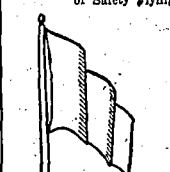

Shell Supply No Worry to U. N. Leader

MANILA, March 18 (U.S.—) — Mark W. Clark said today he is unworried about the ammunition problem in Korea at the present time.

The statement by the United Nations supreme commander came on the heels of a congressional inquiry into statements by former eighth army commander Gen. James A. Van Fleet that shortages of ammunition existed in Korea.

"At the present time I have no worry over the ammunition situation in Korea," Clark said just before taking off for Baguio, the summer capital city of the Philippines.

In the past, because ammunition stocks were not at the proper level they have caused his side to suffer.

Clark flew to Baguio after a round of conferences with U. S. Ambassador Raymond Spruance, Acting Defense Secretary Oscar Castelro and Foreign Secretary Joaquin P. Palomo.

Clark will return to Clark field tomorrow and is scheduled to depart for Indo-China Thursday afternoon.

"I think an exchange of views would be healthy for everyone concerned," Clark said.

U. N. Guards Halt Another Row in Camp

PUSAN, Korea, March 18 (U.S.—) — United Nations guards under test gear to quell a demonstration by 2,000 communist prisoners on Yeoncheon Island Monday, the U. N. prisoner of war command announced.

The demonstration took place in the same enclosure where 27 guards were killed and 42 wounded March 7 in a riot.

Guards put down Monday's demonstration with "non-toxic irritants" similar to tear gas.

The riot began when the prisoners refused to form up for a work detail.

In the other three compounds began screaming and singing communist slogans.

At Panmunjon yesterday, the communists charged the allied command in Korea "covered" the U. N. general assembly by adopting the "illegal" Indian peace plan in order to keep war prisoners.

North Korean Gen. Nam Il said the allies were "tearing up agreements" in an attempt to break off armistice negotiations.

(From Para One) falls hay or alfalfa hay and alfalfa hay and two or three pounds of grain has been proven to be sufficient for wintering calves to be grazed on pasture during the summer and finished on a finishing ration for a market weight of 1,000 pounds.

Under this system of production, an acre of pasture will produce an average of 14 pounds of beef with a range from 813 pounds for steers pastured during a short season to 811 pounds for steers on a low-feed level during the winter and pastured during an excellent growing season.

The rate of gain and the feed requirements of steers being finished are not affected by the level of nutrition during the winter period from 120 to 180 days on pasture, according to Hickman.

"Total winter and pasture gains of steers wintered on a low-feed level will not equal that of steers wintered on a higher level of nutrition. The total pasture gains will not entirely offset the lower gains of the steers on a low-level winter ration."

Huge U. S. Losses For Dairy Prices Support Forecast

WASHINGTON, March 18 (U.S.—) — The government will lose about 100 million dollars in its dairy price support program next year, John H. Davis, head of the agriculture department's commodity credit corporation, said Tuesday.

Testifying at a house agriculture subcommittee hearing on the dairy situation, Davis said the estimate was reached when Secretary Benson agreed to continue supporting dairy products at 90 per cent of parity for the year starting April 1.

Parity is a price calculated by law to be fair to the farmer in relation to the things he buys.

The agriculture department is buying large amounts of dairy products to prop the market and Davis said that by March 31 the CCC still owns some 120 million pounds of butter, 80 million pounds of cheese and 718 million pounds of dried milk powder.

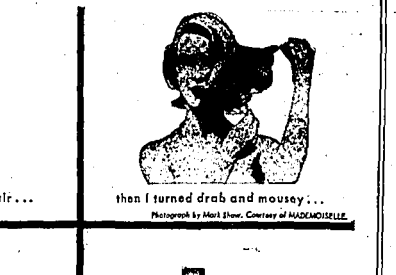

Rules for GI Rights Listed By VA Office

Veterans administration yardsticks for determining veterans' educational eligibility under the Korean GI bill of rights has been announced by Arnold Helweg, Twin Falls veterans administrator.

Helweg pointed out the law prohibits veterans from training under the Korean GI program toward goals already achieved through previous schooling and training or through job experience.

A veteran may select his final goal before beginning training under the law. He also must list his previous training and experience so the VA can rule on his proposed objective.

The veterans administration will not approve an application from a veteran with a certificate of honor if he wants to take another under-graduate college course merely to reach an educational objective.

However, the veteran may take such a course if he shows it is necessary to attain a specific educational or professional objective.

Similar regulations apply to veterans who wish to take below college-level courses where classroom instruction predominates.

In determining the veteran's qualifications for a vocational objective, the VA will base its decision on previous training, and employment records.

Helweg emphasizes the purpose of the regulations is to set up standards that can be used in determining whether Korean veterans already are qualified for the courses they apply for under the Korean GI law. It is not to deny training to those who need it.

Other Pacific Area Attacks Are Recalled

TOKYO, March 18 (AP)—The attack by Soviet aircraft on an American bomber Saturday was the third and possibly the fourth such incident in the North Pacific in the past two years.

An American B-29 with a crew of eight disappeared over the Nemuro peninsula, inside Japanese territory, last October. Only a few months before, its radar "pip" had merged with that of faster aircraft flying from Russian territory.

The United States subsequently protested the incident.

On Feb. 16, two Russian LA-11's, propeller-driven, fighter planes, crossed into Japanese territory and fired on two American Thunderbolt which sought to turn them back. The B-29s returned the fire, downing one of the Russian planes.

In 1951, a U. S. navy PB4V patrol bomber disappeared somewhere off the Russian base at Vladivostok.

Consumers on Their Own; All Controls Cut by Government

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP)—Consumers were strictly on their own for the first time in more than two years today as the government killed off the last of its price controls and returned the nation to a relatively free economy.

The action marked the end of a turbulent postwar experiment in direct price wage and credit curbs that began in the fall of 1950 after the Korean invasion.

It also signalled the beginning of the administration's attempt to use the give-and-take of free enterprise rather than government planning to keep the nation's economy running smoothly.

Price Stabilizer Joseph Freehill completed the step-by-step dismantling of price ceilings by removing controls on steel and a batch of industrial goods. All wage curbs were wiped out Feb. 6.

Decentralized industry has begun showing up some prices. Freehill reported increases on meat, coffee, cigarettes, lard and oils and in some places, motor oil and gasoline. He predicted prices would climb more than 3 billion dollars during the year.

The controls agencies are being dismantled rapidly. Freehill said his office will be liquidated by June 30 with all but five field offices shut down by April 5.

The price control program was one of the most controversial the government has ever undertaken. There are sharp differences of opinion on whether it was effective.

Solons Irked Over McKay's Lag on Aides

WASHINGTON, March 18 (Special)—Interior Secretary Douglas McKay's failure to fill key jobs in the department is provoking a series of public protests by western solons who have thus far remained silent in the interest of harmony with the White House.

"McKay has had long enough," a disgruntled mountain state senator commented this week. "Every other department has its top men in office and McKay hasn't even told us who he wants in some of his bureaus."

The biggest case in point is the commissioning of the bureau of reclamation. Mountain state representatives are anxious to have leadership settled before the introduction of the upper Colorado storage project, on which the states themselves are in substantial agreement.

Amid rumors that the present bureau may be completely reorganized, a dozen candidates for commissioner have been discussed with no results known yet.

One theory has been that the secretary is waiting for arrivals of Undersecretary Ralph Tudor, San Francisco, not scheduled to take over his duties until April 1.

"When he does get here, it will probably take a month for him to lock over the field," the senator pointed out.

Another case which disturbs congressmen is the bureau of land management. Edward Woodley, Idaho state land commissioner, was set for the job when McKay discovered that he had not received the resignation of Marion Clawson, holdover bureau chief from the Truman administration.

As far as anyone knows, Clawson has still not submitted his resignation. The reported plan is to transfer Clawson to a field job, probably in California.

The bureau of Indian affairs, an agency which critics have suggested as the one most in need of a housecleaning, is at a dead halt. Dozens of names are talked of, but no decision has been taken.

"We have nearly 60 Indian bills waiting for consideration," Sen. Arthur V. Watkins, R., Utah, chairman of the Indian affairs subcommittee of the senate interior committee, said pointedly. "Naturally we would like to hear the views of the new commissioner before taking action."

Another mystery is the lack of action on organizing the bureau of mines. Tom Lyon, veteran mining engineer in Utah, Idaho and Montana, and more recently associated with the defense mineral production administration, is supposed to

late over as chief. No one knows when. Some of the heads of bureaus and agencies from the past administration are expected to be continued in office by McKay. But the secretary has made no formal announcement, and the situation is awkward.

National Park Service Director Conrad L. Wirth is believed to be one of those who will carry on. The park service has been regarded traditionally as beyond political considerations.

Henry C. Dyer, head of the fish and wildlife service, also is expected to remain with the new administration.

Paul J. Raver, chief of the Bonneville power administration, was reported to have secured the backing of Sen. Guy Cordon, R., Ore., to remain in office. Gordon is McKay's closest adviser on Capitol Hill and usually gets what he wants in the interior department.

Raver is strongly opposed by Sen. Henry C. Dornbush, R., Ida., who has urged his removal for a long time.

"I am absolutely opposed to retention of new dealers in the administration, and especially the interior department," Dornbush declared. "The department should be completely reorganized in the interest of efficiency."

Westerners are still holding back from criticizing McKay himself, but as one put it: "That little guy seems to enjoy keeping things in suspense."

Wool Help Steps Being Discussed

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP)—Sen. Henry C. Dworshak, R., Ind., says he is convinced the administration will take steps soon to check what he calls the unfair competition of foreign wool with the domestic industry.

He said he had been assured by Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey that plans are being drawn to give the domestic wool industry a better break. Dworshak said he had been informed that the treasury department would soon make an investigation of a foreign government which has been flooding the U. S. market with wool at cheaper prices than the wool can be supplied by domestic producers.

Dworshak said the country was Uruguay, which reportedly shipped 15.5 million pounds of wool to the United States last year.
