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'Benson Plan' Ruled Out by USDA's Chief

WASHINGTON, March 25 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Henry Benson promised Tuesday there will never be a "Benson farm plan."

He told the House subcommittee on agriculture he hopes and expects a new and improved farm program to be developed, but from "grass-roots" and in contrast rather than from a secretary of agriculture.

Benson had said the present program is the "Benson Plan," but the last new farm program laid before Congress became known as the "Benson Plan," after Benson's democratic predecessor, Charles F. Brannan.

That Brannan plan, offered in 1940, but never adopted, envisioned broader government participation in farm affairs than the present program. It went far beyond the amount of participation favored by Benson himself.

No legislation

The new secretary said he considered it the duty of the secretary of agriculture to express his views on farm legislation, but not to attempt to dictate.

"I believe that to improve present farm programs," he said, "I also believe that we can make the department more efficient and at the same time reduce its cost."

Benson was asked his view as to future trends in cattle prices which have been declining during the past 12 months. He said prices have become fairly well stabilized in recent weeks, largely because of increased consumption encouraged by lower meat prices.

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Elmore Man's Freedom Plea Gets Approval

BOISE, March 25 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court today granted the petition of William E. Elmore, a man who had been sentenced to life in the state penitentiary, where he is serving a sentence for second degree murder.

The court reversed a decision by Ada County District Judge Charles E. Winfield in which Elmore was denied freedom because he had not shown good behavior credits he had claimed.

Sentenced in 1943

Elmore entered the penitentiary May 6, 1942, after sentencing in district court in Elmore county to a term of 10 to 12 years. He was later sentenced to life in the penitentiary for the same offense after the killing of a 65-year-old man April 3, 1942.

Elmore's minimum sentence would have expired May 4, 1954. The state board of corrections revoked his good behavior credits because he was convicted of a crime during his term of confinement and failing to obey orders. Last July if he had his release on the basis of good time accumulated since then.

The district court held that once having been denied his good behavior credits he was entitled to the same subsequent time as the board specifically directed to him.

Reversed ordered

The supreme court ruled in an unanimous opinion written by Justice Raymond L. Owens, declared "The Elmore case is a landmark in overlooking the part of the order of the board which disallows good time credits on the basis of good time accumulated since then."

The court held Elmore was entitled to release and instructed the district court to issue an order releasing him.

"The city is going to be a traffic and parking specialist," Henry K. Evans, yesterday in a discussion with representatives from the six Idaho cities.

Evans is on the staff of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce. His organization and the Boise chamber sponsored the meeting, attended by officials from Boise, Nampa, Caldwell, Idaho Falls, Ontario and Kootenai.

Evans said 98 per cent of parking improvements in the nation are accomplished with parking lots or garages, have been done with private capital.

Ice Harbor Dam Project Needed, McKay Declares

WASHINGTON, March 25 (AP)—Secretary of the Interior McKay says the importance of building Ice Harbor dam on the Snake river in Washington cannot be overemphasized from the standpoint of national defense.

The secretary advised a reporter a letter he wrote Rep. Holmes, R. Wash., McKay sent a copy to the director of the budget.

Holmes had written McKay he hoped former President Truman's budget recommendation that funds be provided for construction of Ice Harbor dam would not be eliminated.

McKay replied he was in full agreement about the need of the dam—"an important element in the comprehensive plan for development of the Columbia river basin."

He said the dam would provide an important source of power for the Hanford plant of the atomic energy commission, and that this would be in line with the commission's policy to provide additional generating plants in the areas in which it located plants.

Reds Build up Bomber Force

TOKYO, March 25 (AP)—Gen.otto P. Weiland, U. S. far east air force commander, said today the communists have added modern bombers to their air forces in an attempt to strengthen their capability for offensive warfare.

Weiland also said in an exclusive interview that no targets in the Far East at the present time would be "justly the expenditure of atomic weapons." He said he "doubted" that any would be used in the Far East against the U. N. in Korea unless they wanted to launch off World War III.

Weiland said Soviet air forces based in the far east "seem now to have leveled off... at more than 4,500 aircraft."

He estimated that roughly one-fourth of these Russian planes are based on Sakhalin and the Kurile Islands, a few minutes flying time north of Japan.

Farmers Plan To Hike Crop, Hay Planting

BOISE, March 25 (AP)—Idaho farmers plan to plant about seven per cent more crop this spring than last, the U. S. department of agriculture crop reporting service said Tuesday.

The service's report said a record 800,000-acre seeding of spring wheat in Idaho was planned for this spring than last, the U. S. department of agriculture crop reporting service said Tuesday.

The report indicated that the 1942 seeding and nine per cent greater than the previous record of 733,000 acres, set in 1931.

Reeeding Needed

Because of the dry fall and winter, said the report, little winter wheat was planted this year and what was planted did not do well and much acreage will have to be reseeded.

Indicated spring wheat seedings in north Idaho would not set a record as in south Idaho would make up for it, the report added.

More Potatoes

Potato growers indicated they will plant 150,000 acres of potatoes in more than in 1951 but no record. The increase is expected to be highest in the eastern part of the state.

Growers were reported planning to plant 80,000 acres of potatoes, an 11 per cent increase, 18 per cent more dry beans and 10 per cent more dry peas.

Army Places Ban On Class Division

WASHINGTON, March 25 (AP)—The White House announced today the army will end segregation of students in all schools operated on army posts entirely with federal funds.

The decision was announced following an inquiry made at the request of President Eisenhower.

The White House also disclosed that army commanders are studying ways to end segregation in schools operated by states on army installations.

tion had now begun to affect the mother's health.

A telegram was dispatched by the local Red Cross office asking the whereabouts of the father. In the meantime the baby had undergone an operation and was in critical condition.

National Red Cross headquarters replied the father could not be located on a Saturday. A telegram was sent to the adjutant-general requesting additional information.

The father arrived in Boise at 2 a. m. Sunday. The father and undergone a second operation, he is still living.

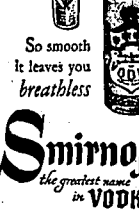

Area Pipeline Bid Explained And Defended

WASHINGTON, March 25 (AP)—The Pacific Northwest pipeline company's proposed natural gas pipeline from the San Juan basin field to Washington state was described, attacked and defended Tuesday.

Vice President Richard D. Ricketts of the Houston, Tex. Fish Engineering company, described and defended the proposed 1,400-mile pipeline at a power commission hearing on five applications to pipe gas to the Pacific northwest.

The 10-million-dollar pipeline would carry gas from the San Juan basin field in Colorado and New Mexico. It was designed by Ricketts and would run through parts of Utah, Wyoming, Idaho (including Snake Valley), Oregon and Washington.

Attorneys for other applicants indicated they will fight the Pacific project on grounds Pacific hasn't proved it has adequate gas reserves and the pipeline would be "skimpy." They succeeded in barring introduction of some of Ricketts' testimony, at least temporarily, on production possibilities of wells in San Juan basin field.

Ricketts testified on details of the company's proposed gathering system, saying Pacific would drill 400 wells.

1,600 Navaho Indians to Aid State Farmers

—BOISE, March 25 (AP)—About 1,600 Navaho Indians will be imported to Idaho this spring to help with the alfalfa crop, the employment security agency said today.

He said fewer Texas Mexicans are expected this year, because crops are doing better in Texas. About 600 Mexicans helped with sugar beets in Idaho last year.

Embargo Slated For Dried Dairy Product Imports

WASHINGTON, March 25 (AP)—The agriculture department has placed an embargo on imports of dried whole milk, dried buttermilk and dried cream, effective April 1.

This action was taken, the agency said, to prevent displacement of domestically-produced dairy products in the U. S. market at a time when the government is buying large quantities of dairy commodities under a farm price support program.

At the present time, these dairy products are being imported under quotas. Higher, non-fat dried milk and high-fat milked milk from abroad, already are barred. This action did not change import quotas permitting limited quantities of cheese to be brought in.

The department is empowered by the defense production act to deny entry to dairy and some other farm products if such imports will impair domestic production, interfere with orderly marketing and storing, or result in unnecessary burdens or expenditures under price support program.

House Leaders Hope for Tax Cut, but Economy Due First

By LYLE C. WILSON
WASHINGTON, March 25 (AP)—Speaker Joseph W. Martin, Jr., hopes congress can reduce income taxes this year, but he said government economy comes first.

"That is what we are trying to do," Martin said. "We hope we can make a tax cut possible in 1933."

Martin and Chairman Leo E. Allen of the house rules committee can make or break any effort to cut taxes. They have firm alliances with the senate and treasury department, there is no reason for running a treasury deficit in Washington.

Allen, R. S. C., is chairman of the most powerful committee in congress. Allen's rules committee determines what shall and shall not be brought to the house floor for debate. There are ways of getting around the rules committee, but they are thorny.

Chairman Daniel A. Reed, R. N. Y. of the house ways and means committee was threatening to bypass Allen to get a 1932 tax reduction bill before the house. Reed has been here since 1919. He is one of the powerful men in congress. But when it came to changing Allen's rules committee authority, Reed backed down.

Allen is getting some small from angry taxpayers. They would be better to center their fire on the house and senate appropriations committee and on President Elean-

committee and on President Elean-hover. Allen will tell you he wants a tax cut as much as anyone, and he means it.

"But we must balance the budget first," Allen said. "We must appropriate less for the executive departments to spend if taxes are to be reduced."

"Cutting taxes and then borrowing money to cover a deficit about \$200 million is all right in war or a depression. But with full employment and generally good farm prices, there is no reason for running a treasury deficit in Washington."

"It shall not be a party to borrowing any more money to pay government costs."

Allen has been in congress since 1913. He knows tax reduction is popular. But he is a team player and as chairman of rules, Allen intends to hold the line against a tax cut until that balanced budget is in sight.

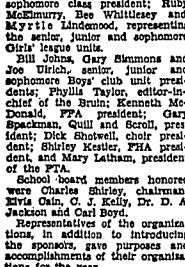

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

"I am at the end of my rope. I have two children, a boy and a girl, and they won't obey me. I tried kindness, and have been very good to them. I gave them what I could, and now they refuse to listen to me. I tried force and it worked. You did approve of this method. What am I to do if they won't mind until I get the strap?"

What is kindness to children? Giving them what they want in order to keep peace with them? Letting them have their way when it is clearly wrong? That is not being kind to them, on the contrary it is a selfish way of eating manners when they might mean discomfort.

Kindness to children often involves a combat of wills, and surely a parent ought to be stronger than

child? A father or mother ought to know what is good for a child. Using a strap to force obedience has had practice. It will subdue a child for a while, but it does not incline him to do what he should willingly. When he obeys through physical punishment, he does not do so willingly.

It is difficult sometimes to be really kind to a child. He wants to eat candy to excess, he wants to stay up late, he wants to play when he is called for meals, he wants and wishes according to his nature and his ideas that give into him what harm his growth. We observe through his ideas and teach him to know what is good for him—but not by beating him.

When his wants are not for his good, we must say, "No." If he is old enough, we explain and stand firmly on that decision. If he is too young for reasoning, we say, "No," direct his attention elsewhere and, if necessary, make him go where we want him to be.

Children want to feel strength of purpose in their parents, but not through beating them.

Youngsters like to lean on parental strength, even as they protest in decisions. There was a wise old child who said to a friend, "You are going to do that? My parents would never allow me to. They'll soon stop me. Don't your parents care what you do? Mine do."

Real kindness is firmness to do what is right by a child. We say, "Yes," whenever we can, but when "No," and stick to it. But we never, never beat the child.

"At first it was a single verse on a full page. This cost the man the money and something like \$300 a page for the tabloids and double that or more for the regular sized papers in Washington.

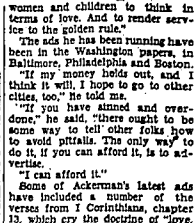
The plot thickened to the point where the newspapers, their phone boards jammed, asked the man who he please sign his name? And what was he up to?

"I do not wish to let people think that I am trying to publicize my business," he told me. "I probably spent more money for ads than any other man in the same business in this area."

No doubt the man has, "Is there any reason," he asked, "why I cannot spend some of this money to get God into every home? My motivation is not a self-seeking one. I want more and more men."

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Experts Begin West's Annual Cricket Battle

RENO, Nev., March 23.—The west's annual battle against Mormon crickets is beginning here. Big guns for the fight against the voracious, wingless grasshoppers will be concentrated in Nevada and Utah, where the cricket problem is particularly serious this year.

But preventive spreading of poisoned bran and other wheat also scale in Idaho, Montana, Colorado, Wyoming and California.

A research program will be set up about 50 miles north of Reno by Frank Cowan of the U. S. bureau of entomology's research division at Boteman, Mont.

Cheaper Ways Sought

Cowan and scientists are trying to find cheaper methods of fighting the crickets. The poisoned bran and wheat methods are expensive because so much hand labor is entailed.

The researchers will experiment with three types of sprays containing chlorinated hydrocarbons in an oil solution. Previous research has shown them to be highly effective.

Of Nevada's 70 million acres, more than 1,000,000 are infested by crickets this year. They are concentrated along the north-south mountain ranges north of U. S. highway 89, in many cases as near crop as grass lands.

The control program, to cover some 300,000 acres of Nevada and some 700,000 acres in Utah, will be handled in Nevada through a cooperative effort of the state department of agriculture and federal agencies.

Strip Land Bare

Although they can't fly, Mormon crickets crawl and hop one to two miles a day, stripping the land bare as they go.

It took real work last year to keep the crickets from invading the central Nevada town of Austin. The tremendous black horde came within yards of the town's center.

Director George Schwela of the agricultural department said Nevada is better prepared to combat them this year and he expects no repetition of the cricket march on Austin or other towns.

The infestation in Utah is worst in southeastern Tooele county. In Idaho—the crickets are scattered through the southern counties, but a particularly heavy infestation exists along the central Idaho-Idaho-Oregon border near Enterprise, Ore. About 70,000 acres will be baited in Idaho.

Infestations are light in Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and California, but preventive work will be done to combat their growth.
