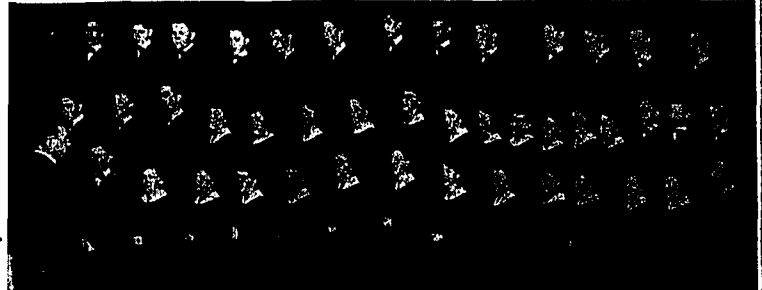

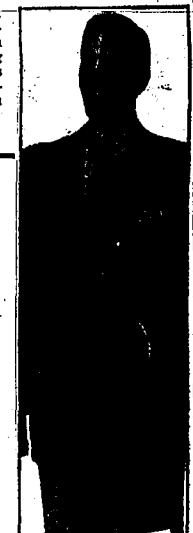

Funeral Held For Gottwald; Job Still Open

VIENNA, Austria, March 19 (AP)—The body of Czechoslovak dictator Klement Gottwald was put in a marble tomb today at a Blatná funeral, with his successor as president still unchosen.

Work was halted throughout Czechoslovakia for five minutes when the funeral ceremony started at 1 p. m. (6 a. m. PST) for the man who betrayed his country to the Russians and followed his idol Stalin to the grave.

Reported by Radio

The funeral ceremony was reported by the official Prague communist radio.

Vice premier and Slovak communist leader Vilian Siroky delivered the eulogy for Gottwald before the body was taken from the Spanish hall of Hradcany castle, where it had been in state, to a funeral place in the marble-walled monument of liberation.

"Comrade Gottwald, our good father," he was quoted as saying, "has left us a strong people's democracy based on the unshakable unity of the working people."

"He has left us the unshakable alliance with the Soviet union and the people's democratic allies. . . . We must rally before the glorious communist party and crush every enemy who might attempt to break our unity."

Czechoslovakia was born from the castle by eight pillars: including Soviet Marshal Nikolai Bulganin, the Russian prime minister, who was his country's representative.

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22,000 Facing Check on Red Links in U. S.

NEW YORK, March 19 (AP)—Attorney Herbert Brownell Jr. says nearly 22,000 foreign-born residents of the United States are under investigation for possible communist links.

He adds that they will be subject to eventual deportation where evidence is found that they have violated our immigration and nationality laws.

The widening inquiry are part of a campaign to rid the nation of subversives, Brownell told the Society of the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick at a dinner Tuesday night.

Worthy of Saint

"It's a job worthy of a modern-day St. Patrick to drive these snakes from our shores," the attorney-general declared.

He said that among those under scrutiny are nearly 10,000 naturalized citizens "believed to be or to have been engaged in subversive activities or presently to be or to have been members of, or affiliated with, the Communist party."

Expulsion Plan

"These investigations are to determine whether their naturalization can be revoked," Brownell added. "If naturalization is revoked by the courts, these persons will again be aliens and subject to deportation."

About 12,000 being probed are aliens residing in the U. S., Brownell said.

Wherever these investigations uncover evidence of membership in or affiliation with the Communist party," Brownell said, "expulsion proceedings will be instituted against these aliens."

EPC Studies Plan On Consumer Aid

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—The federal power commission today began studying the problem of whether public utilities' consumers should benefit from rapid tax write-offs granted the companies under the defense program.

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Probe Unveils Big Row Over 'Cancer Drug'

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., March 19 (AP)—A state legislative investigation of the controversy over "cancer drug" krebion has uncovered an explosive charge that two businessmen and "officials" of the American Medical Association were involved in a "conspiracy" to hamper research on the drug.

The legislative investigation commission will meet in executive session next week, probably Wednesday, to hear answering testimony from both sides in the dispute. Open hearings will resume in Chicago April 9 and 10.

Charges Veiled
An attorney for Dr. Andrew C. Ivy, a leading champion of krebion, testified yesterday the renowned physiologist was "plagued" by a "conspiracy" which "extended even into the ranks of American Medical Association officials."

Attorney John F. Sembover, Chicago, added that Ivy would offer affidavits later to show that "two American businessmen" tried to get control of the serum and tried to discredit it when they failed.

Ivy testified that the originator of the drug, Dr. Stefan Duricic, once told him an official of the AMA warned Duricic he "must" give distribution rights to the two businessmen.

Not Named
The businessmen were not named at yesterday's hearing.

Ivy said he was "so certain" of the drug's value in cancer management that he would like to see a show-down test of it on a group of volunteer patients. He said AMA reports calling krebion "worthless" were not based on valid experiments.

Ivy is vice president of the University of Chicago's professional schools in Chicago, but he is "on leave" so he can continue research on krebion.

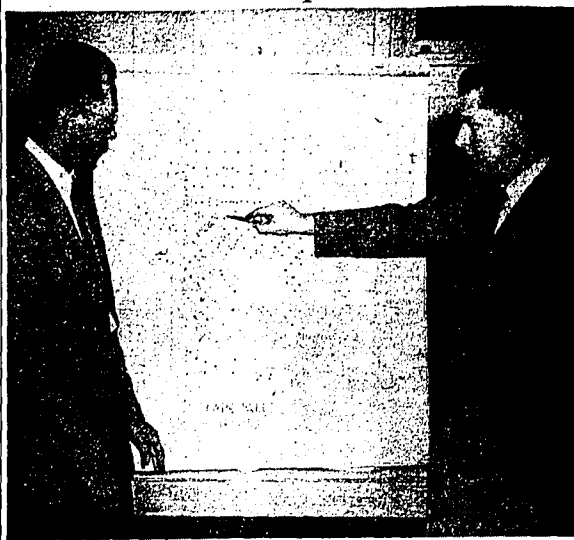

"Forgotten" Indo-China War Has High Priority From U. S.

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—The United States is spilling everything but blood in Indo-China where Gen. Mark W. Clark is visiting to stiffen the anti-communist axis in Asia.

The Eisenhower administration rates the French war against communist forces in Indo-China strategically equal to the United Nations war against communists in Korea. Military authorities say the communists must be stopped in Indo-China if a victory over communists in Korea is to mean anything.

Clark's visit, therefore, is of the highest military and diplomatic importance. The supreme commander of U. N. forces in Korea will seek to arrange, first, for an exchange of military training teams. Americans experienced and successful in training South Koreans for tough, frontline duty, will be sent to help train the Vietnamese. That training plan has a peculiar relation to world-wide anti-communist strategy.

The over-all Eisenhower map-power policy is to shift the frontline burden in Korea from American to Korean soldiers. The French have resisted the idea of accepting American training assistance but are reported now to be ready to accept it to disengage their own soldiers.

The disengagement of North Atlantic treaty organization troops from direct combat with communist forces anywhere in Asia is basic in longhaul Eisenhower strategy. France will be unable to meet her military manpower requirements for western European defense until she is relieved of the Indo-China frontline battle drain. French junior officers and sergeants actually are being killed in Indo-China faster

than they can be trained and sent to combat.

French Premier Rene Mayer is expected here next week to confer with President Eisenhower. Clark's report on the situation in Indo-China will be in Washington by then. Pressure upon the French premier to hurry-up a Vietnamese training program and the disengagement of French troops would be warranted by the high priority the United States gives the Indo-China conflict. American military aid shipments to Indo-China have priority second only to arms and ammunition for Korea.

The United States military aid program for the French in Indo-China is estimated at about one billion dollars, of which 600 million dollars worth of arms, tanks, bulldozers and such has been delivered. An economic aid program, now nearly completed, will cost about 100 million dollars.

Water, Clubs Used to Block Reds in Reich

BONN, Germany, March 19 (AP)—Police drove back shouting communist demonstrators with clubs, fire hoses and a huge "water cannon" today as the West German parliament prepared to ratify the six-nation European army pact.

Two thousand reds moved on the parliament building in groups. They fought with fists in an attempt to break the strong police cordons surrounding the building.

The first wave of reds was driven back with clubs. Then the police turned fire hoses on the mob and finally opened up with their huge water cannon mounted on a truck. Water played on the demonstrators through four high-pressure nozzles.

The reds had orders to break up the debate which opened in the Bundestag, lower house of parliament, this afternoon on the army pact and the allied peace pact with West Germany.

Adenauer Determined
Chancellor Konrad Adenauer was determined to push through ratification of the two measures before he goes to Washington in one month to talk to President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

Anticipating red riots, the government moved 2,000 police into the capital from nearby cities to help the local force and erected barbed wire barricades around parliament and other government buildings.

Other West German cities also made elaborate preparations for communist demonstrations when the reds threatened to protest the army plan.

Grandmother sent the children a box of cookies she had made expressly for them. There were macaroons, butter tins and almond stars. Mother told Susan Jane, 4, that she could pass the cookies, something she loved to do.

First, she picked out one of the almond stars, ate it, while a pleased expression crossed her face. Next she went to a side table and began picking out the almond stars. She had taken almost all of them when her mother said, "What are you doing, Susan Jane?"

"I'm picking out the almond stars for me."

"Put them all back. You must not do that."

"But I like them."

"Never mind. Put them back. That would be very selfish. You will like them, too. You must share them."

Back they went, but slowly, and when Susan Jane passed the cookies she was careful to keep the side of the plate on which she had put the almond stars close to her. Nobody said anything about it, but few took any of the cherished cookies.

Little children are self-centered. They do not know about our adult idea of sharing and should not be scolded for being selfish. In time, as they grow older, they can be taught to share what they have.

We must be very careful about the teaching, however, and not force it. When a child is forced to give what he wants to hold, he is not giving unselfishly, but grudgingly. We have, therefore, done just the opposite of what we hoped to do. We have helped to bring dislike, grudging and resentment, where we had hoped to encourage good will. Self interest, if implanted in each of us, it should be kept within reasonable bounds, but forcing generosity will not tend to do that.

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Legislature Failed to Heed All of Aid Appeals Voiced by Municipal Officials

Zeller's note This is another in a series of articles reviewing actions of the 1936 Idaho legislature.

BOISE, March 19—Idaho municipal officials went to the legislature with a list of financial woes and came out with the same troubles.

A bill to give cities a share of the liquor fund surplus was approved, but one to give them a bigger bite out of the highway revenue was killed in the senate.

Some Idaho communities will be even more hard pressed for funds in the future. The legislature knocked out slot machines effective Jan. 1, 1934, and revenue from the "one-armed bandits" has been a main financial prop for many communities.

Nampa's Mayor Preston Capell, a leader in the Idaho Municipal League's drive for more funds for cities, criticized defeat of the highway fund bill, saying cities and towns are "falling in the rear" by paying 40 per cent of the gasoline tax and receiving less than two per cent of the money back to be used on their own streets.

A main reason for the bill's defeat: By giving up a dollar for primary route, the state would give up another dollar in federal matching funds.

Some state counties neither profited nor lost much in the way of revenue as a result of the legislature, said W. L. Hendrix, veteran Ada county commissioner and secretary of the State Association of County Clerks and Commissioners.

The liquor fund surplus bill was watered down from the original request. When introduced, it would have given cities 15 per cent of the profits, they now receive none. The house amended it down to 15 per cent, and the senate slashed that to seven and one-half per cent.

Last year the state liquor dispensary had a surplus of about three million dollars if the bill had been in effect then it would have meant apportionment of \$25,000 to incorporated cities and villages in accordance with their population—about 75 cents per person.

The new truck licensing bill may give counties some additional revenue. Its backers said it would produce a million dollars more a year in revenue, of which 30 per cent goes to the counties and larger cities.

Offsetting this increase will be the loss to counties of fines collected as a result of state police arrests. They formerly went to the counties, but under the new uniform highway safety code 90 per

cent go back to the state highway fund and counties keep only 10 per cent. The counties will continue to get 30 per cent back from the highway fund. The bill takes effect Jan. 1.

Arrests by state police in 1931 resulted in payments of \$168,000 in fines. Hardly a hit with the counties having permanent ports of entry, Bannock, Bonneville, Cassia, Kootenai and Twin Falls.

The bill to abolish the 85 payment for election judges attending election schools will relieve counties of some financial burden. Hendrix said the counties paid out more than \$25,000 for the schools last year. Also, there may be fewer judges to pay. The legislature increased the maximum number of voters per precinct from 600 to 800.

Counties will get a new source of revenue in trailer house licensing. House trailers will be licensed at \$1 per foot, half the proceeds remaining with the county and the other half going to the state highway fund.

Those counties whose assessed valuation was slightly over seven and one-half million dollars were caught in a squeeze for tax levying purposes, but the session passed a bill to permit them to raise more money. Under the old law counties with assessed valuation of less than seven and one-half million could levy up to 1 per \$100 valuation, while those above could levy only up to 60 cents. It was amended to permit counties with more than seven and one-half million valuation to levy enough mills to raise \$65,000 if the

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60 cents per \$100 valuation didn't bring in that much.

The state tax commission said 10 counties probably would be affected by the new law. Bear Lake, Blaine, Clearwater, Franklin, Fremont, Lewis, Minidoka, Owyhee, Payette and Washington. Two others—Cron and Lemhi—are just under the \$7,500,000 mark, but probably will be affected by it in a few years.

Legislation was passed allowing pay raises for nearly all county officials and elected city officials. Gov. Len Jordan vetoed a bill which would have increased mileage allowance for county officials from 7 to 10 cents a mile.

Idaho's two first class cities were permitted to raise their mayors' salaries to \$7,200. Both have taken advantage of the provision. Nampa, increasing its salary to \$4,000 and Idaho Falls to \$7,200.

A bill was passed to require second class cities to set salaries of their elected officials by ordinance.

Other major bills:

1. Provide for nomination and election of city commissioners in odd years, those being elected in 1934 to serve one or three years.

2. Require city, village and county boards to hold open meetings when final action is taken on matters.

3. Require cities and villages to publish quarterly a statement of receipts and expenditures and an annual, instead of semi-annual, financial statement.

4. Permit deduction from city employees' wages for group insurance and pensions.

In his report, John Brog, manager, said line losses were down four per cent under last year. Accruals have been changed to high voltage, he said.

E. E. Leisig, power superintendent at Minidoka dam, spoke on the progress of the company. J. E. Cavallone, Boise public accountant,

who audited the books, reported that the financial condition of the company is good. Minor changes were made in amendments of the by-laws.

At a previous meeting of the boards of directors of the East End Electric and Rural Electric companies Brog reported that an agreement was reached whereby the Rural Electric will take over the maintenance of the East End Mutual this year.

Thorez's case is different. He reportedly has been reported on the verge of returning to Paris to resume leadership of the French reds.

This week British, comrades reporting on Stalin's funeral, reported he had had a "relapse" through over-exertion after his long convalescence. The word they brought back from Moscow is that Thorez has had a second cerebral hemorrhage.
