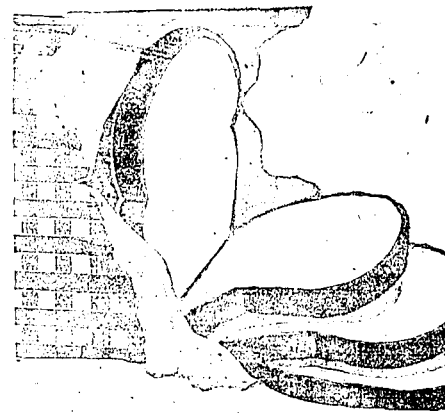

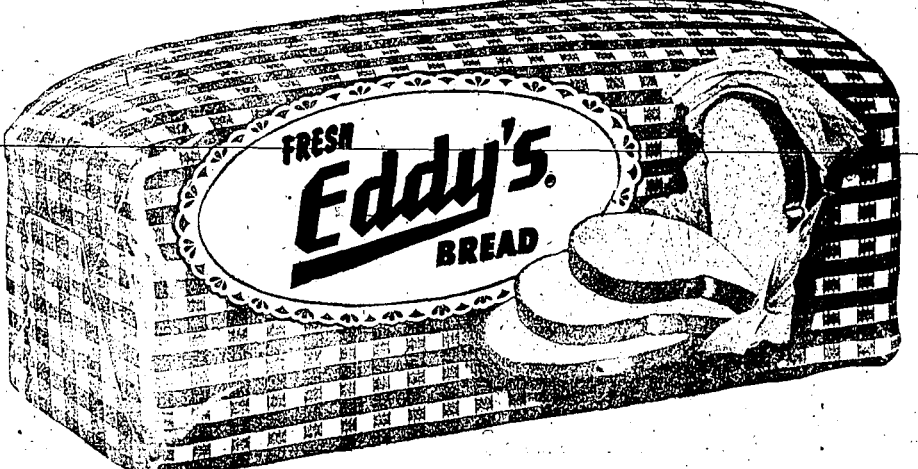

Decontrol Orders Free U. S. Economy, But Have Minor Effect on Most Prices

WASHINGTON, March 10 (AP)—Consumer price control, born in a price panic, is dying amid economic calm.

This could sound silly to the housewife finding coffee dating at much as three cents a pound higher at the supermarket today and 10 cents higher within a week.

But coffee, cigarettes, and a scant handful of other items are exceptions. In general, you'd hardly guess from retail price tags that the Eisenhower administration in just six weeks has ripped the ceiling from the cost-of-living.

If the markets are so steady why didn't the Democrats scrap the ceiling?

The answer is: They were nervous.

One price official, a Truman appointee about to leave Washington, thinks prices would rise that much even if the leaky OPG ceilings were left on.

But he suspects that another two billion dollars will be squeezed out of consumers later by the tax collector to pay for costly munitions, made of more costly materials.

In industry, executives predict price rises will be offset by declines in other lines, caused by big-volume production and hotter sales competition.

Few experts foresee a bigger rise in the consumer price index during 1952 in a free market, than the 1.6 per cent rise last year under price controls.

to the surprise of many, didn't follow copper up.

OPG believes coffee may wind up 10 to 12 per cent higher because Brazilian and Colombian producers are expected to cash in. But roasters and coffee roasters doubt that it would be possible to pass on the whole green coffee increase to consumers. Housewives balk at dollar coffee.

Some of the items still under control—steel, nickel, a few chemicals, machine tools and alloying metals—are priced right up to ceiling. When they are decontrolled, price rises gradually may force up the cost of manufactured goods.

But steel industry sources plead innocent. They said they hear no rumble in their trade of any plans for a general increase.

The Truman administration dragged its feet for seven months after Korea, hoping it could avoid direct controls and a repetition of the OPA fiasco of World War II.

When it finally froze prices and wages on Jan. 21, 1951, it took a lot of abuse from critics who cried: "Too little and too late." Two years later, with the international scene still explosive, it hesitated to untie.

President Eisenhower was unwilling to take a chance. Today only a few basic defense metals and machines remain under ceiling. These will be freed before April 30, when price-wage control authority expires.

Barring a new war scare, OPG men now hope that price boosts on decontrolled goods may cost the public a little more than one billion dollars a year. This is roughly a dollar for every 200 consumers spend.

The calmness, if not apathy, with which most markets reacted to six weekly batches of decontrol orders since Feb. 6 surprised many in Washington. But it did not astonish 200 leading retailers who met here a week ago.

In consensus, they predicted for the next few months "no big changes; major household appliances, steady; clothing, steady or a trifle down; foods, a few rises and some declines."

Cigarettes jumped a cent a pack soon after they were decontrolled. West coast fuel oil went up. Rice, OPG believes, may go up 2 1/2 per cent. Copper rose three cents a pound. Beer may go up a half-cent in some localities.

On the other hand, eastern gasoline firms who boosted prices had to back down. East coast fuel oil may not rise at all. Supplies are ample and the weather mild. Aluminum,

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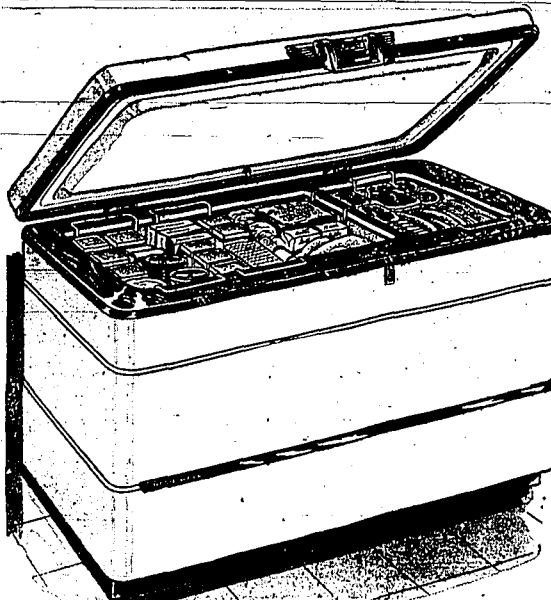

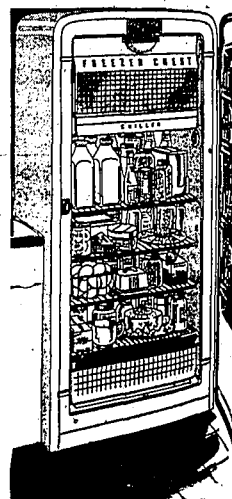

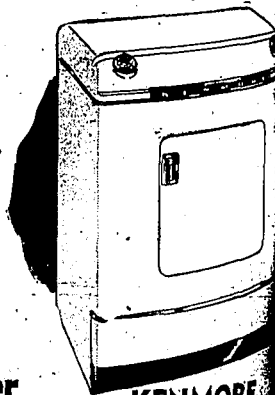

Skin Pigment Process Aids Cancer Fight

PORTLAND, Ore., March 16 (AP)—The chemical process by which human skin is colored has been duplicated in the laboratory here. Two research scientists believe that puts them one step forward in their battle against melanoma—the "black" cancer.

The American Cancer society today reported the test-tube duplication of nature's process by Drs. A. Bunsen Lerner and Thomas H. Fitzpatrick. The two medical men are biochemists carrying on their cancer society-financed research at the University of Oregon medical school.

Now that the skin-pigmentation problem has been licked—they can turn black skin white, then color it black again—here is the question: Does the chemical process of pigmentation differ in malignant growths and harmless growths? They think it does; think that they are on the track of that difference.

If they succeed, then they will be in a position to offer a reasonably certain method for diagnosing melanoma, the cancer that is pigmented and usually is black.

Melanoma is not a common cancer, but it is a deadly one.

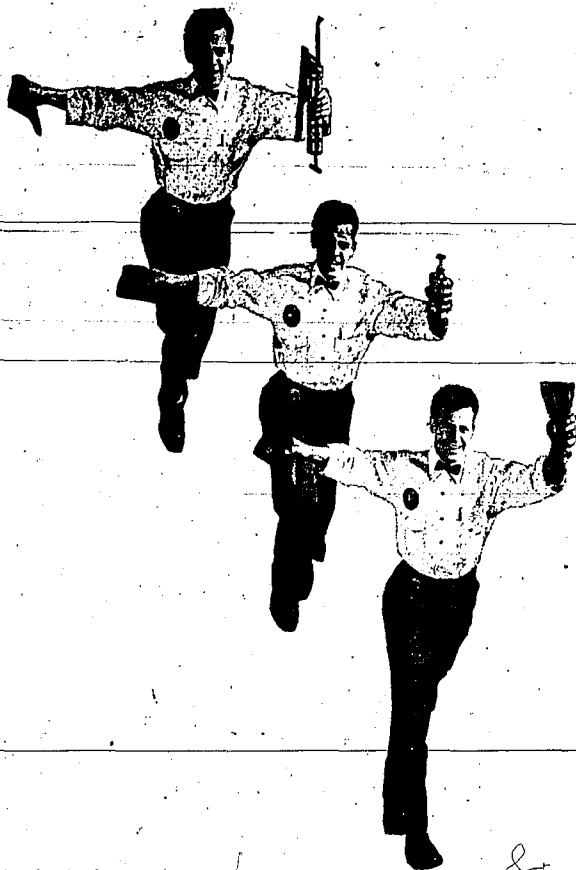

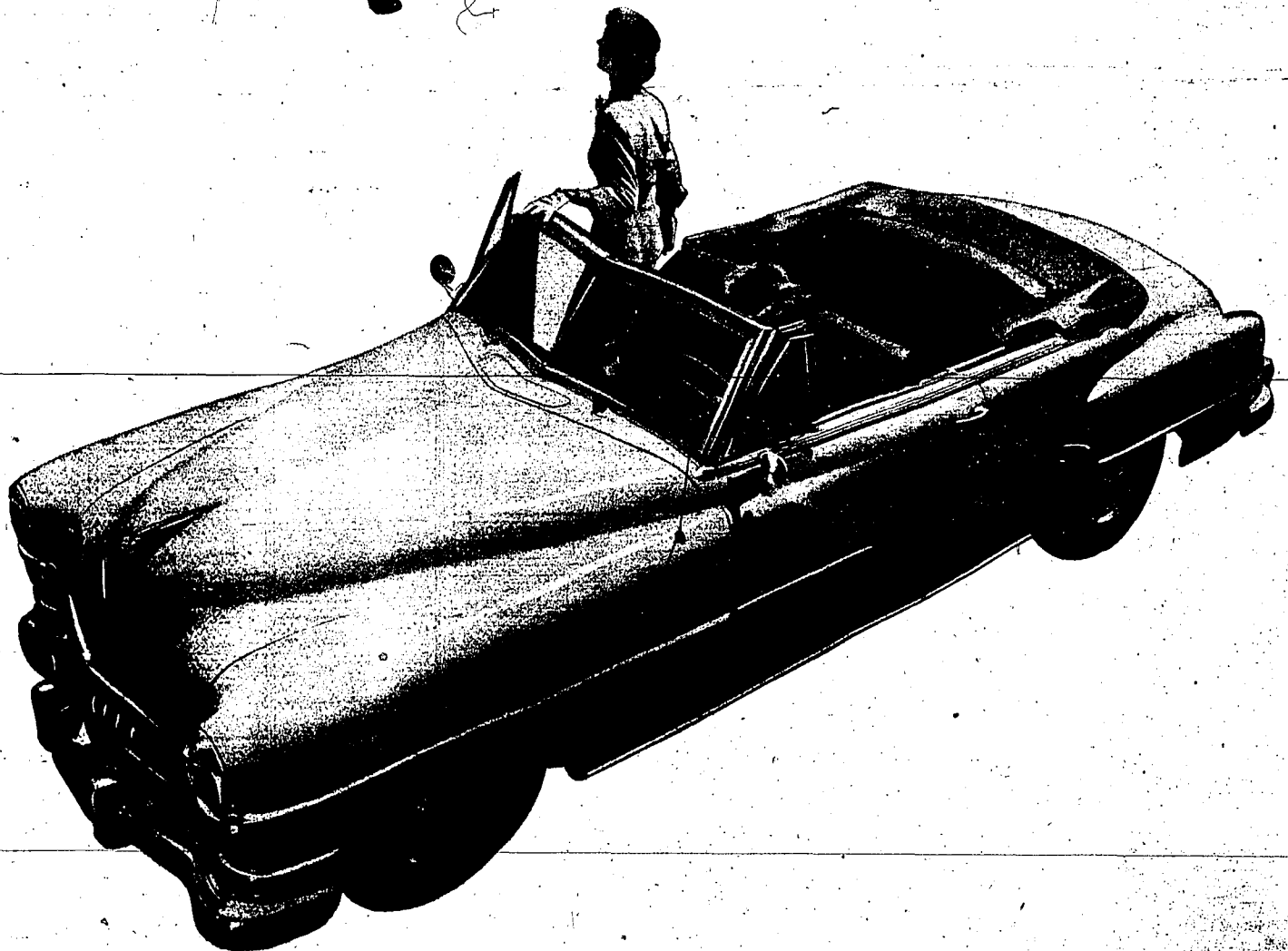

Lifelike Dummies to Be Used Tuesday In Atomic Blast at Nevada Testing Site

LAS VEGAS, Nev., March 13 (AP)—Lifelike dummies taking the place of human beings in furnished homes and automobiles will offer a graphic demonstration of what an A-bomb attack could do to Home town, U. S. A., when a new series of atomic tests opens tomorrow.

Weather permitting, an atomic device located atop a 300-foot tower will be detonated at approximately 11 a. m. (MST) Tuesday.

Present plans call for complete coverage of the 22nd nuclear explosion inside the 17-1/2-by-20-mile area. They will flash the awesome show of shows into homes in most of the nation.

Others will be placed near them so the effect of the blast, 100-times brighter than the sun, can be seen by all. Other dummies will be given protection in different types of bomb shelters.

The dummies in homes, automobiles and shelters will be dressed in various types of clothing made of several materials to demonstrate further which offer the most protection against the explosion's heat, fire and radiation.

Civil defense officials and reporters will be permitted to view the

aspect damage in portions of the test area free from radiation.

Many of the automobiles and dummies will be exhibited throughout the country later to give as many people as possible a vivid realization of atomic power.

Informed observers predicted the new test series at the government's proving grounds 63 miles northeast of here will include 10 nuclear explosions. This would mark the greatest number ever held in one program against the test site.

"At least one, probably the last, will mark the world's first firing of an atomic shell from the army's new 14-inch cannon.

Six of the explosions are expected to be from towers and possibly two or three atomic devices dropped from high-flying bombers.

Security-conscious atomic energy commission scientists refused to give any hint as to the type of nuclear device they are scheduled to explode. Nor would they disclose what problem of weapon development they hope to solve.

Some 1,000 manning troops, accompanied by 600 military observers and a few reporters and photographers will be in the area about three to four miles from the tower on the morning of the explosion.

"They will be backed up by some 800 newspapermen, radio commentators, photographers, governors, civil defense officials and other invited guests. All will gather atop a rocky hill known as News knob about 10 miles from the blast site.

Typical two-story frame houses are located varying distances from the tall tower, along with many cars and used automobiles, ranging from a shiny new Cadillac to beat-up jalopies. The fully-clothed dummies represent both children and adults. All may disappear at the moment of the explosion.

"Informed sources reported the blast, providing weather conditions permit it to be held, will be equivalent in power to about 15,000 tons of TNT, 5,000 tons less than the bomb dropped on Nagasaki in 1945.

One of the test purposes is to show the average American how much protection he can expect from his home or his automobile in the event of an atomic attack.

Need Proven for Spelling Lessons

CARBONDALE, Ill. (AP)—A southern Illinois educator has conducted a test to prove that spelling instruction still is an important part of a high school curriculum.

Charles Willard, an English instructor at Southern Illinois university, matched two sophomore high school classes against each other in a 12-week spelling experiment.

Both groups studied the same words at the same rate, but group "A" had much teacher help while group "B" tried to learn the words on its own.

In final tests group "A" scored a per cent. higher in spelling new words, 18 per cent. greater improvement in ability to spell specified words and had 25 per cent. greater ability to remember how to spell difficult words.
