### 100 Tribesmen in Africa Massacred

NAIROBI, Kenya, March 27 (AP)—Mau Mau terrorists massacred at least 100 pro-British Kikuyu tribesmen, their wives and children in a wild raid last night at a village almost on the outskirts of Kenya's capital.

They also attacked a police station about 40 miles away, killing five Africans and releasing all prisoners from jail.

The village attack was the biggest yet by the Mau Mau in its campaign of terror aimed at driving white men out of this agriculturally rich British crown colony in East Africa. In the past year the terrorists have murdered nearly 300 persons.

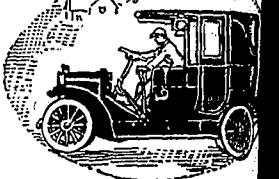

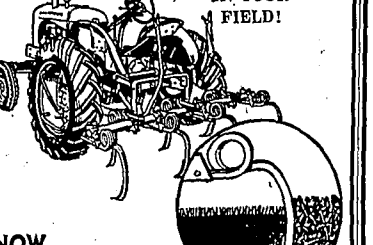

### Well, Gasline Experts Back Company Bid

WASHINGTON, March 27 (U.P.)—Contractors said Thursday they could drill natural gas wells in Colorado and New Mexico and build a pipeline to carry the fuel to the Pacific northwest.

They testified at a power commission hearing on applications to pipe gas to Washington and Oregon that they would do the work for Pacific Northwest Pipeline company, which proposes to develop the San Juan basin field and build a 3,000-mile pipeline.

**\$14,000 Per Well**  
John J. Moran, veteran driller from Wichita Falls, Tex., said his company would undertake to drill in the San Juan basin field for \$14,000 a well.

Moran said Moran brothers, which he heads as president, had completed 15 gas producing wells at San Juan and has four rigs working in the field.

Robert Thomas, Fort Worth, Tex., general manager of River Construction company, testified his firm would lay pipe for 35 million dollars, the construction cost estimated by Richard D. Ricketts, who designed the proposed line.

**Bids on Fall Job**  
Thomas said his company would bid, if Pacific gas the necessary license for the pipeline, on the laying of the entire pipeline. The 1,400-mile main line would run from Arapahoe, Colo., through parts of Utah, Wyoming and Idaho, to Portland, Ore., Seattle and Bellingham, Wash. Laterals would extend to the Dry Piney gas field and Rock Springs, Wyo., and to Spokane, Walla Walla, Wenatchee and Hanford, Wash.

Both Ricketts and Thomas used airplanes to look over the proposed pipeline route. Neither inspected the route on the ground.

Ricketts estimated the pipeline cost after aerial inspection, three other engineers over the route in cars to confirm his estimate. Only one other engineer made in the route over mountainous country as a result of inspection on the ground, Ricketts said.

**NEW YORK, March 27**—International Business Machines Corporation unveiled its newest, fastest and most talented neuron yesterday. It is a giant new calculator known formally as the electronic data processing machine and, informally and affectionately around the IBM shop, as the 701. Its power are staggering.

It can work out the most complicated mathematical problem 25 times faster than its IBM predecessor, the selective sequence electronic calculator, although it takes one quarter the space.

The 701 averages 14,000 mathematical operations a second, without losing a decimal point. It not only adds, subtracts, multiplies and divides like a fantastic genius, it also "remembers" by means of electronic storage devices—cathode ray tubes, magnetic drums and magnetic tapes.

It will do everything for you except cheat on your income tax. Its accuracy is guaranteed if it is fed instructions properly.

A highly complex problem that takes men eight weeks to work out can be solved in six minutes by the 701.

### 10 Million for Forest Access Routes Slated

**LEWISTON, March 27**—The federal budget bureau has approved a 10 million dollar expenditure to build forest access roads in the Pacific northwest during the 1954 fiscal year beginning July 1, Secretary Dworkin R. J. announced Thursday.

If the funds are appropriated by Congress, Dworkin said in a telephone interview from Washington, D. C., the money will be divided between two northwest regions. One is the northern Idaho and western Montana district infested with bark beetles. The other is an Oregon-Washington area where marketable trees have been blown down in great numbers by winds.

"The budget bureau has not attempted so far to divide the appropriation between the two districts," Dworkin said.

The original budget left by President Truman earmarked 20 million dollars for the coming fiscal year for this forest access road work.

While the figure has been reduced to 10 million dollars, Dworkin said, "I have been advised that another 10 million dollars will be allocated for the following fiscal year. The U. S. forest service says the total costs will be amortized over five years by returns from the sale of timber which the roads will make available for marketing."

Soviet Okays Moscow Visit By 10 Editors

LONDON, March 27 (AP)—Soviet Russia in the latest of a series of conciliatory gestures to the west has granted 10 American newspaper and radio editors permission to visit Moscow for a week.

It will be the first group of American correspondents Russia has permitted to visit Moscow in six years.
